

#### PRIOR ENROLMENT IS ESSENTIAL

Failure to enrol prior to the opening of a particular course may mean the cancellation of that course. Prior enrolment is the only way the Department of Extra-Mural Studies has of judging the response to its courses. Your cooperation is therefore invited in sending your application forms to the Department as soon as possible.

#### SPECIAL COURSES

The Department welcomes enquiries and requests from business organizations, government, voluntary bodies or private institutions for specially designed courses to meet their specific educational needs.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

1. There are normally no entry requirements except that applicants should be over 18 years of age. Occasionally to have the full benefit of a course applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Applicants are therefore advised to read the description of a course carefully. Professional courses usually have clearly defined entry requirements.

- 2. The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant.
- 3. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held:
  - (a) on any public holidays.
  - (b) at a storm warning signal of No. 5 or above. (After the typhoon passes, if the No. 5 signal is lowered before 3 p.m., classes will take place as normal. If the signal is lowered after 3 p.m., classes will be cancelled that evening.)
  - (c) during the following holiday periods: December 22, 1972 to January 2, 1973 inclusive (Christmas and New Year).
     February 2-8, 1973, inclusive (Lunar New Year).
- 4. Fees are not refundable once the course has commenced.

5. Certificate of Attendance are issued, on payment of 50 cents, to those who have attended not less than two-thirds of a course of at least 20 meetings in duration.

6. Closing date for enrolment: one week before the starting date of a course. Late enrolments may not be accepted.

10. You will be notified if you are not admitted because of over-subscription or other reasons. THE DEPARTMENT WILL NOT NOTIFY SUCCESSFUL APPLICANTS WHO ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND THE FIRST MEETING OF THE CLASS AT THE PLACE AND TIME ADVERTISED.

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# Archaeology

21. A basic Course in Archaeology with Reference to Hong Kong. S. M. Bard, M.B., B.S. (H.K.), Chairman, Hong Kong Archaeology Society. Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 27, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 9 meetings plus 2 museum visits and 3 field trips. Fee: \$115

Instruction will cover the fossil record of early man and the general field of prehistory, archaeological techniques and questions of chronology in relation to tools and pottery. There will be an introductory study of method and techniques in archaeology and the talks will be illustrated by exhibits and slides. The latter part of the course will outline the development of archaeology in Hong Kong and relate this to recent finds.

The course will include two museum visits and participation in three field work sessions of the Hong Kong Archaeology Society.

The cost does *not* include transport and personal expenses on the field trips.

Enrolment is limited to 30 persons.

22. A Review of the Prehistory of Hong Kong. James C. Y. Watt, M.A. (Oxon.). Curator, Art Gallery and Museum. Institute of Chinese Studies. Chinese University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting December 6, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 3 meetings. Fee: \$30

Mr. Watt will review the prehistory of Hong Kong as currently accepted in the light of recent research and various discoveries in mainland China and in S.E. Asia generally. Particular reference will be made to contributions to knowledge made by new material found in Thailand as well as the new ideas generated by mainland finds.

Preference will be given to those people who have attended Dr. Bard's basic course in this or previous years. Please state on your application if you have attended one of these courses.

Enrolment will be limited to 25 persons to allow time for discussion.

#### ARCHITECTURE

The programme of Seminars for Architectural Studies and short courses in Building method and technology is presented in joint sponsorship with the Hong Kong Institute of Architects, an allied Society of the Royal Institute of British Architects, London.

23. The Law and the Architect. Wednesday, 5.30–10.30 p.m., September 20, 1972. Club Lusitano, 11th floor, Duddell Street. Fee: \$40

A series of papers and discussion on related topics involving the law and the position of the Architect within the professional framework.

The speakers will be as follows and the fee includes dinner, which will be served at 8.00 p.m. sharp, and a copy of the revised contract.

Peter W. Sanderson, F.R.I.C.S. The Hong Kong Standard Form of Contract. Its recent modification as agreed between Contractors, Architects and Surveyors.

Richard Griffin, A.I.Q.S., A.I.Arb. Implied warranties and the Standard Form of Contract.

John J. Swaine, Barrister at Law. The legal aspects of limited liability.

Bar service will be available from 5.30 p.m. and the first speaker will commence at 5.50 p.m.

24. The Architect's Office Library. Christine F. Will, B.A. (Queensland), A.L.A.A. Mondays, 2.30-4.00 p.m., starting October 2, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 4 meetings plus 1 practical session in Technical Reference Bureau, School of Architecture. Fee: \$45

Mrs. Will who is an associate of the Library Association of Australia has specialised in library work for Architects for many years. She will cover the organisation and establishment of a specialist architectural library, accessions, periodicals and trade materials, classification systems and their values, the best use of resources, and the relationship with outside reference facilities.

The course will be an essentially practical one designed for the particular circumstances of Hong Kong offices. Principals and their representatives are recommended to attend.

25. The Computer as a Tool in the Building Industry. R. Shamdasani, B.Eng., D.I.C., Ph.D. (Imperial College, London). Wednesdays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting October 11, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings plus visit to Computer Installation. Fee: \$175

The course is planned for graduate engineers, architects and builders in order to illustrate the usefulness of the Computer as a tool in design and management. The lectures and discussions will cover computer fundamentals, the usefulness of existing programmes in Hong Kong but *not* programming. Use will be made of computer output.

This is essentially a practical course at the level of management for professional application. The cost includes use of computer time to provide runs for discussion.

#### PLANNING

26. Basic Planning Theory and Hong Kong Developments. Chan Hung-kwan, M.A. (H.K.), M.T.C.P. (Syd.), Lo Chai-wan, M.A. (H.K.), M.Phil. (Lond.), A.M.T.P.I. and Pun Kwok-shing, M.A. (H.K.), M.T.C.P. (Syd.), M.R.A.P.I. Fridays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting October 6, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings plus 3 visits. Fee: \$120

Recent developments in Planning theory will be related to present need in Hong Kong and the possible future development here. Planning systems and processes locally and elsewhere will be discussed prior to consideration of the various aspects of the practice of Town Planning in Hong Kong. Development control, the participation of the man in the street, existing law, government structure will form some of the topics involved. The course is aimed at interesting thinking citizens in the whole process of control of their environment.

27. Macau and Hong Kong As Examples of City Form. Jon A. Prescott, B.Arch., M.C.D., Architect R.I.B.A., M.R.T.P.I. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting October 24, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 8 meetings. Fee: \$50

The physical development of Macau and Hong Kong will be related to the history of the importance and traditions of these two cities since their founding. The physical expression of the demands of society at different periods is an open book for those who can read it. Macau the 'City of the name of God'. Hong Kong the trading port on its all important harbour. Historically, both produced physical environments of a high order. Hong Kong's historical form, now gone, has been replaced by a foretaste of high density city building which is maybe still to come elsewhere in Asia, and Macau's, in process of more gradual destruction, has become a victim of neglect and untutored desires to ape the shape of the new big city, Hong Kong.

The story of their development and change is laced with imported formal ideas of city growth as well as the direct result of local needs.

The lectures will be extensively illustrated with historical and recent slides.

29. The Impact of Mass Housing on the Environment. B. F. Will, B.Arch., M.Urb. Studies (Queensland) and others. Mondays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting October 9, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings plus two site visits (at times to be determined by class). Fee: \$85

A review of the past history and development of techniques of housing in Hong Kong will be assessed in the light of the pressures under which the programme was implemented. The impact of the existing situation on society will be discussed, the reactions of residents and the present social and physical patterns will be paralleled by an examination of the administrative and financial implications of the preconceived forms of the estates themselves. An attempt will be made to suggest future advances needed to correct past mistakes and some assessment of current problems arrived at. The course will be conducted mainly by Mr. Will but he will bring in a sociologist and other housing experts during the conduct of the meetings.

Preference will be given to those candidates whose work involves housing matters in Hong Kong.

Enrolment will be limited to 20-25 to allow time for discussion.

30. The Environmental Revolution, Hong Kong. Brian J. Hadland, Dip.Arch., Dip.T.P., Architect R.I.B.A., M.R.T.P.I., General Co-ordinator, Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., startings October 17, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre, fortnightly, 5 meetings in the Autumn Term and continuing in the Spring Term in a similar way. Fee: \$50

A forum is proposed in the form of a series of seminars when papers will be delivered, films shown and discussion steered to the relationship of environmental problems in Hong Kong.

In Max Nicholson's words, 'It has been aptly said that one thing in the world is invincible—an idea whose time has come. Such an idea, in these days is the care of man's environment.'

Hong Kong has been fortunate to host since the 1960s, a series of international conferences on conservation and development, on the city, on human ecology. It has seen the establishment of Government committees on pollution, pressure groups like the Conservancy Association and the careful collection of knowledge in the surveys for Colonywide planning.

Conservation of the Environment involves many disciplines and all of us as individuals. This Forum is seen as a focus of present thinking in Hong Kong for Hong Kong.

#### 31. Certificate Course in Fundamentals of Art & Design

An evening course extending over two years each of 3 terms of 10 weeks duration. Formal instruction is concentrated into three or three and a half evenings per week, but considerable additional private work will be necessary.

The object of this foundation level course is to provide a range of studies and understanding which will enable students, whatever the nature of their previous education, to gain an opportunity to develop talents and discover interests in the field of Art & Design.

Fee: \$900 per annum

Enrolment is limited to 25 persons.

Entry Requirements: Consideration will be given to those who have an interest in Art & Design and proficiency in English up to at least the level of the Hong Kong English School Certificate, grade E.

The syllabus outline is as follows:

- 1. Consideration and evaluation of Visual Criteria.
- 2. History of Western Art and Architecture with concentration on 19th and 20th centuries. History of Oriental Art and Architecture, including techniques.
- 3. An understanding of Man as an individual, and Man in Society in relation to Design expression.
- 4. Understanding of the Nature of Materials and Visual and tactile relationships and values. Colour theory.
- 5. Drawing Techniques both free and mechanical, Life Drawing.
- 6. Studio: Two Dimensional Studies ranging from Painting to Printmaking.
- 7. Studio: Three Dimensional Studies ranging from Sculpture and Construction to Design problems.

The course consists of formal lectures, seminars and discussions and considerable studio work.

#### 32. Certificate Course in Graphic Design

An evening course extending over 2 years each of 3 terms of 10 weeks duration. Formal instruction will be concentrated into two or three evenings per week, but considerable additional private work will be necessary.

The object of this post-foundation level course is to provide vocational training for persons who have:

- (a) completed the foundation level course in Fundamentals of Art & Design, OR
- (b) are working in Graphic Design or Advertising and can show evidence of basic knowledge and ability in drawing and presentation techniques as will exempt them from the course mentioned in (a), OR
- (c) can show evidence of educational attainment which is the equivalent of (a)

Entrance to the course will be governed by consideration of these factors plus an ability in the use of English which is the equivalent of the Hong Kong English School Certificate Grade E or above.

The syllabus outline is as follows:

- (1) Studio: Advanced presentation techniques. Illustration. Printmaking. Problem solving. Special Study.
- (2) A comprehensive study of Printing Technology.
- (3) Specification for various media. Processes of Production.
- (4) Principles & History of Graphic Design & Advertising. Communication through Design.
- (5) Photographic techniques and technology. Film as a media.
- (6) Agency Organisation. Professional Practice. Management.

Fee: \$1,000 per annum.

#### 33. 室內設計應用營做法概論

(Interior Design)

主 講 人:張鎭堃先生。 講授語言:粤語。 地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心。 時 間:一九七二年十月十一日起,每星期三下午六時 至七時卅分。共三十講。

學費:二百四十元。

課程之主要目標在向執業室內設計及裝修工程的人士簡介 營造法之概念。營造法式為其作業日常面對的問題,故應有明確 的認識。室內設計者能夠了解其工作塲所之樓宇結構與設備方式 的原則,即不致造成損害原有建築物的錯誤。對樓宇設備各方 面具有一般之知識,可以預測各專門工程的需要,預留應付的方 法,避免工程上無謂的損失。

營造法之精微要點,為着意闡述之課題,使學者領悟優良 構造之重要,能將其引用於室內裝修工程。

科目包括下列各項:

建築营造法:建築基礎緒論,穩定性,重量分佈,複雜地 盤處理,打樁。不智之擾動。承重牆及桁架之結構。牆壁種類, 間牆。門窗構造、防水、防風、隔熱、隔聲處理。樓梯構造,欄 杆與安全。屋頂工程。防水、日晒影嚮與隔熱設備。防水封蓋之 重要。擾動與不良好重修之後果。隔熱與隔聲工程原則,重修應 注意要點。

結構工程大綱:工程原則及計算方式淺說。割拆之危險, 過重及誤解「安全因數」之危險。何種情況須邀請工程師協助。

建築法規與防火條例:法定規律意義解釋。故意違例之危 險。須邀請建築師協助之情况。

 樓字設備:潔具、渠管、水電、電梯,空氣調節等設備原 則概論。

面層裝飾:油漆、灰水、樓面、牆紙、批擋、灰漿。材料 種類與質地。造法。本課程專為現役室內設計及裝修工程執業成 員而設。用粤語講述,必要時引用英文名詞,但皆輔以詳細解 釋,及讀音指導。聽講者須作繪畫精良之筆記,及研究圖。 Industrial Design—Preliminary Announcement of a Proposed Post-Graduate Course.

Active investigation is proceeding into the feasibility of conducting an 8-term course in Industrial Design for graduates and others working in Industrial or Product Design with Hong Kong industry or who wish to take up this work now much required by Hong Kong.

Candidates will be sought who hold:

- (a) a first degree (or equivalent) in mechanical, electrical or production engineering; OR
- (b) a qualification of similar level in another branch of technology or science together with evidence of interest in engineering design. Preference would be given to entrants who have industrial experience; OR
- (c) a candidate having experience in Industry and no specific academic qualification in the above subjects, but whose general educational level and background make him an acceptable person capable of profiting from and contributing to the course.

Prepared with the assistance of the Hong Kong Industrial Design Council and the Federation of Hong Kong Industries, it is hoped that the course will commence in January 1973. It will be conducted at weekends, on one evening per week and possibly on a day release basis for one day per week, so that active interest and co-operation of industrialist employers would be necessary. Sponsorship in fact would be preferred.

The course will give emphasis to design values, rather than further acquisition of engineering knowledge.

The Industrial or Product Designer is classified as either a consultant or a staff employee who deals with engineering products; from small plastic, metal or wooden items to machines and apparatus for industrial users as well as electronic and scientific equipment. His contribution to the design process is to apply creative talent both to aesthetic and marketing considerations and to provide an understanding of the needs of the operator or user.

The experience of previous years has shown that there is a real need for a grouped arrangement of courses which would give guidance to persons who wish to have a greater general understanding of the thinking of the artist as well as the rudiments of drawing and painting—extending to a visual understanding of basic three dimensional, sculptural or constructional problems. This course is intended to provide such an introductory package. It is not intended for the professional but for those who wish to pursue art studies for personal pleasure or discovery.

It will consist of,

- 1. Principles of 19th and 20th century Art.
- 2. Principles of 19th and 20th century Design.

(Studio 10.45–12.45 p.m.)

- 3. Principles of composition in two dimensions.
- 4. Outlines of various drawing techniques and methods.
- 5. Painting in various media.
- 6. Principles of composition in three dimensions.
- 7. Simple constructional and sculptural techniques.

Enrolment is limited to 15 students.

36. Interior Design—Appreciation. Ruth H. Addison, Dip.Arch., Architect R.I.B.A., General Co-ordinator, Wednesdays, 2.30–4.00 p.m., starting October 11, 1972. Extra-Mural Town Centre and sites in Hong Kong and Kowloon. 10 meetings. Fee: \$150

Lectures in appreciation of good design in interior work will be accompanied by a series of co-ordinated visits to manufacturers, agents and designers whose products are used in interior design and who manufacture especially for contracts.

The cost of the course does not include personal travel for such visits. Persons enrolling should be prepared to devote all of Wednesday afternoons to the series to allow for travelling time.

### PRACTICAL PRINTMAKING, DRAWING AND PAINTING

These are practical classes in the visual arts with emphasis on imaginative painting or drawing, designed to encourage growth of individual creative powers. Work will be carried on in the various media described. Instruction is individual as classes are restricted in size. Enrolment is open to students at different stages, beginners being particularly welcome.

Materials will be discussed at the initial meeting in each class and students must provide all materials necessary or buy the same through the department.

In cases where a model is used an additional fee will be charged.

38. Printmaking. Miss Diane Hughes, Dip.A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Fridays, 9.30–12.30 p.m., starting October 6, 1972. Studio, University Hall, Pokfulam. 20 meetings. Fee: \$200

Various printmaking techniques and their potential will be discussed and experiments carried out in surface printing and pattern making prior to an introduction to wood block and lino cut techniques. A major feature of the course will be the use of the silk screen.

The student will be expected to provide all materials. A charge of \$15 per head will however be made to cover the cost of inks and rollers, etc.

Students will be preferred if they have a basic ability in drawing.

Enrolment will be limited to 15 persons.

39. Drawing & Painting in Water Based Media. Rosamund Brown. Thursdays, 9.30 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting October 12, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$100

Rosamund Brown is an acknowledged expert in water based media whose paintings using bold techniques in watercolour and water based dyes are much sought after. This introductory course will concentrate on painting, though students will be involved in sketching from live subjects or 'landscape' as a source of ideas. The course will be followed by a further series next term if there is a demand.

#### **ECONOMICS**

**41.** An Introduction to Economics. Laurence Pang, B.A. (H.K.). Thursdays, 5.45–7.15 p.m., starting September 21, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 16 meetings. Fee: \$80

A series of lectures and discussions on economics designed for beginners. This course will serve as an introduction to the subject and will examine the ideas and practices behind contemporary economic policies, including issues of international trade. Examples will be based on Hong Kong.

# 42. 經濟學概念與香港經濟 (Basic Economics with Application to Hong Kong) 主講人:陳坤耀碩士。

43. Economics for Intermediate Examinations. Ng Kwok-leung, B.A. (H.K.), Senior Statistician, Census and Statistics Department. Thursdays, 6.45–8.15 p.m., starting September 28, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 22 meetings. Fee: \$100

The fundamental concepts and tools of modern economic analysis will be discussed in detail. Topics to be considered include general principles governing production, distribution and consumption, theories of price, income and employment, money and banking, international trade, public finance and economic growth.

This course is specially designed for those who are preparing for professional examinatons, such as CIS and ACCA.

44. International Trade and the Hong Kong Economy. T. Y. Poon, B.A. (H.K.), Trade Officer, Commerce and Industry Department. Thursdays 5.45-6.45 p.m., starting September 28, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$40

Output is increased with specialisation and exchange. If countries specialise in providing not only those commodities in which they have an absolute advantage but also those products in which they have the greater comparative advantage or the least comparative disadvantage, their joint output will be greater. This will entail exchange, and all those countries taking part in such trade will be better off. However, international trade is subject to such economic frictions that it requires special study. Topics will include: International trade and resource allocation; The Foreign Exchange Market and Balance of Payments Accounting; Trade Barriers and Economic Welfare; Customs Unions; and Free Trade Areas; GATT; EEC and EFTA; the Kennedy Round; Economic Growth; Foreign Trade Problems; UNCTAD and ECAFE.

#### STATISTICS

45. Economic Forecasting for Investment and Sales. Mohan Phatak, B.Comm. (Poona), M.A. (Poona), M.A. (Rochester), Statistician Diploma (Indian Statistical Inst.), Lecturer in Economics, University of Hong Kong. Fridays, 7.00–8.30 p.m., starting October 6, 1972. University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$75

This is an appreciation course outlining a growing area of management science. The course covers the basic principles of data processing, as well as an appreciation of the role of statistical and operational research techniques in economic forecasting and management. There will be an emphasis on the use of these methods in such fields as sales analysis, the market environment, investment decisions, capital budgeting and planning for optimum growth of the firm.

# Commerce

The courses in this section are aimed at all levels of industry, commerce and the public service. They are designed for two types of student:

- (a) Those who wish to prepare for professional examinations.
- (b) Those who wish to acquire skills and knowledge appropriate to their present responsibilities and future development.

Some courses are more advanced than others and require prior participation in basic courses for admission. In particular, students are advised not to enter for courses geared to examination requirements unless they already have a basic knowledge of the subject and fully intend to take the examination.

There will be other courses arranged during the year at the request of professional societies and industrial firms for which details cannot now be given. Suggestions or proposals for courses are welcome. The Department is always willing to consider arranging special courses for members of a particular firm or organisation or for a group of such bodies.

#### COMMERCE

47. Export Documentation and Procedures. Various tutors. Fridays, 5.45–6.45 p.m., starting September 29, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$65

More than any other economy Hong Kong lives by its exports. To help businessmen with the many problems which arise in exporting, the Department of Extra-Mural Studies has brought together a team of lecturers from Government and commerce who will provide guidance on legal and technical difficulties. Speakers will cover the following topics:

The necessity for good public relations is becoming increasingly evident in Hong Kong and is vital to the well-being of the community. Its role as an aid to modern marketing, as a means of conveying ideas and policies, and in assisting companies and institutions in developing sound reputations and relationships will be discussed. There will be some examination of the techniques of public relations and the qualifications that help to make a successful public relations officer or consultant. No previous knowledge of the subject is assumed.

**51.** General Accounting. D. S. Sukheswalla, A.A.C.C.A., A.C.I.S. Fridays, 5.45–7.15 p.m., starting October 6, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 20 meetings. Fee: \$100

Preparation of books of prime entry including day books, journals, cash books and ledgers, preparation of trial balance, profit and loss account, and balance sheet of sole proprietors and partnerships will be explained. Detailed consideration accounting.

Suitable for those wanting a basic knowledge of book-keeping and of accountancy.

Accountancy for Intermediate Examinations. Marshall S. H. Mar, B.Comm., A.A.S.A. Tuesdays, 7.00–8.30 p.m., starting September 26, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 24 meetings. Fee: \$110

The principles and objectives of accounting; Double entry bookkeeping; The relationship between profits and losses and assets and liabilities; Capital and revenue income and expenditure; Classification of assets and liabilities; Reserves and provisions.

The accounts of sole traders, partnerships and non-trading bodies; Trial balance; Manufacturing, Trading and Profit and Loss Accounts; Appropriation Accounts; Balance Sheets.

Accounting adjustments; Accrued income and expenditure; Depreciation; Bad debts; The preparaton of final accounts from incomplete records. Branch and departmental accounts; Consignment accounts; Joint venture accounts; Hire and purchase accounts; Bills of exchange; Branch accounts of joint stock companies; analysis of financial statements.

Students for this course must already have a basic knowledge of accountancy up to at least L.C.C. elementary bookkeeping level. Only serious students will be admitted.

Consolidation of holding and subsidiary companies accounts; company accounts; partnership, including sole trader incomplete records; departmental and branch accounts; manufacturing accounts; accounting ratios; mechanised accounting including computer application; bankruptcy, liquidation and receivership accounts, miscellaneous accounts.

Applicants for this course must either have passed the Intermediate level or else in the opinion of the tutor have acquired sufficient knowledge of accountancy (e.g. by previous satisfactory attendance at appropriate accountancy courses).

54. Cost Accounting. T. N. Adams, A.C.M.A. Tuesdays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting October 3, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 18 meetings. Fee: \$90

The classification of costs; costing for wages including incentives; costing for materials, stock control; the collection, classification, allocation and apportionment of overheads; job, contract, process, single, marginal operation and standard costing and budgetary control.

This course is designed for students taking professional accountancy examinations at intermediate level.

55. Auditing. Andrew Y. K. Poon, A.C.A. Wednesdays, 7.00-8.30 p.m., starting October 4, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 22 meetings. Fee: \$00

Topics discussed will provide knowledge of the principles and practical know-how of auditing. Recent developments of and recommendations from professional bodies over auditing and accounting matters will also be discussed. The course should prove of interest to students who are preparing for professional examinations and to those whose work is related to auditing and accountancy.

56. Taxation and Accounting Problems. Charles Lo, Ll.B. (Lond.), A.A.S.A. Tuesdays, 7.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 26, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 20 meetings. Fee: \$75

The principles and practice of Hong Kong Income Tax Law. Topics include discussion of property tax, salaries tax, profits tax, personal assessment and the related problems. Decisions of court cases and the practical aspects of submitting tax returns and appealing against tax assessments will also be discussed.

Recommended Reading: Hong Kong Island Revenue Ordinance. Hong Kong Tax Cases.

57. Practical Aspects of Taxation. J. K. S. Thong, F.A.C.C.A., F.C.I.S. Fridays, 8.15–9.15 p.m., starting October 6, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$60

The principles of assessing incomes liable to taxation and the problems arising. The various functions of the Departments of the Inland Revenue including the duties and powers of the Assessors, the Board of Inland Revenue and the Board of Review. The practical problems of submitting tax returns, expenses, claims and appealing against tax assessments. It is suitable for business executives as well as those wanting a basic knowledge of how taxes on corporations and individuals are levied and paid.

Prior enrolment is the only way the Department of Extra-Mural Studies has of judging the response to its courses. #### SHIPPING AND SHIPBROKING

This series of courses has been drawn up in collaboration with the Hong Kong Branch of the Institute of Chartered Shipbrokers. Lectures are specifically related to the requirements of Part I and Part II Examinations for Associateship of the Institute. Whilst any person may apply to join the series, in cases of oversubscription to one of the courses preference will be given to students of the Local Branch of the Institute of Chartered Shipbrokers. It is not intended that this series of courses should cover all aspects of examination requirements for Part I and Part II of Associateship. The sources of law: Common Law, Statute Law, Equity. Structure of the Courts and the English Legal System. General Principles of Law of Contract: nature of contract, capacity, types of contract, formation, discharge, remedy for breach. The nature of Tort: the tort of negligence with reference to shipping. General Principles of Law of Agency: the creation and termination of agency: the legal relationship between principal, agents, and third parties.

The Sale of Goods: Sale of Goods Act 1893: FOB, CIF, ex-ship contracts, stoppage in transitu. Contract of Affreightment, including rights, obligations and immunities at common law and under statute. Charter Parties and Bills of Lading: basic legal characteristics and applications, including time barring of actions. Statutes relevant to the Carriage of Goods by Sea, Merchant Shipping and Bills of Lading. Laytime demurrage, despatch money, freight and special clauses. 60. Commercial Geography. Wong Kam-Yeung, B.A., Demonstrator in Geography, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting January 9, 1973. Extra Mural Town Centre. 8 meetings. Fee: \$60

Subjects to be considered in this course include the physical and economic elements of general world commercial geography such as climatic influences, physical settings, natural products and industrial regions. Discussion topics will also include the world's seaborne trade, routes and distances, reasons for the location and development of ports, canals, and navigable waterways.

61. Shipbroking Practice. Senior Members of the Institute of Chartered Shipbrokers (Hong Kong Branch). Fridays, 7.00–8.30 p.m., starting January 5, 1973. Lecture Room South, 8/F., City Hall. 6 meetings. Fee: \$45

Types of Dry Cargo Vessels and Tankers, including basic designs and constructional details: tonnages, methods of propulsion and capacity plans: general and specialised vessels for cargoes and trades. Types of Cargo, including methods of packing, stowage factors and requirements. Lloyds Register, duties of their Agents and Surveyors: abbreviations and their meanings: class requirements. Ships Agency Operations, including documentation, Customs and Dock Authority requirements, services to Master and crew, disbursement accounts, Agency correspondence, Bills of Lading, Statement of Facts, and General Average. Chartering: offer and counteroffer: types and standard forms of Charter-Parties: basic clauses contained in Drycargo, Tanker, Voyage and Time Charter Parties.

Structure of Commerce. Neil Carr, B.A., M.A., Dip.A.D., Fridays, 7.00–8.30 p.m., starting February 23, 1973. Lecture Room South, 8/F., City Hall. 6 meetings. Fee: \$45

Subjects to be discussed in this course include the nature and scope of commercial activity, the main commercial functions, including exchange, transport and storage, finance, risk-bearing. Supply and demand, and their effect on price under conditions of competition and monopoly. Money, bills of exchange, methods of payment and foreign exchange. The balance of payments and International Trade. Banks and their main services. Business ownership, control, the provision of capital, its use and the relationship of capital, stock, turnover, expenses and profit.

## Management

Staff Tutor: T. W. Casey, Telephone 5-468161 Ext. 305

The management courses offered by the Department fall into three main groups.

- 1. In-Company training of Senior Executives in the principles and practice of Management, advice on Management Training Policy, administrative systems, and setting up a Management Development scheme. The nature and length of this work depends entirely on the situation of the Company concerned and the need to be met. Specialist advice may also be called upon in the fields of Personnel Management, Organisation Planning, and Industrial Relations.
- 2. Those which provide an introduction to some of the main management responsibilities and techniques. They are conducted on a lecture-discussion basis and outside reading is encouraged. Although most of them are introductory they are of sufficient duration to be serious courses of study, and by careful planning a student can follow an integrated programme over a period of years.
- 3. Those which require sustained study over a long period and lead to a particular qualification, such as the Diploma in Management Studies or the Certificate courses in Personnel Management, Hospital Administration or Social Welfare Administration.

#### The Lions Management Loan Fund

Through the generosity of the Lions International, District 303, the Department of Extra-Mural Studies is able to offer loans to cover the cost of fees in the Diploma in Management Studies and the Certificate in Personnel Management. #### Diploma in Management Studies

The Department of Extra-Mural Studies is responsible for this two-year part-time day release Diploma which is offered to graduates or other suitably experienced and qualified candidates. Those selected will be expected to attend for two evenings per week and to be given release by their employers for one afternoon per week over the two year duration of the course. # ENGLISH IN TRANSLATION

The importance of English/Chinese and Chinese/English translation is daily becoming more evident. The Department of Extra-Mural Studies therefore offers courses in this skill at two levels. The first of these is intended for those who have had little or no experience of it and the second for those who have completed the first course satisfactorily or who have had a certain amount of experience. # CERTIFICATE COURSES IN THE USE OF ENGLISH

A sound working knowledge of English is one of the greatest needs in Hong Kong life today. To meet this need the Department offers a carefully devised and integrated series of courses in the Use of English which are aimed at improving the students' ability to speak, write and understand English. General courses are offered at First and Second Year level for those who wish to improve their English for everyday purposes and, at Second Year level only, there are also courses in English for Commercial Practice which are more specifically related to the kinds of English used in commerce and industry.

All these courses comprise a continuous programme leading to the award of the Department's Certificate in the Use of English on successful completion of the second year.

As with all Extra-Mural courses, these are not intended for students in secondary schools.

The tutors for all these courses will be drawn from a panel of university graduates.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS: Those who have successfully completed one of the Department's Use of English courses before may enter the next appropriate course without any further test. All those who are enrolling for the first time should possess an English or Chinese Certificate of Education, or equivalent, with a pass in English Language. In order to ensure that they can be placed in a course at the appropriate level they will be also required to sit a grading test. All such applicants are therefore asked to indicate on their application form which of the following dates they can come to sit this test:

# General Courses

In order to improve the basic skills in English of the students, intensive tuition will be given in speaking, writing and the understanding of written and spoken English. The tutors will set assignments to be completed at home, and these will then be marked and discussed in class with the students. A large number of articles on topical subjects and short stories are available for comprehension and appreciation, and at all times the students will be given plenty of opportunity to express their own ideas. Throughout the course, and particularly at First Year level, the importance of the oral usage of English will be emphasized.

Students are advised to apply for a place in a First Year course and then when they completed this satisfactorily, they will be eligible to enter the Second Year in the following year. However, those who consider themselves adequately qualified and who pass the Grading Test sufficiently well may enter the Second Year direct.

After completing a First or Second Year course satisfactorily students may apply for a place in a Second Year course in the Use of English for Commercial Practice if they wish to.

On completion of the Second Year students may sit the examination leading to the award of the Department's Certificate in the Use of English.

#### **Commercial Practice Courses**

Intensive tuition will be provided in the English skills most commonly needed in offices and other commercial situations. Attention will also be paid to improving the students' general English and oral skills. The syllabus will include the following:

> commercial correspondence; the writing of notes from written material; note-taking from oral material; the writing of memoranda; the writing of minutes; the writing of reports; comprehension of commercial and general texts.

These courses are ideally suited to the needs of those who are preparing for the Intermediate Examination of the Chartered Institute of Secretaries and other commercial examinations requiring competence in English.

Locally produced material that is specifically related to Hong Kong will be used throughout these courses.

On completion of these courses students may sit an examination leading to the award of the Department's Certificate in the Use of English for Commercial Practice.

## 111. Certificate in Housing Management

The aim is to provide a local qualification in Housing Management for people already working in the field and for others hoping to take up housing management as a career. The course is intended to provide a firm grounding in the theory and practice of housing management.

The standard and content of the course and its examinations are designed to be the equivalent of the Diploma in Housing Management sponsored by the United Kingdom Institute of Housing Managers. The syllabus is related to that of the Institute but is strongly geared to local relevance.

The course runs over three academic years. Years I and II prepare candidates for the Intermediate Examination and Year III for the Final Examination.

A Certificate in Housing Management, issued by the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong, will be awarded to a candidate on passing the Final Examination and on producing evidence of having had at least three years' approved experience in housing management work.

141. Understanding Chinese Customs & Traditions. Mrs. Nana Tsao, B.A., Dip.Ed. (H.K.). Thursdays, 2.30–4.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$75

This series of lectures is designed for those who wish to learn something of Chinese life and culture, and will deal with traditional Chinese customs and ways of life existing in Hong Kong: historical background to the understanding of Chinese customs and traditions; Chinese family structure and kinship; ancestor worship and folk religion; wedding and burial customs; types of symbols in Chinese art; the main festivals celebrated during the year; Chinese etiquette and common courtesy. The lectures will be illustrated with slides and films.

This course, although primarily intended for parents, will interest teachers and youth club leaders, kindergarten workers, etc. Topics will include understanding children; social and emotional development of young people; discipline and the problem of punishment; children's difficulties at home and at school; their special problems (as aggressive and withdrawn children, the problem of European children in Hong Kong, rebellious and bored children, etc.); introduction to the social psychology of childhood and early adolescence; sex education issues; delinquency and its treatment; some cases (as petty stealing and how to handle it in the home situation). R. D. Laing "anti-psychiatrist"

This course will seek to examine how philosophers over the past two centuries have undermined what people believe to be "obvious", and how new perspectives in science, social problems, etc. have posed the need for philosophers to re-examine the basic concepts underlying everyday actions and judgements.

Some topics to be covered: Hegel and the concept of "changing basic concepts", Nietzsche and the "overthrow" of established morality, logical positivism and the discrediting of moral and aesthetic judgements, Marcuse's criticism of positivism and linguistic analysis.

**150.** Christianity and Contemporary Art Forms. Jerry Juergens, B.A. (Northeastern), B.D., Th.M. (Southeastern). Thursdays, 7.30–8.45 p.m., starting October 5, 1972. Extra Mural Town Centre. 11 meetings. Fee: \$45

This is an introductory course in Contemporary Art Forms viewed from the Christian perspective. 151. A Problem-Solving Approach To Sixth-Form Analytical Chemistry. R. T. Allsop, B.A., Dip.Ed. (Cantab.), Lecturer in Education, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting November 8, 1972. Chemistry Building. 6 meetings. Fee: \$80

This largely laboratory-based course is designed to meet two specific requirements: firstly to take into account the widening scope of the Advanced Level practical examinations in Chemistry; secondly to look ahead to the introduction of the new Advanced Level Physical Chemistry syllabus where the use of analytical techniques to solve physical problems will be of great importance.

Participants will be able to choose from a range of experiments within the following broad areas-

- (a) Chromatography-paper, TLC and simple GLC.
- (b) Titrimetric methods—complexometric, thermometric, conductimetric and potentiometric titrations.
- (c) Colorimetric methods—equilibrium constant studies, formulation of complexes by continuous variation methods.
- (d) Applicable analysis—some more or less open-ended problems to be solved using the above techniques.

A small part of the course will be devoted the construction of a simple piece of equipment for sixth-form use in one of the above areas.

FEE REFUND: It is hoped that teachers of chemistry at 'A'-Level will be able to have their fees refunded by the Director of Education, on completion of an application form (obtainable from the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong) which must be returned directly to the Director of Education before the commencement of the course. This applies to all teachers whether in Government or private schools.

152. Drugs and the Mind. M. B. Roberts, M.A., D.Phil., M.B.,B.S., Professor of Pharmacology, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 7.30-8.30 p.m., starting October 4, 1972. University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

These lectures are intended for the interested layman, school teachers, workers in hospitals, health and welfare departments etc., and those concerned with the treatment and rehabilitation of drug addicts. An attempt will be made to present in simple terms the state of scientific and medical knowledge on the ways in which drugs can influence the activities of the brain. In particular, drugs which affect mood and behaviour, the so-called 'psychotropic drugs', will be described in some detail. One important aim will be to provide a basis for the rational understanding of those drugs which cause physical and psychological dependence, and hence lead to serious personal and social problems.

Some topics to be discussed are: investigating how the brain works; brain and mind; how drugs may act on the brain; habituation, addiction and withdrawal syndromes; causes and treatment of drug addiction. 153. Molecular Biology and Modes of Inheritance. P. K. Das, B.Sc., Ph.D., Lecturer in Biochemistry, University of Hong Kong. Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting October 9, 1972. University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

During recent years, enormous progress has been made in describing the fundamental processes of life at the molecular level. This course will be of particular interest to those concerned to keep abreast of scientific developments, schoolteachers and workers in medical and allied professions.

Some topics which will be covered are: the nature of molecular biology: the chemistry of biological molecules and their roles in evolution and inheritance patterns; factors influencing their roles such as environment and drugs.

FEE REFUND: Teachers of Biology at Advanced Level who wish to have their fees refunded by the Director of Education are required to complete an application form (obtainable from the Department of Extra Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong) which must be returned directly to the Director of Education before the commencement of the course. 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
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
