

AN INTRODUCTION TO ARCHAEOLOGY Dr. S.M. Bard, M.B., B.S. (H.K.), Hong Kong Archaeological Society Wednesdays, 5.30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. starting October 2, 1968 Extra Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings plus 2 museum visits and 2 site visits. Enrolment is limited to 30 persons. Fee: \$50

other visits

The museum visits will be arranged during the course at times to be announced, the other visits will take place on Sundays in November to sites in Lamma and Lantau Islands. The cost of the course does not include expenses in connection with field visits.

Instruction will deal with the fossil record of early man and the general field of prehistory, archaeological, techniques and questions of chronology in relation to tools and pottery. Special reference will be made to the prehistory of China and to sites in Hong Kong An introductory study of method and techniques in archaeology will precede the site visits. The talks will be illustrated by exhibits which can be handled by the students and many slides.

The courses are either in the nature of mid-career instruction of the refresher type, or provide an opportunity for professionals to discuss relevant and new issues.

Group B is related to the appreciation and understanding of Architecture as a Fine Art and is intended mainly for interested laymen, though professionals may well find them of value.

A Building Science, Practice and Management

"The Building and its Services" and "Structures and Techniques" continue the series of courses begun last year. Each is complete in itself.

THE BUILDING AND ITS SERVICES — FIRE CONTROL Commencing In January 1969.

The ten lectures will discuss requirements of local and other codes of practice and will explain the technical basis of equipment available for control and prevention of fire.

17 STRUCTURES AND TECHNIQUES — SLIPFORM 14th to 15th November, 1968. The Extra-Mural Town Centre and visits.

A two day short course consisting of a series of lectures on the theory and practice of the slipform technique, using Hong Kong examples as illustrative material. Lectures will be followed by a seminar discussion and visits Full particulars will be published nearer to the proposed date. THE NEW FORM OF BUILDING CONTRACT Mr. Peter Sanderson, F.R.I.C.S., F.I.S. (F.M.), F.I.Arb., Resident Partner of Messrs Langdon & Every. Mondays, 5.30 p.m. to 7.00 p.m., starting September 30, 1968 The City Hall, Committee Room North, 8th Floor. Opening lecture plus 10 meetings, once weekly. Fee: \$5 (for initial meeting), \$50 (all meetings)

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The work of the Joint Co-ordinating Committee for the drafting of a Standard Form of Building Contract for Hong Kong has now been completed and the new standard form is available for use by Architects in their dealings with Developers and Contractors. The Committee was composed of representatives nominated by the Hong Kong Society of Architects, the Society of Builders (Hong Kong) and the Hong Kong & China Branch of the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors.

This new form differs in many ways from the RIBA Standard Form of 1963 which has been used as the basis of the new document. The talks by Mr. Sanderson will be presented in two parts.

- (a) The opening lecture will cover only the fundamental difference between the two contracts and no further detailed explanation will be given
- (b) The subsequent ten lectures will deat clause by clause with the ramifications of the entire document

THE BUILDING INDUSTRY — AN ANALYSIS Mr. M.G. Munday, Dip. Arch., A.R.I.B.A., Lecturer in Building Technology, Department of Architecture, University of Hong Kong. Mondays, 5.45 p.m. to 6.45 p.m., starting September 30, 1968. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$45

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Few durable consumer products are as unique, as expensive, as complex, as large, as permanent and as influential as buildings. Few are designed and made by such a diverse group of people, in such a wide range of materials and techniques, for so many differing needs

These products are the Building Industry's very reason for being, and this short but provocative illustrated review aims to show that, as an organisation designed to produce them, and so meet a very important social and economic need, it has no grounds for complacency. Yesterday's criteria for success will be shown as being inappropriate for tomorrow and reappraisal, reorganisation and rethinking by all concerned in the building process is essential.

This course is strongly recommended as an introduction to the Symposium on Building Industry Documentation, (see Course No. 21) and adequate attendance will entitle the participant to at least observer membership

SYMPOSIUM ON TECHNICAL DOCUMENTATION FOR THE BUILDING INDUSTRY IN HONG KONG Organisers Jon A. Prescott, B.Arch., M.C.D., A R I B A , A M T P I , Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hongkong. M G Munday, Dip Arch. A R I B A , Lecturer in Building Technology, Department of Architecture, University of Hong Kong Extra-Mural Town Centre. Spring, 1969.

Between now and the end of the century, the Building Industry faces an enormous increase in demand for its products. It is known that it will be necessary to at least double the present stock of buildings within this period, if only to meet the growth in population, let alone achieve improvements in standards. The Industry is also aware that, to meet these needs and challenges in a world of increasingly rapid social, economic and technical change and advance, it must be properly organised and equipped. That it has cause for concern in this respect is evidenced by the extensive self-analytical studies it has felt necessary to initiate in recent years in many countries. In all cases a recognition of their inter-dependence by contractor, architect, supplier, engineer surveyor, manufacturer, planner and government agency alike is seen as a pre requisite to the re-organisation needed to achieve such improvements.

Inter-dependent relationships require an organisation based on a sound network of communications, and it is the formal technical aspect of this, plus the documentation that goes with it, that is the subject of particularly close attention and spectacular change in the Industry today Developments in documentation automation, standardisation and coding and their effects on the building process are of special significance.

This Symposium, which continues the series on vital aspects of Hong Kong industries, is linked to research studies which are already under way in the University of Hong Kong—It aims to bring together local and overseas experts in this field both to review developments in other parts of the world and to discuss their inevitable relevance to the current and future working of the Building Industry in Hong Kong

Participation in the Symposium will be by invitation, and details will be published in due course. In the meantime persons interested in it, or in the research studies mentioned, are requested to contact the organisers for further particulars.

CERTIFICATE COURSE IN HOUSING MANAGEMENT

Due to factors outside our control, the Certificate course will not commence, as had been hoped in October 1968, but will now begin in 1969.

The course will be in two parts, Intermediate and Final and will involve instruction on at least two evenings per week plus a half day release requirement with employers. A Certitificate will be awarded for the Final Examination only.

The Syllabus will have the approval of leading Managers of Real Estate, The Hong Kong Branch of the Institute of Housing Managers and several Government Departments. Full details are available by writing to the Director of Extra Mural Studies.

THE CHINESE ARCHITECTURAL TRADITION Mr. C.H. Wong, M.C.D. (Liv.), B. Arch. (Sun Yat Sen), Senior Lecturer in the Department of Architecture, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 3.00 p.m. to 4.00 p.m. starting October 2, 1968. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$40

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The Tutor will touch upon theories and beliefs affecting architectural forms from Han to Ching Dynasties, and will discuss not only the development of buildings and their details but also the larger issues of layout and building relationships in town design. The lectures will be copiously illustrated.

BACKGROUND TO JAPAN — THE ARTS AND ARCHITECTURE Lectures and Study Tour.

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Japan will become the Mecca of tourists in 1970 when the "Expo" is scheduled to be held in Osaka. Since the best of todays Architecture and Industrial Design to be found in Japan is of world significance this will be of great importance to persons having design interests.

It is proposed in 1970 to conduct a Study Tour of Japan which will allow for a series of visits to "Expo" but will also take into account the wider traditions and culture of the country as a whole.

This preliminary announcement is made now since the question of booking will obviously be of great importance. We shall invite applications for places simultaneously with a course of background fectures covering physical and geographical structure, basic religion and philosophy, traditional design, the growth of the modern movement in Architecture and and its relationship to world developments and the Japanese problems and solutions in City and Regional Planning. The courses will begin in the Spring Term of 1969 and continue throughout the year in preparation for the tour which will be held in March/April 1970 coincident with the Easter vacation.

The number of enrolments for the Study Tour will be limited to 20 persons, priority being given to those attending the pre-study tour lectures and in order of booking. Prices will be held as low as practical and accommodation arranged in traditional Japanese Inns wherever possible.

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A VISION OF GREECE Philosophy, Classics — Mr. George Mahood, M.A. (London), Architecture — Mr. Jon Prescott, B.Arch., M.C.D., A.R.I.B.A., A.M.T.P.I. Greek Art — Miss Marcia Vale B.A. (Brit. Col.). M.A. (Kent). Wednesday, 8.15-9.30 p.m., starting October 16, 1968. Extra-Mural Town Centre, 10 meetings.

Much of the character and tradition of ancient Greece is mirrored in her plastic art and architecture: vases and statues celebrate the gods and heroes of myth, or sometimes the Greek love of athletics or again that popular and essential ingredient of Athenian life — the drinking-party or symposium; great buildings (such as the Parthenon) commemorate past legends and present glory

The three lecturers will collaborate in each session, Mr. Prescott and Miss Vale providing illustrations of architecture and plastic art and Mr. Mahood commenting on these as keys to Greek life and society from the feudal aristocracy of Ulysses' time to the democratic era enshrined in the Athens of Pericles, Socrates and Plato. It is hoped that a special showing of a film based on the Greek heritage can be arranged to add interest to the series.

Art and Design

Instruction in Art and Design is planned primarily for the needs of the bona fide student who wishes to follow the three year programme leading to a Certificate in Fine Art, Advertising Design or Interior Design on a part-time basis. These courses provide for the essential skills and knowledge required of an artist or designer, together with a basic training in the professional aspects of the students chosen specialty.

Many courses are open to other than certificate students particularly in the Pre-Certificate Term I and day time courses are provided for those wishing to pursue art studies for personal pleasure or discovery.

Owing to limitations of space in the studios of the Town Centre and in the interests of good teaching the numbers accepted for courses primarily planned for certificate students will be restricted to the numbers mentioned with each course and priority will be given to certificate students over those wishing to attend only single courses.

For persons having a non-professional interest the series of lectures entitled "Grammar of Visual Form" would however provide a theoretical nucleus from which an attiude to design can grow and a sound grasp of the principles there expounded coupled with a knowledge gained from pre-certificate foundation courses in Form, Colour, Draughting and Theory would be of immeasurable value whatever practical classes are chosen in, for example, painting, ceramics, drawing or design.

Entry Requirements

Hong Kong School Certificate or equivalent with a good working knowledge of the English language. Appropriate experience or ability will be taken into consideration. This includes satisfactory participation in a relevant Extra-Mural art course with at least 75° attendance

Satisfactory completion of the studio work and courses included in the Pre-Certificate training will be necessary and final acceptance will depend upon interview and approval of the Advisory Panel.

Course Syllabuses and Examinations

Each complete Certificate Course covers three years. A year consists of two unequal length terms, the first of 12 weeks and the second of 15 weeks, making a total of 27 weeks in all. In courses which are predominately studio orientated, the work produced during the terms plus any vacation period tasks will be assessed as a whole at the end of each year by the Examining Board, consisting of the Advisory Panel and Course Tutors as relevant. It is particularly important at this portfolio examination that all work should be shown, in as far as progress can only be judged by comparison of good and bad and early and later exercises. Certain other subjects will be examined by written papers. At the moment these are:

After completion of this initial term the student will select one out of the three present streams of Fine Art, Advertising Design or Interior Design, and will take the lecture series and studio sessions which have been grouped so as to provide a scheme of systematic study leading, over three years, to the Certificate in Art and Design. The choice of streams may well be eventually enlarged by adding other subject areas as this becomes possible.

Materials and Equipment

All students will be required to have a portfolio (size 35" x 25" min.) for storage of studio work during the term. This is particularly important as all work is required for the examination at the end of each year. Facilities are provided adjacent to the studios for storing these on the premises to save constant transportation of a bulky item. In addition students will be required to purchase:

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A double elephant size T square
A double elephant drawing board (for home use)
45° and 60° set squares
Drawing scales, instruments and pens (a basic minimum only)
Brushes, poster paint, water colours, pencils, etc. as required
Drawing paper of various types
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Advice will be given on equipment needed prior to the commencement of each course and students should wait until they have been so briefed before they purchase, to avoid buying needlessly complex or expensive equipment not required by the tutors or lecturers.

A retail shop is open on the premises for the convenience of students at times suited to the lectures and studio periods, so that purchases can be made during the time of instruction as required. Prices are very competitive with other shops in town.

Fees

The prescribed Pre-certificate Courses will be available as a group for the reduced overall fee of \$300

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The Course fee for terms of 12 weeks will be $200 The Course fee for terms of 15 weeks will be $250
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Fees are to be paid in advance. Registration will be accepted for a WHOLE YEAR only. Examination fees are extra.

24 INTRODUCTION TO AESTHETICS Mr. Henry Steiner, M.F.A. (Yale). Thursdays, 6.00 p.m. to 7.00 p.m. starting 3rd October, 1968. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$50.

Aesthetics is usually considered to be the study of beauty in art, but as standards of beauty have altered through history, it might more broadly be defined as the study of the rules that make art 'Art'. Accepting the idea that there are laws of perception, as well as ideals of proportion, contrast and harmony — which even the most apparently 'formless' and 'meaningless' modern art acknowledges by rebelling against them — this course seeks to examine these underlying rules as they apply to the visual arts. Through lectures, slides and discussion this course will attempt to awaken those with little previous background or training to the rational basis of art and equip them with a set of standards to use in judging for themselves the merits of works of 'gure' or applied visual art

25 RELATIONSHIPS OF FORM AND COLOUR Mr. Tao Ho, B.A. (Williams), B. Arch. (Harvard). Mondays, 6.00 p.m. to 7.30 p.m., starting 30th September, 1968. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$75

The two parts of this course will consider two dimensional formal relationships basic to any understanding of visual pattern making, Composition, and also theories of colour and systems of organisation (Oswald and Munsell) which help to explain basic phenomena such as contrast, harmony, discord, transparency, etc.

Instruction will be given in the form of a series of exercises which will be used as a starting point for discussion each week, but this is basically a lecture series having no studio work during the period of instruction.

The aim of a Grammar of Visual Form is to provide a training in visual understanding. The Course which consists of four sections, is based on the studies of Kurt Rowland, whose work for the Council of Industrial Design in England has resulted in a textbook on visual education. Parts C and D show how the "grammar" formulated in Parts A and B may be applied.

Certain sessions will conclude with the setting of a small practical exercise which will be discussed briefly at the following meeting

Part A, Year 1, Pattern and Shape
In the visual world everything can be reduced
to patterns and shapes. A study of their
nature and functions enables us to look at our
surroundings with deeper insight. Patterns
are effected by the materials used and are
deeply influenced by the social, economic
and cultural backgrounds of the pattern
makers.

Part C, Year 2. The Shapes We Need
There are two strands in all design—the rational, scientific and analytical aspect and the intuitive, inspired", human influence. The man made world is a synthesis of these two and the balance will vary. Discussion will centre on how these elements are combined, how they influence results and what principles are involved.

Part B, Year 1, Development of Shape
Form is the outcome of forces acting on
material—when the material and the forces
change, the forms they create must also change
Consideration will be given to Form based on
technology, the effect of traditional and modern
materials on form, natural development and
function, and to the relationship between

shape, materials, processes and function

Part D, Year 2, the Shape of Towns
The town is the most complicated and ambitious man-made set of shapes and its study brings out the importance of the variety and a vast scale of design problems. Town design is an art form, though we look at it chiefly as a means of solving the problems of organised urban living. However, as in all design, the intuitive element is still required in order to restore those qualities of delight which are an essential element of our well being.

"The profession of interior design has had a long struggle to free itself from the image of the interior decorator. There is a growing appreciation that transference of the interior designer from the atmosphere of the boutique to the architectural design studio is not enough and that there is a need to establish far more scientific basis for interior decisions."

Like all creative work, interior design depends on an understanding of the principles and disciplines which can be scientifically outlined but it depends on something more—an intuitive element without which the results can be sterile

The special courses to be provided over three years will introduce a scientific attitude to design and although the lecture series will be independent they will be correlated to form a whole

STUDIO

Studio periods will form an essential part of the Interior Design courses when exercises will be discussed. In the studio all aspects of the work coalesce and for this reason such work forms perhaps the most important part of the instruction and the subsequent portfolio examination.

B. English as a Second Language

A sound working mastery of the fundamentals of English is one of the greatest needs in Hong Kong life. To meet this, the Department, building on its experience of a wide variety of English teaching over recent years, has introduced a carefully integrated and intensive scheme. This programme — "Use of English" I and II — is designed to develop and improve skills in written and oral English for people such as clerks, secretaries, junior executives, post-secondary students, teachers and others whose work, e.g. in commerce, industry, government and teaching, requires a thorough command of basic English.

As with all Extra-Mural courses these are not intended for students in Secondary Schools.

The courses are examinable and those successfully completing Part II will qualify for a certificate in Advanced Use of English.

Details of entry requirements are given with the course particulars below. This is essentially a 2 year scheme with Part I leading by examination results to Part II. However, applicants wishing to enter Part II immediately can do so provided they satisfy the entry requirements (See "Use of English" II).

USE OF ENGLISH I

Classes will be held both in Hong Kong and Kowloon as follows:

Hong Kong English School Certificate or Hong Kong Chinese School Certificate pass in English These should be of recent date. Preference will be given to those with a credit. Candidates are requested to enclose a photostat copy of the appropriate certificate along with their application form. Students will be allocated to classes according to qualifications to ensure the best teaching situation. There may be minor re-allocation after the first meeting with class tutors.

Parallel courses will be offered in Hong Kong and Kowloon and students should indicate their preference for location. This will be met if at all possible.

The number of classes offered is at the discretion of the Department, but every effort will be made to accommodate all those eligible.

Details of Syllabus:

A careful balance will be kept between spoken and written English, including essential revision of grammar and vocabulary-building. Use will be made of a wide range of selected reading material relevant to Hong Kong to develop powers of comprehension. More formal English practice will include precis, report and simple creative writing.

The Revolutions of 1911 and 1949 transformed a tradition-conscious China into a dynamic civilization. They brought to the fore conflicting ideas of nationalism and communism, democracy and totalitarianism. The decades prior to the Revolutions had seen the introduction of new political and ideological factors that came to dominate China. These provided the necessary stimulants for change and change she did. This series of lectures attempts to analyse in historical terms the reasons for this change.

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
