

SPECIAL COURSES

The Department welcomes enquiries and requests from business organizations, government, voluntary bodics or private institutions for specially designed courses to meet their specific education needs.

PRIOR ENROLMENT IS ESSENTIAL

Failure to enrol prior to the opening of a particular course may mean the cancellation of that course. Prior enrolment is the only way the Department of Extra-Mural Studies has of judging the response to its courses. Your co-operation is therefore invited in sending your application forms to the Department as soon as possible.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. There are normally no entry requirements except that applicants should be over 18 years of age. Occasionally to have the full benefit of a course applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Applicants are therefore advised to read the description of a course carefully. Professional courses usually have clearly defined entry requirements.

- 2. The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant.
- 3. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held:
 - (a) on any public holidays.
 - (b) at a storm warning signal of No. 8 or above. (After the typhoon passes, if the No. 8 signal is lowered before 3 p.m., classes will take place as normal. If the signal is lowered after 3 p.m., classes will be cancelled that evening.)
 - (c) during the following holiday periods: December 20, 1976 to January 2, 1977 inclusive (Christmas and New Year). February 15-23, 1977 inclusive (Lunar New Year).
- 4. Fee are not refundable once the course has commenced.

5. Certificates of Attendance are issued, on payment of 50 cents, to those who have attended not less than two-thirds of a course of at least 20 meetings in duration.

6. Closing date for enrolment: one week before the starting date of a course. Late enrolments may not be accepted.

8. Complete the attached enrolment form and mail it to the Director, Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong. Forms are also available on request. To ensure that a class can take place, the Department would appreciate early enrolment by applicants.

9. You should send your application form together with the appropriate fee either in the form of a postal order, money order or crossed cheque made out in favour of the UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG.

10. You will be notified if you are not admitted because of oversubscription or other reasons. THE DEPARTMENT WILL NOT NOTIFY SUCCESSFUL APPLICANTS WHO ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND THE FIRST MEETING OF THE CLASS AT THE PLACE AND TIME ADVERTISED.

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Archaeology

31. A Basic Course in Archaeology with Reference to Hong Kong. S. M. Bard, M.B.,B.S., Hon.D.Litt. (H.K.), and B. A. V. Peacock, M.A. (Cantab.), Curator, Hong Kong Museum of History. Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting November 16, 1976, Hong Kong Museum of History, Star House, 4th floor, Salisbury Road, Kowloon. 10 meetings plus 2 museum and 4 field trips. Fee: \$100

Instruction will cover the fossil record of early man and the general field of prehistory, archaeological techniques, and questions of chronology in relation to tools and pottery. The emphasis will be on the practical aspects of the subject, and the talks will be illustrated by slides and specimens, which can be handled by the students. The latter part of the course will deal with the prehistory of Hong Kong and will be related to recent finds.

The course will include two museum visits and four field trips; the latter in conjunction with the field work sessions of the Hong Kong Archaeological Society. The cost of these field trips is included in the fee.

Enrolment is limited to 30 persons.

UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE

The attention of extra-mural students is drawn to the following regulation of the University of Hong Kong regarding admission to the University:

'A mature person without formal academic qualifications who is aged 30 or over on September 1 of the year in which admission is sought may be exempted completely from University entrance requirements and be eligible for admission to read for a first degree except in the Faculty of Medicine. Applications for exemption on grounds of mature age must be supported by certified true copies of a birth certificate or a statutory declaration and of any academic qualifications.'

Art & Design

Courses in Art & Design and related areas are open to students of all levels of development unless otherwise stated.

32. The Basics of Art & Design

"The Basics of Art & Design" consists of four constituent courses. A limited number of places will be available for students wishing to take only some of, or even one of, these constituent courses. Such applicants will be notified as to whether or not a place is available approximately one week before the commencement of the course. Applicants wanting advice as to whether to pursue the course as a whole or merely some of its constituent parts can consult the Staff Tutor in Art & Design on the 12th floor of the Extra-Mural Town Centre on Saturday, September 11, from 10.00 a.m. until noon, or on Tuesday, September 14, from 6.00 to 8.00 p.m. Those with previous experience of Art & Design are requested to bring a few examples of their work with them.

The Basics of Art & Design course is designed for those seriously interested in pursuing the study and practice of art and design. It consists of four constituent courses, viz. Basic Relationships of Two Dimensional Design; Freehand Drawing; Art: the human experience; and Life Drawing. Details of these courses are given below. Taken together these courses provide a range of studies which will enable students, whatever the nature of their previous art education, to develop their talents and interests.

Students successfully completing 'The Basics of Art & Design' may embark, if they so wish, on the 'Certificate Course in the Foundations of Art & Design,' which, henceforth, will be arranged on a modular basis. Full details of this programme can be obtained by phoning or writing to the Staff Tutor in Art & Design.

Closing date for applications: September 17, 1976.

Fee: \$900 including model fees.

33. Basic Relationships of Two Dimensional Design. Lynn Mitchell, M.E.C. (Strammillis). Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m. or 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$250

Pleasing, dynamic, two-dimensional art, whether painting, drawing, printmaking, or graphic design, does not just *happen*. It is the result of conscious structuring by the artist, employing all the basics of good design. In this course we will experiment with line, space, and compositional layout. We will also explore visual illusion, and the uses of colour and tone. By analyzing various examples of two-dimensional art, from old masters to contemporary works, we will get a 'feel' for pleasing and expressive composition, a discriminating sense about design, and a greater appreciation of art work as well as the development of our own design skills.

This course is essential for anyone wishing to pursue fine or applied art.

34. Freehand Drawing in Various Media. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m. or 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings.

Fee: \$280 including model fee

Drawing is the thinking process in the language of visual art; it is the basis of all visual communication and expression. The emphasis in this course will be on learning to see, think, and communicate through visual means. Through a series of exercises in the first part of the course students will gain an understanding of the more concrete elements of line, tone, movement, texture, pictorial and modelled space as well as uses of a variety of materials including graphite, charcoal, conté crayon, oil and wax crayons, inks, paints, felt pens, and others. Mid-way through the course emphasis will be placed on the more abstract elements of plastic space, colour, self-expression and visual problem solving.

Students should note that there will be a minimum of four hours of homework each week. Students taking this course will benefit if they also attend 'Basic Relationships of Two-Dimensional Design'.

35. Life Drawing. K. Burns McKeon, D.A. (Edin.). Wednesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m. or 8.00-10.00 p.m., starting September 29, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$320 including model fee

Drawing from the human figure and nature provides a discipline which develops visual perception and correlation of hand and eye. Regular practice, even by the most experienced artist, is essential to sustain ability. This course will include anatomy, life drawing, draped figure, and head studies. A variety of media will be used including pencil, conté crayon, and ink. 36. Visual Art: the Human Experience. Lynn Mitchell, M.E.C. (Strammillis). Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m. or 8.15-9.45 p.m., starting September 29, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$250

There have been many forms and styles of visual art in the history of the Western world, and it is generally accepted that visual art is a reflection and expression of the culture from which it comes. How and why have visual art forms changed, and in what ways have they retained similarities? How are we to 'read' a work of Art? And most importantly, what can we learn of the human experience through the study of Art forms? This course, through discussions, films, and slides will probe these questions. It will also examine the intellectual, emotional, social, and therefore 'human' processes involved in the creation of a work of art.

PRACTICAL STUDIO COURSES IN ART and DESIGN

These are practical studio classes in the Visual Arts with emphasis on artistic skills and creative growth of the individual. Work will be carried out in the various media described.

Students must provide all necessary materials, some of which will be available for purchase through the department. Materials will be discussed at the first class meeting.

37. Interior Design Concepts. Douglas Cooper, B.A. (Kingston Polytechnic). Mondays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$225

The main feature of this course will be the setting of a series of introductory exercises to help develop the student's ability to solve functional design problems. Critiques of the exercises will be given.

The course will be divided into three main areas. First, visual research, wherein emphasis will be on colour, space, form, light and texture. Second, design theory and research, with exercises exploring the relationship between design and function, and design and materials. Third, design practice, with the students being asked to solve design problems within a variety of settings. The presentation and communication of visual information will also be discussed.

While previous design experience is not required, it is suggested that those without experience should also attend Architectural Drawing.

Enrolment is limited to 25, and in the event of oversubscription an interview may be required.

38. Architectural Drawing. Ruth Addison, A.R.I.B.A. (London). Mondays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$250

Architectural drawing is a basic form of communication among architects, builders, interior designers, and others. It is an international language. The basic concepts, skills, and techniques of architectural drawing will be explored through a series of exercises in ink and pencil. These exercises include: orthograph, axometric and asometric projections, the casting of shadows, drawing in perspective, and lettering, as well as the use of architectural drawing instruments.

39. Silkscreen and Serigraphic Printing. Jacqueline Sutliff, B.A. (University of Minnesota). Mondays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The silkscreen and serigraph have developed from the simple stencil, and screenprinting is among the youngest of the printmaking crafts. As such it is in an exciting state of expansion with the uses of varied techniques ranging from decorative elements to fine art prints. The aim of this course is to present the silkscreen and serigraphic medium to the student, to allow him to explore its potential and versatility, and to produce prints in both black and white, and colour.

Students will be expected to provide many of their own materials. Inks and sundries for use during class sessions will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

40. Woodcut and Relief Printmaking. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Tuesdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The relief print is one of the most ancient forms of printmaking, and wood the most traditional material. Carving a line or shape demands gestures that are both satisfying and intrinsic, and are quite unlike holding a brush or pen. An exciting aspect of contemporary relief printmaking is the use of new and varied materials such as plastics, cardboard, and 'found' objects. Students will explore both traditional and contemporary relief printmaking, and will develop and produce prints in both black and white, and colour.

Students will be expected to provide most drawing and cutting materials. Some inks and sundries will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee 41. Experimental Fabric Printing. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Wednesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting September 29, 1976. Pokfulam Studio, 14.1 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

Fabric printing and dyeing forms a part of our lives, as it is used to decorate our clothing and our surroundings. The methods of decorating cloth are varied. This course offers students the opportunity to experiment and explore the potentials of pattern and printmaking on fabric. The student cannot hope to compete with the perfectly matched patterns of the machine and modern technology, but he can aim to become a 'handicrafts person,' using traditional methods of wood and lino-block, stencil and silkscreen, and batik and tiedye.

Students will be expected to provide most of their own materials. Inks and dyes will be provided for class use, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

42. Advanced Graphic Design Seminars. Henry Steiner, M.F.A. (Yale). Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$250

A free-form series consisting of lectures, slides, films, discussions and practical problems aimed at persons with some prior experience in Graphic Design or Advertising Studio work. The course will attempt to broaden knowledge of relevant painters and designers, and to stimulate critical and conceptual abilities. Class members must be prepared to participate in discussions, and to submit examples of design solutions to set homework exercises.

43. Photography as an Aid to the Graphic Designer. Philip Tse. Tuesdays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$165

Photography, because it achieves optical effects never known before, plays a vital part today in a designer's work, and techniques of photographics open up completely new vistas. Tuition will include studio and darkroom procedure within the designer's capabilities, detailing some of the many effects which can be achieved by simple manipulation at the developing and printing stages. Colour work, distortion of straightforward images, special screening effects, photo layout, photo mural, graphic art photography, photo dyeing techniques and advertising photography will be discussed. Emphasis will be on practical darkroom work, and there will be a visit to a printer's darkroom.

This intermediate level course is intended for those with a basic knowledge of darkroom procedure.

Papers, chemicals and other materials for use during class time will be supplied, and the cost of these has been included in the course fee.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

44. Photography: an Introduction. Andrew Mitchell. Wednesdays or Fridays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 29 and October 1, 1976 respectively. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$145

Aimed at those with a genuine interest in photography as a vehicle for expression and communication, this course will cover the basic studio and darkroom techniques of black and white, and colour photography as well as choices of equipment and materials. In addition, theories of photography, both aesthetic and philosophic, will be explored. Students will be encouraged to experiment in the media, and class critiques will be held on the results of these.

Students will be expected to provide their own cameras. Basic darkroom materials and supplies to be used during class sessions will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

45. Photography: an Intermediate Course. Philip Tse. Thursdays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting September 30, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$200

In recent years photography has come to be accepted as a fine art form in its own right. The emphasis in this course will be on 'creativity and aesthetics,' and it is designed for those already familiar with the basic technical aspects of photography and photographic equipment. While most of the work will deal with black and white photography, colour processing will be introduced. In addition there will be lectures and discussions on the work of well-known photographers such as David Hamilton, Irving Penn, Sam Haskins, and others. There will be six class field trips to a variety of sites on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, and class critiques will be held on the results of these as well as of studio and independent work.

Chemicals and papers will be provided for use during class sessions, and the cost of these is included in the fee.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

46. Painting Workshop in Oil, Acrylic and Related Media. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Thursdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting September 30, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 25 meetings. Fee: \$270 including model fee

Through paint, and the related media of collage, drawing, transfer and others, students will explore aesthetic and philosophic concepts of painting. Emphasis will be placed on learning to discover and communicate one's own ideas through visual and technical means. This is an intermediate level course and previous experience in drawing, painting, or related skills is *essential*.

Enrolment will be limited to 18 persons, and in the event of over-subscription an interview may be required. The studio will be available for work until 9.30 p.m. though formal instruction will end at 8.00 p.m.

47. Painting in Oils. K. Burns McKeon, D.A. (Edin.). Thursdays, 9.30 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting September 30, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150 including model fee

Max Doerner stated that, 'It is no more possible to learn to paint from books than to learn to swim on a sofa,' therefore students, after ascertaining their skill level, and discussing materials and other relevant information, will dive right into painting in oil. Subjects will include draped figure and still life, and towards the end of the course students will be encouraged to produce compositions from their own sketches.

48. Design and Drawing: the Language of Visual Art. Kathleen Brinkley-Rogers, B.F.A. (Univ. of Illinois), Martha Lesser, B.S., (N.Y.U.). Mondays and Wednesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting September 27, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 weeks. Fee: \$270 including model fee

The experience of previous years has shown that there is a need for a course in the basics of Two-Dimensional Design and Freehand Drawing, as these are the grammar and language of visual art.

Students will experiment with line, space, and compositional layout. They will also explore visual illusion, and the uses of colour and tone. By analyzing various examples of two-dimensional art they will develop a 'sense of design' which will heighten their appreciation of art works, as well as improve their own design skills. Through a series of drawing exercises students will 'learn to see' as well as develop the dexterity skills necessary to record and express what they see. They will explore a wide range of techniques, materials, and visual subjects.

Applicants should note that there will be approximately four to six hours of homework each week.

49. Life Drawing. Elise Parkin. Tuesdays, 9.30 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting October 12, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$150 including model fee

Drawing from the human figure in movement and at rest has long been considered one of the better ways to train correlation of hand and eye. It is part of a continuing discipline if we are to interpret and communicate what we 'see' with accuracy and sensitivity. Students will come to understand the structure and proportion of the human figure, and will be encouraged to draw freely and with vigour.

Both beginners and more advanced students will be welcome.

50. Children's Arts and Crafts Workshop for Adults. Kathleen Brinkley-Rogers, B.F.A. (University of Illinois). Fridays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting October 1, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$120

It is important for a child's growth and development to have creative activities, such as arts and crafts, integrated into the home and school life. Such activities help develop a child's creativity, dexterity, and intellect. In this course, parents, teachers, nurses and social workers can experiment with a variety of projects such as paper craft, puppets, simple cloth dying, needlecraft, and collage. These activities can be adjusted to the different skill levels of children, and some of the projects can also be employed as handicrafts for the aged.

Enrolment is limited to 20 persons.

51. Fundamentals of Weaving. Paula DeFazio, B.A. (Oregon), M.A. (Indiana). Thursdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 30, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$120

Fibre manipulation is one of mankind's oldest skills, fulfilling both utilitarian function and aesthetic form. Modern industrial production often simulates the textural quality of handwoven material but lacks the creative expression found in individually woven fibres. This course will provide the student with both on-loom techniques of flat weave, tapestry, rya and knitting, bandweaving and back strap weaving and off-loom weaving techniques of sprang, bobbin, lace and fibres sculpture. In addition, the course will be illustrated by slides and actual examples of the stages of production and finished products of the different techniques.

52. 素描

(Monochrome Drawing)

These are lecture and discussion courses open to all students regardless of previous Art History study.

57. Introduction to Chinese Architecture and Landscape Design. Shun Kai Tse, B.Arch. (Berkeley), Dipl. of Tropical Studies (A.A. London). Thursdays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting September 30, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings and 2 field trips. Fee: \$100

Architecture is a social art. By studying the architecture of a civilization, one can understand its people and their attitude towards life. Chinese architecture, like many other Chinese art forms, has a glorious past, which the course will illustrate by briefly discussing its history, design principles, and philosophical and artistic bases. The influence on the West in the 18th century will be discussed, and comparison drawn with Japan and elsewhere. Two visits will be organized to some traditional Chinese buildings and gardens in Hong Kong and Macau and the dates of these will be set at the first class session. The cost of these visits is not included in the fee. 58. Masks and Puppets of the East. Helga Werle, Programme Coordinator of the Hong Kong Arts Centre. Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$75

The exotic mystery, fairy-tale splendour and luxury of the East is still alive in its traditional dance-dramas and puppet-theatres. There is endless variety and one of the peculiarities of these performances is the use of masks, which are made of wood, lacquer or papier-mâché, or painted directly on the face as in Kathakali, Peking opera and Kabuki. Masks are used in Tibet and other Himalaya regions, Sri Lanka (Ceylon), Bali, Java, Thailand, Japan and Korea.

Many forms of puppet-theatre are widely spread all over the East. There is the film-like media of flat leather-shadows, rather stiff in Java, agile and lively in Taiwan and giant-sized in India. String-puppets, glove and stickpuppets, primitive ones as found in Korea or the world's most sophisticated puppets, Bunraku, which are still performed in Japan. All will be discussed and illustrated during the course.

59. An Introduction to the Hindu and Buddhist Art of India. Mrs. Rajeshwari Ghose, B.A. Hons. (Calcutta), M.A. (H.K.). Fridays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting October 1, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 16 meetings. Fee: \$75

This illustrated course will provide an introduction to the Hindu & Buddhist art of India. It will commence with a survey of the development of both religions and discuss their beliefs, mythology and iconography. It will examine at length the development of secular and religious architecture in India—the Hindu rock-cut temples, the Buddhist cave monasteries, the Hindu temple in south India and its development as a temple-town. It will also deal with the different Schools of Indian Sculpture—the classical and romantic trends, the erotic sculptures of north and east India, bronze casting, terracottas, ivory carving and the fascinating murals and fresco paintings of Ajanta.

The course will conclude with a very brief glimpse of the spread of these art forms and concepts in Nepal and Tibet.

60. Hong Kong Taxation: Principles and Practical Procedures. Y. K. Yu, C.P.A., F.H.K.S.A., A.A.S.A. Tuesdays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

The Hong Kong Inland Revenue Ordinance provides for charges of four main kinds of tax, namely, profits tax, salaries tax, property tax and interest tax. The Ordinance also provides for the availability of personal assessment. This course will introduce the main taxes and consider the implications and effect of personal assessment. The practical applications, as well as basic principles, will be discussed. The course will also cover the procedures for submitting the different types of tax return and the appeal process. Students are advised to obtain a copy of the Hong Kong Inland Revenue Ordinance.

61. Hong Kong Taxation: Law and Practice. Marshall Mar, B.Com. (Melbourne), A.A.S.A., C.P.A. Thursdays, 6.00-7.00 p.m., starting September 30, 1976. Room 11, Central Market Building, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 20 meetings. Fee: \$80

The different heads of charges of tax laid down in the Hong Kong Inland Revenue Ordinance will be discussed together with the provisions relating to election of personal assessment, the powers of the officers of the Inland Revenue Department, and some of the practical aspects of filing and objecting to tax returns. The legal aspects of taxation will be emphasized and court cases on taxation will be considered whenever relevant.

The aspects of company accounting to be covered in this intermediate level course will include changes in capital structure, fund statements, objectives, analysis and interpretation of financial statements, share valuation, accounting aspects of business combinations, treatment of taxation and company law with respect to disclosure in financial statements. To gain full benefit students should have completed part B of the Foundation Examination of A.C.A. or be at an equivalent standard.

64. Advanced Accounting. S. W. Ching, A.C.C.A., A.C.I.S., A.I.B., A.M.B.I.M., A.H.K.S.A. Mondays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Room 846, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 16 meetings. Fee: \$120

Advanced theory and practice in relation to the development, processing, interpretation and use of accounting information at a high level and across a wide range of business activities will be covered in this class. To gain full benefit students should have passed A.C.C.A. professional examination, Accounting 3, Paper 8, or be able to prove an equivalent standard. A copy of examination results should be submitted with the enrolment form.

65. Management Accounting. Joseph S. T. Tam, A.C.C.A., A.C.M.A., A.C.I.S., A.A.I.A., A.M.B.I.M., A.H.K.S.A. Fridays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting October 1, 1976. Room 721, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 22 meetings. Fee: \$110

The best basis for successful management action is proper accounting information submitted to management in meaningful form. While primarily for accountants, non-financial executives will find this course useful as it provides an introduction to the subject and sufficient knowledge to enable them to take action towards profit improvement through the use of this kind of management information.

67. Management Mathematics. C. K. Butt, B.Comm. (McGill), M.Sc. (Berkeley). Fridays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting October 1, 1976. Room 11, Central Market Building, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 15 meetings. Fee: \$90

Instead of being satisfied with feasible solutions, businessmen nowadays are looking for optimal solutions. This course serves as an introduction to how various quantitative and mathematical techniques can be applied to business problems and to the decision-making processes of management in order to reach these optimal solutions. The techniques include linear programming, statistical decision theory, network analysis, mathematical inventory theory queuing and game theory. Designed to be of general interest the course will, however, be particularly relevant to students taking Section 2 Paper 12 of the A.C.A. examinations.

The use of computers increases every year with more companies using them and computer applications and techniques growing more varied and sophisticated. This course will introduce the world of computers, their development and scope, how to carry out feasibility studies, how to develop computer linked management information services, and particularly computer applications in business and management. The course will include a visit to a computer installation. No prior knowledge of computer languages or systems is needed. 69. Industrial Relations in Hong Kong. James Yue, A.D.P.A. (Exeter), A.C.I.S., Dip. M.S. (H.K.), A.M.B.I.M. Fridays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting October 1, 1976. Room 27, Central Market Building, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

More companies are beginning to pay closer attention to employee relations and to realise how important this factor is to the prosperity of the company. This course will look at the composition of the Hong Kong work force, the ways in which it is organised, the general pattern of industrial relations at the present time, examining the roles of the individual, management, trade unions and the government, and finally, will consider the direction of industrial relations in Hong Kong in the future.

70. Principles of Economics. Michael Cheung Tow, B.Soc.Sc. (H.K.), M.Sc. (Econ.), Ph.D. (London), Assistant Lecturer in Economics, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Room 11, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 20 meetings. Fee: \$120

Economic theory is a subject which is learned most effectively not just by passive reading, but by taking an active role in reasoning and discussion. To this end economic analysis will be explained simply and critically, and its application to both problems of everyday life and business decisions will be explored. This course is suitable for candidates preparing for professional examinations requiring a paper in economics.

The basic concepts of statistical theory will be introduced for those who wish to acquire some knowledge of elementary statistics and for candidates studying for professional examinations requiring a statistics paper. Topics to be covered include: presentation of data; frequency distributions; introductory probability and elementary probability distributions; sample and population; statistical inference.

Elements of Statistical Theory II. A continuation course for examinations. *Starting Spring 1977*.

75. Accounting Statistics. K. G. Jones, B.Com. (Melbourne), F.C.C.A., F.H.K.S.A., F.A.S.A., A.C.I.S. Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting October 4, 1976. Room 27, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 6 meetings. Fee: \$80

This course is designed for accountants, both in accounting firms and in industry, whose duties may involve recognition of conditions of uncertainty. Some knowledge of accountancy and elementary statistics is essential. The areas covered will be: uncertainty in accounting measurements; sampling in auditing; regression analysis for cost/output estimates; quality control approach to cost control including standard costing; risk/uncertainty in capital budgeting or project analysis; cost/profit break even analysis under conditions of uncertainty.

78. Techniques of Financial Management. Vincent Ng, B.S., M.B.A., M.S. (U.C.L.A.). Tuesdays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Room 11, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 16 meetings. Fee: \$95

The application of financial procedures affects every Manager in a business organization. Whilst a detailed knowledge of such procedures may not be necessary in the case of a non-finance Manager, an awareness of the financial implications and of alternative methods of financial control can be invaluable to the operational Manager. The speaker will examine the main features of business finance, such as source funding, ratios as a system of financial analysis, projection of business results through cash forecasting, operating budgets, budgetary control, and analysis of capital investment decisions. Case studies drawn from local and foreign sources will be used to illustrate the techniques in question.

Designed for practising Managers in the non-financial area, this course will put the various techniques of financial control in the context of other organizational activities and examine the human implications of financial systems.

79. The Marketing of Industrial Products. Peter Tang, B.A. (California State), M.B.A. (Southern California). Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Room 26, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$65

The attention which is given to the marketing of Consumer Goods often draws attention away from the fact that a large and growing area of marketing activity is devoted to the sale and distribution of products from one business enterprise to another. The purpose of this course is to analyse the special problems which the marketing of Industrial Products can create. The speaker will trace the development of marketing policies in this field from the basis of Product Planning, Pricing, Sales Techniques, Distribution, Marketing Research, Advertising, and Promotional strategies, to the continuance of customer loyalty through after-sales service. Case material will be used to illustrate the policies outlined in principle. The course will benefit managers both in the marketing area and those who work in other areas but who wish to extend their knowledge of marketing techniques. 80. Consumer Goods Marketing. Francis A. Chan, B.Sc. (Minnesota). Wednesdays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting September 29, 1976. Room 4, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$65

Successful marketing is the key to business success. The application of the marketing concept makes it necessary that all elements in the organization should have their activities focussed upon the attainment of specific marketing goals. The theory and practice of marketing will be dealt with in detail, including the definition of the market and consumer acceptance, marketing organization, market research, channels of distribution, selling, pricing policies and advertising and sales promotion activity. The tutor will address himself particularly to the problems of marketing consumer goods in the context of Hong Kong. This course is intended for junior executives whether in a specialist marketing area or not and for those engaged in General Management who wish to gain a greater insight into the relevance and working of the marketing function in a business operation.

81. An Introduction to Office Management. S. P. Ho, B.Soc.Sc. (H.K.), Dip.M.S. Tuesdays 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

The management of an office in a modern business enterprise may call for a variety of skills covering the human and technical aspects of management. This course has been designed for office supervisors and administrators who wish to gain a deeper knowledge of the systems, managerial and personnel problems involved in the direction of the modern office. Specific emphasis will be laid on the techniques of Organization and Methods, the use of Machines and Systems, Work Scheduling, Cost Control, Job Analysis and Evaluation, and problems of Human Relations.

82. An Introduction to Investment Management. Franklin Y. Y. Jen, B.Sc., M.B.A., M.S. (Wisconsin). Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$85

A knowledge of the relationship between business enterprises and the financial infrastructure of the community in which they are involved is important to the modern manager. The course examines the various investment vehicles open to a portfolio manager including the stock market, notes & bond, stock options etc. and their close relationship to the banking and financial sectors, taking into account the growth of Hong Kong into a banking and finance centre. The problems and opportunities associated with funding; loan and credit analysis, and Risk Management will also be reviewed. The course will be most suitable for junior managers with experience who wish to broaden their knowledge of the environment within which business operates. Some of the sessions may be given by guest speakers who have a specialist knowledge in the field, and some of the lectures may be in Cantonese. 83. Industrial Relations Workshop. Conducted by various Labour Specialists drawn from the University of Hong Kong and the community at large. Mondays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 8 meetings. Fee: \$60

With the rapid development of Hong Kong as a manufacturing and commercial centre, the need to promote good Industrial Relations within the community is becoming increasingly evident. The role of the Employer, the Employee, the Trade Unionist, the Government and the Personnel Specialist will be examined, together with the relevant legislative background and voluntary factors at work in the Industrial Relations scene. This course, which will be highly participative amongst those attending, is intended to break away from the conventional teaching situation. It is hoped that the various sessions will give an opportunity to bring together Trade Unionists, Union Officials, Managers, Personnel and Industrial Relations Specialists and Government personnel to discuss problems and opportunities in an atmosphere of seeking and mutual help.

84. Personnel Management: theory and practice. Francis Chia, B.A. (H.K.), Dip. P.M. (London), M.I.P.M., A.M.B.I.M. Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting September 30, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$75

The development of sound personnel policies in a business organization is now widely accepted as the cornerstone to the successful pursuit of other managerial policies. Intended for junior executives in the Personnel function and for other non-specialists who wish to improve their knowledge of the function, the course will examine the role of the Personnel Manager in terms of direct operational responsibilities and as adviser in human relations to the organization. Stress will be laid on ways of developing Personnel Policies which are appropriate for the culture and business environment in which the Company is operating.

85. Personnel Psychology. Henry S. R. Kao, B.A. (National Taiwan), M.S. (West Virginia), Ph.D. (Wisconsin), Lecturer in Psychology, University of Hong Kong. *Tuesdays*, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting September 28, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$80

The principles of Psychology have been increasingly applied to business practice and all forms of human resource utilization. A range of behavioural science techniques have been developed to enable the personnel specialist to formulate policies for the assessment and development of staff. It is proposed to analyze the techniques from a theoretical and practical standpoint during this course. Emphasis will be placed on the value of Job Analysis and Evaluation, Personnel Appraisal, Selection, Psychological Testing as well as on the role of the Psychologist in programmes of Management Development and Industrial Training. The course has been designed for specialists with experience in the field of Human and Personnel Relations who wish to deepen their knowledge of the latest developments in this field.

CERTIFICATE COURSES IN THE USE OF ENGLISH

A sound working knowledge of English is one of the greatest needs in Hong Kong life today. To meet this need the Department offers a carefully devised two-year programme in the use of English that will provide the students with practical tuition in the following skills:

the ability to speak fluently and carry on conversations in English; the ability to understand accurately what is said by other speakers; the ability to write English well to meet a number of different situations; the ability to read easily and understand written English.

The tutors for the courses offered each year are drawn from a panel of university graduates and experienced teachers of English. They set assignments for the students to complete at home and in class, and these are then corrected and discussed in class. In addition to the textbooks that are prescribed, a large number of articles on topical subjects and short stories are available for comprehension and appreciation. The students are also provided with plenty of opportunity for oral practice and to express their own ideas.

Students are advised to apply for a place in a First Year course, but those who consider themselves adequately qualified and who pass the Entrance Examination sufficiently well may enrol in a Second Year course.

On completion of the First Year, all students will sit an examination, which if they pass sufficiently well, will qualify them to enrol in a Second Year course in the following year. Those who pass this examination, but not sufficiently well to qualify them for a place in a Second Year course, will be awarded a Statement of Proficiency.

On completion of the Second Year, all students will sit an examination that leads to the award of the Extra-Mural Certificate in the Use of English.

As these courses are intended for working adults, those attending any class in a secondary school will not be admitted.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS: Those who have completed a First Year course sufficiently well in the previous year or who possess a Departmental Certificate in English for Business in Grade A, B or C may enrol in a Second Year course without any further test. All those who do not have these qualifications should possess an English or Chinese Certificate of Education, or equivalent, with a Pass in English Language and should also sit the Use of English Entrance Examination. All such applicants should therefore state on their application form the date on which they wish to take this examination.

BASIC MEDICAL ENGLISH

The 'long short story', the form which Henry James called 'the dear, the blessed Nouvelle', is a genre favoured by many writers. It is rather like a sculptor's dummy which is used to try out new ideas which later receive full treatment in a more structured work. While the danger in a short story is to overload the fragile anecdote at its centre, in a novella, the writer can explore more intimately his central theme and yet preserve the vividness of the anecdote.

The aim of the course is to examine in group discussions the techniques used by four writers in novellas which are not only classics in their own right but which also have found favour with modern audiences as all four have been made into successful films.

The four prescribed texts are available, in paperback editions, at the Hong Kong Book Centre.

Throughout the ages, women have played many different roles in different societies. How accurately have these roles been reflected in literature? During the lectures and discussions those attending will have an opportunity of considering the various images of women as they have been portrayed in Western literature, and particularly in drama. Special attention will therefore be paid to the plays that the course will consider, and these will range from the Greeks to contemporary American work. Supplementary material will include overviews of the role of women in society, images of women as they appear in other forms of literature and the extent of the influence that female writers have been able to exert.

The textbook that the course will use is *Women in Drama* by Harriet Kriegel (Mentor Books) that will be available from the Hong Kong Book Centre, Des Voeux Road Central.

By using a systems approach, a theoretical framework will be provided for the study of Human Geography. An understanding of the overall background of Asia has become a necessity to every one, resulting from the rapidly growing political tension in the area. For those with a keen interest in Asian History and for teachers, the following topics have been selected for discussion: methodology of study and teaching; reference works and textbooks; preparation for examinations; significant points in the study of Asian History; the teaching and study of 19th Century Asian History, with eight lectures arranged for the areas of China, Japan, India and Southeast Asia.

Priority will be given to teachers of Form IV to Form VII.

139. The Cold War in Asia: the Sino-American Confrontation. Kenneth S. Chern, Ph.D. (Chicago), Lecturer in History, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting October 5, 1976. Room 141, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$55

The development of the Sino-American confrontation during the Cold War will be explored by discussing the following topics: the triumph of Chinese Communism in 1949 and the alienation of China from America; the impact of the Korean war; the issue of Taiwan and the Formosa Strait crises of the 1950s; the tensions in John Kennedy's policy; the origins and course of the Vietnam debacle; the Nixon-Kissinger initiative leading to the Shanghai Communiqué; and the post-Cold War balance of power in the Far East.

Within this framework, the course will focus on the inter-relationship of economic, strategic, cultural, and ideological factors; the role of formal diplomacy, rhetoric, intellectuals, pressure groups, and popular images in the Asian Cold War; and the role of other major actors, such as Japan and the Soviet Union, in the developing Asian international system. 140. Rebellions in Modern China. K. C. Fok, B.A. (HK), M.A. (Hawaii), Lecturer in History, University of Hong Kong, Owen H. H. Wong, M.A. (HK), Ph.D. (Cantab.). Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting October 7, 1976. Room 141, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$60

The single most revolutionary aspect of contemporary Chinese thought is the attempt by Chinese Communist historians to rewrite the history of the peasant rebellions. This course attempts to make a comparative analysis of traditional Chinese and Marxist theory in the treatment of peasant rebellions in Ch'ing China. The nature of rural control is singled out as the key to rebel or government strength in the process of amassing peasant support. The importance of rebel leadership and ideology, military strategy and tactics is also dealt with to explain the rise and fall of rebellions. Chinese reaction to the West in the period, in its more violent form, as dramatised by the endless succession of anti-missionary outbreaks culminating in the Boxer uprising of 1899–1900, will also be discussed to determine the relations between Western impact and peasant rebellions. Finally the significance of Ch'ing rebellions in modern Chinese history will be assessed.

Almost everybody knows that the area of a circle is πr^2 , but what precisely does this mean? What is the meaning of speed if the distance travelled is not proportional to time? Without a knowledge of calculus these quite natural questions are not easy to answer and yet many elementary mathematics courses omit this topic.

This course aims to fill this gap and to provide a fairly comprehensive working knowledge in calculus up to A-level standard. It is hoped the course will be helpful to both those involved with the teaching of calculus in schools and to beginners wishing to find out what it is all about.

中國典籍浩浩,若江海然,非一人之腹所能盡飲也。本課程特濃縮所 有代表作,內容包括經史子集精華,選講尚書、詩經、左傳、唐宋古文、唐 詩、宋詞、元曲、明小說及淸文學名篇。首重詞章之欣賞與理解,其次認識 文章之體裁與風格,末則學習寫作產易文言文,以收實用之效。對中國文學 有興趣之社會人仕亦歡迎參加。

本課程取材之方法及選講之目的與第一輯相同。所選講之內容則比較 第一輯爲深入。已修習第一輯者固可報名,繼續進修,未修習第一輯而具較 高程度者,亦可入學。至於中四至中七教師,則可作爲補充教材。

文字改革是中國現代化過程中的一個重要環節。近百年來,每當中國 進入一個新的歷史階段,文字改革就有了相應的發展。本課程分兩部份: (1)文字改革簡史,其中又包括:漢字發展簡史及趨向,清末文字改革運 動,注音字母的產生,國語羅馬字運動,拉丁化新文字運動以及1949年以來 文字改革的發展。(2)「漢語拼音(1958)」的介紹,其中又包括:漢語拼音 的分析,教學法(規劃學習法 Programmed Learning)介紹,跟注音字母的 比較,目前在世界各地教學(特別是新加坡的教學經驗)和應用(電報、電 算機處理漢字、手語、旗語)的概況,以及將來的展望。

本講座的一位主講者近年來經常撰寫關於文字改革的文章,另一位主 講者則從事業餘國語教學工作。他們願以自己的資料和心得跟語文教師和其 他所有關心中國語文的朋友們切磋。

Chinese Jade, Ceramics and Painting have been highly esteemed since the remote past. For connoisseurs of Chinese art and those with a keen interest in Chinese culture, the techniques of identification and ways of appreciation will be introduced. The historical and cultural background of some selected items will also be stressed. Lectures will be illustrated with slides. This course has been organised in co-operation with the Fung Ping Shan Museum.

No previous knowledge of the subject will be assumed.

MISCELLANEOUS

209. The Study of Chinese Coins. Werner Burger, Ph.D. (Munich). Thursdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting October 7, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$65

One of the most fascinating aspects of Chinese history is the development of her means of payment. This subject, however, is usually either studied by sinologists and historians, content with what can be learnt from recorded history, without studying the actual coins; or by numismatists, who also look at it solely from the point of view of their science. That explains why there are nearly no studies about this subject, neither in European nor in Far Eastern languages, which compare favourably with research done into the economic history of other cultures.

This course will give on one hand a serious introduction to the numismatic history of China: the various forms of coins and their development until modern times, their manufacture, questions of contemporary and modern forgeries, and problems of collecting Chinese coins. On the other hand, it will deal with the sources of Chinese economic history, exchange rate to silver, buying power of cash, and other problems of research into Chinese monetary history.

210. Understanding Chinese Customs and Traditions. Mrs Nana Tsao, B.A., Dip. Ed. (HK). Wednesdays, 3.00–4.30 p.m., starting September 29, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

This series of lectures is designed for those who wish to learn something of Chinese life and culture, with special reference to Hong Kong. Topics include historical background to understanding Chinese Customs and Traditions; Chinese family and kinship organization; religion; marriage and burial customs; and the festivals celebrated in Hong Kong. The lectures will be illustrated with slides and films.

213. An Introduction to Behaviour Modification: Theory & Practice. Joseph A. Precker, Ph.D. (Columbia University), Lecturer in Psychology, University of Hong Kong. Mondays, 5.45–7.45 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 5 meetings. Fee: \$50

This short course will present the major theories of behaviour modification techniques, but the main attempt will be to develop appropriate beginning skills in application of these techniques. The course is designed for psychologists, psychiatrists, social workers, teachers, physicians, police officers, managers, parents and others who may feel the need to understand and to utilize systematic approaches to behaviour modification. The final session will include a critique of methods used, and discussion of ethical and practical considerations.

214. The Work of Careers Teachers. Saturdays, 10.00 a.m.-12 noon, starting September 18, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$100

Inter-relationship among different areas of philosophy will be stressed, and the relevance of philosophy to human existence considered. No previous training in philosophy is required.

The American military withdrawal from Indochina in 1975 (and from Thailand by mid-1976) coincided with growing indications of the Asian ambitions of the Soviet Union, continuing uncertainty concerning the political succession and therefore of foreign policy priorities of the People's Republic of China, a continuing global and regional 'low posture' by Japan which sought to place economic growth above overt political competition among states, and the development of apparent uncertainty and confusion in the U.S. concerning foreign policy direction. At the same time, the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) sought to develop a regional spirit of mutual interest, cooperation, and security, with a longterm goal of neutralization of the region; and this endeavour was being supported in general terms by China. Additionally, there were the puzzles concerning Vietnamese ambitions in the region and the Cambodian social, political, and economic changes. The background to these circumstances will be sketched, and discussion will concentrate on the following and related areas: the policy options available to the major states, and the domestic and foreign constraints on these policies; the implications of events in Europe and the Middle East, together with growing Soviet naval strength, for political stability in Asia; reactions by the U.S. to Soviet attempts to 'encircle' China; the Soviet Union-Japan-China 'problem' and its implications; insurgency in Southeast Asia and the possibility of Great Power involvement; prospects for the 1980's.

They aim to provide a thorough grounding in programming techniques and to train independent computer programmers. Those who are able to enclose a letter from their employers to this effect are advised to do so.

Minimum Entry Qualifications: Applicants should have 5 subjects including English and Mathematics at Grade E or above in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education, or equivalent.

An examination will be conducted at the end of the course. The award of an extra-mural certificate is conditional on passing the written examination, completing the set projects and attending at least 75% of the lectures.

These courses aim to provide an explanation of how computer systems operate. They are designed for people who have no previous knowledge of computers and are especially suitable for people thinking of taking up data processing as a career, as well as those employees whose work involves contact with computer systems. It may be considered as a preliminary to the 'Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming'.

The syllabus will include: number systems and elementary arithmetic procedures; data processing organisation chart; the nature of data processing systems; input; storage; processing; control; output; input/output units; storage units; central processing and control; methods of processing, batch processing; random access; real time. 230. Hong Kong Birds. Michael A. Webster, M.A., M.B.O.U., Chairman of the Hong Kong Bird Watching Society. Mondays, 6.00-7.00 p.m., starting September 27, 1976. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$50

Why is Hong Kong a particularly interesting place for the birdwatcher? Over 370 species have been recorded here, and over 240 are recorded each year. This course sets out to give an account of the reasons why Hong Kong is so rich in bird life, with details of migration, breeding distribution and biology, and identification of the species involved. There will also be discussion of the different habitats involved, and how Man is changing the bird life by changing the nature of the countryside. The course will be illustrated by slides taken by local photographers. It is intended as an introduction to Hong Kong's birds, but a certain amount of more advanced theory will be included, with suggestions as to how the amateur ornithologist can make a lasting contribution to this science. There will be one or two field trips, according to the wishes of participants.

231. Fauna of Hong Kong. D. S. Hill, M.Sc., Ph.D., F.L.S., M.I.Biol., M.B.O.U. Wednesdays, 6.00–8.30 p.m., starting September 22, 1976. Northcote Science Building, Department of Zoology, Lecture Room 302, Laboratory 213, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$130

The course will deal briefly with the principles of animal classification, and then the fauna of Hong Kong down to the level of Family, with particular reference to the more abundant and/or ecologically interesting species. It is intended to be of particular use to local biology teachers, especially those teaching ecology, since there will be a strong ecological slant to the course. However, it is also intended to be of interest to anyone concerned with the Hong Kong fauna.

Each session will consist of a lecture, followed by a practical laboratory session.

Fee Refund: Teachers of Biology in fourth, fifth and sixth forms who wish to attend the above course may apply for a fee refund from the Director of Education. This applies to all teachers whether in Government, aided or private schools. 232. A Modern Approach to Biology Teaching. J. D. Warren, B.Sc., Dip.Ed. Mondays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 20, 1976. Island School, Biology Laboratory, Ground floor, 20 Borrett Road, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. (Island School may be reached via Borrett Road from Kennedy Road, or via Bowen Road from Magazine Gap Road.) Fee: \$130

A practically orientated course to introduce teachers to equipment and quantitative methods for use with students in fourth, fifth and sixth forms.

The work will include respiration, enzyme action, homeostasis, the nervous system, inheritance and some ecological studies. Emphasis will be given to interpretive practical work and teaching methods which encourage a better understanding of biological principles. There will be a variety of visual materials for use with experiments and explanatory work sheets.

The material included will be useful for those involved in teaching integrated science.

Each meeting will include a lecture followed by a practical session.

233. Reaction Mechanisms in Organic Chemistry. Michael Sammes, Ph.D. Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 29, 1976. Chemistry Building, first floor Lecture Theatre and first floor Laboratory, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings including laboratory sessions. Fee: \$120

A course designed primarily for science teachers of sixth forms who are teaching the new organic chemistry 'A' level syllabus. It aims to cover the main mechanistic concepts included in the syllabus, and to suggest approaches to the teaching of these.

Topics will include bonding in carbon compounds, types of reagents and substrates, nucleophilic substitution, electrophilics aromatic substitution, electrophilic and nucleophilic additions, elimination reactions, free radical reactions. Laboratory periods will include sessions with molecular models, and some simple reactions and preparations to illustrate concepts in the syllabus.

Fee Refund: Teachers of Chemistry in sixth forms who wish to attend the above course may apply for a fee refund from the Director of Education. Applicants are required to complete an application form (obtainable from the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong) which must be returned directly to the Director of Education before the commencement of the course. This applies to all teachers whether in Government, aided or private schools. 234. Introduction to Corrosion. G. W. Greene, B.Eng. (Stevens I.T.), Ph.D. (Ind. Met.) (Birmingham), M.I.Corr.T., M.Met.Soc. Tuesdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting October 19, 1976. Room DS2, Duncan Sloss Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$100

The course will deal with concepts of corrosion processes and protection methods. The state of the metal in terms of composition and microstructure are shown to seriously affect corrosion resistance in a chemical environment. However many factors determine the environment such as concentration, impurities, temperature, humidity, solution velocity, abrasion, aeration, applied stresses, surface deposits, and design.

Protective systems are compared and contrasted for a range of applications. If time permits, specific corrosion problems of interest to the class will be considered.

The course could be of interest to either practicing engineers or Chemistry teachers.

This series of ten lecture-discussion sessions is specially designed for professionals working in fields such as teaching, social work, medicine, pastoral care, etc.

The provision of social services became an integral part of the Chinese Communists' political programme during their early struggle for power, and remains so today. But in trying to build socialism for a nation that is still primarily agricultural, the Chinese must somehow find the means both to industrialise their economy and to provide social security for their people. Hence the importance of self-reliance and self-help at the local level in the Chinese system at the present stage.

Within this context, topics to be discussed will include health care, education, criminal rehabilitation, the status of women, income maintenance, social welfare and the care of the aged.

Each lecture will focus on three specific questions: achievements since 1949; the methods and programmes responsible for the achievements; problems experienced and future tasks. Guest speakers will be invited to participate where possible.




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GROUND PLAN OF UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG MAIN BUILDING
