

 - 4th to 10th February 1970-(Chinese New Year)
- The course fee will-cover the entire duration of a course or part of a course. Fees are not refundable once the course has commenced.
- Certificates of Attendance are issued on payment of 50 cents, to those who have attended not less than two thirds of a course of at least
 20 meetings duration.

A PRACTICAL INTRODUCTION TO ARCHAEOLOGY Dr. S.M. Bard, M.B., B.S., (H.K.), Hong Kong Archaeological Society Wednesdays 5.45-7.00 p.m., starting 17th September, 1969. Extra Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings plus 2 museum visits and 3 site visits. Enrolment is limited to 30 persons. Fee: \$50

The museum visits will be arranged during the course at times to be announced, the other visits will take place on Sundays in November to sites in Lamma and Lantau Islands. The cost of the course does not include expenses in connection with field visits.

Instruction will deal with the fossil record of early man and the general field of prehistory, archaeological techniques and questions of chronology in relation to tools and pottery. Special reference will be made to the prehistory of China and to sites in Hong Kong. An introductory study of method and techniques in archaeology will precede the site visits. The talks will be illustrated by exhibits which can be handled by the students and by many slides.

This one day Symposium will provide an opportunity for experts (engineers, contractors and architects) to discuss Slip Form Techniques in association with methods of construction associated with this system.

Papers will be read and discussions held as follows:-

GENERAL PLANNING & STRUCTURAL CONCEPTS including relationship of core, shear walls and other structural elements. Precasting of associated members. Economic feasibility.

PRACTICAL PROBLEMS OF TECHNIQUE including details of shuttering method. Constructional Sequence. Connections. Contracting problems.

DETAILS OF ACTUAL PROJECTS IN HONG KONG including reports by the designers and professional persons involved to assess the effectiveness, efficiency and general usefulness under Hong Kong conditions. The Symposium will last for one day, but will be supported by a small Exhibition of relevant material.

Full details, a timetable and copies of contributory papers will be circulated to participants prior to the date of the Symposium.

CERTIFICATE IN HOUSING MANAGEMENT

The aim is to provide a local qualification in Housing Management for people already working in the field and for others hoping to take up housing management as a career. The course is intended to provide a firm grounding in the theory and practice of housing management.

The standard and content of the course and its examinations are designed to be the equivalent of the Diploma in Housing Management sponsored by the United Kingdom Institute of Housing Managers. The syllabus is related to that of the Institute but will be strongly geared to local relevance.

The course runs over three academic years. Year I and II prepares candidates for the Intermediate Examination and Year III for the Final Examination.

A Certificate in Housing Management issued by the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong, will be awarded to a candidate on passing the Final Examination and on producing evidence of having had at least two years' approved experience in housing management work.

Fee: Year I - \$600 Year II - \$600 Year III - \$800

BACKGROUND TO JAPAN

A Study in connection with Man Made Environment, Arts & Architecture.

This series of courses has been arranged to coincide with the Osaka International Exposition 'Expo 70' which opens on the 15th March, 1970 and is the world exposition to be held in Asia.

The Study will concern itself with the man made environment and Arts and Architecture of Japan in the context of an emergent industralised nation having powerful traditional ties, and will cover both these traditional elements and modern aspects of Japanese culture.

Lecture courses commenced in January 1969 and have covered basic studies of the historical outline up to the turn of the Century including archaeology and a limited discussion of geographical features.

Further studies are planned as follows in Spring 1970;

Historical Outline: The Emergence of a New Nation 1900-1970 Architecture: Modern Design of World Significance. Urban & Regional Planning Problems and Work Studies. Contemporary Trends in Fine and Applied Arts. Economic and Industrial and Commercial Organisation.

Participants wishing to take a Japanese language course at an elementary level and with emphasis on conversational everyday phrases will find a suitable course under languages during the Autumn and Spring Terms 1969-1970.

The lecture programme will be augmented from time to time both by additional items and an extensive programme of films.

Art and Design

The courses in Art & Design are primarily planned to give a balanced basic visual education (both practical and theoretical) on which subsequent study can be soundly based.

Commencing this year, the previous Pre-Certificate training, consisting of one term of 12 weeks will be extended to encompass a full academic year of 27 teaching weeks and this will be regarded as a FOUNDATION YEAR with, as a consequence, the vocational elements of the three year Certificate Course restricted to the two final years. Students will be given introductory talks on the vocational aspects of the Design Courses, which can be undertaken within the somewhat limited means at our disposal. The object of even the vocational aspect of these programmes is to provide a general rather than a particular study so as to open students' eyes to the wider opportunities rather than to provide a narrow specialism in terms of design.

It is emphasised that Design cannot be practised in a vacuum or without a full technical understanding of the media involved, and the inclusion of specific courses in for example technological subjects, or in management and costing techniques, is essential for students wishing to put their more intuitive skills, and their understanding of form and colour, to practical and business use.

The Integration of Design skills into the Management and Industry of Hong Kong is one of the present great needs of the community; and the courses are envisaged as being of practical use in helping to meet this requirement.

Art & Design Courses are arranged so as to be available on a Liberal Studies basis for the general student.

Owing to the limitations of space and in the interests of good teaching the numbers accepted will be limited, with priority, of course, given to Certificate Students over those wishing to attend individual courses in isolation.

Course Syllabuses and Examinations

Each complete Certificate Course covers three years. A year consists of two unequal length terms, the first of 12 weeks and the second of 15 weeks, making a total of 27 weeks in all. In courses which are predominately studio orientated, the work produced during the terms plus any vacation period tasks will be assessed as a whole at the end of each year by an Examining Board, consisting of the Advisory Panel and Course Tutors as relevant. Certain subjects will be examined by written papers.

Detailed requirements for written examinations will be made known as the course proceeds and adjustments in the syllabus and requirements may be made from time to time at the discretion of the Director of Studies and the Board.

After completion of the initial year the student will select one out of the three present streams of Fine Art, Advertising Design or Interior Design, and will take the lecture series and studio sessions which have been grouped so as to provide a scheme of systematic study leading, over two years, to the Certificate in Art and Design. The choice of streams may well be eventually enlarged by adding other subject areas as this becomes possible.

Entry Requirements

Evidence of a good working knowledge of English is an essential for most Certificate and other courses in Art & Design. In view of the few facilities in schools to make Art a subject for the Hong Kong or London Certificate of Education, Ordinary or Advanced level, no formal requirements in these subjects are made for entry to the Certificate Course. A sound general education up to Ordinary levels G.C.E. and compliance with the age requirements for Extra Mural enrolment, (18 years minimum), is necessary.

Candidates will be selected by interview and mature students will be admitted on evidence of interest or professional involvement without necessarily possessing G.C.E. passes. 14

It is only fair however to point out to candidates who wish to follow further courses of study, in for example the United Kingdom, that a minimum entry requirement of 5 "O" level passes plus 2 "A" level passes or 3 "A" level passes plus evidence of a good general educational background represent minimum standards for entry to 1st Degree or equivalent level courses in Art & Design overseas and for which a good portfolio from our Certificated; Foundation type, course might provide a background for entry.

Materials and Equipment

All students will be required to have a portfolio (size 35" x 25" min.) for storage of studio work during the term. This is particularly important as all work is required for the examination at the end of each year. Facilities are provided adjacent to the studios for storing these on the premises to save constant transportation of a bulky item. In addition students will be required to purchase:

A double elephant size T square
A double elephant drawing board (for home use)
45° and 60° set squares
Drawing, scales, instruments and pens (a basic minimum only)
Brushes, acrilic or oil paint, poster paint, water colours, pencils, etc. as required
Drawing paper of various types.

Advice will be given on equipment needed prior to the commencement of each course and students should wait until they have been so briefed before they purchase, to avoid buying needlessly complex or expensive equipment not required by the throws or lecturers.

A retail shop is open on the premises for the convenience of students at times suited to the lectures and studio periods, so that purchases can be made during the time of instruction as required.

FORMAL RELATIONSHIPS AND TEXTURES Tao Ho, B.A. (Williams) B. Arch. (Harvard) Mondays 6.00-7.00 p.m., tutorial 7.00-8.00 p.m., starting 22nd September, 1969. Extra Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings.

The course will consider two dimensional formal relationships basic to any understanding of visual pattern making and composition. Analysis of textural quality will accompany the exploration of the sensual effect of different materials.

Instruction will be given in the form of a series of exercises which will be used as a starting point for discussion each week, but this is basically a lecture series having no studio work during the period of instruction.

Mr. Tam is a talented and lively contemporary painter in the Chinese manner who derives great strength from the traditions which he knows so well.

The division of time in this course will be such as to allow the earlier lectures of the series to be devoted to the technical problems related to materials, basic elements and composition of Chinese painting, as a prelude to the understanding of its history. Important theories of early masters and their influence, the systems of classification, the greater influence of certain 'masters' and a pictorial analysis of their painting will be related to this early technical analysis and to a weekly exercise, the criticism of which will form a basis for discussion to give the student a deeper understanding of the achievement of the past and its vitality as a basis for today's work.

The course will be illustrated both by actual paintings or reproductions and slides.

VOCATIONAL: Interior Design

"The profession of interior design has had a long struggle to free itself from the image of the interior decorator."

Like all creative work, interior design depends on an understanding of the principles and disciplines which can be scientifically outlined but it depends on something more — an intuitive element without which the results can be sterile.

The courses provided over two years introduce to students a scientific attitude to design and although the lecture series are independent they will be correlated to form a whole.

STUDIO

Studio periods will form an essential part of the Interior Design courses when exercises will be discussed. In the studio all aspects of the work coalesce and for this reason such work is perhaps the most important part of the instruction and, for Certificate Students, the subsequent portfolio examination.

English as a Second Language

A sound working mastery of the fundamentals of English is one of the greatest needs in Hong Kong life. To meet this, the Department offers a carefully integrated and intensive scheme. This programme — "Use of English" I and II — is designed to develop and improve skills in written and oral English for people such as clerks, secretaries, junior executives, post-secondary students, teachers and others whose work, e.g. in commerce, industry, government and teaching, requires a thorough command of basic English.

As with all Extra-Mural courses these are not intended for students in Secondary Schools.

The courses are examinable and those successfully completing Part II will qualify for a certificate in Advanced Use of English.

Details of entry requirements are given with the course particulars below. This is essentially a 2 year scheme with Part I leading by examination results to Part II. However, applicants wishing to enter Part II immediately can do so provided they satisfy the entry requirements (See "Use of English" II).

USE OF ENGLISH I

Classes will be held both in Hong Kong and Kowloon as follows:

The aim of this course is to increase the Student's ability to handle the English language commencing with intensive oral work designed to eradicate faults in spoken English. This will be followed by drills of a remedial nature providing sound practice in the effective use of the language.

Entry Requirements:

Hong Kong English School Certificate or Hong Kong Chinese School Certificate pass in English. These should be of recent date. Preference will be given to those with a credit. Candidates are requested to enclose a photostat copy of the appropriate certificate along with their application form. Students will be allocated to classes according to qualifications to ensure the best teaching situation. There may be minor re-allocation after the first meeting with class tutors.

Parallel courses will be offered in Hong Kong and Kowloon and students should indicate their preference for location. This will be met if at all possible.

The number of classes offered is at the discretion of the Department, but every effort will be made to accommodate all those eligible.

Details of Syllabus:

A careful balance will be kept between spoken and written English, including essential revision of grammar and vocabulary-building. Use will be made of a wide range of selected reading material relevant to Hong Kong to develop powers of comprehension. More formal English practice will include precis, report and simple creative writing.

Entry Requirements:

Pass in terminal examination of "Use of English" I, Matriculation or recent G.C.E. O-Level English. There will also be selection by interview.

Details of Syllabus:

The aim of the course is to improve the student's grasp of idiomatic English through exercises in advanced comprehension and interpretation. It will involve wide and careful reading, including books and cyclostyled material, of varied styles and content-matter. This will develop the student's ability to read deeply and critically. Comprehension will be of two types: the writing of a precis after intensive study of a passage; and the answering of brief questions after rapid reading of a prose passage on a general topic, as training in quick assessment of essential points. The material used will include articles from newspapers or

periodicals on social, political and economic themes. Essay work will involve writing explanations and reports on the basis of information supplied, the purpose of this being to expand the student's ability to write clearly and logically in a given set of circumstances familiar to him.

The course will be valuable to teachers of English whose native speech is Mandarin. It will also be useful to English learners of Chinese who have some previous knowledge of Mandarin.

Decisions made in the field of Urban or Rural planning, which are of fundamental importance in the creation of the evironment in which we live, are frequently incomprehensible to the average citizen even should he be fully aware of them before their effect is manifested in physical reality.

This situation for example in the United States has resulted in the appearance of a form of intermediary, a professional 'advocate planner' whose prime purpose is to advise and explain from a non official, but informed, level the significance of planning proposals at their formative stages. The importance of the awareness of what is planned by the general public as well as the property owner and developer, and even his participation in the decision making processes of Planning will be discussed, in the course of this series of talks.

The structure of Hong Kong's planning machinery will be examined, and conclusions drawn on the effectiveness of the relationships existing at present.

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
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
