

The Department welcomes enquiries and requests from business organizations, government, voluntary bodies or private institutions for specially designed courses to meet their specific education needs.

PRIOR ENROLMENT IS ESSENTIAL

Failure to enrol prior to the opening of a particular course may mean the cancellation of that course. Prior enrolment is the only way the Department of Extra-Mural Studies has of judging the response to its courses. Your co-operation is therefore invited in sending your application forms to the Department as soon as possible.

General Information

- There are normally no entry requirements except that applicants should be over 18 years of age. Occasionally to have the full benefit of a course applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Applicants are therefore advised to read the description of a course carefully. Professional courses usually have clearly defined entry requirements.
- 2 The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant
- 3 Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held (a) on any public holidays.
 - (b) at a storm warning signal of No. 8 or above. (After the typhoon passes, if the No. 8 signal is lowered before 3 p.m., classes will take place as normal. If the signal is lowered after 3 p.m., classes will be cancelled that evening.)

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Archaeology

7 A Basic Course in Archaeology with Reference to Hong Kong

S. M. Bard, M.B., B.S. (H.K.), Chairman, Hong Kong Archaeological Society. Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 30, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings plus 2 museum visits and 4 field trips. Fee: \$100

Instruction will cover the fossil record of early man and the general field of prehistory, archaeological techniques, and questions of chronology in relation to tools and pottery. The emphasis will be on the practical aspects of the subject, and the talks will be illustrated by slides and specimens, which can be handled by the students. The latter part of the course will deal with the prehistory of Hong Kong and relate this to recent finds

The course will include two museum visits and four field trips; the latter in conjunction with the field work sessions of the Hong Kong Archaeological Society. The cost of these field trips is included in the fee.

Enrolment is limited to 30 persons.

UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE

The attention of extra-mural students is drawn to the following regulation of the University of Hong Kong regarding admission to the University:

'A mature person without formal academic qualifications who is aged 30 or over on September 1 of the year in which admission is sought may be exempted completely from University entrance requirements but shall not be eligible for admission to the Faculty of Medicine. Applications for exemption on grounds of mature age must be supported by certified true copies of a birth certificate or a statutory declaration and of any academic qualifications.'

Art & Design

Courses in Art & Design and related areas are open to students of all levels of development unless otherwise stated.

8 Certificate Course in Fundamentals of Art & Design

An evening course extending over two years, each of which consists of two terms of fourteen weeks duration. Formal instruction is concentrated into three or three and a half evenings each week, but considerable additional work at home will be necessary.

The object of this foundation level course is to provide a range of studies and understanding which will enable students, whatever the nature of their previous education, to develop talents and discover interest in the field of Art & Design.

Fee: \$1,000 per annum.

Entry Requirements

Consideration will be given to those who have an interest in Art & Design, and proficiency in English up to at least the Pass level of the Hong Kong English School Certificate.

The course consists of studio work, lectures, seminars and discussions.

Syllabus outline

- 1. History of Western and Oriental Art and Architecture.
- 2. Exploration into the nature of materials.
- 3. Design Concepts: Colour Theory, Two-Dimensional, and Three-Dimensional design.
- 4. Drawing: Freehand, Mechanical, and Life Drawing.
- 5. Painting: Oil based media, water based media, and Chinese ink painting.
- Printmaking: Silkscreen, relief, lithograph, and intaglio printing.
- 7. Three-Dimensional: Sculpture, construction, and design problems.
- 8. Independent study project: 'Special Study'.

Closing date for applications: September 16, 1975. Candidates will be required to attend an interview.

Instruction will start during the week of September 29, 1975.

CERTIFICATE SUBJECTS: Year I, Term I, and Year II, Term I

A limited number of places in certificate classes will be available to non-certificate students. These classes are listed below, Course Nos. 9 to 15, and 16 to 22. Please note that most of the practical courses require a minimum of four hours additional outside work. Applications for these should be sent to the Extra-Mural Town Centre only as soon after September 19, 1975 as possible. In the event of oversubscription an interview may be required.

q Introduction to Printmaking

Diane Jones-Parry, Dip.A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C (Hornsey). Mondays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 29, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140.

There are four basic types of prints: intaglio, relief, lithograph, and stencil, each having its own individual characteristics. This course offers an introduction to these major printmaking areas and students will have the opportunity to experiment and produce prints in black and white, and colour.

10 Freehand Drawing and Painting in Various Media

Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Tuesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m, starting September 30, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 28 meetings. Fee: \$250 plus model fee \$30

The emphasis in the first part of this course will be on "learning to see", use of materials, composition and manual dexterity. Through a series of exercises students will gain an understanding of the more concrete elements of drawing: line, tone, movement, texture, pictorial and modelled space. Mid-way through the course emphasis will be placed on the more abstract elements of plastic space, colour, self-expression and visual "problem solving." Paint, and its uses will be explored towards the end of the course.

Students taking this course will benefit if they also attend "Basic Relationships of Two-Dimensional Design."

The additional model fee of \$30 will be payable at the opening meeting.

11 An Introduction to Chinese Painting

Harold Wong Chung Fong. Tuesdays, 8.15-9.45 p.m., starting September 30, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140

Many people believe that all Chinese paintings are very much the same. In order to disprove this general misconception students will study the development of Chinese painting from the seventh century to modern times, exploring the styles of great painters, and major art movements.

12 Architectural Drawing

Ruth Addison, A.R.I.B.A. (London). Wednesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting October 1, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 28 meetings. Fee: \$250

Architectural drawing is a basic form of communication among architects, builders, interior designers, and others. It is an international language. The basic concepts, skills, and techniques of architectural drawing will be explored through a series of exercises in ink and pencil. These exercises include: orthograph, axometric and asometric projections, the casting of shadows, drawing in perspective, and lettering, as well as the use of architectural drawing instruments.

13 Basic Relationships of Two-Dimensional Design

Kathleen Brinkley-Rogers, B.F.A. (University of Illinois). Wednesdays, 8.00-10.00 p.m., starting October 1, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140

Pleasing, dynamic, two-dimensional art, whether painting, drawing, printmaking, or graphic design, does not just happen. It is the result of conscious structuring by the artist, employing all the basics of good design. In this course we will experiment with line, space, and compositional layout. We will also explore visual illusion, and the uses of colour and tone. By analyzing various examples of two-dimensional art, from old masters to contemporary works, we will get a "feel" for pleasing composition, a discriminating sense about design, and a greater appreciation of art work as well as the development of our own design skills.

This course is essential for anyone wishing to pursue fine or applied art.

14 Anatomy and Life Drawing

B. S. Vaughan, D.C., Peter Chancellor, Dip.A.D. (Birming ham), A.T.D. (London). Thursdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting. October 2, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 28 meetings.

Fee: \$250 plus \$50 model fee

"Anatomy," the understanding of the human body as a functioning entity, will be covered in the first eight weeks. This part of the course consists of lectures and studio work with the use of anatomical specimens as well as life models.

The remaining twenty weeks will be spent on "Life Drawing." Drawing from the figure has long been considered one of the better ways to train correlation of hand and eye. The aim of this part of the course is to understand the structure and proportion of the human figure, and students will be encouraged to draw freely and with vigour.

15 A Survey of Western Art History

Philippa Kelly, David Osborne, B.A.Hons. (Kingston Upon Hull). Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting September 29, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 28 meetings. Fee: \$250

Western art, architecture, and sculpture will be studied in broad outline from their early beginnings to the present. This course is intended as a foundation for further detailed study.

16 Birth of Modern Painting

Philippa Kelly, David Osborne, B.A. Hons. (Kingston Upon Hull). Thursdays, 8.15-9.45 p.m., starting October 2, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140

The most radical changes in the paintings of this century have been the two tendencies towards abstraction and the conceptual. One freed the painter from the necessity of an object to portray on canvas, the other from the necessity for a canvas at all. New methods, materials, and attitudes, all contributed to these changes which started most clearly in the late 19th century. The art movements and painters of the years, 1880–1914, will therefore be studied because they laid the foundations for our present day attitude to art.

17 Silkscreen and Serigraphic Printing

Diane Jones-Parry, Dip.A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Tuesdays, 6.30-8.30 p.m., starting September 30, 1975. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 14 meetings.

Fee: \$140 plus \$30 materials fee

The silkscreen and serigraph have developed from the simple stencil, and screenprinting is among the youngest of the printmaking crafts. As such it is in an exciting state of expansion with the uses of the varied techniques ranging from decorative elements to fine art prints. The aim of this course is to present the silkscreen and serigraphic medium to the student, to allow him to explore its potential and versatility, and to produce prints in both black and white, and colour.

A materials fee of \$30, payable at the first class meeting, covers the cost of ink and sundries. Students will be expected to provide many of their own materials.

18 Woodcut and Relief Printmaking

Diane Jones-Parry, Dip.A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Wednesdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting October 1, 1975. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 14 meetings.

Fee: \$140 plus \$30 materials fee

The relief print is one of the most ancient forms of printmaking, and wood the most traditional material. Carving a line or shape demands gestures that are both satisfying and intrinsic, and are quite unlike holding a brush or pen. An exciting aspect of contemporary relief printmaking is the use of new and varied materials such as plastics, cardboard, and "found" objects. Students will explore both traditional and contemporary relief printmaking, and will develop and produce prints in both black and white, and colour.

Students will be expected to provide most drawing and cutting materials. An additional charge of \$30 will be collected at the first meeting to cover the cost of inks and sundries.

19 Photography: An Introduction

Andrew Mitchell. Wednesdays or Fridays, 6.30-8.30 p.m., starting October 1 and 3, 1975, respectively. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140 plus \$25 materials fee

The basic studio and darkroom techniques of black and white, and colour photography will be discussed. Theories of photography, both aesthetic and philosophic, will also be explored. Students will be encouraged to experiment in the media, and class critiques will be held on the results.

20 Painting in Acrylic: An Intermediate Course

Gaylord Chan. Mondays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 29, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140.

The versatility of this comparatively new media, "acrylic", has opened up a new path in painting. Its quick drying characteristic is particularly suitable for the fast pace of modern life. Acrylic is so versatile that a systematic study is required if its full use is to be exploited. This course will therefore explore the numerous techniques and effects of acrylic paint. Tuition will be closely related to painting theories and will aim to strengthen students' command of the material to suit their own expression

The course is aimed at those with experience in Basic Design, Painting, and related fields. In the event of oversubscription an interview may be required.

Students are expected to provide their own materials but should wait until the first class meeting before purchasing.

Enrolment is limited to 20 persons.

21 Lithography

Julie Newport, B.F.A. (Calif. Arts and Crafts). Fridays, 6.30-8.30 p.m., starting October 3, 1975. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140 plus \$30 materials fee

Lithography is a printing technique in which an image 1s drawn on a slab of limestone which is then chemically treated in order to make many prints from that one drawing. As with most printing techniques it was originally developed for commercial use but became a fine art form. Among the better known early lithographers are Toulouse-Lautrec, Redon, and Daumier.

This course will explore the basic techniques of lithography including black and white and colour printing, and is suitable for both beginners and more advanced students.

The materials fee covers the cost of inks, solvents, and heavy equipment only.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

22 中國繪書

(Techniques in Chinese Brush Painting)

23 Certificate Course in the Fundamentals of Interior Design

An evening course extending over one year and consisting of two terms of fourteen weeks each, together with one summer term of six weeks. Formal instruction will be concentrated into two or three evenings a week, but there will be a considerable amount of work to be completed at home.

Entry Requirements This post-foundation level course aims at providing a vocational training for those who

- (a) have completed the foundation level certificate course in the Fundamentals of Art & Design, OR
- (b) are working as trainees in the field of Interior Design and can show evidence of basic knowledge, skills and techniques, such as will exempt them from attending the course mentioned in (a) above, OR
- (c) can show evidence of educational attainment equivalent to (a).

 Candidates must be proficient in English up to at least the Pass level of the Hong Kong English School Certificate.

The course will consist of studio work, lectures, seminars and discussions, field trips, and projects.

Syllabus outline

- Concepts of Interior Design: theory, visual research, problem solving, relationships of form and function.
- 2. Architectural Drawing: concepts and techniques.
- 3. History of Interior Design.
- Hard materials and Construction.
- Soft furnishings: wall and floor coverings, fabrics.
- Grammar of Design: two-dimensional design, colour, freehand drawing, three-dimensional design.
- 7. Furniture: design, construction, finishes.
- 8. Technology, lighting, acoustics.
- 9. Presentation and communication of visual information.
- 10. Projects: commercial, residential.

Fee: \$1,250 per annum.

Enrolment is limited to 25 persons.

Course tutors will include: David Crowe, Dip. Arch., A.R.I.B.A., Robert Griffiths, F.R.S.A., Philippa Kelly, Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.), Alfred Mok, B.Sc. (School of Design, San Francisco), David Osborne, B.A. Hons. (Kingston-upon-Hull), Elizabeth Stanton, L.S.I.A., Felix Tardio, B. Arch. (Univ. of Notre Dame), M. Arch. (Univ. of Penna.), and additional guest lecturers.

24 Problem Solving in Graphic Design

Basil Pao, B.F.A. (Art Centre College of Design, L.A)
Mondays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting September 29, 1975. Extra
Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings.

Fee: \$14

The basic concepts of graphic design "problem solving" will be discussed. Class exercises will follow the various stages of design problems, from visual research and ideas, to an understanding of how, when, and where to use the various tools of photography, illustration, typography, etc.

Guest speakers from the graphic design profession will also.

(Book Design and Production)

26 Photography as an Aid to the Graphic Designer

Philip Tse. Tuesdays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting September 30 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings.

Fee \$140 plus \$25 materials fee

Photography, because it achieves optical effects never known before, plays a vital part today in a designer's work, and techniques of photo-graphics open up completely new vistas. Tuition will include studio and darkroom procedure within the designer's

capabilities, detailing some of the many effects which can be achieved by simple manipulation at the developing and printing stages. Colour work, distortion of straightforward images, special screening effects, photo layout, photo mural, graphic art photography, photo dyeing techniques and advertising photography will be discussed. Emphasis will be on practical darkroom work, and there will be a visit to a printer's darkroom.

This intermediate level course is intended for those with a basic knowledge of darkroom procedure.

27 Photography: An Intermediate Course

Dinshaw Balsara. Thursdays, 7.00-9.00 p.m., starting October 2, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings.

Fee: \$180 plus \$20 materials fee

A course in black and white and colour photography for those already familiar with the basic technical aspects of photography and photographic equipment. The emphasis will be on 'seeing' and 'shooting'. There will be approximately five class field trips to a variety of sites on Saturday or Sunday afternoons, and class critiques will be held on the results of these, as well as of independent field trips. In addition there will be lectures and discussions on the work of well-known photographers.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

28 Illustration for Graphic Design

Kathleen Brinkley-Rogers, B.F.A. (Univ. of Illinois). Thursdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting October 2, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140

Illustrative art has a long and varied history, from early illuminations, seen by only a few, to the present vast array of magazine and book illustrations which reach millions of viewers. Illustration instructs us, arouses our interest, and satisfies our desire for visual interpretation of the printed word. The works of well-known illustrators will be examined and students will experiment with a variety of styles of illustration using various techniques and materials. Illustrations for children's books, posters, brochures, and individual projects will be developed.

PRACTICAL DRAWING, PAINTING, AND PRINTMAKING

These are practical studio classes in the Visual Arts with emphasis on artistic skills and creative growth of the individual Work will be carried out in the various media described.

Students must provide all necessary materials, some of which will be available for purchase through the department. Materials will be discussed at the first class meeting. Where a model is used an additional fee will be charged.

29 Design and Drawing: the Language of Visual Art

The experience of previous years has shown that there is a need for a course in the basics of Two-Dimensional Design and Freehand Drawing, as these are the grammar and language of visual art.

Students will experiment with line, space, and compositional layout. They will also explore visual illusion, and the uses of colour and tone. By analyzing various examples of two-dimensional art they will develop a "sense of design" which will heighten their appreciation of art works, as well as improve their own design skills. Through a series of drawing exercises students will "learn to see" as well as develop the dexterity skills necessary to record and express what they see. It will then compare the intricacies of Peking Opera and the Japanese Kabuki and Noh, and will also delve into the interrelationship of dance, music, drama, the painted face, symbolism of gesture and similar features which characterize Far Eastern performances.

Tests of hypotheses provide an important basis for decision-making. In this course, the approach to testing hypotheses is practical and problem-oriented. The various distributions, e.g. normal, x², t-, and F-, used in testing will be covered, along with correlation and regression. The emphasis will be on how to deal with problems arising from applications in extreme or difficult situations, particularly when the population cannot be assumed to be normal. Examples will be taken from management and the social sciences. However, people who have encountered statistical problems in this area are encouraged to bring them up for discussion. Some knowledge of basic statistics would be helpful, but is not essential.

61 An Introduction to Management Theory

Susan Cameron, B.A., Dip. I.A., and Gordon Redding, M.A., Ph.D. Mondays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting October 6, 1975 Room 248, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

People spend much of their lives in some form of organization and it is valuable to be able to think clearly about what is happening in such environments. Management theory is aimed at this form of explanation and this introductory course is intended for those who would like guidance towards more detailed study and who would appreciate an opportunity to learn the meaning of what often seems to be mere jargon. The two main themes of the course are patterns of organization and styles of leadership. The main trends in management theory will be explained and will lead to a discussion of current contingency theories of leadership and organization. Participation in two case studies will be expected, and the course will be particularly relevant to those currently in managerial positions.

62 The Formulation of Business Policy

C. Y. Hung, M.B.A. (Cranfield), Dip. M.S. (H.K.), A.M.B.I.M. Mondays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting September 29, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$75

Business organisations vary enormously in the way in which they approach the formulation of their business policies. Ranging from the informal or casual approach to the highly structured, decisions of policy must inevitably be made and can affect the very lifeblood of a business enterprise. The speaker will concentrate on the policy implications of product planning, marketing, finance, international investment, and acquisitions and mergers. The policy implications of a manager's leadership and social responsibility will also be examined. A number of case studies will be introduced to illustrate the policy in question.

The course has been designed for young managers, supervisors and for those who intend to open their own business.

63 Production Management

W. S. Lau, M.Sc., Ph.D., C. Eng., M.I.Mech.E., M.I. Prod.E. Mondays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting September 29, 1975. Room 230, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$70

The rising cost of materials and equipment is a problem faced by all Hong Kong manufacturers and it is increasingly important to use these resources as skilfully as possible. These lectures aim to provide knowledge of scientific management in the production area. Topics to be covered include factory location and layout, production planning and control, work study and critical path analysis. The course is suitable for both general managers and production engineers.

64 People at Work: human capabilities and limitations

Brian Peacock, B. Tech., Ph.D., Lecturer in Industrial Engineering, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting September 24, 1975. Room 142, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$60

Productivity, motivation and health in any system can be improved by due consideration of human capabilities and limitations. This course on Ergonomics or Human Factors Engineering aims to outline the ranges of human variability in things such as size, strength, endurance, and abilities such as vision, manual dexterity, memory, decision making and communication. The implications of these sources of human variability for job, work-place and equipment design will be discussed. Explanation of the principles involved will be supplemented by descriptions of relevant laboratory exercises. This course will be of interest to Personnel Managers, Safety Officers, Supervisors and to individuals in the field of General Management whose responsibilities lead them to seek the improvement of the employee's contentment and effectiveness in the industrial context.

65 Introduction to Marketing Research

Patrick Luk Wah-shing, B.A., M.B.A. (C.U.H.K.). Fridays, 7.30-9.00 p.m., starting September 26, 1975. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$60

An increasing number of business organizations are realizing the dangers of moving into new product marketing without a properly-conceived marketing plan based upon factual information. This course introduces students to the functions of Marketing Research and its place in the decision process of Marketing. Methods of obtaining information will be examined, together with the planning of surveys, questionnaire design, attitude scaling, sampling theory, response and non-response errors, point and internal estimation, and tests of hypotheses.

Consideration will also be given to the forecasting of sales and market potential by statistical techniques, including regression, correlation, time series analysis, Markov chains, opinion polling and the evaluation of advertising effort.

66 Consumer Goods Marketing

72 The Teaching of Health Education in "Social Studies"

Anthony Kyoong, B.Sc., Dip.Ed. (H.K.), Dip.Health Ed (Lond.). Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting October 20, 1975 Room 725, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

Social Studies is a subject recently introduced into the secondary school curriculum. It comprises elements of Geography, History, Economic and Public Affairs, and Health Education and will eventually form part of the common-core curriculum for junior secondary forms.

As more schools move away from the separate social subjects towards the new Social Studies curriculum, many teachers, especially those who are now teaching Geography, History or EPA, will be asked to teach Social Studies. This extra-mural course is designed especially for those teachers who will be teaching Social Studies or who are interested in Health Education.

The course will deal with the content, principles and methods of Health Education, with special emphasis on some contemporary health issues. CERTIFICATE COURSES IN THE USE OF ENGLISH

A sound working knowledge of English is one of the greatest needs in Hong Kong life today. To meet this need the Department offers a carefully devised and integrated programme in the use of English that will provide the students with practical tuition in the following skills:

the ability to speak fluently and carry on conversations in English:

the ability to understand accurately what is said by other speakers;

the ability to write in a number of different situations; the ability to understand written English.

The course tutors will set assignments for the students to complete at home and in class, and these will then be corrected and discussed with the course. A large number of articles on topical subjects and short stories are available for comprehension and appreciation, and at all times the students will be provided with plenty of opportunity to express their own ideas.

All these courses comprise a continuous programme leading to the award of the Department's Certificate in the Use of English

on successful completion of the Second Year.

Students are advised to apply for a place in a First Year course and then, when they have completed this satisfactorily, they will be eligible to enter the Second Year in the following year. World economic geography is dealt with under a number of themes which bring together more detailed regional studies from each continent, the overall aim being an understanding of the location of economic activity.

The syllabus will also be of interest to people studying for examinations such as those of the Institute of Bankers (Part I).

The main themes dealt with are:

- (1) Energy and Power. The primary sources of energy: coal, petroleum, natural gas, and water power; the secondary sources of power derived from them; nuclear energy and sources of nuclear fuel.
- (2) Agriculture and Industry. The production and utilization of primary raw materials and foodstuffs. Environmental factors in agricultural production. The geographical location and localization of manufacturing industry.
- (3) Trade Centres and Market Areas. The functions of towns and service centres. Urban regions. Ports and their hinterlands.
- (4) Transport and Distribution. Geographical aspects of inland and overseas transport. Trade routes and communications.
- (5) World Population. World population trends and distribution; the geographical background to population growth and economic development. Urban growth and rural depopulation.

The syllabus will include: number systems and elementary arithmetic procedures; data processing organisation chart; the nature of data processing systems; input; storage; processing; control; output; input/output units; storage units; central processing and control; methods of processing, batch processing; random access; real time.

193 A Modern Approach to Biology Teaching

A practically orientated course to introduce teachers to equipment and quantitative methods for use with students in fourth, fifth and sixth forms.

The work will include respiration, enzyme action, homeostasis, the nervous system, inheritance and some ecological studies. Emphasis will be given to interpretive practical work and teaching methods which encourage a better understanding of biological principles. There will be a variety of visual materials for use with experiments and explanatory work sheets.

The material included will be useful for those involved in

teaching integrated science.

Each meeting will include a lecture followed by a practical session.

194 Sea Shore Ecology

B. S. Morton, Ph.D., F.L.S., Lecturer in Zoology, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays and Fridays, 6.00-7.00 p.m., starting September 3, 1975. Aquatic Biology Laboratory, Northcote Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings plus six field excursions on Saturdays. Fee: \$140 (including excursions)

Aimed, primarily, at science teachers of fourth, fifth and sixth forms, the course will be sufficiently broad in approach to be of value to anyone interested in the Ecology of Hong Kong.

195 The Origin and Cultivation of Tropical Crops

This course is designed both for postgraduates in Chemistry and for those working in industry and chemical or related fields. It should also be of interest to teachers of Chemistry. The course will be given in such a way that people in a specialized chemical trade can have a better understanding not only of his own field, but of other chemical industries as well.

Syllabus

- (1) Origin of Petroleum. The picture of a simple refinery. Distillation. Isomerization, catalytic cracking, hydrocracking, catalytic hydrodesulphurisation, catalytic reforming.

203 Medicine in Chinese Society

Medicine in any society exists in a particular historical, philosophical, and cultural context. This course will examine the context in which Chinese medicine has developed and is practised today. Topics will include: the theories of yin and yang and the five elements; conceptions of the human body and its functions; the maintenance of health; therapies; the history of doctoring; folk theories of illness; illnesses unique to the folk traditions; shamanism and curing rites; the use of Western medicine in Chinese society; and the "new" medicine as practised in China today. The approach will be sociological and anthropological rather than medical. Lectures will be illustrated with slides where appropriate.


