

### SPECIAL COURSES

The Department welcomes enquiries and requests from business organizations, government, voluntary bodies or private institutions for specially designed courses to meet their specific education needs.

### PRIOR ENROLMENT IS ESSENTIAL

Failure to enrol prior to the opening of a particular course may mean the cancellation of that course. Prior enrolment is the only way the Department of Extra-Mural Studies has of judging the response to its courses. Your co-operation is therefore invited in sending your application forms to the Department as soon as possible.

### GENERAL INFORMATION

**1.** There are normally no entry requirements except that applicants should be over 18 years of age. Occasionally to have the full benefit of a course applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Applicants are therefore advised to read the description of a course carefully. Professional courses usually have clearly defined entry requirements.

2. The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant.

- 3. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held:
  - (a) on any public holidays.
  - (b) at a storm warning signal of No. 8 or above. (After the typhoon passes, if the No. 8 signal is lowered before 3 p.m., classes will take place as normal. If the signal is lowered after 3 p.m., classes will be cancelled that evening.)
  - (c) during the following holiday periods: December 22, 1974 to January
     4, 1975 inclusive (Christmas and New Year).
     February 10-15, 1975 inclusive (Lunar New Year).
- 4. Fees are not refundable once the course has commenced.

5. Certificates of Attendance are issued, on payment of 50 cents, to those who have attended not less than two-thirds of a course of at least 20 meetings in duration.

6. Closing date for enrolment: one week before the starting date of a course. Late enrolments may not be accepted.

8. Complete the attached enrolment form and mail it to the Director, Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong. Forms are also available on request. To ensure that a class can take place, the Department would appreciate early enrolment by applicants.

9. You should send your application form together with the appropriate fee either in the form of a postal order, money order or crossed cheque made out in favour of the UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG.

10. You will be notified if you are not admitted because of over-subscription or other reasons. THE DEPARTMENT WILL NOT NOTIFY SUCCESSFUL APPLICANTS WHO ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND THE FIRST MEETING OF THE CLASS AT THE PLACE AND TIME ADVERTISED.

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## Archaeology

17. A Basic Course in Archaeology with Reference to Hong Kong. S. M. Bard, M.B., B.S. (H.K.), Chairman, Hong Kong Archaeological Society. Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 24, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings plus 2 museum visits and 4 field trips. Fee: \$70

Instruction will cover the fossil record of early man and the general field of prehistory, archaeological techniques, and questions of chronology in relation to tools and pottery. The emphasis will be on the practical aspects of the subject, and the talks will be illustrated by slides and specimens, which can be handled by the students. The latter part of the course will deal with the prehistory of Hong Kong and relate this to recent finds.

The course will include two museum visits and four field trips; the latter in conjunction with the field work sessions of the Hong Kong Archaeological Society.

The cost does not include transport and personal expenses on the field trips.

Enrolment is limited to 30 persons.

### UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE

The attention of extra-mural students is drawn to the following regulation of the University of Hong Kong regarding admission to the University:

'A mature person without formal academic qualifications who is aged 30 or over on September 1 of the year in which admission is sought may be exempted completely from University entrance requirements but shall not be eligible for admission to the Faculty of Medicine.'

## Art & Design

Courses in Art & Design and related areas are open to students of all levels of development unless otherwise stated.

### 18. Certificate Course in Fundamentals of Art & Design.

An evening course extending over two years, each of which consists of two terms of fifteen weeks duration. Formal instruction is concentrated into three or three and a half evenings each week, but considerable additional work at home will be necessary.

The object of this foundation level course is to provide a range of studies and understanding which will enable students, whatever the nature of their previous education, to develop talents and discover interest in the field of Art & Design.

Fee: \$1,000 per annum.

Entry Requirements: consideration will be given to those who have an interest in Art & Design, and proficiency in English up to at least the Pass level of the Hong Kong English School Certificate.

The course consists of studio work, lectures, seminars and discussions.

Syllabus outline:

- 1. History of Western and Oriental Art and Architecture.
- 2. Exploration into the nature of materials.
- 3. Design Concepts: Colour Theory, Two-Dimensional, and Three-Dimensional design.
- 4. Drawing: Freehand, Mechanical, and Life Drawing.
- 5. Painting: Oil based media, water based media, and Chinese ink painting.
- 6. Printmaking: Silkscreen, relief, lithograph, and intaglio printing.
- 7. Three-Dimensional: Sculpture, construction, and design problems.
- 8. Independent study project: 'Special Study'.

Closing date for applications: September 20, 1974. Candidates will be required to attend an interview.

Instruction will start during the week of October 7, 1974.

### CERTIFICATE SUBJECTS: Year I, Term I

A limited number of places in certificate classes will be available to non-certificate students. These classes are listed below, Course Nos. 19 to 24. Applications for these should be sent to the *Extra-Mural Town Centre only* as soon after September 23, 1974 as possible.

19. Freehand Drawing and Painting in Various Media. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Mondays, 6.00-8.00 p.m. or 8.00-10.00 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 30 meetings. Fee: \$215 plus model fee \$30

The emphasis in the first part of the course will be on 'learning to see', use of materials, composition and manual dexterity. Through a series of exercises students will gain an understanding of the more concrete elements of drawing: line, tone, movement, texture, pictorial and modelled space. Mid-way through the course emphasis will be placed on the more abstract elements of plastic space, colour, self-expression and visual 'problem solving'. 'Painting is a drawing limited to paint as the main material.' Paint and its uses will be explored towards the end of the course.

Students taking this course will benefit if they also attend 'Basic Relationships of Two-Dimensional Design'.

The additional model fee of \$30 will be payable at the opening meeting.

Enrolment is limited to 20 persons.

20. Basic Relationships of Two-Dimensional Design. Marion Bird, A.T.C. (Brighton). Mondays, 6.00–8.00 p.m. or 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$110

The aim of this course is to help students gain an understanding of the basic elements of design, line, tone, shape, colour, etc., and how they are used in visual expression. This course is essential for those wishing to work in other Two-Dimensional Media such as drawing, painting & printmaking.

21. Architectural Drawing. Mrs. Ruth Addison, A.R.I.B.A. (London). Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m. or 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting October 8, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 30 meetings. Fee: \$215

A course in which the basic skills and techniques of architectural drawing will be explored through a series of exercises in ink and pencil. These exercises include: Orthographic, Axometric and Asometric projections, the casting of shadows, drawing in perspective, and lettering, as well as the use of architectural drawing instruments.

This basic course is essential for anyone hoping to work in architecture, interiors or graphics.

22. Anatomy and Life Drawing. B. S. Vaughan, D.C., Marion Bird, A.T.C. (Brighton), Michael F. Griffith, A.T.D., and others. *Tuesdays*, 6.00–8.00 p.m. or 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting October 8, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 30 meetings. Fee: \$270 plus model fee \$50

'Anatomy', the understanding of the human body as a functioning entity, will be covered in the first 12 weeks. This part of the course consists of lectures and studio work with use of anatomical specimens as well as life models.

The remaining 18 weeks will be spent on 'Life Drawing'. Drawing from the figure has long been considered one of the better ways to train correlation of hand and eye. The aim of this part of the course is to understand the structure and proportion of the human figure, and students will be encouraged to draw freely and with vigour.

23. Introduction to Printmaking. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Fridays, 6.00–8.00 p.m. or 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting October 11, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$110

There are four basic types of prints: intaglio, relief, lithograph, and stencil, each having its own characteristics. This course is suitable for beginners who wish to explore printmaking techniques, and for print collectors who wish to more fully understand what constitutes an 'original print.'

24. History of Chinese Art. Lawrence C. S. Tam, B.A. (Hons.) London, M.A. Thursdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting October 10, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 30 meetings. Fee: \$330

A general survey of the development of the major forms of Chinese Art from the Neolithic period to the Ching Dynasty. Emphasis will be laid on pictorial art.

Certificate Course students will also study Art History from prehistoric times to the present during the first year, but this course is not open to non-certificate students.

### GRAPHIC DESIGN AND INTERIOR DESIGN

These are studio, lecture, and discussion classes aimed at those students with a professional interest in the subject. Enrolment is open to all students at different stages of development, unless otherwise stated.

### 25. Graphic Design Studio. Henry Steiner, M.F.A. (Yale). Mondays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$215

Through examples of existing designs and practical homework projects this course aims to refine design analysis and stimulate creativity. Topics to be covered include: symbols, publications, typography, signage. Students should have some prior exposure to design and working designers will be given precedence for enrolment. Class members will be expected to complete one homework assignment per week.

#### 26. Printing Technology. Savio Au. Mondays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130

Printing is a mass-production technique of communication, and effective production methods are among the most important developments in modern graphic communication. This course covers the modern printing and book production methods of photo-mechanical reproduction for colour and black and white, binding and finishing of printed matter, and papers and materials used for printing. There will be field trips to printers, binders and compositors.

This course is for graphic artists and anyone wishing to know something of the visual and mechanical aspects of printing.

#### 27. Typography. Savio Au. Tuesdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting October 8, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 30 meetings. Fee: \$220

Typography is a complex subject with ever-expanding applications. This course will provide the students with an effective knowledge of the major historical stages in the development of letter and type forms. It will also cover the intricacies of letter design and construction, and their function as elements of written communication and design.

This course is for those with an interest in graphic communication, as well as for those working in the related professions of commercial design, publishing and printing.

28. Illustration for Graphic Design. Mrs. Marion Bird, A.T.C. (Brighton). Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting October 9, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$120

The course begins with drawing techniques and goes on to show how these are used in a wide range of graphic and illustration work.

The work of well-known illustrators will be discussed, and assignments set based on the requirements of agencies and publishers.

Enrolment is limited to 25 persons.

29. Packaging Design. Miss Bonnie Chan, B.Sc. (Mich.), Dip. A.D. (Liverpool), A.D.F. (Manchester). Wednesdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting October 9, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$120

Fundamentally the graphic designer is concerned with communication: the problems of sending and receiving messages. The course is broadly based, aimed at three dimensional graphic surface design as well as constructive ways of packaging. In addition to studio work, discussions will take place throughout the term concerning packaging technology.

30. Photography: An Introduction. Ken Locke, A.I.A.P., A.R.P.S., T.T.C. Wednesdays, 6.30–9.00 p.m., starting October 9, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130 plus \$15 materials fee

This course will cover the basic studio and darkroom techniques of black and white and colour photography. Theories of photography, both aesthetic and philosophic, will be explored, and students will be encouraged to experiment in the media.

**31.** Photography: An Intermediate Course. Benno Gross, B.A.C.D.A. Fridays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting October 11, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$260 plus \$15 materials fee

A course in black and white and colour photography for those already familiar with the basic technical aspects of photography and photographic equipment. The emphasis will be on 'seeing' and 'shooting'. There will be approximately five class field trips to a variety of sites on Saturday or Sunday afternoons, and class critiques will be held on the results of these, as well as independent field trips. In addition there will be lectures and discussions on the work of well-known photographers.

Enrolment will be limited to 15 persons.

32. Interior Design Concepts. Elizabeth Stanton, L.S.I.A. Thursdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting October 10, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130

The main feature of this course will be the setting of a series of introductory exercises to help develop the students' ability to solve functional design problems. Critiques of the exercises will be given.

The course will be divided into three main areas. First, visual research, wherein emphasis will be on colour, space, form, light, and texture, with the aim of breaking down 'habitual' visual pre-conceptions. Second, design theory and research, with exercises exploring the relationship between design and function, design and materials, tone and colour. Third, design practice, with the students being asked to solve various problems relating to design within the home. The presentation and communication of visual information will also be discussed.

### 33. 室內設計應用營造法概論 (Building Construction for Interior Designers)

主 講 人:張鎭堃先生。

- 地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心。
- 時 間:一九七四年十月九日起,每星期三下午六時十 五分至七時四十五分。共三十講。

### 學 費:二百五十元。

課程之主要目標在向執業室內設計及裝修工程的人士簡介 營造法之概念。營造法式為其作業日常面對的問題,故應有明確 的認識。室內設計者能夠了解其工作塲所之樓宇結構與設備方式 的原則,即不致造成損害原有建築物的錯誤。對樓宇設備各方 面具有一般之知識,可以預測各專門工程的需要,預留應付的方 法,避免工程上無謂的損失。

營造法之精微要點,為着意闡述之課題,使學員領悟優良 構造之重要,能將其引用於室內裝修工程。

科目包括下列各項:

**建築 登 选 : 建築 基 礎 緒 論 , 穩 定 性 , 重 量 分 佈 , 複 雜 地 盤 處 理 , 打 樁 。 不智之 擾 動 。 承 重 牆 及 桁 架 之 結 構 。 牆 壁 種 類 , 間 牆 。 門 窗 構 造 、 防 水 、 防 風 、 隔 熱 、 隔 聲 處 理 。 樓 梯 構 造 , 欄 桁 與 安 全 。 屋 頂 工 程 。 防 水 、 日 晒 影 嚮 與 隔 熱 設 備 。 防 水 封 蓋 之 重 要 。 擾 動 與 不 良 好 重 修 之 後 果 。 隔 熱 與 隔 聲 工 程 原 則 , 重 修 應 注 意 要 點 。** 

結構工程大網:工程原則及計算方式淺說。割拆之危險, 過重及誤解「安全因數」之危險。何種情况須邀請工程師協助。

建築法規與防火條例:法定規律意義解釋。故意違例之危 險。須邀請建築師協助之情况。

樓字設備:潔具、渠管、水電、電梯,空氣調節等設備原 則概論。

面骨裝飾:油漆、灰水、樓面、牆紙、批擋、灰漿。材料 種類與質地。造法。本課程專為現役室內設計及裝修工程執業成 員而設。用粤語講述,必要時引用英文名詞,但皆輔以詳細解 釋,及讀音指導。

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### 34. 書本策劃設計與製作

### (Book Design and Production)

主 講 人:歐英傑先生。

講授語言:粤語。

時 間:一九七四年十月十日起每星期四下午六時卅分 至八時。

批 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心。

學 費:一百卅元(共十五講,每講個半小時)。

此課程與本年春季用英語講授之 'Book Design and Production'大致一樣,內容包括出版中英文書籍的策劃版面美術設計與 字體的運用,製作方法及其程序,品質管制與成品裝煌等。旨在 給予學員一個基本概念。

本課並包括參觀印刷排版,製版,釘裝等工廠藉以增加學員之興趣及吸取更多之實際經驗。學員完成此課程後並可繼續參 加明年春季開辦以英語講授之第二級課程。

### PRACTICAL DRAWING, PAINTING, AND PRINTMAKING

These are practical studio classes in the Visual Arts with emphasis on artistic skills and creative growth of the individual. Work will be carried out in the various media described.

Students must provide all necessary materials, some of which will be available for purchase through the department. Materials will be discussed at the first class meeting. Where a model is used an additional fee will be charged.

35. Basic Relationships of Two-Dimensional Design. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.), Marion Bird, A.T.C. (Brighton). Tuesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting October 8, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$110

See entry for Course No. 20.

36. Freehand Drawing and Painting in Various Media. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Thursdays, 10.30 a.m.-12.30 p.m., starting October 10, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 30 meetings.

Fee: \$215 plus \$30 model fee

See entry for Course No. 19.

37. Life Drawing. Elise Parkin. Fridays, 9.30 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting October 11, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$135<sup>+</sup><sub>4</sub>plus \$50 model fee

A class for beginners and more advanced students as part of a continuing study in the valuable discipline of drawing from life models.

Students will be encouraged, by drawing the human form, to learn 'to see', co-ordinating hand and eye. A variety of media will be used.

38. Painting in Oil and Related Media. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.), Julie Newport, B.F.A. (Calif. A & C). Wednesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.30 p.m., starting October 9, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$235

Using the figure, still life, landscape, etc. as basic structural elements, students will explore various possibilities of using oil and other related media in painting and drawing. Instruction will be on an individual basis and both beginners and more advanced students will be welcome.

Enrolment will be limited to 20 persons.

39. Basic Intaglio Printing. Julie Newport, B.F.A. (Calif. A & C). Mondays, 2.00-4.30 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 15 meetings. Fee: \$140 plus \$30 materials fee

Intaglio printing, commonly known as 'Etching', is a process of printing usually done from a metal plate. Techniques covered in this course will include: drypoint, etching, aquatint and shallow relief. Both black and white and colour prints will be made.

The materials fee of \$30 (payable at the first class session) will cover the cost of inks, chemicals, and heavy equipment.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

40. Introduction to Printmaking. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Wednesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.30 p.m., starting October 9, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130

See entry for Course No. 23.

**41.** Lithography. Julie Newport, B.F.A. (Calif. A & C). Mondays, 10.00 a.m.-12.30 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 15 meetings. Fee: \$140 plus \$30 materials fee

Lithography is a printing process done traditionally on limestone. In this course students will explore the basic techniques of limestone lithography including stones, presses, inks, rollers, etc. and will be able to produce both black and white, and colour prints.

The materials fee of \$30 (payable at the first class session) covers the cost of inks, solvents and heavy equipment.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

42. Printmaking and Experimental Fabric Design. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Thursdays, 9.30 a.m.– 12.30 p.m., starting October 10, 1974. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 15 meetings. Fee: \$145 plus \$25 materials fee

During the course students will explore the potentials of pattern and printmaking; surface printing, wood and lino block, and silk screen. They will then experiment with fabric painting and printing, using direct methods as well as printing methods. The emphasis will be on the 'experimental' as students will be working in the classroom and not laboratory conditions. Beginners welcome.

Students will be expected to provide all materials. An additional charge of \$25 per person to cover the cost of inks and sundries will be payable at the first meeting.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

### ART APPRECIATION

These are lecture and discussion courses open to all students regardless of previous Art History study.

43. Modern Architecture and Design. Cesar Guillen-Nunez, M.A. (Penna. Univ.). Mondays, 2.30–4.00 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130

A close look will be taken at the main architectural developments in Europe, America, and Japan from the mid-nineteenth century to the present. The important role played by architects on modern concepts of industrial design will also be discussed.

44. Civilisation. Philippa Kelly. Mondays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130

During the course the thirteen films of Kenneth Clark's series 'Civilisation' will be shown. 'Kenneth Clark emphasizes that this is not a history of the arts, but of the life-giving beliefs and ideas made visible and audible through the medium of art. It is a 'personal view' that becomes a marvellously exciting and stimulating search into the sources and developments of Western Civilization.' Each film will be followed by a talk exploring further the history of the works and artists Clark discusses.

45. Ukiyo-E and Impressionism. Cesar Guillen-Nunez, M.A. (Penna. Univ.). Tuesdays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting October 8, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130

'Ukiyo-e,' or the Japanese *genre*-picture of the early nineteenth century, had an impact on the West which is only just beginning to be fully realised. It reached its climax in a group of landscape painters in France, known as 'The Impressionists'. This course will study these movements and their protagonists, such as Hiroshige and his woodcuts, as well as Van Gogh. It should be especially interesting to enthusiasts of Japanese woodcuts and Western landscape painting.

46. A Survey of Art and Culture in the Ancient World. Nancy Jenkins, B.A. (Wellesley). Wednesdays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting October 9, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$130

A general survey of art forms and their social and historical context from Neolithic Times to the Seventh Century B.C. in Western Asia and the Mediterranean world. Particular attention will be paid to Egypt, Sumeroakkadia, Anatolia, and Greece. 47. An Introduction to the Hindu and Buddhist Art of India. Mrs. Rajeshwari Ghose, B.A. Hons. (Calcutta), M.A. (H.K.). Fridays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting September 27, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 16 meetings. Fee: \$75

This illustrated course will provide an introduction to the Hindu & Buddhist art of India. It will commence with a survey of the development of both religions and discuss their beliefs, mythology and iconography. It will examine at length the development of secular and religious architecture in India—the Hindu rock-cut temples, the Buddhist cave monasteries, the Hindu temple in south India and its development as a temple-town. It will also deal with the different Schools of Indian Sculpture—the classical and romantic trends, the erotic sculptures of north and east India, bronze casting, terracottas, ivory carving and the fascinating murals and fresco paintings of Ajanta.

The course will conclude with a very brief glimpse of the spread of these art forms and concepts in Nepal and Tibet.

### STUDY TOUR TO INDIA

It is hoped to arrange a two-week tour during Chinese New Year in February 1975 to visit some famous monuments of Hindu and Buddhist art in India. A course on Indian art is being offered (Course No. 47) and the tour will be led by the tutor. Interested persons are requested to apply for further details before *September 15, 1974*.

64. Management Decision-Making: A Case Study Approach. Vincent Ng, B.B.A., B.S., B.S.B.A., M.B.A., M.S. Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting September 30, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

Managers and students of Management Studies who wish to assess and improve their skills in decision-making will find this course of particular value. A number of management cases have been selected, covering the fields of business expansion, marketing, credit lending, cash forecasting and decisions to make or buy. These cases will form the basis of the course, which in turn will require a high degree of participation from those attending. Formal teaching of the principles of decision-making will be kept to a minimum, as the group of participants will be expected to formulate their own ideas from the case material.

65. Personnel Management and Industrial Behaviour. Major J. W. Gurhy, R.P.C. Thursdays, 7.30–9.00 p.m., starting September 26, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$60

This essentially practical course in personnel management concentrates on current issues and problems. It will cover, in particular, management functions, human relations, organisation study and communications as well as basic aspects of the personnel function in an industrial environment.

Good financial management is vital for the profitability of any organisation. The decision-making aspects of financial management as well as the techniques and tools used in financial analysis are covered in the course. In particular, emphasis is placed on the task of providing funds on favourable terms, cash management, short and long term financing. Classroom lecturing and case study method will be used. The course is designed to benefit all managers not just finance specialists.

The best basis for action is proper accounting information submitted to management in meaningful form. Non-financial executives will find this course very useful as it provides an introduction to the subject of management accounting, and also sufficient knowledge to enable them to take action towards profit improvement by the use of the techniques of this form of management information. 68. Production Management. W. S. Lau, M.Sc., Ph.D., C.Eng., M.I. Mech. E., M.I. Prod. E. Tuesdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting October 8, 1974. Room 103, University Main Building, 10 meetings. Fee: \$70

The rising cost of materials and equipment is a problem faced by all Hong Kong manufacturers and it is increasingly important to use these resources as skilfully as possible. These lectures aim to provide knowledge of scientific management in the production area. Topics covered include factory location and layout, production planning and control, work study and critical path analysis. The course is suitable for both general managers and production engineers.

This course is intended to cater for the needs of both those engaged in careers master's work and educational guidance and those who want an introduction to the theory and practice of school counselling. ## CERTIFICATE COURSES IN THE USE OF ENGLISH

A sound working knowledge of English is one of the greatest needs in Hong Kong life today. To meet this need the Department offers a carefully devised and integrated programme in the use of English that will provide the students with practical tuition in the following skills:

the ability to speak fluently and carry on conversations in English; the ability to understand accurately what is said by other speakers; the ability to write in a number of different situations; the ability to understand written English.

The course tutors will set assignments for the students to complete at home and in class, and these will then be corrected and discussed with the course. A large number of articles on topical subjects and short stories are available for comprehension and appreciation, and at all times the students will be provided with plenty of opportunity to express their own ideas.

All these courses comprise a continuous programme leading to the award of the Department's Certificate in the Use of English on successful completion of the Second Year.

Students are advised to apply for a place in a First Year course and then, when they have completed this satisfactorily, they will be eligible to enter the Second Year in the following year. However, those who consider themselves adequately qualified and who pass the Grading Test sufficiently well may enter the Second Year direct.

As these courses are intended for working adults, students at present attending secondary school will not be admitted.

The tutors for all these courses will be drawn from a panel of university graduates.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS: Those who have successfully completed one of the Department's Use of English courses before may enter the next appropriate course without any further test. ## CERTIFICATE COURSES IN ENGLISH FOR BUSINESS

The ability to express himself clearly in English is something that every businessman needs to pay very considerable attention to if he is going to be able to communicate effectively with his customers and suppliers not only in Hong Kong but also in many of those countries that Hong Kong trades with. Within his company, too, the businessman needs to understand what his colleagues have to say and to communicate with them. Here again, a good command of English is often of the utmost importance.

The Extra-Mural courses in English for Business are specifically designed to help those engaged in commerce and industry, and provide intensive tuition in those applied varieties of English that they are most likely to require. They are therefore ideally suited for those who have to handle correspondence independently for their firms and need to communicate with others within them.

#### SYLLABUS

109. Educational Drama as a Teaching Method. Miss S. Stanley, A.G.S.M. Tuesdays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting October 15, 1974. Room 231, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$75

This course is directed at teachers who are interested in working with and adapting recognised educational drama methods. An aim of educational drama is to encourage students to question and make decisions when faced with particular problems within an improvised situation. This method of working helps students to communicate their ideas more spontaneously to each other, as well as giving them extra insight into the experience of being involved imaginatively in a particular role or situation. Teachers attending will need to participate in the various activities which will include some of the following ways of working: drama exercises and games, role play, improvised situations based on stories, historical events, themes, group speaking.

It is hoped that there will be an opportunity for the tutor to follow up some of the course work with teachers in their schools. Although the course is not directly concerned with school theatre productions the tutor will be pleased to discuss ideas with teachers.

An introductory study of soil geography, biogeography and physical geography, the criterion, problems and achievements of which will be evaluated with reference to local examples. Special emphasis will be laid on the soils of Hong Kong with regard to their genesis, uses and response to man's impact. The interplay of vegetation, soils and environmental factors will receive equal attention and the course will conclude with a discussion of geomorphological problems.

Priority will be given to post-secondary students and geography teachers.

116. Urban Geography. Miss Chung Yuet-ping, B.A. (C.U.H.K.), M.A. (Kent), Ph.D. (Minn.). Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Room 122, University Main Building. 8 meetings. Fee: \$45

An introductory course covering the following topics: evolution of urban systems (urbanization, suburbanization, and urban design), urban hierarchy (urban centres and their functional relationship), social space, and field survey methods in urban geography. Examples of urban systems from Asia, Africa and Western societies are selected for discussion to illustrate the forces in urbanization. Field methods such as sampling and questionnaire surveys are approached with examples from Hong Kong. Some class projects for high school students in field studies on local urban environment are suggested.

All lectures are conducted by a team of University lecturers from the Department of History, each contributing according to their present research and teaching. Various aspects of the undercurrents fermenting the revolutionary activities in 1789 France, 1917 Russia and Modern Japan will be analysed; the consequent liberal and socialist movement will also be discussed; the final aim being to trace the influences, especially of the latter two countries, on modern Chinese historical trends. The Chinese revolution of 1911, the intellectual revolution of 1919 and the later socialist revolution will be particularly discussed.

Upper form school teachers and those engaged in historical studies will find this course especially useful in acquiring new concepts and approaches. This course will be followed in the spring of 1975 by a course on 'Modern & Contemporary China'.

本課程之重要目的,爲配合中文取得與英文同等法律地位 以後當前香港社會之實際需要,其內容主要爲說明各種應用文之 一般原理,並以指陳體要,廣舉範例之形式介紹各種公文信件之 寫作方法。

課程項目包括公私函件、商業信札、會議文件、便條、規 章、契約、啓事、報告、佈告、通告、題詞、序跋等等應用文體 之介紹與習作,力避陳腐,以切時用。

# 165. 語言傳達學入門

(Introduction to Speech-communication)

此乃美洲最近新興的一門寶用學科,用科學化及系統化的 分析,幫助參加者對其語言環境之意義,作有系統的觀察,再用 語言為媒介,發揮人與其環境合一化的創造能力。

內容包括語言與傳達的現象;語言與傳達的關係;個人與 傳達的關係;傳達時常遇到的阻礙;及勸誘的技巧。

整個過程着重小組討論,故只限收二十六人,對從事文 化教育事業、社會工作及公共關係者,均會有很大的專業上的 幫助,凡上課次數超過三分之二者,將可申請本部發給之聽講 證書。

166. Topics in Chinese Literature. L. Y. Chiu, M.A. (H.K.), Ph.D. (Sydney), Senior Lecturer in Chinese, Mary Fung, B.A. (H.K.), M.A. (Col.), Lecturer in Chinese, K. P. H. Ho, M.A. (H.K.), D.Phil. (Oxon), Lecturer in Chinese, Owen H. H. Wong, M.A. (H.K.), Ph.D. (Cantab.), S. K. Wong, M.A., Dip.Ed. (H.K.), D.Phil. (Oxon), Lecturer in Chinese. Fridays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting October 11, 1974. Room 103, University Main Building. 11 meetings. Free: \$60

A team of University lecturers, drawn mainly from the Department of Chinese, will draw on their specialised teaching & research experience, to highlight the main characteristics of Chinese Literature, past and present. A general survey of Chinese Literature will be given at the beginning of the course in order to set the scene and then the following topics will be discussed: the rhyme prose of the Han period; Li Po & Tu Fu, two famous T'ang poets; modern Chinese novels, and modern Chinese poetry.

Little or no previous knowledge of the subject will be assumed.

167. Chinese Literature in English Translation. S. K. Wong, M.A., Dip.Ed. (H.K.), D.Phil. (Oxon), Lecturer in Translation, University of Hong Kong. Fridays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting October 4, 1974. Room 142, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$65

A selection of English translations of Chinese prose & poetry will be supplied and will be analysed critically. The changing fashions in the translation of Chinese poetry into English will be discussed, as well as the general problems facing the translator.

The course is primarily intended for two types of students: first, school teachers interested in the teaching of Translation up to Sixth Form level, and, second, English-speaking non-Chinese students who have a reasonable command of the Chinese Language and who wish to further their understanding of Chinese Literature.

168. The Ancient Civilisation of China. O. H. H. Wong, M.A. (H.K.), Ph.D. (Cantab.). Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting October 7, 1974. Room 103, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$50

To understand Modern China it is essential to have some knowledge of Ancient China, which, in itself, is a fascinating study. To this end, the following topics have been selected for discussion: the cradle of Chinese civilisation; geographic influences on Chinese history and culture; trends in Chinese history, particularly the dynastic cycle; ways of Chinese thinking; the Chinese mode of life and social structure; political concepts; the Chinese as an artistic nation; early Chinese contacts with the outside world.

Little or no previous knowledge of Chinese history will be assumed.

169. Chinese Religion and Religious Practice. James P. McGough, B.A. (Washington), M.A. (Michigan State), Lecturer in Sociology, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting October 15, 1974. Room 418, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 8 meetings. Fee: \$45

This course will begin with a survey of traditional Chinese religion, including the 'three teachings' of Confucianism, Buddhism, and Taoism. The main emphasis will then be on the popular, or 'folk' religion and its practice. Topics will include, among others, the ritual calendar, the Chinese pantheon, ancestor worship, shamanism, and the types and forms of religious rituals. Special reference will be made to religious practice in Taiwan and Hong Kong, and lectures will be illustrated with slides whenever possible. 170. The Chinese Family. Mrs. H. L. McGough, B.A. (Grinnell Coll.), M.A. (Mich.). Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting October 3, 1974. Room 230, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$60

The family unit has usually been considered the backbone of Chinese society. After a brief discussion of the types and functions of families in general, this course will deal with the family in traditional China; changes in the family since the beginning of the Republican period in China; the Chinese family in Hong Kong, Taiwan, and overseas Chinese communities. Finally, there will be discussion of the family under the Communist system in mainland China.

The approach will be anthropological, and use will be made of the tutor's experiences in Taiwan.

171. Understanding Chinese Customs & Traditions. Mrs. Nana Tsao, B.A., Dip.Ed. (H.K.). Thursdays, 3.00–4.30 p.m., starting October 3, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

This series of lectures is designed for those who wish to learn something of Chinese life and culture, with special reference to Hong Kong. Topics include historical background to understanding Chinese Customs and Traditions; Chinese family and kinship organization; religion and the Chinese; marriage and burial customs; symbolism in Chinese art; main festivals celebrated in Hong Kong. The lectures will be illustrated with slides and films.

Industrial Psychology. Mick J. Bennett, B.A. (Keele), M.Phil. (Lond.), Lecturer in Psychology, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting October 8, 1974. Room 248, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

The course introduces the ways in which psychology can be applied in the industrial context. In particular it concerns itself with assessment and selection, learning and industrial training, management development, problems in worker motivation and job satisfaction, human factors in work design and consumer psychology.

175. Psychoanalysis—Outline and Critique. Joseph A. Precker, Ph.D. (Columbia). Mondays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting September 30, 1974. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 5 meetings. Fee: \$50

This short series of five sessions will focus on the insights into human behaviour provided by Freud and his followers, and attempt to place them in historical, social, and scientific perspective. Investigations in psychology, psychiatry, anthropology, and sociology will be introduced to demonstrate the present-day relevance and shortcomings of psychoanalytic thinking.

**176.** The Psychology of Women. Mrs. Mildred McCoy, B.A. (Coll. of St. Catherine), M.A. (H.K.), Assistant Lecturer in Psychology, University of Hong Kong. Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting October 17, 1974. Room 418, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

The course will attempt to examine the information now available on the interaction of biological and cultural determinants in shaping modern woman, her motives, behaviour and role. Topics to be covered include: the biological determinants of sex differences, the early effects of constitutional differences between males and females, sex differences in personality and learning and other abilities, the female sexual experience, sex roles, identification, self-esteem, changing patterns in the relationship between the sexes, and an evaluation of various historical approaches to female psychology with special attention to psychoanalytic theories. Although most of the research has been on western societies, the specific Hong Kong situation will be considered.

Discussion will be encouraged during each session.

181. Mondays and Thursdays, 6.15–7.15 p.m., 7.30–8.30 p.m. starting September 23, 1974. Room 847, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. Fee: \$530 (including examination fee)

182. Tuesdays and Fridays, 6.15-7.15 p.m., 7.30-8.30 p.m. starting September 24, 1974. Room 847, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. Fee: \$530 (including examination fee)

These courses are designed for people with no previous knowledge of computer programming. They aim to provide a thorough grounding in programming techniques and to train independent computer programmers. Preference will be given to applicants to whom the skills taught during the course will be of direct relevance. Those who are able to enclose a letter from their employers to this effect are advised to do so.

No. of Meetings: 65, twice weekly. Each period will consist of two hours.

Minimum Entry Qualifications: Applicants should have 5 subjects including English and Mathematics at Grade E or above in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education, or equivalent.

An examination will be conducted at the end of the course. The award of an extra-mural certificate is conditional on passing the written examination, completing the set projects and attending at least 75% of the lectures.

Students are expected to do a certain amount of work in their own time and are advised not to take any other public examination in the same year.

Syllabus

- 1. Introduction: computer concepts & hardware; number & character system; problem definition & description; computer language development.
- 2. Fortran-IV: elements of language; arithmetic control, input/output & allocation; subscription & flow-charts; subroutines & flow-charts; compatibility; overwriting; efficiency; examples.
- Cobol: elements of Cobol; procedure, data, environment and identification divisions; concept of programme suite; typical commercial system using Cobol, case study 1; advanced technique in Cobol programming: programming with direct access files; case study 2.
- More Advanced Studies: basic arithmetic & decision operations; symbolic coding & programme; assembly & execution; address modification & index register; direct & indirect addressing; subroutines.

5. Projects: the organization, writing & running of projects on digital computers form an integral part of the course.

Ample computer time will be provided for problem exercises & projects.

183. Certificate Course in Basic Biochemistry for Teachers. D. R. Kemp, Dip.Microbiol. (Lond.), M.Sc. (Biochem.), Ph.D. (Lond.), M.I.Biol. Tuesdays, 6.00–9.00 p.m., starting September 24, 1974. Li Shu Fan (Preclinical) Building, Sassoon Road, in the Department of Biochemistry. Fee: \$400 (including examination fee)

This course is particularly designed for teachers of 5th and 6th form Biology and/or Chemistry who have not had the opportunity to study Biochemistry. The emphasis on Biochemistry in Modern Biology has become much greater during the last few years and the course aims to give a basic training in theoretical and practical Biochemistry that should be particularly useful to 6th form teachers of Biology. Simple experiments that could well be used in the 6th form will be included as well as more advanced practical techniques.

The course will deal with the structure and metabolic importance of carbohydrates, fats and proteins. There will be 36 meetings of three hours each (one hour lecture followed by two hours practical work).

#### Outline of the Syllabus

(1) The structure and occurrence of the common carbohydrates and the metabolism of these substances by the body. The latter will include glycogenesis, glycolysis, the tricarboxylic acid cycle, electron transport and the pentose phosphate pathway. (12 weeks)

(2) The structure of lipids and their metabolism, including the  $\beta$ -oxidation pathway and the synthesis of fatty acids. (6 weeks)

The structure of amino acids and their importance as residues in proteins. Protein structure. (6 weeks)

(3) The structure and nature of action of enzymes. Enzyme kinetics. The effect of substrate concentration, pH, temperature, enzyme concentration and inhibitors on the rate of an enzyme reaction. (12 weeks)

An examination will be conducted in both theory and practical in the last two weeks of the course. The award of an Extra-Mural Certificate is conditional on passing the written and practical examination and attending at least 75% of the lectures.

Students are expected to do a certain amount of work in their own time and are advised not to take any other public examination in the same year.

PARTIAL FEE REFUND: Teachers of Biology and/or Chemistry in Forms 5 and 6 may obtain a refund of \$100 by application to the Director of Education (forms are obtainable from the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong) which must be returned directly to the Director of Education well in advance of the commencement of the course. This applies to all teachers whether in Government, aided or private schools. 184. The Construction and Use of Simple Physics Apparatus. R. F. Simpson, B.Sc., M.A., Ph.D., Cert.Ed., Dip.Ed. (Lond.), A.Inst.P., Senior Lecturer in Education, University of Hong Kong. Fridays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting October 11, 1974. Room 113/114, University Main Building. Io meetings. Fee: \$120

The course will deal with the construction and use of simple physics apparatus with special reference to the integrated science programme but including work up to the Certificate of Education level. Participants, who should be teachers or senior laboratory staff, will be given the opportunity to try out the equipment and where possible to make things themselves.

185. Hong Kong Birds. Michael A. Webster, M.A., M.B.O.U., Executive Secretary of the Conservancy Association. Tuesday, 7.00-8.00 p.m., starting October 8, 1974. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

Why is Hong Kong a particularly interesting place for the bird-watcher? Over 370 species have been recorded here, and over 240 are recorded each year. This course sets out to give an account of the reasons why Hong Kong is so rich in bird life, with details of migration, breeding distribution and biology, and identification of the species involved. There will be also discussion of the different habitats involved, and how Man is changing the bird life by changing the nature of the countryside. The course will be illustrated by slides taken by local photographers. It is intended as an introduction to Hong Kong's birds, but a certain amount of more advanced theory will be included, with suggestions as to how the amateur ornithologist can make a lasting contribution to this science. There will be one or two field trips, according to the wishes of participants.

186. Fauna of Hong Kong. Mondays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting September 16, 1974. Lecture Room 302 & Laboratory 213, Northcote Science Building, Department of Zoology, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$100

Tutors: D. S. Hill, M.Sc., Ph.D., F.L.S., M.I.Biol., M.B.O.U. B. S. Morton, Ph.D., F.L.S. R. C. C. Ko, M.Sc., Ph.D.

The course will deal with Animal Taxonomy, and Systematics of the Animal Kingdom to the level of Family, in most instances, with particular reference to the fauna of Hong Kong. The more important and interesting groups of animals represented in Hong Kong will be dealt with to the species level. It is intended to be of special use to local biology teachers, but also to anyone seriously interested in the local fauna. It is also intended as a vital precursor to any future courses in Animal Ecology in Hong Kong. Each meeting will consist of a lecture followed by a practical laboratory session. The course is designed to supplement a pictorial text, one copy of which can be obtained for \$20 at the first meeting.

# 187. 日常營養學

188. 香港海洋魚類 (Marine Fishes of Hong Kong)

本課程共十講,旨在介紹香港海鮮魚類,包括魚類之形 態、分類、生態、習性、分佈及漁業各方面之問題。內容適應 生物學教師,學生及一般對生物學有認識或對魚類有與趣人士修 讀,並附魚類標本及幻燈片之示範。課程期內另舉行一次標本採 集活動。

The course will also examine the problems of economic analysis, business forecasting, measuring social trends, and the financial indices of share price movements.

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
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#### **GROUND PLAN OF UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG MAIN BUILDING**
