

The Department welcomes enquiries and requests from business organizations, government, voluntary bodies or private institutions for specially designed courses to meet their specific education needs.

PRIOR ENROLMENT IS ESSENTIAL

Failure to enrol prior to the opening of a particular course may mean the cancellation of that course. Prior enrolment is the only way the Department of Extra-Mural Studies has of judging the response to its courses. Your co-operation is therefore invited in sending your application forms to the Department as soon as possible.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- r. There are normally no entry requirements except that applicants should be over 18 years of age. Occasionally to have the full benefit of a course applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Applicants are therefore advised to read the description of a course carefully. Professional courses usually have clearly defined entry requirements.
- 2. The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant.
- 3. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held:
 - (a) on any public holidays.
 - (b) at a storm warning signal of No. 8 or above. (After the typhoon passes, if the No. 8 signal is lowered before 3 p.m., classes will take place as normal. If the signal is lowered after 3 p.m., classes will be cancelled that evening.)
 - (c) during the following holiday period: February 15-23, 1977 inclusive (Lunar New Year).
- 4. Fee are not refundable once the course has commenced.
- 5. Certificates of Attendance are issued, on payment of 50 cents, to those who have attended not less than two-thirds of a course of at least 20 meetings in duration.
- **6.** Closing date for enrolment: one week before the starting date of a course. Late enrolments may not be accepted.

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Archaeology

246. Archaeology in Southeast Asia. B. A. V. Peacock, M.A. (Cantab.), Curator, Hong Kong Museum of History. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting March 1, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$90

This course will cover the archaeology of the Southeast Asian region in the prehistoric and early historic periods. Some emphasis will be given to Malaysia and a prior knowledge of basic archaeological methods, techniques and theories of interpretation will be assumed. Topics covered will include the fossil record of man in the region; Palaeolithic industries in South, Southeast and East Asia and problems of old world cultural inter-relationships and chronology during the Pleistocene; cultural ecological adaptations in the late Pleistocene and early Holocene; archaeological evidence for the development of plant cultivation and animal domestication; the development of metallurgy and the growth of natural resource exploitation and interregional trade; the impact of Indian cultural elements on indigenous cultures and the process of Indianization.

Enrolment is limited to 30 persons.

UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE

The attention of extra-mural students is drawn to the following regulation of the University of Hong Kong regarding admission to the University:

'A mature person without formal academic qualifications who is aged 30 or over on September 1 of the year in which admission is sought may be exempted completely from University entrance requirements and be eligible for admission to read for a first degree except in the Faculty of Medicine. Applications for exemption on grounds of mature age must be supported by certified true copies of a birth certificate or a statutory declaration and of any academic qualifications.'

Art & Design

Courses in Art & Design and related areas are open to students of all levels of development unless otherwise stated.

PRACTICAL STUDIO COURSES IN ART and DESIGN

These are practical studio classes in the Visual Arts with emphasis on artistic skills and creative growth of the individual. Work will be carried out in the various media described.

Students must provide all necessary materials, some of which will be available for purchase through the department. Materials will be discussed at the first class meeting.

247. Portrait Drawing and Painting. Merly Chesterman, B.A. (Bath Academy of Art), Dip.Ed. (Bath University). Fridays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting January 21, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$150 including model fee

From early days we have evidence of man's fascination with the human face, and his search to portray the essence of humanity. The emphasis in this course will be on developing the basic skill of the portrait artist, and work will be carried out in either oil or acrylic paint as well as drawing materials. In addition there will be a brief look at the history of portraiture.

Enrolment is limited to 20 persons.

248. Silkscreen and Serigraphic Printing. Jacqueline Sutliff, B.A. (University of Minnesota). Mondays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting January 24, 1977. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The silkscreen and serigraph have developed from the simple stencil, and screenprinting is among the youngest of the printmaking crafts. As such it is in an exciting state of expansion with the uses of varied techniques ranging from decorative elements to fine art prints. The aim of this course is to present the silkscreen and serigraphic medium to the student, to allow him to explore its potential and versatility, and to produce prints in both black and white, and colour.

Students will be expected to provide many of their own materials. Inks and sundries for use during class sessions will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

249. Watercolour Painting. Jacqueline Sutliff, B.A. (University of Minnesota). Thursdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting January 27, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$120

The Western approach to watercolour and wash painting differs considerably from Oriental styles, both in emphasis and technique. This class is designed to familiarize students with aspects of both traditional and modern Western watercolour techniques. Included in this course will be selection and preparation of papers, wet on wet, dry brush, ink on wash, and watercolour polymer mix. This course is suitable for both beginners and more advanced students.

250. Elementary Graphic Design. Ross F. Evans, A.D. (Western Australia), A.I.D.I.A. Mondays, 8.00-10.00 p.m., starting January 24, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$135

The elementary principles of two dimensional design and the preparation of artwork for printing reproduction will be discussed. A study of basic typography will be included, covering the history and mechanics of type, layout, copyfitting, etc. because good graphic design can be easily spoilt by imperfect printing. After investigation of common printing methods, students will learn to communicate effectively with the printer and to produce artwork which helps eliminate printing errors.

If possible, visits will be made outside course hours to a typesetters, engravers, a newspaper production house and an advertising studio.

A home exercise will be set each week.

251. Colour Reproduction and Printing for the Graphic Designer. Norman de Brackinghe, D.M.S., M.I.O.P., Minst. M.P., A.M.B.I.M., A.S.I.A. Wednesdays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting January 26, 1977. Room 732, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$120

Relationships between the Graphic Designer and the Printer often become strained as it appears that the two elements are often working towards different ends instead of the same goal. The aim of this course is to help the designer pick his way through the technology that gets thrown at him. To understand in basic terms what is happening in order to improve the communication between himself and the printer. It is important to have the printer and the designer both on the same side. The designer needs to know sufficient technology to understand the limitations of the processes that his work will go through in order to achieve a finished product. Once he does understand the limitations there is no reason why he cannot urge the printer towards those limits and in consequence extend both their ranges through a sense of discipline. Presentation and handling are part of the key, for well presented and clearly specified material will tend to be handled with the minimum of fuss and with greater understanding.

The need for a course of this type is based on many years experience of working with graphic designers and acting as interpreter between the two factions. This course is designed for those with a professional interest in the subject.

252. Fun with Animated Film. Ross F. Evans, A.D. (Western Australia), A.I.D.I.A. Thursdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting January 20, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

Most of us enjoy watching animated cartoons, without realising how easily we can produce such film ourselves. Creating even simple animated film is a pleasurable and satisfying experience. After a brief study of the history and theory of animation, students will produce their own films, experimenting with simple techniques including drawings, cutouts, wire or clay models, etc. Methods of planning more advanced animated film will be discussed with those students wishing to proceed beyond the elementary stages of this course.

Knowledge of photography or ability to draw are not required, but a lively imagination is essential.

Most of the film to be used during class meetings will be supplied, and the cost of this has been included in the course fee.

253. Photography: an Introduction. Andrew Mitchell. Wednesdays or Fridays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting January 19 and 21, 1977 respectively. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$145

Aimed at those with a genuine interest in photography as a vehicle for expression and communication, this course will cover the basic studio and darkroom techniques of black and white, and colour photography as well as choices of equipment and materials. In addition, theories of photography, both aesthetic and philosophic, will be explored. Students will be encouraged to experiment in the media, and class critiques will be held on the results of these.

Students will be expected to provide their own cameras. Basic darkroom materials and supplies to be used during class sessions will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

254. Photography: an Intermediate Course. Philip Tse. Thursdays, 7.00-9.00 p.m., starting January 20, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$200

In recent years photography has come to be accepted as a fine art form in its own right. The emphasis in this course will be on 'creativity and aesthetics,' and it is designed for those already familiar with the basic technical aspects of photography and photographic equipment. While most of the work will deal with black and white photography, colour processing will be introduced. In addition there will be lectures and discussions on the work of well-known photographers such as David Hamilton, Irving Penn, Sam Haskins, and others. There will be six class field trips to a variety of sites on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, and class critiques will be held on the results of these as well as of studio and independent work.

Chemicals and papers will be provided for use during class sessions, and the cost of these is included in the fee.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons, and in the event of over-subscription an interview may be required.

255. Photography as an Aid to the Graphic Designer. Philip Tse. Tuesdays, 7.00-9.00 p.m., starting January 18, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$165

Photography, because it achieves optical effects never known before, plays a vital part today in a designer's work, and techniques of photographics open up completely new visitas. Tuition will include studio and darkroom procedure within the designer's capabilities, detailing some of the many effects which can be achieved by simple manipulation at the developing and printing stages. Colour work, distortion of straightforward images, special screening effects, photo layout, photo mural, graphic art photography, photo dyeing techniques and advertising photography will be discussed. Emphasis will be on practical darkroom work, and there will be a visit to a printer's darkroom.

This intermediate level course is intended for those with a basic knowledge of darkroom procedure.

Papers, chemicals and other materials for use during class time will be supplied, and the cost of these has been included in the course fee.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons, and in the event of over-subscription an interview may be required.

256. Life Drawing. Elise Parkin. Tuesdays, 9.30 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting January 25, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$150 including model fee

Drawing from the human figure in movement and at rest has long been considered one of the better ways to train correlation of hand and eye. It is part of a continuing discipline if we are to interpret and communicate what we 'see' with accuracy and sensitivity. Students will come to understand the structure and proportion of the human figure, and will be encouraged to draw freely and with vigour.

Both beginners and more advanced students will be welcome.

257. Painting in Oils. K. Burns McKeon, D.A. (Edin.). Thursdays, 9.30 a.m.—12.00 noon, starting January 27, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150 including model fee

Max Doerner stated that, 'It is no more possible to learn to paint from books than to learn to swim on a sofa,' therefore students, after ascertaining their skill level, and discussing materials and other relevant information, will dive right into painting in oil. Subjects will include draped figure and still life, and towards the end of the course students will be encouraged to produce compositions from their own sketches.

258. Woodblock and Mixed-Media Printmaking. Nancy Woo, B.F.A., M.F.A. (Cornell), M.A. (Columbia). Tuesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting January 25, 1977. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

A chief merit of prints is their ability to meet the human mind on a simple level of appreciation and to lure it on to a more complex level of enjoyment as one's comprehension increases. This course will give the student an introduction to those basic techniques of woodblock printmaking, and mixed-media printing, which will enable the student to carry on in the media beyond the level which can be attained in twelve meetings. Both monochrome, and multi-colour prints will be produced, and class critiques will be held on these. In addition there will be discussions on both traditional and contemporary Western and Japanese woodblock prints.

Students will be expected to provide most drawing and cutting materials. Some inks and sundries will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

259. Experimental Fabric Printing. Diane Jones-Parry, Dip. A.D. (Camberwell), A.T.C. (Hornsey). Wednesdays, 10.00 a.m.—12.00 noon, starting January 26, 1977. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$150

Fabric printing and dyeing forms a part of our lives, as it is used to decorate our clothing and our surroundings. The methods of decorating cloth are varied. This course offers students the opportunity to experiment and explore the potentials of pattern and printmaking on fabric. The student cannot hope to compete with the perfectly matched patterns of the machine and modern technology, but he can aim to become a 'handicrafts person,' using traditional methods of wood and lino-block, stencil and silkscreen, and batik and tiedye.

Students will be expected to provide most of their own materials. Inks and dyes will be provided for class use, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons.

260. 素 描

(Monochrome Drawing)

本課程爲繪圖愛好者而設,强調基礎訓練,使學員認識素描的基本概念,掌握整體的觀察方法及初步明白構圖,明暗,透視,比例,空間感的處理,在寫實的基礎上可依據自己的興趣去發展和變化。課程以寫生爲主,對象包括靜物與人物。(限收二十名)。

261. 速 寫 (Sketch)

主 講 人:郭倩如女士。

滿授語言: 粤語。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心。

時 間:一九七七年二月四日起每星期五下午六時至八時。 (块十講)。

心 皆:一百元。

速寫不僅可以成爲獨立的藝術。而且也是畫家創作形象的資料。因此它是每個繪畫者必修之課。本課程是爲稍有繪畫基礎的愛好者而設。將使學員認識速寫的基本概念和掌握基本的方法。

課程內容以寫生人物爲主。

262. 油 畫 (Painting in Oil)

主 講 人:郭倩如女士。

講授語言: 粵語。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心。

時 間:一九七七年二月四日起每星期五下午八時至十時。 (共十講)。

學 曹:一百元。

本課程講授有關油畫之初步知識,包括色彩關係,調色處理等,講授時以臨摹,寫生爲主。(限收二十名)。

ART APPRECIATION

These are lecture and discussion courses open to all students regardless of previous Art History study.

263. Introduction to the Chinese Arts of Painting, Sculpture and Ceramics. Lawrence Tam, M.A. (H.K.), M. Museol. (Toronto), Curator, Hong Kong Museum of Art, S. C. Chuang, B.A. (Taiwan University), M.A. (Princeton University), Fredrikke M. Scollard, M.A. (Hawaii), M.A. (Chicago). Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting January 24, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$100

In China, painting was normally regarded as a special achievement of the literary circle. In order to explain this phenomnon, theories, techniques, subject-matter, symbolism, and other aspects of Chinese painting will be analyzed. In contrast sculpture in the traditional days was not highly regarded. While important works were produced, the names of the sculptors are unknown. In addition to this social aspect of sculpture, subject-matter, techniques, materials, and stylistic connections with India, Korea, and Japan will be explained. With ceramics, porcelain produced by the imperial kilns attained a firm place in traditional studies of art history, whereas ceramics of provincial kilns have been regarded as handicrafts, and been given scant attention. The lectures on ceramics will deal with a historical sequence of selected examples of pottery and porcelain from the neolithic to the present with emphasis on the conceptual and stylistic comparison between imperial and provincial wares. Techniques, and market distribution will also be discussed.

264. An Introduction to the Art of South-East Asia. Mrs. Rajeshwari Ghose, B.A. Hons. (Calcutta), M.A. (H.K.), and Mrs. Priscilla Tso, B.A., Dip.Ed. (H.K.), Dip.Ad.Ed. (Manc.), Asst. to the Director of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong. Fridays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 4, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 16 meetings. Fee: \$90

This illustrated course will provide an introduction to the Hindu and Buddhist art of South-east Asia. It will commence with a general survey of the area, trace the progress of the two religions and study the transformations that they underwent in their adopted lands. It will then proceed to a regional study of Burma, Indonesia, Indochina and Thailand, and will examine at length the art of Burma, Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, Indonesia (including Bali), Borneo and Sumatra.

265. The Human Figure in Western Art. Carolyn Muir, B.A. (Wellsley), M.A. (Pennsylvania). Thursdays, 8.15–9.45 p.m., starting January 27, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$85

Western man has always been fascinated by visual images of himself. Throughout the history of Western art, the representation of the human figure has played a predominant part. This illustrated course will examine various aspects of the representation of the human figure in the West, primarily in painting, but also in sculpture. It will consider such questions as the changes in the concept of beauty, the changing notion of art's purpose, the social attitudes which conditioned it, and the problem of "realism." Also discussed will be the relationship of figure to setting, and the ideological question of man's place in nature, as determined by historical and religious factors. The human figure will also be studied in the context of religious symbolism and human expression, with special emphasis on such specific types as the nude and the portrait. This course will include examples chosen from all chronological periods of Western art, ranging from ancient Greek art to contemporary art.

266. Intermediate Accounting. Warren Lowe, A.A.S.A., A.H.K.S.A. Tuesdays, 5.45–7.00 p.m., starting January 25, 1977. Room 722, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 15 meetings. Fee: \$70

Partnership accounts, including the change of partners and conversion to limited companies, and company accounts, including the issue of shares and debentures, are amongst subjects which will be covered in this course set at the intermediate level. Designed for students who have a good working knowledge of basic accounting principles, the course will also deal with final accounts for publication, the treatment of taxation in company accounts and the interpretation of accounts, including flow of funds statements.

267. Advanced Accounting. S. W. Ching, A.C.C.A., A.C.M.A., A.C.I.S., A.I.B., A.M.B.I.M., A.H.K.S.A. Mondays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting February 7, 1977. Room 26, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 16 meetings. Fee: \$120

Advanced theory and practice in relation to the development, processing, interpretation and use of accounting information at a high level and across a wide range of business activities will be covered in this class. To gain full benefit students should have passed A.C.C.A. professional examination, Accounting 3, Paper 8, or be able to prove an equivalent standard. A copy of examination results should be submitted with the enrolment form.

268. Accounting for Solicitors. S. E. C. Purvis, B.A. (Reading), A.C.C.A., A.H.K.S.A., Lecturer in Accountancy, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting January 11, 1977. Room 418, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 15 meetings. Fee: \$85

Designed to be of assistance to candidates sitting Part II of the Law Society's Qualifying Examinations, this course will include accounting for Clients and Trust Monies; treatment of disbursements on behalf of clients; outstanding costs at the balance sheet; preparation of final accounts; evaluation of business proposals.

The aim of this course is to provide an understanding of the basic principles of United Kingdom taxation and their application to practical questions and problems in the areas of law, income tax schedules (A, B, C, D and E), tax deductions, the computation of capital allowances, corporation and capital gains tax.

270. Hong Kong Taxation: Principles and Practical Procedures. Y. K. Yu, C.P.A., F.H.K.S.A., A.A.S.A. Tuesdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting March 1, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

The Hong Kong Inland Revenue Ordinance provides for charges of four main kinds of tax, namely, profits tax, salaries tax, property tax and interest tax. The Ordinance also provides for the availability of personal assessment. This course will introduce the main taxes and consider the implications and effect of personal assessment. The practical applications, as well as basic principles, will be discussed. The course will also cover the procedures for submitting the different types of tax return and the appeal process. Students are advised to obtain a copy of the Hong Kong Inland Revenue Ordinance.

271. Company Secretaryship. J. A. Ellis, E.D., F.T.I.A., A.A.S.A., A.A.I.M., A.C.I.S., M.I.T.O. Fridays, 5.45-7.00 p.m., starting February 4, 1977. Room 722, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 16 meetings.

Fee: \$85

The practical aspects of the Company Secretary's job will be described with special reference to the procedures and administration of companies registered under the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. This course is suitable for students who wish to acquire a basic knowledge of Secretarial Practice for practical use as well as for students taking professional examinations.

272. Advanced Company Secretarial Practice. A. R. Dermont, A.C.I.S., A.M.B.I.M., M.Inst.A.M. Cert. Ed. Wednesdays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting March 2, 1977. Room 27, Central Market Building, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 13 meetings. Fee: \$80

This course is designed particularly for those who are preparing for the "Company Secretarial Practice" examination of the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators and will make special reference to English Company Law. Students must have a basic knowledge of the subject and preference will be given to those who have completed Part I. A copy of examination results should be submitted with the application form.

273. Information Systems for Business. Buck C. Y. Cheung, A.M.I.S.M., A.I.D.P., Dip. D.P. (London). Fridays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting January 28, 1977. Room 27, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

Most businessmen know what information they need but often experience problems in having the information available exactly when it is required. This course will look at the way an organised information system may benefit the businessman, paying particular attention to the use of a computerized system. Whilst the tutor will discuss the range of computer applications, their feasibility, definition and extraction of information for the computer and implementation, no prior knowledge of computers is assumed as the course is designed to be useful for those in general management positions.

274. Computer Simulation in Industrial and Transport Systems. J. B. Peacock, B.Tech. (Loughborough), Ph.D. (Birmingham), F.R.S.H., Lecturer in Industrial Engineering, University of Hong Kong, and Chan Chun Kwong, B.Sc. (Eng.) (H.K.). Tuesdays, 6.15-8.15 p.m., starting January 25, 1977. Room DS2, Duncan Sloss Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$150

Simulation is a useful technique for the investigation and planning of operational aspects of systems in that it is performed without interference with the real system. The conduct of simulation investigations involves the construction of an appropriate model in the form of an activity cycle diagram, the collection of data from the real system, and the conduct of statistically based simulation experiments. The course will consist of an introduction to simulation as a technique followed by practice in the use of a specially designed Computer Language (E.C.S.L.). The course will be of interest to Engineers and Scientists with a degree or equivalent qualification who have a knowledge of statistics and computing. An opportunity will be provided for course members to investigate problems from their own organizations.

275. Management Theory and Practice. K. K. Chong, B.Sc. (Eng.) (H.K.), Dip. M.S., A.M.I.B.M. Fridays, 7.30-9.00 p.m., starting January 21, 1977. Room 26, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$70

The bridge between soundly-conceived management theory and the problems of the practical manager is the focal point of this course. Theoretical concepts will be examined from the point of view of their applicability in today's business conditions with reference to eastern and western influences in managerial style. The problems of change and the reaction of subordinates to change will be considered. The course is designed to help managers to assess their priorities in the non-technical sphere of administration and to stimulate thinking about modes of effective managerial conduct.

276. Personnel Management: theory and practice. Francis Chia, B.A. (H.K.), Dip. P.M. (London), M.I.P.M., A.M.B.I.M. Mondays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting January 24, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$75

The development of sound personnel policies in a business organization is now widely accepted as the cornerstone to the successful pursuit of other managerial policies. Intended for junior executives in the personnel function and for other non-specialists who wish to improve their knowledge of the function, the course will examine the role of the Personnel Manager in terms of direct operational responsibilities and as adviser in human relations to the organization. Stress will be laid on ways of developing Personnel Policies which are appropriate for the culture and business environment in which the Company is operating.

277. Personnel Psychology. Henry S. R. Kao, B.A. (National Taiwan), M.S. (West Virginia), Ph.D. (Wisconsin), Lecturer in Psychology, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 7.30–8.45 p.m., starting March 30, 1977. Room 231, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$80

The principles of Psychology have been increasingly applied to business practice and all forms of human resource utilization. A range of behavioural science techniques have been developed to enable the personnel specialist to formulate policies for the assessment and development of staff. It is proposed to analyze the techniques from a theoretical and practical standpoint. Emphasis will be placed on the value of Job Analysis and Evaluation, Personnel Appraisal, Selection, Psychological Testing as well as on the role of the Psychologist in programmes of Management Development and Industrial Training. The course has been designed for specialists with experience in the field of Human and Personnel Relations who wish to deepen their knowledge of the latest developments in this field.

CENTRAL MARKET

The Department of Extra-Mural Studies has been fortunate in obtaining permission to use the premises of the Urban Services Training Unit during the evenings. These light and pleasant lecture rooms are air-conditioned and are situated on the top floor of the Central Market Building. Entrance is via the stairs at the main entrance to the Market in Des Voeux Road Central.

278. Techniques of Financial Management. Vincent Ng, B.S., M.B.A., M.S. (UCLA). Tuesdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 8, 1977. Room 11, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 16 meetings.

Fee: \$95

The application of financial procedures affects every manager in a business organization. Whilst a detailed knowledge of such procedures may not be necessary in the case of a non-finance manager, an awareness of the financial implications and of alternative methods of financial control can be invaluable to the operational manager. The speaker will examine the main features of business finance, such as source funding, ratios as a system of financial analysis, projection of business results through cash forecasting, operating budgets, budgetary control, and analysis of capital investment decisions. Case studies drawn from local and foreign sources will be used to illustrate the techniques in question.

Designed for practising managers in the non-financial area, this course will put the various techniques of financial control in the context of other organizational activities and examine the human implications of financial systems.

279. Financial Analysis in Modern Business. Gabriel Lee Chi-wang, B.Sc. (H.K.), M.B.A. (Toronto). Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting January 31, 1977. Room 229, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$85

In the conditions of modern business a number of analytical techniques have been developed for solving financial problems within the Company. The theory and practice of such methods will be examined in detail, together with ways of evaluating financial performance, alternative investment opportunities, financial risk and security pricing. The course is designed for junior credit analysts and security analysts in the fields of banking and finance who wish to gain a greater awareness of modern techniques. It is planned that the course will allow maximum participation by course members in addition to the more formal mode of instruction.

280. Introduction to Office Management. James Yue, A.D.P.A. (Exeter), A.C.I.S., Dip. M.S. (H.K.), A.M.B.I.M. Tuesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting January 11, 1977. Room 141, University Main Building. 7 meetings. Fee: \$70

The management of an office in a modern business enterprise may call for a variety of skills covering the human and technical aspects of management. This course has been designed for office supervisors and administrators who wish to gain a deeper knowledge of the systems and managerial and personnel problems involved in the direction of the modern office. Specific emphasis will be laid on the techniques of Organization and Methods, the use of Machines and Systems, Work Scheduling, Cost Control, Job Analysis and Evaluation, and problems of Human Relations.

281. Introduction to Operational Research. Frederick Mak Kam-wing B.Sc. (Eng.) (London), M.Eng. (Liverpool), Ph.D. (London), C.Eng., M.I.Mech.E., A.F.I.M.A. Thursdays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting January 20, 1977. Room 27, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$70

Operational Research is a most useful technique for all managers and administrators, enabling them to understand and use the more advanced methods of information collection, processing and control which lead to a more efficient organization. Students should have a basic knowledge of algebra but all other mathematical concepts will by explained. The course has been designed to suit those who have no previous knowledge of Operational Research and to act as an introductory course for those who wish to pursue more advanced studies in this area.

The course is designed to give an understanding of the theory underlying modern monetary systems and will be of special interest to those in banking, treasury and financial positions as well as to the general public who have some knowledge of economics. Topics covered are: Basic Monetary Concepts; Demand and Supply of Money; Inflation; Theories of Banking; Monetary Policy; International Money Markets.

284. Economics for Teachers. Paul J. T. F. Morris, B.Ed., Cert. Ed. (Leeds), M.Sc., Lecturer in Education, University of Hong Kong. Thursdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting March 10, 1977. Room 11, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$80

The course aims to clarify the basic concepts of Economics for teachers who are not primarily Economists, to analyse approaches to teaching and use of teaching aids, and to examine the methods of evaluating students. The course will combine an application of the essential concepts of Economics with a discussion analysis of appropriate methods of teaching the concepts to school children. The course is of special benefit to those teaching E.P.A. and Economics from Form III upwards.

285. How Hong Kong is fed: economics and marketing mechanisms of food supply. H. C. Tsoi, B. Agric. Econ. (N.E.U.), Agric. Planning & Project Dev. Cert. (U.N.), John K. W. Cheng, B. Econ. - 3. Diagnosis for the patient, by the doctor.
- 4. Prognosis and treatment allocation.
- 5. Experimentation in clinical medicine.
- 6. Assessment of clinical performance.

The course is designed in association with the Federation of Medical Societies of Hong Kong for practising doctors and statisticians interested in medical problems. Please write for further details.

288. Hong Kong Statistics for Businessmen. Mondays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting March 7, 1977. Room 223, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 9 meetings. Fee: \$200

This course has been developed in consultation with the Census and Statistics Department to put managers, administrators and planners in closer touch with the availability of statistical data in Hong Kong, with a view to discussing how such data may be used to assist in the conduct of business. The course is an integrated series of lectures/seminars by experts in the field. Topics to be covered: Population, labour supply, household income; Labour and prices: employment, unemployment, wages, earnings and consumer prices; External trade: indices, markets, products, elasticity of demand for Hong Kong exports, terms of trade; Industry: cost structure, inter-industry comparisons, censuses of production; Monetary sector: money supply, loans and advances, liquidity, interest rates, exchange rates; National accounts: G.D.P., current and constant price estimates; Applications of economic statistics: macro-economic, micro-economic; Use of Economic Indicators for business.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE COURSES

RETURN TO ENGLISH

It often happens that young people who completed their formal education a few years ago and who have been employed in office work ever since feel that they need to improve their English if they are going to develop as fully as they should in their work. The 'Return to English' courses are therefore intended for those who wish to improve their knowledge of English so that they can write and speak more fluently and understand written material and what is said to them without difficulty. The tutors will provide thorough tuition in writing, reading and speaking skills and also provide frequent opportunities to practice those aspects of English that most commonly present problems to those who have stopped studying the language for a few years.

This course is particularly recommended for those who propose to apply for a place in one of the Department's Certificate Courses in English for Business or the Use of English in the year 1977–78. The tuition that they will receive during it will be of value to them, but completion of the course will *not* exempt them from sitting the appropriate entrance examination.

The need for a greater command of English for professional purposes is rapidly becoming more apparent amongst some members of the medical profession in Hong Kong. The course in Basic Medical English is therefore designed to meet this need and to help those who attend it to overcome the problems that they may meet in communicating with others in English. The emphasis in this course will be placed on how to complete statutory medical forms, how to write simple notes and memoranda, reading medical texts and medical terms and vocabulary. A certain amount of attention will also be paid to General English and simple and practical oral communication.

This course will consist of sixty hours of intensive tuition in forty course meetings of $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours each, held twice a week. Those students who complete at least 75% of the course will be award a Certificate of Attendance on completion.

303. English Then and Now. A. W. T. Green, M.A. (Oxon.), Professor of English, and Mrs Mimi Chan, M.A. (H.K.), M.Phil. (Lond.), Senior Lecturer in English, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting January 26, 1977. Room 121, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$75

The English Language has not always been as we speak it today, but has been subject to many changes in the course of its history. This course will trace the history of the language from its origins and early development before the fourteenth century and will then go on to consider the language used six hundred years ago by Chaucer and his contemporaries, the development of modern dialects and changes in the meaning and structure of words and language forms, the English of Shakespeare's England and how it has developed since then, differing registers and styles in spoken English, changes in written English and their effect on both writers and their readers and the development of American and other varieties of 'overseas' English.

Students attending the course will be provided with relevant reading material and illustrations.

304. Approaches to Contemporary Poetry. R. Kirkpatrick, B.A. (Oxon.), Ph.D. (Cantab.), Lecturer in English, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting January 25, 1977. Room 217, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

This course will be an introduction to modern English poetry, particularly of the last twenty years, and those attending it will have an opportunity of considering the qualities of the poetry written during this period. The tutor will lead the discussions on the poetry considered and will clarify some of the difficulties that have arisen.

Some of the poets whose work will be examined—such as Philip Larkin and Ted Hughes—are already beginning to be recognized as important figures in the English tradition. The others are no doubt rather less well known, and so plenty of time will be allowed for discussion of their work to enable the class to form an opinion of their merits, or possibly their shortcomings.

Copies of the poems that are to be discussed will be made available.

In order to analys the changing social, economic, institutional and political conditions in China in the last century, as well as their interplay with western ideological, technological and political impacts, the following topics will be treated in detail: the mid-century uprisings in China; reforms and court politics; the growth of nationalism and ideological awakening; the revolutionary upsurge of 1911; the intellectual revolution; warlordism and Chiang Kai-shek's unification; foreign wars and civil wars; communism and socio-political transformation; China under Mao Tze-tung.

312. China and the West: Cultural Exchange and Intellectual Confrontation. John D. Young, B.A. (Hayward), M.A., Ph.D. (UC Davis). Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 3, 1977. Room 141, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$55

China's relations with the West stretch back to the remote past, and provide not only a fascinating story in its own right, but also greatly contributes to our understanding both of Modern China and of its present-day relations with the West. The following topics will be discussed: the Roman Empire and the Han Dynasty; Buddhism and Greco-Roman influence; Nestorial Christianity in T'ang China; the myth of Cathay: Marco Polo in China; Yuan Dynasty and its meaning for Europe; the Jesuits and the response to Christianity in Ming China: anti-Christian tradition; the Taipings and Christianity; the self-strengthening movement as the last stand of Chinese conservatism; 1898 Reform Movement: Chinese utopianism and radicalism; Sun Yat-sen and the West: republicanism and Christianity; the May 4th Movement and its legacy. 若將「古典音樂的認識與欣賞」作為西洋音樂欣賞之緒論,則「巴赫和巴赫時代的音樂」可當作緒論後之第一章。「古典音樂的認識與欣賞」簡略地涉及整個西歐音樂發展概況,各樂派之源流、風格及影響等,可作爲學習音樂史、樂曲形式和音樂欣賞之緒論。「巴赫和巴赫時代的音樂」則較詳細地討論十八世紀前半葉的音樂。

人們常把巴赫當作近代音樂之鼻祖,但更正確地來講,巴赫實在是音樂發展史裡一個長期演進的終點。他的作品所構成的是一座建築物之穹豪, 一座偉大廟宇的圓頂。因此,音樂史家稱巴赫為音樂領域裡最偉大的建築師。

巴赫作品極爲豐富,無論器樂或聲樂,皆稱上乘之作;全部對位法的數理音樂,雖樸實無華,但亦極爲抒情戲劇化;組織非常工整嚴密而均勻,旋律纖巧精緻,富於濃厚感情:這些都是巴赫風格之特色。在風琴領域裡,無人可與巴赫相比。他的賦格曲和力量渾厚的托卡塔亦是舉世無雙的;他的聖詠調前奏曲(Chorale—Preludes)是無價之實;他的十二平均律(Fortyeight Preludes and Fugues—Well-tempered Clavichord)是空前絕後的傑作。

巴赫整個族譜,從一五六〇年開始,直至一八七一年巴赫家族最後一人去世爲止,共三百餘年。在這三百餘年裡,巴赫家族產生了爲數不少的傑出音樂家,但無人可與 J.S. 巴赫相比。

本課程亦將略述意大利的 A. 司卡拉勞、法國的拉穆、英國的韓得爾的作品。講授輔以圖片、錄音帶、講義及樂譜,供學員參考分析之用。

The relation between music, movement and creative dance will be discussed first. 368. Introduction to Public Chinese Art Collections. Michael W. M. Lau, B.A., Dip.Ed., (HK), M.A., Ph.D. (Harvard), Museum Curator, Fung Ping Shan Museum, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 10.30 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting February 1, 1977. Lecture Room, Fung Ping Shan Museum, University of Hong Kong. 2 lectures, 3 guided museum visits plus one or two half-day visits to some special collections or exhibitions. Fee: \$65

Recently the various Hong Kong museums, have, as recognized by the art circle of the world, accumulated a substantial collection of art and have naturally become an attraction to overseas collectors and connoisseurs of Chinese art. For the convenience of the public who need guidance, lectures and museum visits will be conducted to provide a basic knowledge of these art collections, together with the necessary historical and cultural background, and techniques of identification. This course has been organized in co-operation with the Fung Ping Shan Museum.

LOCAL HISTORY

369. The Profile of old Hong Kong: 1841-1941. Carl T. Smith, B.A. (De Pauw), M.Div. (Union Theological Seminary). Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 1, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$65

This will be a survey course presenting the major internal developments from which emerged modern Hong Kong. To understand the forces operating in Hong Kong today one needs to know the factors in Hong Kong's history which produced them.

Beginning with the settlement of Hong Kong as an urban centre with distinct European and Chinese business and residential areas, consideration will be given to the development of business and finance within the Chinese community, the commercial activities of foreign firms and the establishment of industry; the social structure of the Chinese community and ethnic grouping of the foreign population; the Hong Kong countryside and the development of Kowloon as an urban centre; the function of such institutions as temples, schools, churches and clubs; the history of social problems including crime, triads, prostitution, gambling, coolie trade, drugs; structures developed by the Chinese community and by Government to bridge the gap between a Colonial administration and the general population; and Hong Kong in its relation to the Government of China and to overseas Chinese communities.

370. Understanding Chinese Customs and Traditions. Mrs Nana Tsao, B.A., Dip. Ed. (HK). Wednesdays, 3.00-4.30 p.m., starting January 26, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

This series of lectures is designed for those who wish to learn something of Chinese life and culture, with special reference to Hong Kong. Topics include historical background to understanding Chinese Customs and Traditions; Chinese family and kinship organization; religion; marriage and burial customs; and the festivals celebrated in Hong Kong. The lectures will be illustrated with slides and films.

371. Studies in Comparative Chinese and European Culture and Philosophy. Miss Margaret Ng, B.A., M.A. (H.K.), Ph.D. (Boston). Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting January 20, 1977. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$75

While the general perspective of this course is an objective presentation of the characteristics, spirit and creeds of Chinese and European cultures, where they agree and where they conflict with each other, discussion will concentrate mainly on the philosophical outlooks of these cultures on the following topics: individual and society; tradition and change; science and learning; virtue and happiness.

This course tries neither to be comprehensive nor didactic, but merely to provide an example of how our cultural background may be appraised and understood. Participants will be invited to further consider what they are, and what they may, or could want to be. No previous knowledge of philosophy is required.

372. Philosophy of Education. Dr. Ho Hsiu-hwang, Ph.D. (Michigan State), Lecturer in Philosophy, Chinese University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting January 26, 1977. Room 26, Central Market Building, Top Floor, Ilong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

A philosophical examination of the major basic concepts and fundamental problems in education will be conducted. Topics to be discussed will include the aims, content and justification of education; teaching and learning; general versus specialised education; and contemporary educational theories and philosophies.

373. Symbolic Logic and Scientific Methodology: Theory and Application. Dr. Ho Hsiu-hwang, Ph.D. (Michigan State), Lecturer in Philosophy, Chinese University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 7.40–9.10 p.m., starting January 26, 1977. Room 26, Central Market Building, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

This course investigates the basic concepts and problems in modern logic and scientific methodology. Topics to be discussed will be grouped into two categories:

- (a) Implications as the basic logical relation, formal language and semantical interpretation, axiomatic system and natural deduction system, and formal and informal systems;
- (b) The nature and structure of a theory, discovery and justification, presupposition and hypothesis, verification and confirmation, hypothetico-deductive method, law and explanation, and concept formation.

Stress will be put on the application of symbolic logic to scientific methodology, and the employment of scientific method to everyday life. As this is an introductory course, no previous training in logic or science is required.

374. The Philosophy of Wittgenstein. L. Goldstein, B.Arch., B.A. (Liv.), Lecturer in Philosophy, University of Hong Kong. Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 28, 1977. Room 248, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

It is usual to divide Ludwig Wittgenstein's philosophical life into two periods. In his early years Wittgenstein studied under Bertrand Russell at Cambridge and, in 1921, published *Tractatus Logico-Philosophicus*, a work on the relation between logic and language, of which it has been said that no philosophical classic is harder to master. After retiring from philosophy (thinking that in the *Tractatus* he had solved all the problems), Wittgenstein returned to Cambridge where he taught intermittently between 1930 and 1947. During this later period he published nothing, but several books reconstructed from his notes have appeared posthumously. In these works Wittgenstein employs a radically new method of philosophising, linguistic analysis, that has since proved extremely fertile.

Main themes from both periods of Wittgenstein's career will be examined and some attention will be paid to the relevance of his work to other areas such as psychology and anthropology.

375. The Development of Modern Logic. L. Goldstein, B.Arch., B.A. (Liv.), Lecturer in Philosophy, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting March 1, 1977. Room 228, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

To-day logic is flourishing. Logical techniques are being used for such diverse enterprises as the design of computer circuits, the analysis of natural languages and the investigation of quantum mechanics. But the road to this happy state of affairs, though sometimes paved with gold has also, on occasion, been strewn with boulders. There have been periods of tremendous productive activity when great advances were made, but there have also been long periods when the subject stagnated. In tracing this route we shall do enough logic to appreciate the staggering achievements of logicians such as Aristotle, Frege and Godel. We shall also try to illustrate what obstacles hindered progress, and how these were overcome.

每個時代都有其佔主導地位的思想體系左右着人們的意識和價值觀念,從而影响社會總體的發展。就現代來說,自由主義和馬克思主義逼兩套對立的理論,在工業革命的推展下,正分別做成巨大的歷史變遷,改變了人類社會的面貌,其重要性十分明顯。本課程將介紹它們的源流、要點以及發展;並從民衆的立場出發,以民主這個原則對兩派理論作檢討和剖析。推論時,將盡量引用近代史實來加以說明。

378. Basic Principles of Psychology. Brian W. B. Lui, B.A. (Berea), M.Ed. (Toronto). Thursdays, 6.15-7.15 p.m., starting March 3, 1977. Room 228, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$70

This introductory course is designed for those who wish to acquire a general understanding of the basic principles of psychology. The focus of the course is on the human aspects and the practical implications of the discipline. Major topics include: general methods and concepts of psychology; human development, nature and theories of intelligence, and intellectual assessment; learning, thinking, and cognition; personality theories and human motivation; social behaviour, deviance, and group dynamics.

379. Child Development. Farideh Salili, Ph.D. (Ill.). Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting January 24, 1977. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$70

This course is designed to highlight major aspects of human development from infancy to adolescence, in the light of both internal and external factors influencing the growing process. Main topics to be discussed are: maturation and learning; deprivation; child-rearing practices; Piagetian stages of development; language development; social and moral development and the concept of self.

Findings from recent researches will be used for illustration, and participants are encouraged to bring in cases for discussion.

380. The Work of Careers Teachers. Saturdays, 10.00 a.m.—12 noon, starting January 22, 1977. Extra-Mural Town Centre. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$100

Tutors: Dr. Mary-kaye Heisler, Director of Counselling, Hong Kong International School.

Miss Ada Wong, Student Counsellor, University of Hong Kong.

Mr. Jacland Lai, Chairman, Hong Kong Association of Careers Masters.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ko, Appointments and Careers Counsellor, Chinese University of Hong Kong.

This course is intended for practising careers teachers in secondary schools in Hong Kong. The course content and the format of presentation are designed with a view to enable participants to have a firmer grounding in and a higher sensitivity to careers guidance, including underlying theories, practical aspects, roles, problems, and local resources. Participants are expected to share actively in discussions, problem solving sessions and video tapings.

This course is co-sponsored by the Hong Kong Association of Career Masters, and is open to practising careers teachers.

Enrolment is limited to 30.

381. Psychology and Industrial Training. Henry S. R. Kao, B.A. (National Taiwan), M.S. (West Virginia), Ph.D. (Wisconsin), Lecturer in Psychology, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting April 12, 1977. Room 121, Main Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$60

This course consists of two parts; the first half will centre around the various psychological theories on learning and teaching, with emphasis on the principles that have direct bearing on the development of training programmes. The second half will focus on such practical aspects as the development, and implementation of training programmes and curricula, and evaluation of their effectiveness. Lecture topics will include: principles of human learning; assessment of training needs; programme preparation; programmed instruction; programme administration; and programme evaluation and improvement.

Fee Refunds will be available to teachers performing the duties of Careers Teachers in member schools of the Hong Kong Association of Careers Masters in the case of Course No. 380, and to teachers in technical secondary schools in the case of Course No. 381. 385. The Hong Kong Political System: an Introduction. S. N. G. Davies, B.Sc. (Econ.) (Wales), M.Sc. (Econ.) (London), Lecturer in Political Science, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting January 26, 1977. Room 229, Knowles Building. University of Hong Kong. 6 meetings.

Fee: \$35

An attempt will be made to introduce the interested student to Hong Kong's political system. The analysis of the system will take place within a theoretical framework which seeks to evaluate the claims for the representativeness and the responsiveness of the Hong Kong system made by official and unofficial supporters. It will also evaluate the criticisms that have been levelled at the system in recent publications such as the Association for Radical East Asian Studies', Hong Kong: A Case to Answer, and Joe England's Fabian Pamphlet, Hong Kong: Britain's Responsibility.

386. Mao Tse-tung: Marxist and Traditional Chinese Influences. Jerome Hill, B.A. (Oakland), M.A. (Michigan). Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting March 30, 1977. Room 229, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$55

What Mao Tse-tung did and how Mao Tse-tung thought have become focal issues because he was the man who transformed China and influenced the world. The focus of the lectures will be on traditional Chinese philosophy and classical Marxist philosophy, and their influence on the thought of Mao. The major themes will be: the Confucian Tradition; the Marxist Influence; Concepts of Contradiction, on Practice, and Class Struggle; and Theory of Revolution, all these being discussed from a philosophical viewpoint with the relevant political perspective being stressed.

387. 中國共產黨現階段的路線鬥爭

(The Struggles among the Different Lines of Thought in the Chinese Communist Party after 1950)

388. Spectroscopy in Chemistry. Michael Sammes, B.Sc., Ph.D. (Lond), D.I.C., A.R.C.S., M.R.I.C., Lecturer in Chemistry, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting March 2, 1977. Chemistry Building, first floor Lecture Theatre, University of Hong Kong. 8 meetings including laboratory sessions.

Nowadays, most information concerning the structure and identity of chemical substances is obtained by spectroscopic methods rather than by chemical tests. Thus elementary spectroscopy is included in the majority of modern 6th form syllabuses, so that students who discontinue chemistry on leaving school are aware of the tools used by modern chemists.

This course, designed primarily for science teachers of sixth forms, aims to introduce the main spectroscopic methods currently in use by chemists, and to give participants some experience in running and interpreting spectra.

The course will cover elementary theory, instrumentation, and the information available from the following spectroscopies; atomic absorption; x-ray fluorescence; ultraviolet/visible; infrared; mass; nuclear magnetic resonance. Infrared spectroscopy will be examined in the most detail.

Fee Refund: Teachers of Chemistry in the sixth form who wish to attend the above course may apply for a fee refund from the Director of Education. Applicants are required to complete an application form (obtainable from the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong) which must be returned directly to the Director of Education before the commencement of the course. This applies to all teachers whether in Government, aided or private schools.

389. Electronics for Teachers. M. K. Summers, B.Sc. (Birmingham), M.Sc. (Bristol), Cert.Ed. (Oxon), Lecturer in Education (Physics), University of Hong Kong. Fridays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting February 25, 1977. Room 113, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$200

This course will provide an introduction to practical electronics for secondary school physics teachers of forms four, five and six. There will be a strong emphasis on construction techniques, and each participant will build and test electronic equipment for direct use in classroom teaching. The course fee includes materials and components worth approximately \$100. Completed equipment may be taken home.

Please note that this course is specifically intended for teachers with little or no previous experience of this kind of work. Practising electronics enthusiasts are *not* encouraged to apply.

Tutor: P. P. Melwani, B.Sc. (Eng.) (H.K.)

These courses aim to provide an explanation of how computer systems operate. They are designed for people who have no previous knowledge of computers and are especially suitable for people thinking of taking up data processing as a career, as well as those employees whose work involves contact with computer systems. It may be considered as a preliminary to the 'Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming'.

爲使各學員盡量得益,務須自發地熱烈參與全部課程。每班只限收十 八名。 399. The Use of Groups in Clinical and Educational Contexts. Peter M. Whyte, Dean of Students, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.00–8.30 p.m., starting March 1, 1977. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$95

This will be a course with the emphasis heavily on practical participation. Commencing with a three-session Micro-Laboratory Training the participants will be involved in a continuous alternation of experience, and analysis of the experience. Some theory of group dynamics and some discussion of the application of group work in different contexts will be included. However the overriding purpose of the series is for participants to achieve understanding of the use, the dynamics and the goals of groups through their own direct experience.

Since a group depends on its wholeness for proper functioning, punctuality is most important, particularly in the first three sessions. Workers in the clinical, educational and youth work settings would find the course especially beneficial.

Enrolment is limited to 24.

400. Social Welfare Programme Planning and Proposal-Writing in Hong Kong. Rev. Paul R. Webb, B.A. (W. Ontario), M.S.W., Adv.Dip. in Social Work (Toronto), B.D. (St. Andrew's College), Assistant Director (Planning and Development), Hong Kong Council of Social Service. Wednesdays, 6.15-8.15 p.m., starting March 2, 1977. Room 209, Duke of Windsor Social Service Building, 15 Hennessy Road, 2nd Floor, Wanchai, Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$85

In recent years, and especially in the past 5 years, planning for social welfare services has been developing rapidly. First came the White Paper on "Aims & Policy for Social Welfare in Hong Kong". Then followed the Appreciation of Social Welfare Services, "The Way Ahead", Five Year Plan, Programme Plans and now Development Plans. In addition, physical and social planning for New Towns has been receiving more and more attention.

The purpose of this course is to enable the participants to have a better understanding of these plans, the planning process, the classification of services, the collection of data and the value of research in planning. Related to planning is the writing of proposals for projects to be included in the above Plans and/or for support from the administration of an agency or from a funding source. An opportunity to participate in a simulated planning or proposal-writing exercise will be included. Middle to senior level administrators or supervisors of voluntary agencies or Government Departments would find this course particularly beneficial.

402. Marriage and the Family in Contemporary China. Stephen Tomlin, B.A. (East Anglia). Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting January 26, 1977. Room 27, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$70

This course is designed for those interested in the development of policy and practice towards marriage and family relationships in Contemporary China.

Preliminary discussion will focus on the structure of the family, lineage, clan, and marriage in Traditional China, concentrating on the nature of family authority and the arrangement of marriage. Secondly, the course will briefly consider the influence of radical movements in the 1911–49 period on the family and marriage.

The main emphasis of the course will be on policy and practice in the People's Republic of China. Detailed discussion will concentrate on the tutor's recent research on marriage practices in Kwangtung Province. Attention will focus on the process of spouse-selection, the arrangement and economics of marriage, and the relationship between families. These topics will be discussed in the context of the Marriage Law of 1950, its achievements and failures, and subsequent political campaigns and changes of policy.

At the end of each meeting a brief discussion will concentrate on comparisons with Hong Kong.

Certificate in Housing Management

The aim is to provide a local qualification in Housing Management for people already working in the field and for others hoping to take up housing management as a career. The course is intended to provide a firm grounding in the theory and practice of housing management.

The standard and content of the course and its examinations are designed to be the equivalent of the Diploma in Housing Management sponsored by the United Kingdom Institute of Housing. The syllabus is related to that of the Institute but is strongly geared to local relevance.

The course runs over three academic years. Year I prepares candidates for the Intermediate Examination and Years II and III for the Final Examinations.

A Certificate in Housing Management, issued by the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong, will be awarded to a candidate on passing the Final Examination and on producing evidence of having had at least three years' approved experience in housing management work.

Applications for 1977–78 must be submitted before March 31, 1977. Preference will be given to applicants sponsored by their employers.


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GROUND PLAN OF UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG MAIN BUILDING
