

- 2. The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant.

A PRACTICAL BASIS FOR ARCHAEOLOGY S.M. Bard, M.B.,B.S.(HK), Hong Kong Archaeology Society. Wednesdays, 5.45 – 7.00 p.m., starting September 23, 1970. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings plus 2 museum visits and 3 site visits. Fee: \$60

Dr. Bard's revised course will deal with the fossil record of early man and the general field of prehistory, archaeological techniques and questions of chronology in relation to tools and pottery. Special reference will be made to the prehistory of China and to sites in Hong Kong. An introductory study of method and techniques in archaeology will precede the site visits. The talks will be illustrated by exhibits which can be handled by the students and by slides.

The Museum visits will be arranged during the course and other visits will take place on Sundays in November to sites in Lamma and Lantau Islands. The cost of the course does not include expenses in connection with field visits.

Enrolment is limited to 30 persons.

A new series in Grammar of Visual Form will commence in February, 1971.

157 HISTORY & TECHNIQUES OF CHINESE PAINTING Lawrence C.S. Tam, B.A. (Hons) London. (A) Mondays, 8.00-10.00 p.m., (B) Mondays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting September 21, 1970. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 27 meetings. Fee: \$70 (12 meetings), \$90 (15 meetings), \$150 (27 meetings).

An historical survey of Chinese Painting in which a considerable amount of time will be devoted to the technical problems relating to materials and the techniques of painting adopted at various times. Important theories of early masters, their influence and systems of classification will be discussed together with an analysis of composition.

Practical exercises will be set so as to ensure fuller understanding of the problems involved.

A new series of History of Art I - the general introduction to historical method and survey from Lascaux to the 19th Century will commence in February, 1971.

Lectures devoted to parallel developments in painting, architecture and sculpture in the 19th & 20th centuries.

The tutorials arranged will be for small groups of students and advice on further reading and private study will be provided.

Private work will be essential to gain maximum benefit from this course.

> Dr. Vaughan's course will provide a knowledge of the structural framework of the human form, its muscles and blood vessels as needed to provide a sound background knowledge for figure drawing. He will consider individual limbs and parts of the whole body both in repose and in movement.

> That part of the fee which represents the model fee must be paid separately from that for tuition and will be collected from students on the first evening. Models will be used on nine out of the twelve evenings.

Enrolment is limited to 25 persons.

The Seminar will be orientated towards the requirements of students with experience and will, it is hoped, attract post-certificate as well as final year students. A limited number of places will be available to non-certificate students.

A study of human anatomy and individual three dimensional studies of parts of the human form will lead the student into development of modelling techniques direct from the human form.

A small charge will be made for materials and the model when used.

It will, so far as is possible, follow the syllabus laid down for the Diploma of the Institute of Hospital Administrators and will cover the evolution of the modern general hospital; the basic principles of the National Health Service in the United Kingdom; hospital organisation; internal administration and the relationship of hospital departments one with another.

PRACTICAL ASPECTS OF HOSPITAL ADMINISTRATION A.E. Starling, F.H.A., 49 F.C.C.S., F.R.S.H., Chief Hospital Secretary, Medical and Health Department. Wednesdays, 7.15-8.15 p.m., starting October 14, 1970. Extra Mural Town Centre. 20 meetings. Fee: \$75

This course is designed for mature students with considerable experience in some branch of hospital administration but persons who have completed the introductory course will be accepted. It is intended to provide students with an opportunity to study and discuss practical aspects of hospital administration and students must be equipped to join in discussions on all aspects of hospital organisation, including supplies, development, financial administration, statistics, the staffing organisation of hospitals and the functions and duties of the principal officers. The management courses offered by the Department fall into three main groups.

- In-Company training of Senior Executives in the principles and practice of Management, advice on Management Training Policy, administrative systems, and setting up a Management Development scheme. The nature and length of this work depends entirely on the situation of the Company concerned and the need to be met. Specialist advice may also be called upon in the fields of Personnel Management, Organisation Planning, and Industrial Relations.
- 2. Those which provide an introduction to some of the main management responsibilities and techniques. They are conducted on a lecture-discussion basis and outside reading is encouraged. Although most of them are introductory they are of sufficient duration to be serious courses of study, and by careful planning a student can follow an integrated programme over a period of years.
- 3. Those which require sustained study over a long period and lead to a particular qualification, such as the Diploma in Management Studies or the Certificate in Personnel Management.

Courses in the Use of English

A sound working knowledge of English is one of the greatest needs in Hong Kong life today. To meet this need the Department offers a carefully devised and integrated series of courses in the Use of English which are aimed at improving the students' ability to speak, write and understand English. General courses are offered for those who wish for a greater fluency in English for everyday purposes while the courses in English for Commercial Practice are more specifically related to the kinds of English used in commerce and industry.

All these courses comprise a continuous programme leading to the award of the Department's Certificate in the Use of English on successful completion of the final year.

The two main courses in the Programme are the Use of English I and II, but for those who need more tuition before following the Use of English I course there is a Preparatory Year in which particularly intensive tuition will be given in the basic skills of English both for general usage and for commercial practice.

As with all Extra-Mural courses, these are not intended for students in secondary schools.

The tutors for all these courses will be drawn from a panel of university graduates.

Entrance Requirements: Those who have successfully completed one of the Department's Use of English courses before may enter the next appropriate course without any further test.
