

### SPECIAL COURSES

The Department welcomes enquiries and requests from business organizations, government, voluntary bodies or private institutions for specially designed courses to meet their specific education needs.

## PRIOR ENROLMENT IS ESSENTIAL

Failure to enrol prior to the opening of a particular course may mean the cancellation of that course. Prior enrolment is the only way the Department of Extra-Mural Studies has of judging the response to its courses. Your co-operation is therefore invited in sending your application forms to the Department as soon as possible.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

1. There are normally no entry requirements except that applicants should be over 18 years of age. Occasionally to have the full benefit of a course applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Applicants are therefore advised to read the description of a course carefully. Professional courses usually have clearly defined entry requirements.

- 2. The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant.
- 3. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held: (a) on any public holidays.
  - (b) at a storm warning signal of No. 8 or above. (After the typhoon passes, if the No. 8 signal is lowered before 3 p.m., classes will take place as normal. If the signal is lowered after 3 p.m., classes will be cancelled that evening.)
- 4. Fees are not refundable once the course has commenced.

5. Certificates of Attendance are issued, on payment of 50 cents, to those who have attended not less than two-thirds of a course of at least 20 meetings in duration.

6. Closing date for enrolment: one week before the starting date of a course. Late enrolments may not be accepted.

8. Complete the attached enrolment form and mail it to the Director, Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong. Forms are also available on request. To ensure that a class can take place, the Department would appreciate early enrolment by applicants.

9. You should send your application form together with the appropriate fee either in the form of a postal order, money order or crossed cheque made out in favour of the UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG.

10. You will be notified if you are not admitted because of oversubscription or other reasons. THE DEPARTMENT WILL NOT NOTIFY SUCCESSFUL APPLICANTS WHO ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND THE FIRST MEETING OF THE CLASS AT THE PLACE AND TIME ADVERTISED.

## Art & Design

Courses in Art & Design and related areas are open to students at all levels of development unless otherwise stated.

## CERTIFICATE SUBJECTS: Year I, Term II

A limited number of places in the constituent courses comprising the Certificate Course in Fundamentals of Art and Design are available to non-certificate students. These classes are listed below, Course Nos. 193 to 196. Applications for these should be sent to the *Extra-Mural Town Centre only* as early as possible. In the event of oversubscription an interview may be required.

193. Introduction to Three-Dimensional Design. Christine Thery, B.A. (Winchester). Mondays, 6.00–8.00 p.m. OR 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting February 17, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$150

Through the use of simple materials such as wire, cardboard, string, clay, and styroforme, students will explore the basic concepts of threedimensional form from the linear to the solid. In addition to studio work, there will be several lectures and discussions on the work of modern sculptors.

194. Woodcut and Relief Printmaking. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting February 19, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings.

Fee: \$150 plus \$25 materials fee

The relief print is one of the most ancient forms of printmaking, and wood the most traditional material. Today an exciting aspect of relief printmaking is the use of new materials such as plastics, cardboard, plaster, and 'found objects.' This course will introduce the techniques and concepts of traditional and contemporary relief printmaking. Students will develop and produce black and white and colour prints.

Students will be expected to provide most materials. An additional charge of \$25 per person, payable at the first class meeting, will cover the cost of inks and sundries.

195. Lithography. Julie Newport, B.F.A. (Calif. Art & Crafts). Fridays, 6.30–9.00 p.m., starting February 21, 1975. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 15 meetings. Fee: \$150 plus \$30 materials fee

Lithography is a printing technique in which an image is drawn on a slab of limestone which is then chemically treated in order to make many prints from that one drawing. As with most printing techniques it was originally developed for commercial use but became a fine art form. Among the better known early lithographers are Toulouse—Lautrec, Redon, and Daumier.

This course will explore the basic techniques of lithography including black and white and colour printing, and is suitable for both beginners and more advanced students.

The materials fee covers the cost of inks, solvents, and heavy equipment only.

196. Silkscreen and Serigraphic Printing. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Fridays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting February 21, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings.

Fee: \$150 plus \$30 materials fee

The silkscreen and serigraph have developed from the simple stencil, and require a minimum of equipment. The uses of this printing technique are varied and range from decorative elements to fine art prints. Students will be afforded the opportunity of exploring the potentials and versatility of silkscreen and serigraphic printing, and of producing prints in black and white and colour.

A materials fee of \$30, payable at the first class session, covers the cost of ink and sundries.

The next intake for the Certificate course in the Fundamentals of Art and Design will be in September, 1975. Intending students are advised to consult Miss Lesser, Staff Tutor in Art and Design, at the Extra-Mural Town Centre as soon as possible.

## **GRAPHIC DESIGN AND INTERIOR DESIGN**

These are studio, lecture, and discussion classes aimed at those students with a professional interest in the subject. Enrolment is open to all students at different stages of development, unless otherwise stated. In the event of oversubscription an interview may be required.

197. Interior Design Concepts. Elizabeth Stanton, L.S.I.A. Thursdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130

The main feature of this course will be the setting of a series of introductory exercises to help develop the students' ability to solve functional design problems. Critiques of the exercises will be given.

The course will be divided into three main areas. First, visual research, wherein emphasis will be on colour, space, form, light, and texture, with the aim of breaking down 'habitual' visual pre-conceptions. Second, design theory and research, with exercises exploring the relationship between design and function, design and materials, tone and colour. Third, design practice, with the students being asked to solve various problems relating to design within the home. The presentation and communication of visual information will also be discussed.

Enrolment is limited to 25 persons.

198. Introduction to Modern Typography. Savio Au (Production Controller, Longman's S.E. Asia). Tuesdays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting February 18, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$120

Typography is a complex subject with ever-widening applications. This introductory course is intended to provide the students with some basic knowledge of types and their function as an element of today's written communication and design.

Attention will be concentrated mainly on the study and formation of letters; the purposes of type design; the developments of the necessary disciplines and visual sensitivities for modern typographical practice; and the principles of mechanical type.

199. Book Production and Design: Intermediate. Savio Au (Production Controller, Longman's S.E. Asia). Thursdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$120

This is an advanced and more complex course designed for those who have completed the introductory course, and should prove equally helpful to those who have had some experience or knowledge in related fields.

The course will cover two main subject areas: (I) the practical and economic adoption of modern book design and production methods; and (2) the aesthetics of book design, the appreciation of the details of type design and presswork, and the deeply interesting problems of art and atmosphere in typography.

200. Photography: An Introduction. Andrew Mitchell. Wednesdays, 6.30–9.00 p.m., starting February 19, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130 plus \$25 materials fee

This course will cover the basic studio and darkroom techniques of black and white and colour photography. Theories of photography, both aesthetic and philosophic, will also be explored, and students will be encouraged to experiment in the media.

Enrolment will be limited to 15 persons.

201. Photography: An Intermediate Course. Frank Price, B.S. (Hons.) (Illinois). Thursdays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$245 plus \$20 materials fee

A course in black and white and colour photography for those already familiar with the basic technical aspects of photography and photographic equipment. The emphasis will be on 'seeing' and 'shooting'. There will be approximately five class field trips to a variety of sites on Saturday or Sunday afternoons, and class critiques will be held on the results of these, as well as independent field trips. In addition there will be lectures and discussions on the work of well-known photographers.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

202. Concepts and Techniques of Advanced Photography. Andrew Mitchell and others. Mondays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting February 17, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$135

This series of lectures and critiques by well-known Hong Kong photographers is aimed at those who have completed 'Intermediate Photography' or the equivalent, or who have a professional interest in the subject. Guest photographers will discuss their own concepts and techniques, as well as those of other photographers, and will give critiques of advanced student work. Both still and cinema photography will be covered.

## PRACTICAL DRAWING, PAINTING, AND PRINTMAKING

These are practical studio classes in the Visual Arts with emphasis on artistic skills and creative growth of the individual. Work will be carried out in the various media described.

Students must provide all necessary materials, some of which will be available for purchase through the department. Materials will be discussed at the first class meeting.

203. Woodcut and Relief Printmaking. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Wednesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting February 19, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$150 plus \$25 materials fee

See entry for Course No. 194. Enrolment is limited to 20 persons.

204. Lithography. Julie Newport, B.F.A. (Calif. Art & Crafts). Fridays, 10.00 a.m.-12.30 p.m., starting February 21, 1975. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 15 meetings. Fee: \$150 plus \$30 materials fee

See entry for Course No. 195. Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

205. Painting in Water-based Media. Tutor to be announced. Thursdays, 9.30 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting February 20, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$120 plus \$15 materials fee

With still life and models as subjects, students will explore water-based media, acrylic, water colour, and dyes as a way of freeing themselves towards greater visual expression.

The additional \$15 model fee will be payable at the opening meeting.

Enrolment is limited to 25 persons.

206. Life Drawing. Elise Parkin, A.T.D. Wednesdays, 9.30 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting February 19, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$90 plus \$50 model fee

An introductory course in which beginners will be taught to co-ordinate hand and eye by drawing the human form in movement and at rest. Life drawing is an essential discipline if we are to interpret and communicate what we 'see' with accuracy and sensitivity.

More advanced students will of course be welcome.

#### 207.素描

(Monochrome Drawing)

主 講 人:郭倩如女士。

學費:一百四十元(包括聘請模特兒費用二十元)。

本課程為繪圖愛好者所設,强調基礎訓練。使學者能認 識素描的基本概念,掌握整體的觀察方法,以及構圖,明暗,透 視,比例,空間感的處理。並通過較嚴格,正統的素描學習,使 學員在寫實的基礎上將可依據自己的興趣發展和變化。

課程內容:以寫實為主,對象包括靜物,風景和人物。

## ART HISTORY AND APPRECIATION

These are lecture and discussion courses open to all students regardless of previous Art History study.

208. Art and Archaeology in the Ancient World. Nancy Jenkins, B.A. (Wellesley). Wednesdays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting February 19, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$70

The Near East, Egypt, Mesopotamia, Anatolia, and the Aegean, has been called the Cradle of Western Culture. This course will examine the art forms and artifacts which illuminate the social and historical characteristics of these ancient cultures, and their relationship to some fundamental concepts of Western Civilization.

209. Chinese Painting: An Appreciation. Harold Wong Chung Fong. Tuesdays, 6.30–9.00 p.m., starting February 18, 1975. Robert Black College, University Drive. 10 meetings. Fee: \$90

This course is structured to help beginners grasp the basic elements of Chinese painting through the use of slides, reproductions, and original paintings. Among other things, students will learn to distinguish between an old and a modern work, an original and an imitation. Emphasis will be laid on Ming, Ch'ing, and 20th Century painting.

There will be a 30-minute break between the first and second hours of each class session to allow students to examine original works of art. Light refreshment will be available. 210. The Birth of Modern Art. Philippa Kelly. Tuesdays, 8.15–9.45 p.m., starting February 18, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 13 meetings. Fee: \$130

Since the time of the Ancient Greeks, almost 2,500 years ago, our thinking about the form and function of painting had remained basically unchanged. Painting was pictorial, it 'told a story'. That painting 'told a meaning', or was 'meaningful in itself' was indeed a revolutionary concept.

This course will study the art movements and painters of the 35 years, 1880–1914, that challenged and changed our present-day concept of art. Among the movements to be explored will be: Impressionism, Cubism, Symbolism, Expressionism, etc., and some of the painters to be discussed will be Monet, Cézanne, Van Gogh, Gauguin, Kandinsky, Mondrian, and Redon.

211. An Introduction to the Art of South-East Asia. Mrs. Rajeshwari Ghose, B.A. Hons. (Calcutta), M.A. (H.K.). Fridays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting February 28, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 16 meetings. Fee: \$75

This illustrated course will provide an introduction to the Hindu and Buddhist art of South-east Asia. It will commence with a general survey of the area, trace the progress of the two religions and study the transformations that they underwent in their adopted lands. It will then proceed to a regional study of Burma, Indonesia, Indochina and Thailand, and will examine at length the art of Burma, Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, Indonesia (including Bali), Borneo and Sumatra.

212. Interrelationship of Painters and Designers. Henry Steiner, M.F.A. (Yale). Wednesdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting February 19, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 5 meetings. Fee: \$50

This short course will consider the interrelationships of the 'Design Element in the work of Fine Artists', and the 'Fine Arts Element in the work of Graphic Designers'. Among those individuals to be discussed are: Paul Klee, René Magitte, A.M. Cassandre, and Miton Glizer.

213. The Home: Fashions in Modern Interior Design. Alfred Mok, B.Sc. (School of Design, San Francisco). Tuesdays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting April 8, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 6 meetings. Fee: \$65

The early 1960's was characterized by hard lines and earth colours, the 70's by soft forms and bold prints; where do we go from here? How and why do 'fashion' and taste change? Does our 'inside' environment, the home, reflect changes in our 'outside' environment, the World? This short course will discuss not only changes in the fashion of interior design from 1960 to the present, but will try to examine the underlying social factors that may have brought them about.

## **Business** Studies

214. Marketing Management. Robert Wong, B.A., A.M.B.I.M., Thursdays, 7.00-8.30 p.m., starting March 20, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 8 meetings. Fee: \$50

Successful marketing is a key to business success. Beginning with a description of the marketing system this course will then analyse and discuss the use of the basic components of marketing, distribution channels, product life cycle, consumer markets and behaviour, the marketing mix, pricing, promotional strategies and sales management.

215. Materials Management: A Modern Interpretation. Ronald C. Blyth, M. Tech., M.Inst.P.S., D.M.S., A.M.B.I.M., Principal Lecturer in Management, Hong Kong Polytechnic. *Tuesdays*, 5.45–7.15 p.m., starting February 18, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee:\$50

Materials Management is one of the major functions in Industrial, Commercial and Governmental organisations. The term indicates an attempt to manage and control the total flow of materials from selection of supplier, through inventory control into production, and, in certain cases, after processing into the finished product, distribution to the customer.

This course will benefit managers who are responsible for all or part of the purchasing, inventory control or stores activities. Topics covered will include various management techniques which can be applied specifically to the solving of materials management problems.

**216.** Operational Research. F. K. W. Mak, Ph.D., C.Eng., M.I. Mech.E. Thursdays, 6.45–8.15 p.m., starting February 27, 1975. Room 725, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$60

For a more efficient organisation executives should understand and be able to use the latest methods of information collection, processing and control. This course in Operational Research will provide such an understanding. Non-linear programming, queueing theory, network analysis and simulation are some of the topics to be discussed. The course is designed to suit those who are new to the study of Operational Research. Students will find that a knowledge of calculus, whilst not an essential enrolment requirement, would be useful. 217. Personnel Management. Miss Brenda Chow, B.A. Mondays, 7.00-8.00 p.m., starting February 24, 1975. City Hall Committee Room South. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

Hong Kong businesses are increasingly acknowledging the importance of personnel management. This course will survey the theory and practice, as applicable in Hong Kong, of this management area. It is suitable for those involved in the personnel field and for anyone with a general interest in the management and use of human resources.

**218.** Management Styles. Susan Cameron, B.A., Dip. I.A. Mondays, 6.15–7.15 p.m., starting April 7, 1975. Room 229, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 6 meetings. Fee: \$30

The development of ideas and results of research in the areas of motivation and leadership theory will be discussed and then related to the problems of managing the human resources of a company. In particular the value of managing through delegation and participation, and the conditions under which these are most effective, will be considered.

219. Management in the Service Industries. Susan Cameron, B.A., Dip. I.A., & Gordon Redding, M.A., Ph.D. Thursdays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Knowles Building, Room 248, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

Managers of staff whose duties bring them into direct contact with members of the public will find this course valuable. The course will concentrate on the area of company/client relationship, analysing the importance of this relationship to company effectiveness and efficiency, and the company image. In particular the course will focus on the problem of managing this vital relationship. Managers in such service industries as banking, large-scale retail organisations, and government services such as taxation and the post office should find the course especially useful.

303. Higher Accounting. S. W. Ching, A.C.C.A., A.C.I.S., A.I.B., A.M.B.I.M., A.H.K.S.A. Thursdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Room 121, University Main Building. 14 meetings. Fee: \$85

This is a course for students who have reached or just passed the L.C.C. Intermediate standard. It will discuss, at an advanced level, up-to-date practice across a wide range of accountancy problems. There is a limit of 40 students for this class and early enrolment is advised. 221. Hong Kong Taxation Law and Practice. Charles Lo, LL.B. (Lond.), A.A.S.A., A.H.K.S.A., C.P.A. 304. An Introduction to Economics and Its Uses. Laurence L. C. Chau, M.S., Ph.D. (Wisconsin), Lecturer in Economics, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting February 25, 1975. Room 847, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$60

To the layman, economics often seems too abstract and obscured by terminology. Yet the current economic situation makes it impossible to ignore economic reports. This course, divided into two parts, helps the interested layman to read some meaning into the economic scene. The first part introduces the basic concepts most relevant to current economic issues. Part two applies these concepts to analyzing problems of inflation, unemployment, environment, and the quality of life, with particular reference to Hong Kong.

226. Inflation: A Disaster for the International Monetary System? David Penketh, B.Sc., Senior Lecturer in Economics, Hong Kong Polytechnic. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 25, 1975. Room 103, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

This course analyses the subject of inflation in the context of international finance. Contents include the theory of inflation, inflation as a domestic problem, the international effect of inflation and its relation to the world economy. Study will also be made of the historical background to the current international monetary situation, as an introduction to a survey of current problems and prospects.

227. Economics of Everyday Life. Mrs. Teresa Tsang Chan Chingwah, B.A. Wednesdays, 2.30–4.00 p.m., starting February 26, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

As inflation begins to have greater impact on family incomes, it is essential to have an understanding of how the economy functions and affects each household. Starting with a basic introduction to the economy, this course goes on to show how a family can best manage its income. No previous knowledge of economics is assumed.

228. The Chinese Economic System. Mrs. Leslie Chan, M.A. Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 24, 1975. Room 248, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

The recent increase in Western trade with China has focussed more attention on China's economy. To provide a greater understanding of the Chinese economy, the course will consider the basis and operation of the economic system rather than a statistical analysis of performance. No previous knowledge of economics is assumed.

## 229. 中國經濟 (An Introduction to the Economy of China)

230. International Trade. S. S. Vasan, M.A. (Econ.), Dip. J. (Ad.). Tuesdays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting February 25, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

Through international trade, events in one economy often have a significant effect on other economies. This is particularly true in the case of Hong Kong which depends heavily on trade. Trade topics, with relevance to Hong Kong, to be discussed include: international trade and resource allocation, foreign exchange, balance of payments, tariffs and barriers to trade, customs unions and the EEC, GATT, the Kennedy round, commodity cartels.

231. Statistics for Business and Management. Henry K. S. Cheng, B.A., M.B.A. (Western Ontario). Wednesdays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting February 19, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$70

The use of statistics in business is becoming increasingly important. This course covers basic statistical methods and their application to business. Topics to be covered include: classification and analysis of data; probability distributions; sampling theory; correlation and regression; statistical quality control; time series; index numbers. Also suitable for those taking professional examinations requiring a paper in statistics. A knowledge of mathematics up to School Certificate level is desirable. 232. General Applied Statistics. Kwong Man-kam, B.Sc. (H.K.), M.Sc., Ph.D. (Chicago). Fridays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting February 28, 1975. Room 142, University Main Building. 14 meetings. Fee: \$70

Assuming the student already has a basic knowledge of statistical methods, this course emphasizes the application of statistics to decisionmaking, forecasting and measuring social trends. Specifically designed for those who are preparing for the Institute of Statisticians examinations, the topics to be studied are: association, distribution and curve-fitting, time series, experimentation, sampling, hypotheses, life-tables, statistical tables.

233. Introduction to Marketing Research. Ho Fong-hoe, B.A. (H.K.), and Fung Hing-wang, B.Soc.Sc. (H.K.), Demonstrators in Statistics, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 18, 1975. Room 248, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 16 meetings. Fee: \$80

The course introduces students to the functions of Marketing Research and its place in the decision process of marketing. Methods of obtaining information will be examined, together with the planning of surveys, questionnaire design, attitude scaling, sampling theory, response and non-response errors, point and internal estimation, and tests of hypothesis.

Consideration will also be given to the forecasting of sales and market potential by statistical techniques, including regression, correlation, time series analysis, Markov chains, opinion polling, and the evaluation of advertising effort.

75. Introduction to Rock Mechanics. Chang Chak-man, M.Sc. (Durham), M.I.Str.E., C.Eng. Thursdays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting February 27, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$65

The course will deal with the following topics: the physical and engineering properties, strength and failure, site and laboratory testing, rheological and dynamic properties of rocks; site investigation in rocks; structural features of massive rocks; rock foundation and slope.

237. Introduction to Engineering Design. J. L. Sykes, M.Sc., A.M.I.E.D., Lecturer in Mechanical Engineering, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays & Fridays, 6.00–8.15 p.m., starting February 26, 1975. Peel Laboratory, University of Hong Kong, Pokfulam Road, Hong Kong. 24 meetings, twice weekly. Fee: \$250

Engineering Design may be described as the recognition and understanding of a need and the creation of a system to satisfy that need. It will require the logical application of Science, Technology and, at times, the Arts to achieve optimum solutions.

The course will introduce students to an elementary design technique and general analytical methods for component/product design. Account will be taken of manufacturing considerations in the design process, and material availability and selection will be reviewed. Simple applications of Anthropometric data for the design of workspaces will be covered.

Topics to be covered will include: revision of engineering graphics; design method; machine element design; bearing selection; gears & gearing; material selection; applied anthropometry.

The course will be using Metric Units, and those attending will receive data sheets for a variety of design applications.

Applicants for the course should ideally possess a Degree/Diploma in Mechanical/Industrial Engineering but other experienced persons engaged in engineering design would also benefit from the course. 238. Introduction to Properties of Engineering Materials. G. W. Greene, B.Eng. (Stevens I.T.), Ph.D. (Ind. Met.) (Birm.), M.I.Corr.T., M.Met.Soc., Lecturer in Mechanical Engineering, University of Hong Kong. Thursdays, 6.30-9.00 p.m., starting March 13, 1975. Duncan Sloss Building, and floor, Room DS2, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$100

The course will cover fundamental processes that determine the properties of materials during processing, heat treatment, fabrication, and under service conditions. Emphasis is placed on factors governing material structure both at the atomic and microscopic levels since the structure controls the properties.

Approximately half the time will be spent in the laboratory conducting tests and considering collected samples.

The course could be of interest to either practising engineers or Physics teachers.

239. Introduction to Corrosion. G. W. Greene, B.Eng. (Stevens I.T.), Ph.D. (Ind. Met.) (Birm.), M.I.Corr.T., M.Met.Soc., Lecturer in Mechanical Engineering, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting March 11, 1975. Duncan Sloss Building, 2nd floor, Room DS2, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$70

The course will deal with concepts of corrosion processes and protection methods. The state of the metal in terms of composition and microstructure are shown to seriously affect corrosion resistance in a chemical environment. However many factors determine the environment such as concentration, impurities, temperature, humidity, solution velocity, abrasion, aeration, applied stresses, surface deposits, and design.

Protective systems are compared and contrasted for a range of applications.

The course could be of interest to either practising engineers or Chemistry teachers.

### Style in Writing

240B. Tutor: T. J. Eyres, M.A. (Cantab.). Wednesdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting February 19, 1975. Room 103, University Main Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

Intensive courses in writing aimed at giving the students tuition in expressing themselves clearly and concisely in different situations. The tutors will provide guidance in how to avoid common errors and provide exercises in different kinds of writing.

These courses are ideally suited for those who wish to improve their writing style before applying for a place in one of the Department's English for Business courses in the year 1975/76, but others may also apply for admission.

#### Minimum Entrance Requirements :

A Pass in English at G.C.E. 'O' Level or equivalent; all applicants are also required to attach a statement, in which they should say why they wish to attend the course, to their applications. Enrolment in a course will be by selection of those best qualified to benefit from it.

241. Reading and Discussion. Miss P. Smith, M.A. (Edin.), Dip. T.E.O. (Manchester), Lecturer in English, Hong Kong Polytechnic. Wednesdays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting February 19, 1975. Room 3A, Wah Yan College, Queen's Road East. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

Different writers employ a variety of different styles with which to express their ideas in a number of different situations. The style used when the writer wishes to persuade his readers of something, for example, is different from the style he uses when he wishes merely to give factual information, and this, in turn, is different from the style used when he expresses a personal opinion. The aim of this further course which is suited for those who already have quite a good command of English, is to consider the various styles that a writer can use and the various effects that they can achieve. In addition to those in the textbook mentioned below, a number of examples of non-literary prose will be made available for critical examination of the writers' styles of writing. The tutor will lead the discussions in class on these and explain the effect that the writers wanted to achieve. Enrolment will be limited to 25 persons and may be by selection of those most qualified to benefit from the course. All applicants should have obtained a Pass in English at G.C.E. 'O' level or equivalent.

Textbook: H. L. B. Moody: Varieties of English (Longman), which may be obtained from the Hong Kong Book Centre, Des Voeux Road Central.

242. Intonation in Idiomatic English. Raymond Huang, B.A. (Lingnan), M.A. (Leeds), I.P.A.Cert. Phon., P.G.C.E. (London), L.R.A.M., L.T.C.L. (London), President, Lingnan College and Principal, Lingnan Middle School. Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 24, 1975. Room 3A, Wah Yan College, Queen's Road East. 16 meetings. Fee: S110

By showing the contrast in stress and intonation between English and Chinese (Cantonese and Mandarin) the tutor will help the Chinese student to grasp:

- (1) The tonal and rhythmic system of his mother tongue and
- (2) how errors in his English speech arise from his native language habits.

Methods of correcting errors will be suggested and graded aural-oral exercises on English Intonation will be provided. Intonation practice will be related to everyday idiomatic English in order to increase the student's range of expression.

#### Enrolment limited to 30 students.

The tutor is author of a number of books on phonetics, including 'English Pronunciation Explained with Diagrams' and co-author of 'Intonation in Idiomatic English', Books I & II.

243. Love and Death. Harry Ricketts, B.A. (Oxon.), Assistant Lecturer in English, University of Hong Kong. Thursdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Room 142, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

The dual theme of love and death has long possessed the imagination of the great poets. During this course the tutor will introduce a number of representative poems which are dominated by this theme and then lead discussions on them. He will begin the course by considering the *femme fatale* of the English Romantics at the beginning of the nineteenth century and will then explore the ambivalent attitudes of the Victorian poets. Those attending the course will then be able to investigate some of the disturbed and disturbing reactions of the poets of the present century with him.

Duplicated copies of the poems to be considered will be made available.

## Geography & Geology

244. Trends in Geography. Dr Chung Yuet-ping, B.A. (C.U.H.K.), M.A. (Kent), Ph.D. (Minn.). Mondays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting February 24, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 6 meetings. Fee: \$40

The main theme is to outline current developments on issues, theories, and methods of geography. Included in the discussion are spatial concepts on both the macro and micro level such as global spatial system, region, location and personal space, and the relevance of quantitative techniques in spatial problems. Lectures are structured to cover a brief overall review of how geographers view and organize space. It aims at providing some guidelines in formulating approaches to spatial problems rather than exploring a specific field to any depth. A major concern will be behavioural geography which involves discussion on environmental perception and environmental quality.

This course is especially designed for upper form high school teachers, or those who have special interest in this field.

245. Economic Geography of Hong Kong: Modern Concepts & Techniques. David, Chu Kim Yee, B.A. (H.K.), Demonstrator in Geography, University of Hong Kong. Thursdays, 7.30–8.30 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Room 122, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$40

The aim is to outline some modern concepts and techniques that have been used by recent publications and research on the economic geography of Hong Kong with particular reference to population growth, land use studies, location theories, retailing & marketing, agriculture and industry, transportation and trade. A brief discussion on collection, analysis and generalisation of data and findings will also be included as an introduction to the course.

The following topics will be discussed: data collection from documentary sources and from surveys in the field; analysis of the data collected by statistical techniques such as mean, median, standard deviation, correlation and regression; construction of hypothesis and models; population growth and related economic problems in Hong Kong; location theories and the land use pattern in Hong Kong; retailing and marketing in Hong Kong; Hong Kong industries; changes in the agricultural scene in Hong Kong; internal freight and passenger transport of Hong Kong; trade and shipping between Hong Kong and the outside world. 246. Geography in the Field (Physical). K. C. Chau, B.A. (H.K.), Demonstrator in Geography, University of Hong Kong. Thursdays, 6.15-7.15 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Room 122, University Main Building. 6 meetings plus 5 field trips. Fee: \$75

An introductory study of soil geography, biogeography and physical geography, the criterion, problems and achievements of which will be evaluated with reference to local examples. Special emphasis will be laid on the soils of Hong Kong with regard to their genesis, uses and response to man's impact. The interplay of vegetation, soils and environmental factors will receive equal attention.

Priority will be given to those with a post-secondary education and to Geography teachers.

Enrolment is limited to 35 persons.

This course is intended to examine the use of trademarks and the action for Passing Off by which traders may protect their right to use marketing symbols and distinctive trading 'get ups'. Matters to be discussed will include: definition of a trademark and its purpose; how to register trademarks; the effect of registration; registered users; the actions for infringement and for rectification of the register; the action of Passing Off and its scope as an alternative remedy and source of protection; an examination of criticisms of the trademark system as a form of monopoly.

249. Business Law. T. K. Ghose, B.A. Hons. (Calcutta), C.A.I.I.B., A.I.B., A.C.I.S., A.M.B.I.M. and William P. K. Lee, Barrister-at-Law (Inner Temple), Crown Counsel. Wednesdays, 6.15–8.30 p.m., starting February 26, 1975. Room 847, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 16 meetings. Fee: \$120

A course designed to be of assistance to candidates preparing for the Part II Examination of the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators. It will deal with general principles of the law of contract, including agency, sale of goods, hire purchase and consumer protection; lien and bailment; commercial arbitration, negotiable instruments with particular reference to cheques and bankers' credits; relationship of banker and customer; legal aspects of the distinctions between various kinds of business organization including forms of incorporated and unincorporated associations; law of bankruptcy; deeds of arrangement; outline of the law including, where appropriate, that deriving from the European Economic Community, relating to monopolies and restrictive trade practices; law of defamation. 302. Company Law and Partnership. Roderick O'Brien, LL.B. (Adel.), Barrister and Solicitor of the High Court of Australia and the Supreme Courts of South and Western Australia, Lecturer in Law, University of Hong Kong, and Mrs. Ruth Marylyn Willoughby, LL.B. (Lond.). Fridays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting February 21, 1975. Room 229, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 15 meetings. Fee: \$110

The course will be divided into the following two parts:

This course should be of interest to librarians, would-be librarians and research workers.

## UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE

本課程以深入淺出的方式,分析及檢討過去西方國家各派 政治思想及當今潮流所趨,內容包括希臘城邦的民主與柏拉圖的 理想國;亞里斯多德的國家觀與實際政治;羅馬時代的法律觀點 與政治思想;敎權與政權的紛爭;馬開外里的霸術論;法國革命 前後的思潮;英國的功利主義學派與殖民地主義;馬克思與社會 主義;法西斯主義與極權國家論;當代的共產主義;二十世紀的 民主思潮。

凡中學文史教師及社會各界對中國文化有興趣之人士,均 歡迎前來聽講,惟正就讀中學之未成年學生,均不宜報名。

287. Modern and Contemporary China: A Period of Reforms and Revolutions. Owen H. H. Wong, M.A. (H.K.), Ph.D. (Cantab.). Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 17, 1975. Room 103, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$50

An interpretation of the political, economic, social and cultural movements, as well as of the foreign influences, that have transformed China during the last hundred years. The following topics will be considered: the foreign impact on the transformation of China; the last peasant rebellion in China; the ill-fated technical revolution; the abortive coup d'état of 1898; the political revolution of 1911; the early anarchist and socialist movements; the intellectual revolution; the attempt at unification and national salvation; the communist revolution; the socialist transformation; the cultural revolution.

288. The Politics of the People's Republic of China: An Interpretation. Dr. Lee Ngok, M.A., Dip.Ed. (H.K.), Ph.D. (London). Lecturer, Department of History, University of Hong Kong. Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting May 26, 1975. Room 103, University Main Building. 6 meetings. Fee: \$40

Any explanation of China's emergence as a world power must concentrate on the following topics as the high-lights for discussion: building of the Socialist State, a perspective; Mao and Marxism-Leninism; Government, Party Politics and the Role of the Military; the Revolution and the Masses; Politics after the Cultural Revolution; China's role as a world power; the current scene.

Mrs. Angela Griffith, B.A. (Melb.), T.S.T.C. Fridays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting February 21, 1975. Room 418, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$55

This course will look at 'Child Development' from the parents' point of view, with particular reference to the period from birth to six years. It will investigate the ways in which parents are instrumental in the growth and development of their children.

Topics to be covered include: the effect of different child-rearing practices on the child; the child's relationship with other members of the family; the role of the parent in development of sex roles; socializing influences on the child outside the home; adjusting to a pre-school environment; the importance of children's play and art; the effect of television and other media on the child; the development of language and the ability to communicate ideas; the effect of different physical environments on the development of the child with particular reference to high-rise buildings; living in crowded conditions in a bi-cultural, bi-lingual society.

Case study material and the experiences of participants in the course will be used whenever possible.

292. The Psychology of Conflict: Reduction & Resolution. Joseph A. Precker, Ph.D. (Columbia). Mondays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting February 17, 1975. Room 122, University Main Building. 5 meetings. Fee: \$50

What can the social sciences contribute to the reduction or the resolution of conflict, within individuals, between individuals, and within groups?

This short course will examine the meaning of conflict, discuss methods of reducing them, and review recommendations for resolving them in typical family and work-related situations. 293. Current Issues in Psychology. B. M. Young, B.Sc. (Edin.), Lecturer in Psychology, University of Hong Kong. Fridays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting April 4, 1975. Room 847, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

Three main themes are explored and discussed in this course. The first is intelligence. What is it? How is it measured? What is the best environment for the development of intelligent behaviour? Are tests appropriate for other cultural contexts necessarily relevant in Hong Kong? How does intelligence relate to creativity and do schools cultivate the development of both?

Secondly, it is intended to examine the nature of attitudes. This would include why attitudes change and why, on the other hand, other attitudes remain stubbornly the same. Related topics would be persuasion, obedience and conformity.

Finally, the new humanism. This development in psychology stems from the view that psychotherapy is too good for *just* the mentally ill. Encounter groups, Gestalt therapy and other ways of stressing the 'here and now' way of living will be discussed.

296. Common Hong Kong Flowering Plants. D. R. Kemp, B.Sc., Dip.Microbiology, M.Sc., Ph.D., M.I.Biol. Staff Tutor in Science, University of Hong Kong. Fridays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting February 21, 1975. Knowles Building, Room 732, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$100

This course is intended primarily for secondary school teachers, but will be of value to lay botanists who are seriously interested in the classification of Flowering Plants.

The course will include those Families of Monocotyledons and Dicotyledons which are well represented by local species. The structure and function of particular flowers in these families will be considered and the student will be encouraged to relate such features to the systematic position of the species concerned.

Plants showing special adaptations, for example climbers, insectivores, parasites, semi-parasites, aquatics, salt marsh plants and plants with unusual leaves or stems will be considered separately.

Throughout the course the plants discussed will be demonstrated as fresh specimens or by the projection of slide transparencies wherever possible. In addition there will be one conducted field trip at the end of the course.

Fee Refund: Teachers of Biology at Advanced Level or Certificate of Education Level who wish to attend the above course may apply for a fee refund from the Director of Education. Applicants are required to complete an application form (obtainable from the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong) which must be returned directly to the Director of Education before the commencement of the course. This applies to all teachers whether in Government, aided or private schools. 297. Common Hong Kong Ferns. H. H. Edie, B.Sc. (Agric.), M.Sc. (Edin.). Thursdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting February 20, 1975. Northcote Science Building, Ground floor laboratory. 10 meetings. Fee: \$80

This course is intended primarily for secondary school teachers, but will be of value to lay botanists who are seriously interested in the classification of ferns. A general introduction to ferns, including their life-cycle and morphology, will be followed by a more detailed study of about 50 species of common local ferns which represent almost all the known important fern groups, and provide a very clear illustration of fern development and evolution. At the same time these species will be related to their various habitats so that an appreciation can be obtained of the very wide range of adaptations which have occurred during the evolutionary process.

Each meeting will consist of a lecture, followed by a practical period when there will be an opportunity to handle fresh specimens and study herbarium material. In addition a field trip will be arranged if there is sufficient demand.

Fee Refund: Teachers of Biology at Advanced Level who wish to attend the above course may apply for a fee refund from the Director of Education. Applicants are required to complete an application form (obtainable from the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong) which must be returned directly to the Director of Education before the commencement of the course. 
