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

Tuesdays, 5.45 p.m. to 6.45 p.m., starting 21 January, 1969. Extra-Mural Town Centre, and Fire Prevention Training School, 323 Java Road, North Point, 10 meetings. Fee: \$45

A series of ten lectures on different aspects of the problem of Fire Control, each taken by an expert in the particular topic involved, followed by a terminal lecture period when all the Tutors will be in attendance to answer questions and when an extremely well made film "Setting Fires for Science" will be shown.

This discussion will cover legislation on means of escape, codes of practice, fire protection in building construction and prevention of spread of fire, legislation and details of fire service installations, building materials characteristics, ventilation and air conditioning special problems.

### CERTIFICATE COURSE IN HOUSING MANAGEMENT

## Appreciation B

### BACKGROUND TO JAPAN

This series of courses has been arranged to provide a background for a planned Study Tour in Japan in 1970. It will coincide with the Osaka International Exposition 'Expo 70' which opens on the 15th March, 1970 and is the first world exposition to be held in Asia.

The Study Tour will concern itself with the man made environment and Arts and Architecture of Japan in the context of an emergent industrialised nation having powerful traditional ties, and will cover both these traditional elements and modern aspects of Japanese culture.

Lecture courses are planned to commence in January 1969 with basic studies of the historical outline up to the turn of the century and will allow a gradual build up of knowledge as indicated by the provisional programme given here.

#### **OUTLINE PROGRAMME OF STUDIES** (subject to final confirmation)

#### Spring 1969

Pre-History: The Archaeology of Japan, Migration of peoples and early Anthropology Historical Outlines AD400-1912 Physical Geography and simple Geology, Regionalism, National Resources and Materials.

#### Autumn 1969

Traditional Architecture and Garden Design. The Supreme Craft of the Potter, Traditional Arts Painting and Sculpture. Religion: The Importance of Shinto, Zen and Buddhism generally, Noh Plays, Kabuki and Bunraku Theatre, Mythology & Literature.

(cont.)

Historical Outline: The Emergence of a New Nation 1900-1970 Architecture: Modern Design of World Significance. Urban & Regional Planning Problems and Work Studies. Contemporary Trends in Fine and Applied Arts. Economic and Industrial and Commercial Organisation.

Participants wishing to take a Japanese language course at an elementary level and with emphasis on conversational everyday phrases will find a suitable course under languages during the Autumn and Spring Terms 1969-1970.

Full details of the arrangements for the Study Tour will be given in the 1969-70 main brochure published in August 1960.

Arrangements are being planned for a larger group to spend approximately one week in Osaka or Kyoto within easy access of the Exposition, yet close to the historic traditional centres of culture of Kyoto and Nara; whilst a smaller group who wish to stay longer may spend a further period in a more extensive study of the country.

The lecture programme will be augmented from time to time both by additional items and an extensive programme of films commencing in Autumn 1969. The programme is presented with the co-operation of the Japan Cultural Centre.

23A I PRE-HISTORY OF JAPAN AND Hiroaki Kani, M.A., Keio University, Japan II HISTORICAL OUTLINES AD400 to 1912 W.E. Cheong, B.A., Ph.D. (London) Mondays, 6.00 p.m. to 7.00 p.m., starting 20th January, 1969. 15 sessions, Extra-Mural Town Centre. Fee: \$65 (Part I taken separately \$15, Part II taken separately \$55)

Part I will form a short introductory course of three lectures giving an outline of the archeology of Japan, early migration patterns, neolithic Jomon and Yayoi cultures and the mythology and folklore of the Nihongi.

Part II will build on this foundation and follow the history of the Japanese nation from the first recorded history of AD 400 to the beginning of this century. Mr. Kani is seconded from Keio University at Chung Chi College, Chinese University of Hong Kong and Mr. Cheong is lecturer in History in the University of Hong Kong.

These lectures will be followed in January 1970 by an analysis of the emergence of the modern nation as we know it today.

## 23B PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY, REGIONAL PATTERNS & RESOURCES OF JAPAN

C.K. Leung, B.A. (H.K.) additional tutors will lecture from time to time, *Mondays*, 7.00 p.m. to 8.00 p.m., starting 17th March 1969. Extra-Mural Town Centre, 10 sessions. Fee: \$45

A series of background lectures ranging from the Geology, morphology and climatic variations within the country, its natural regions and resources and the settlement patterns, both traditionally and in association with the distribution of industrial development.

These lectures will provide a background for later discussion of planning problems and the economic and industrial development of modern Japan.

Owing to limitations of space in the studios of the Town Centre and in the interests of good teaching the numbers accepted for courses primarily planned for certificate students will be restricted to the numbers mentioned with each course and priority will be given to certificate students over those wishing to attend only single courses.

#### PRE-CERTIFICATE TRAINING

All students wishing to enter upon certificate courses have normally to take the pre-certificate training first.

## **Foundation Courses**

GRAMMAR OF VISUAL FORM Jon A. Prescott, B. Arch., M.C.D., A.R.I B A., A.M.T.P.I. & Kwok Chiu Leung, N.T.D.

Parts A & B Tuesdays, 6.00 p.m. to 7.30 p.m., starting 21 January, 1969. Parts C & D Fridays, 8.00 p.m. to 9.30 p.m., starting 24 January, 1969. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. (each course) Fee: \$75

The aim of a Grammar of Visual Form is to provide a training in visual understanding. The Course which consists of four sections, is based on the studies of Kurt Rowland, whose work for the Council of Industrial Design in England has resulted in a textbook on visual education. Parts C and D show how the "grammar" formulated in Parts A and B may be applied.

Certain sessions will conclude with the setting of a small practical exercise which will be discussed briefly at the following meeting.

#### Part A, Year 1, Pattern and Shape

In the visual world everything can be reduced to patterns and shapes. A study of their nature and functions enables us to look at our surroundings with deeper insight. Patterns are effected by the materials used and are deeply influenced by the social, economic and cultural backgrounds of the pattern makers.

#### Part C, Year 2, The Shapes We Need

There are two strands in all design—the rational, scientific and analytical aspect and the intuitive, "inspired", human influence. The man made world is a synthesis of these two and the balance will vary. Discussion will centre on how these elements are combined, how they influence results and what principles are involved.

#### Part B, Year 1, Development of Shape

Form is the outcome of forces acting on material—when the material and the forces change, the forms they create must also change. Consideration will be given to Form based on technology, the effect of traditional and modern materials on form, natural development and function, and to the relationship between shape, materials, processes and function.

#### Part D, Year 2, the Shape of Towns

The town is the most complicated and ambitious man-made set of shapes and its study brings out the importance of the variety and a vast scale of design problems. Town design is an art form, though we look at it chiefly as a means of solving the problems of organised urban living. However, as in all design, the intuitive element is still required in order to restore those qualities of delight which are an essential element of our běing.

#### LIFE DRAWING & ANATOMY I

Michael F. Griffith, A.T.D., Fridays, 6.00 p.m. to 8.00 p.m. and 8.00 p.m. to 10.00 p.m., (groups A & B) starting 24 January, 1969. Extra-Mural Town Centre, 15 two hourly periods. (Students will be assigned to group A or B) Fee \$90, A model will be used for which there will be an additional charge of \$25. (Payable in advance)

A beginners class. Stress will be laid on the underlying structural framework of the human form through a knowledge of basic anatomy, and on understanding both bone structure and muscle arrangement. The use of different media will be encouraged after a preliminary period of study of parts of the body in detail.

## Practice

This class will be duplicated if necessary on Tuesdays 8.00 p.m. to 10.00 p.m., starting 21 January, 1969.

The graphic presentation of ideas is an essential basic requirement in all design work, of key importance in communicating the intention of the designer to his lay client. These studio periods will by way of a series of exercises introduce a variety of methods of presentation for the schemes undertaken. Emphasis will be given to the effective presentation of plans, sectional elevations as well as to the most important descriptive method the perspective.

The course will build on the knowledge which was the subject of Drawing Board Technique I (Course No. 27) and non-certificate students wishing to take it should have some previous experience.

The discipline of drawing from life has long been recognised as the finest training in the correlation of hand and eye for any artist or designer. Stress will be laid on the underlying structural framework of the human form through a knowledge of basic anatomy. The use of different media will be encouraged.

This course is aimed at students who have had some previous experience. There is also a Life Drawing & Anatomy I course for beginners. (see no. 40)

An intermediate level class for continued painting experience in various media. The The aim is to allow individual students to develop at their own pace under expert guidance. Non-certificate students who have taken Part I Painting or who have a little experience already will be welcome.

PAINTING INQUIRY-A CONTINUING SEMINAR AND STUDIO Mr. Hon Ch. Fun and Guest Tutors. *Tuesdays*, 5.45 p.m. to 7.45 p.m., starting 21 January 1969 Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 periods Fee \$90

This continuing seminar will consist of organised discussion combined with studio practice, the whole emphasis being on the discussion of expression of ideas, methods of work and approach to conceptually creative thinking.

Under the general direction of Mr. Hon Chi Fun various well known Hong Kong Artists will participate from time to time.

There will be a limited enrolment of 15 students who should be either registered certificate students or have considerable painting experience to their credit.

INTRODUCTION TO THREE DIMENSIONAL DESIGN Paul Selinger, MFA (San Francisco Art Institute), *Thursdays*, 6.00 p.m. to 8.00 p.m., starting 23 January, 1969. Place to be announced. 15 periods. *Fee: \$90.* An extra charge will be made for materials used.

A series of studio/workshop sessions introducing students to the problems of three dimensional composition and sculpture. Students will work on practical problems in various media and should be prepared to devote additional time to that involved in formal tuition, to the further development of their work.

A general appreciation of formal composition and two dimensional applications is a prerequisite.

This initial series of meetings will present an introduction to the work of an advertising agencey. The work will consist of practical exercises, and the outline work of an agency will be discussed in formulating the problems involved.

Studio facilities provide the core of the Advertising Design students work bringing together all aspects from printing technology to abstract formal considerations. As, however, advertising relies very greatly on "ideas" as well as Graphic Design it is important to appreciate what ideas mean, why they are good, how to get and exploit them. Within the framework of a series of carefully conceived exercises the student will apply ideas, in terms of layout, copy and photographic application for both advertisement and packaging designs.

They will provide a study in some depth of the features of printer's type, his type case, type setting and justification, point systems and classification, preparation of copy, page layout, composition, paper and paper calculation, lino types and monotypes, etc. The study will be closely co-ordinated with studio exercises provided in Course 34.

46 DRAWING TECHNIQUES-MIXED MEDIA AND USE OF PHOTOGRAPHY Albert Hill, I.A.Dip., Wednesdays, 8.00 p.m. to 10.00 p.m., starting 22 January 1969. Extra-Mural Town Centre, 15 periods. Fee: \$140

> The Tutor who is well known for his book illustrations and advertising work will cover a wide range of techniques applicable to black and white illustrative work. Line drawing, scraperboard, use of various pens, airbrush techniques, will be analysed and compared and the usefulness of the camera demonstrated alongside the use of graphic arts material. The making of transparencies, photo composition, typography and use of camera for documentary work will be discussed. The course is envisaged as an introduction to this wide subject and will continue into next year.

Work will continue into the 2nd Year, Term 3, for certificate students. Non-certificate students are welcome.

Application of this data will be made in the studio technical drawings.

After World War II Britain began to dismantle gradually her empire. This course will cover the policies of empire as layed down in London, the changes in policy as they occurred, and the implementation of policy in Southeast Asia during the century and a half following 1800.

Specific types to be referred to will include theism, existentialism, scientific humanism and linguistic philosophy.

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
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
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
