

BACKGROUND TO JAPAN

A Study in connection with Man Made Environment, Arts & Architecture.

This series of courses has been arranged to coincide with the Osaka International Exposition 'Expo 70' which opens on the 15 March, 1970 and is the first world exposition to be held in Asia.

The Study will concern itself with the man made environment and Arts and Architecture of Japan in the context of an emergent industrialized nation having powerful traditional ties, and will cover both some traditional elements and modern aspects of Japanese culture.

Lecture courses already held have covered basic studies of the historical outline up to the turn of the century including archaeology and a limited discussion of geographical features.

The rapid growth of the Japanese economy in the nineteen fifties and sixties has brought about drastic changes in the spatial distribution of population and activities. The initial lecture will outline the steps taken to resolve the problems resulting from these changes: The comprehensive National Land Development Plan of 1969, the 1968 "civil minimum" plan for Tokyo and the City Planning Law which came into effect in 1969.

The second lecture will be devoted to Housing. Japan produces annually more than a million dwelling units. An outline will be given of present housing policies together with a description and evaluation of the different kinds of Government Aided Housing.

The aim of a 'Grammar of Visual Form' is to provide a training in visual understanding. The course consists of four sections and is based on the studies of Kurt Rowland whose text* is used as a reference. Parts A & B "Pattern & Shape" and "The Development of Shape" will be offered in the 1970-71 session. Parts C & D "The Shapes We Need" and "The Shape of Towns" are offered in the current session.

C. "The Shapes We Need"
The man made world is a synthesis of two approaches to design, the rational, scientific and analytical aspect and the intuitive 'inspired' human influence. Discussion will centre on how these elements are combined and what principles are involved.

D. "The Shape of Towns"

The Town is one of the most complex man made set of shapes which exists. Its study brings out the variety and vaste scale of design problems. Though we may look at it chiefly as a means of organizing the problems of urban living, Town Design is an art form.




