

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. There are normally no entry requirements except that applicants should be over 18 years of age. Occasionally to have the full benefit of a course applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Applicants are therefore advised to read the description of a course carefully. Professional courses usually have clearly defined entry requirements.

2. The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant.

- 3. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held:
 - (a) on any public holidays.
 - (b) at a storm warning signal of No. 8 or above. (After the typhoon passes, if the No. 8 signal is lowered before 3 p.m., classes will take place as normal. If the signal is lowered after 3 p.m., classes will be cancelled that evening.)
 - (c) during the following holiday periods: December 21, 1978 to January 3, 1979 inclusive (Christmas and New Year).
 January 27-February 2, 1979 inclusive (Lunar New Year).

4. Fees are not refundable once the course has commenced.

5. Certificates of Attendance are issued, on payment of 50 cents, to those who have attended not less than two-thirds of a course of at least 20 meetings in duration.

6. Closing date for enrolment: one week before the starting date of a course. Late enrolments may not be accepted.

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Archaeology

39. A Basic Course in Archaeology with Reference to Hong Kong. S. M. Bard, O.B.E., E.D., M.B., B.S., Hon.D.Litt. (H.K.), J.P., Executive Secretary, Antiquities and Monuments, Urban Services Department. Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 27, 1978. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 10 meetings plus 2 museum visits and 3 field trips. Fee: \$150

Instruction will cover the fossil record of early man and the general field of prehistory, archaeological techniques, and questions of chronology in relation to tools and pottery. The emphasis will be on the practical aspects of the subject and the talks will be illustrated by slides and specimens which can be handled by the student. The latter part of the course will deal with the prehistory of Hong Kong and will be related to recent finds.

The cost of field trips is included in the fee.

Enrolment is limited to 30 persons.

UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE

The attention of extra-mural students is drawn to the following regulation of the University of Hong Kong regarding admission to the University:

'A mature person without formal academic qualifications who is aged 30 or over on September 1 of the year in which admission is sought may be exempted completely from University entrance requirements and be eligible for admission to read for a first degree except in the Faculty of Medicine. Art & Design

Courses in Art & Design and related areas are open to students of all levels of development unless otherwise stated.

BASICS OF ART & DESIGN

40. The Basics of Art & Design

"The Basics of Art & Design" consists of three constituent courses. A limited number of places will be available for students wishing to take only one of these constituent courses. Such applicants will be notified as to whether or not a place is available approximately one week before the commencement of the course. Applicants wanting advice as to whether to pursue the course as a whole or merely one part can consult the Staff Tutor in Art & Design.

The Basics of Art & Design course is designed for those seriously interested in pursuing the study and practice of art and design. It consists of three constituent courses, viz. Two-Dimensional Design, Freehand Drawing in Various Media, and Introduction to the History of Western Art. Details of these courses are given below. Taken together they provide a range of studies which will enable students, whatever the nature of their previous art education, to develop their talents and interests.

Students successfully completing 'The Basics of Art & Design' may embark, if they so wish, on the 'Certificate Course in the Foundations of Art & Design,' which is arranged on a modular basis. Full details of this programme can be obtained by phoning or writing to the Staff Tutor in Art & Design.

Closing date for applications: September 12, 1978. In the event of oversubscription an interview may be required on September 19, 1978.

41. Two Dimensional Design. Diana Taylor, M.A. (R.C.A.). Thursdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1978. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 24 meetings. Fee: \$275

Basic Design is more an attitude of mind rather than a method, shaped by enquiry, not formula. Participants will develop a direct understanding of the fundamental qualities inherent in line, form, space, colour, mass and texture through practical studio and project work. The concern will be to expose the students to the formal problems of handling marks whatever the media, in order to produce desired effects. It is hoped that through this course students will develop a "sense of design" which will strengthen their own artistic pursuits as well as broadening their appreciation of visual realities.

Students should note that to get full benefit from the course they should be prepared to do homework assignments.

42. Freehand Drawing in Various Media. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 26, 1978. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 24 meetings. Fee: \$325

Drawing is the thinking process in the language of visual art; it is the basis of all visual communication and expression. The emphasis in this course will be on learning to see, think, and communicate through visual means. Through a series of exercises in the first part of the course students will gain an understanding of the more concrete elements of line, tone, movement, texture, pictorial and modelled space as well as uses of a variety of materials including graphite, charcoal, conté crayon, oil and wax crayons, inks, paints, felt pens, and others. Mid-way through the course emphasis will be placed on the more abstract elements of plastic space, colour, self-expression and visual problem solving.

Students should note that there will be a minimum of four to six hours of homework each week, and should plan their time accordingly in order to gain full benefit from the course. Students who attend class sessions, and complete homework assignments regularly will find by the end of the course that they are able to approach any drawing subject with confidence and skill.

Enrolment is limited to 17 persons. Applications must be received by September 16, 1978, and in the event of oversubscription, interviews will be held on September 21, 1978.

43. Introduction to the History of Western Art. Valeric Martin, B.Sc. (Leeds). Tuesdays, 8.15-9.45 p.m., starting September 26, 1978. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 24 meetings. Fee: \$150

This course is a general introduction to Western Art from pre-dynastic Egypt to the present day. Emphasis will be on the mythological, historical and cultural origins of the art of different periods so that students may appreciate the aims as well as the achievements of the artists. The course will range freely over sculpture, architecture, and the other arts where appropriate, but the main stress will be on the study of painting.

PRACTICAL STUDIO COURSES IN ART & DESIGN

These are practical studio classes in the Visual Arts with emphasis on artistic skills and creative growth of the individual. Work will be carried out in the various media described.

Students must provide all necessary materials, some of which will be available for purchase through the department. Materials will be discussed at the first class meeting.

44. Introduction to Three-Dimensional Design. Diana Taylor, M.A. (R.C.A.). Thursdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1978. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 24 meetings. Fee: \$275

By reducing the various aspects of three-dimensional design to a few fundamental principles, it becomes possible to study each in isolation, thus acquiring an understanding and control of their separate strengths. In order to sharpen awareness and understanding of form, construction and materials, and to bring individuality to bear on the practical studio work, a series of exercises and projects will explore aspects of design separately, using simple materials and techniques in expressive ways. Individuals will learn from each other's development and group discussion will figure in the process.

Students should note that there will be homework assignments, and should plan their time accordingly.

45. Life Drawing. Peter Chancellor, Dip. A.D. (Birmingham), A.T.D. (London). Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 27, 1978. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$190 including model fee

Drawing from the human figure provides a discipline which develops visual perception and correlation of hand and eye. This course will include basic anatomy and drawing from life. A variety of media will be used including crayon, chalk, ink, pencil and paint and students will be encouraged to try a variety of graphic techniques to the point of experimentation. Reference to artists both old and modern will be made. Beginners and more advanced students are welcome.

Enrolment is limited to 17 students.

46. Life Drawing. Karen McKeon, D.A. (Edin.). Fridays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting September 29, 1978. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$190 including model fee

Drawing from the human figure and nature provides a discipline which develops visual perception and correlation of hand and eye. Regular practice, even by the most experienced artist, is essential to sustain ability. This course will include anatomy, life drawing, draped figure, and head studies. A variety of media including pencil, conte crayon, and ink will be used, and the approaches of line, tone, volume, movement and others, will be incorporated into the studies. This course is open to both beginners and more advanced students.

Enrolment is limited to 17 students.

47. Landscape Painting Workshop. Robert O'Brien, Dip.A.D. Mondays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 25, 1978. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

Landscape offers an endless variety of forms, texture and colour, and is a most exciting subject for artistic interpretation. This course is intended for those who wish to develop their inherent painting skills while focusing on the landscape as subject matter. Experiments with various media, including cut paper, drawing, and painting materials will help the students develop their faculties for making decisions about media and form and will encourage spontaneity and originality of response and expression. Homework will be set each week, and, if dates can be agreed upon, field trips to various sites will be arranged.

Enrolment is limited to 18 persons.

48. Introduction to Traditional Watercolour Painting. Karen McKeon, D.A. (Edin.). Mondays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 25, 1978. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

With still-life, nature objects, sketches and other figurative subjects as take-off points, students will explore techniques basic to traditional watercolour painting, including: washes, glazing, dry brush, layering, and others. Specific projects will be set each week which will facilitate growth in and understanding of the media.

Students should be prepared to do some homework, including preparatory sketches.

49. Experimental Watercolour Painting. Philip Seth, B.F.A. (S.F. Art Inst.). Tuesdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 26, 1978. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

The physical nature of watercolour is such that there are quite a variety of effects which can be achieved through a number of techniques. In this course, students will explore these techniques and discover the results derived through the use of materials such as transparent and opaque watercolour, watercolour pencils, acrylics, dyes and inks and combinations thereof, on Western and Oriental papers, and on canvas. As effects are discovered, students will be encouraged to apply them to assignments or to use them in free compositions. Emphasis will be placed on experimentation. Students should be prepared to do a limited amount of homework.

50. Painting Workshop in Oil, Acrylic, and Related Media. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Thursdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1978. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$160 including model fee

Through paint, and the related media of collage, drawing, transfer and others, students in this intermediate level course will explore aesthetic and philosophic concepts of painting. Emphasis will be placed on learning to discover and communicate one's own ideas through visual and technical means. The basic questions of materials, composition, and use of colour will be discussed throughout the course, and students will receive guidance on how to set and achieve their aims in painting. As painting is an ongoing activity, students at various levels of skill and experience are welcome, but it should be pointed out that some previous experience in drawing, design or other related subjects is essential, and it is expected that students will do a minimum of six hours homework each week. The studio will remain open until 9.30 p.m. so that students wishing to continue work begun that evening can do so.

In the event of oversubscription an interview will be required.

51. Introduction to Chinese Painting. Harold Wong. Thursdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1978. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 24 meetings. Fee: \$275

The general use of materials, subtle variations of ink tones, and application of colours will be taught in the first part of this course. Dots and lines are the essence from which rocks, mountains, and trees are formed; freer brushwork is sometimes preferred on flower and bird painting, and these traditional approaches to Chinese painting will be covered in the second part of this course. It is hoped that by the end of the course students will be able to apply these techniques to creative painting concepts of their own. Demonstrations will be given and students are expected to paint both during class time and at home. Critiques will be held on students' work.

Students taking this course will greatly benefit if they also enrol for Course No. 79, Appreciation and History of Chinese Landscape Painting, which is offered earlier the same evening.

Enrolment is limited to 18 students, and in the event of oversubscription an interview may be required.

52. The Basics of Silkscreen Printmaking. Diana Lin, B.F.A. (S.F. Art Inst.). Wednesdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 27, 1978. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$205

Silkscreen is an exciting and versatile printmaking media in which a wide range of effects can be achieved with a relatively minimal financial investment in tools and equipment. This comprehensive course is designed to introduce silkscreening in both its technical and artistic capacities. It will include step by step demonstrations in the uses of the basic equipment; practical application of such stencil making techniques as tusche, block-out methods, paper stencils, and hand-cut film stencils; multicolour work; the printing operation and use of inks; and washing-up. There will also be periodic field trips to exhibitions and artists' studios or screen processing factories, and discussions of the aesthetics of commercial and fine art sample works. Students will participate in critiques of class work with the aim of increasing their awareness of the expressive nature of silkscreen prints, and visual expression in general. Students will be expected to provide many of their own materials. Inks and sundries for use during class sessions will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

Enrolment is limited to 17 persons.

53. Introduction to Mixed-Media Printmaking. Sylvia Weiss, A.T.C (Univ. of London). Thursdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 28, 1978 Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$16:

Simple experimental printmaking is a creative art form suitable for those with little or no previous art and design experience. Through various techniques such as monoprint, collage, stencil, lino and woodblock, students will explore pattern, shape, texture, colour and line, and will produce both monochrome and multi-colour prints. This course is so planned that students will easily be able to continue exploration of the subject on their own.

Students will be expected to provide most drawing and cutting materials. Some inks and sundries will be provided and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

Enrolment is limited to 20 persons.

54. Children's Arts and Crafts Activities: a Workshop for Adults. Sylvia Weiss, A.T.C. (Univ. of London). Tuesdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 26, 1978. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$160

It is important for a child's growth and development to have creative activities, such as arts and crafts, integrated into home and school life. Such activities help develop a child's creativity, dexterity, and intellect. This course is designed for parents, teachers, and other adults who work with pre-school, and school-age children, and will demonstrate art and craft activities suitable for these age groups. Emphasis will be on the uses of simple, inexpensive, materials and the students themselves will participate in a variety of projects in order to better understand the basic concepts and techniques.

Students will be expected to provide most of their own tools and materials. Some paints and papers for use during class time will be provided and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

55. Architectural Drawing. Ruth Addison, A.R.I.B.A. (London). Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 26, 1978. Room II, Evtra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, III Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 24 meetings. Fee: \$275

Architectural drawing is a basic form of communication among architects, builders, interior designers, and others. It is an international language. The basic concepts, skills, and techniques of architectural drawing will be explored through a series of exercises in ink and pencil. These exercises include: orthograph, axometric and asometric projections, the casting of shadows, drawing in perspective, and lettering, as well as the use of architectural drawing instruments. 56. Interior Decoration. Ramon O. Lorenzana, B.F.A. (Univ. of Santo Tomas). Wednesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting September 27, 1978. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

Intended as a basic introduction to the skill of interior decoration, this course will cover: concepts of technical drawing including plans and elevations, basic design, proportion and scale, effects of colour and colour schemes, and materials and finishes. Assignments will be concentrated on residential and small office projects. Students should note that they will be expected to work at least five hours a week outside of class. Following this course there will be a further 12-week project-orientated course in which the skills and concepts introduced here will find greater application.

Enrolment is limited to 22 students, and in the event of oversubscription an interview will be required.

57. Introduction to Graphic Design. Peter Chancellor, Dip. A.D. (Birmingham), A.T.D. (London). Wednesdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 27, 1978. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 24 meetings. Fee: \$275

The principles of two dimensional design will be discussed in relation to graphic design. Following this, the basic graphic elements will be used in a project incorporating posters, logos, television graphics, etc. to create simple, but effective designs. In addition students will study and discuss what worthwhile graphic communication involves. There will also be a visit to a design studio to see at first hand how graphic projects are developed in a professional environment.

There will be homework assignments and students should plan their time accordingly.

58. A Guide to Photography. Andrew Mitchell. Wednesdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting September 27, and November 1, 1978. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 5 meetings. Fee: \$65

Not everyone wants to be a photographer, but most people like to take pictures. This course will help the amateur to take better pictures. Types of cameras, lenses, films, and accessories will be discussed, as will the basics of composition, lighting, and selective focussing. If time permits there will also be an introduction to the developing and printing of black and white photographs. 59. Introduction to Photography. Andrew Mitchell. Thursdays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting September 28, 1978. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, III Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$170

Aimed at those with a serious interest in photography as a vehicle for expression and communication, this course will cover the basic studio and darkroom techniques of black and white, and colour photography as well as choices of equipment and materials. In addition, theories of photography, both aesthetic and philosophic, will be explored. Students will be expected to experiment in the media, and class critiques will be held on the results of these.

Students must provide their own cameras. Basic darkroom materials and supplies to be used during class sessions will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

60. Photography: an Intermediate Course. Philip Tse. Mondays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting September 25, 1978. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, III Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$205

In recent years photography has come to be accepted as a fine art form in its own right. The emphasis in this course will be on 'creativity and aesthetics', and is designed for those already familiar with the basic technical aspects of photography and photographic equipment. While most of the work will deal with black and white photography, colour processing will be introduced. There will be four class field trips to a variety of sites on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, and class critiques will be held on the results of these as well as of studio and independent work.

61. Photography as an Aid to the Graphic Designer. Philip Tse. Tuesdays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting September 26, 1978. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$175

Photography, because it achieves optical effects never known before, plays a vital part today in designer's work, and techniques of photographics open up completely new vistas. Tuition will include studio and darkroom procedure within the designer's capabilities, detailing some of the many effects which can be achieved by simple manipulation at the developing and printing stages. Colour work, distortion of straightforward images, special screening effects, photo layout, photo mural, graphic art photography, photo dyeing techniques and advertising photography will be discussed. Emphasis will be on practical darkroom work, and there will be a visit to a printer's darkroom.

This intermediate level course is intended for those with a basic knowledge of darkroom procedure. Papers, chemicals and other materials for use during class time will be supplied, and the cost of these has been included in the course fee.

Enrolment is limited to 15 persons, and in the event of oversubscription an interview will take place on September 19, 1978.

68. An Introduction to Design and Drawing. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.) and Diana Taylor, M.A. (R.C.A.). Mondays and Wednesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting September 25, 1978. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 24 meetings. (12 weeks) Fee: \$295

The experience of previous years has shown that there is a need for a basic introductory course in Two-Dimensional Design and Freehand Drawing, as these are the grammar and language of visual art.

Students will experiment with line, space, and compositional layout. They will also explore visual illusion, and the uses of colour and tone. By analyzing various examples of two-dimensional art they will develop a 'sense of design' which will heighten their appreciation of art works, as well as improve their own design skills. Through a series of basic drawing exercises students will begin to 'learn to see' as well as develop the dexterity skills necessary to record and express what they see. They will explore a wide range of techniques, materials, and visual subjects.

Students should note that there will be approximately four to six hours of homework each week.

A workshop designed to introduce the beginner to the fundamentals of camera usage, lighting, film and paper characteristics, film developing, contact printing, enlarging, editing and print finishing. Field trips and weekly assignments will allow experimentation with picture-taking and darkroom techniques. In order to get full benefit from this course students must be prepared to do work outside of class time.

Enrolment will be limited to 15 persons. The cost of materials to be used during class sessions is included in the course fee.

This course will broadly cover the fundamentals of materials and techniques for beginners and offer a challenge to the more ambitious painter.

A chief merit of prints is their ability to meet the human mind on a simple level of appreciation and to lure it on to a more complex level of enjoyment as one's comprehension increases. This course will give the student an introduction to those techniques of woodblock printmaking and mixed-media printing, which will enable the student to carry on in the media beyond the level which can be attained in twelve meetings. Both monochrome, and multicolour prints will be produced, and class critiques will be held on these. In addition there will be discussions on both traditional and contemporary Western and Japanese woodblock prints.

These are lecture and discussion courses open to all students regardless of previous Art History study.

75. Concepts and Derivations of Modern Art. Robert O'Brien, Dip. A.D. Mondays, 8.15–9.45 p.m., starting September 25, 1978. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$100

In order to appreciate the art of our own time it is necessary to consider some of the principles by which it operates, rather than to be mystified by it or to reject it outright. Modern art, though often baffling and apparently obscure, has its roots in, and relates to "traditional" art. In this series of illustrated lectures, ways of looking at painting and sculpture will be discussed, and the elements of form, light, space, colour, content and technique, will be examined with a view towards gaining a deeper understanding of what has given rise to current art forms. 76. Romanticism. Carolyn Diskant Muir, B.A. (Wellesley), M.A. (Univ. of Penn.). Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting September 27, 1978. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$90

The late 18th and early 19th centuries marked the period of European art known as Romanticism. Characterized by a growing historical awareness and an interest in the expression of spontaneous emotion, the Romantic era saw revivals of ancient and medieval styles in the visual arts. This illustrated course will deal with theories treated by Romantic artists, such as the hero, death, nature, and the portrait. The visual arts' relationship to contemporary philosophy, literature, and politics will also be discussed. The work of such artists as David, Géricault, Ingres, Delacroix, Goya, Turner, and Constable will be considered within the context of these problems.

Textbook: Romantic Art, by William Vaughan, published by Thames and Hudson (Paperback), will be available at the Hong Kong Book Centre, Des Voeux Road Central, Hong Kong.

77. Understanding Ukiyo-e. Henry Steiner, M.F.A. (Yale). Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting September 25, 1978. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 6 meetings. Fee: \$60

The 200 year history of Japanese woodblock prints represents one of man's most satisfying visual achievements. This short course provides an introduction to this vital art form, dealing with the historic and technical background and investigating the main themes, including actors, women, landscape, and erotic subjects.

The teacher is both a graphic designer and print collector. Numerous colour transparencies will accompany the lectures.

78. Chinese Woodblock Printmaking. David Chau. Mondays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting November 6, 1978. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, III Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 6 meetings. Fee: \$60

The tradition of Chinese woodblock printing dates back more than 1,000 years to the T'ang Dynasty. While some blocks were used to print books and special paper, the majority were representations of Chinese folk culture and religion. In designs that have remained unchanged for centuries, the prints and woodblocks to be discussed in this course depict gods, traditional charms, prayers, and talismans associated with Taoism and Buddhism, as well as those for common use. Through study of the prints students can get a glimpse into the ways, wisdom, and lives of the common Chinese people. In addition to slides, this course will be illustrated by actual prints, blocks, and tools.

Some of the pieces in Mr. Chau's collection have been featured in recent exhibits and magazine articles.

79. History and Appreciation of Chinese Landscape Painting. Harold Wong. Thursdays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting September 28, 1978. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$100

"Nature is vast, infinite, and eternal." The love of mountains and water in Chinese art found its fullest expression in landscape painting through the ages. The early "primitive" landscape reached maturity by the 10th Century. The subsequent development into a more calligraphic approach, the handling of space, and the treatment of themes are among the major topics to be discussed and will be illustrated by original art as well as slides and books.

80. Introduction to Chinese Architecture and Landscape Design. Shun Kai Tse, B.Arch. (Berkeley), Dip. of Tropical Studies (A.A. London). Fridays, 7.00–8.30 p.m., starting September 29, 1978. Room 847, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings and 2 field trips. Fee: \$100

Architecture is a social art. By studying the architecture of a civilization, one can understand its people and their attitude towards life. Chinese architecture, like many other Chinese art forms, has a glorious past, which the course will illustrate by briefly discussing its history, design principles, and philosophical and artistic bases. The influence on the West in the 18th Century will be discussed, and comparisons drawn with Japan and elsewhere. Two visits will be organized to some traditional Chinese buildings and gardens and the dates of these will be set at the first class session. The cost of these visits is not included in the fee. 81. Seedlings in the Desert: An Historical View of the Creative Arts in Hong Kong. Carl T. Smith, B.A. (De Pauw), M. Div. (Union Theological Seminary). Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting September 26, 1978. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8th floor, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$90

The development of both the visual and performing arts in Hong Kong, with particular emphasis on the period before the Pacific War, will be discussed. The topics to be covered in this illustrated course include: the variety of venue, sponsorship and promotion of the arts, amateur and professional artists and groups, visiting artists, and ethnic and national specialities. In addition, reference will be made to causes of changing styles in the arts, and comparison of these with some in other parts of the world.

82. Sights and Sounds of Chinese Opera. Helga Berger, Programme Director, Hong Kong Arts Centre. Wednesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting September 27, 1978. Hong Kong Arts Centre, Harbour Road, Wanchai, Hong Kong. 6 meetings. Fee: \$60

China has brought forth myriad local styles of operas topped by the highly perfectioned abstract theatre of the Peking opera. The basic principles of Peking opera in contrast to local styles are introduced together with samples of music, as music is their major difference. The amazing high standard of systematisation of every part of the Chinese opera be it the management, hierarchy in a troupe, division of roles, behaviour on stage and backstage will be discussed. In addition, the visually exciting elements of the costumes, and face decoration will also be examined.

Courses Nos. 83 to 98 are designed to be of assistance to those preparing for the examinations of the Association of Certified Accountants, the Institute of Cost and Management Accountants and the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators. The courses are a complement to, not a substitute for, correspondence courses. Students should make their own arrangements for sitting the relevant examinations.

83. Financial Accounting I: Foundation Stage. J. D. Lane, M.A., A.C.I.S., A.I.B. Thursdays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting September 14, 1978. Room 103, University Main Building. 14 meetings. Fee: \$120

Students who are embarking on the study of accounting and have little or no previous experience of the subject will find this course valuable. The intention is, however, that the course will follow the syllabus of the A.C.C.A. Accounting I paper, in preparation for the 1978 examination.

The main topics covered are as follows: the principles involved in the keeping of records of financial transactions, the trial balance and the final accounts of sole traders and partnerships, capital and revenue expenditure, elements of depreciation, accruals and prepayments, the accounts of non-trading institutions, manufacturing accounts, departmental accounts and an introduction to the accounts of companies. In addition, topical aspects in relation to Accounting will be discussed.

84. Intermediate Accounting. Warren Lowe, Dip. Tech. (Comm.), A.A.S.A., A.H.K.S.A. Tuesdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting October 3, 1978. Room 103, University Main Building. 11 meetings. Fee: \$100

Partnership accounts, including change of partners and conversion to limited companies, and company accounts, including the issue of shares and debentures, are amongst subjects which will be covered in this course set at the intermediate level. Designed for students who have a good working knowledge of basic accounting principles, the course will also deal with final accounts for publication, the treatment of taxation in company accounts and the interpretation of accounts, including flow of funds statements. 85. Advanced Financial Accounting. Mrs. S. Panchapakesan, B.Sc., A.C.A. Tuesdays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting September 12, 1978. Room 167, University Main Building. 13 meetings. Fee: \$120

The tutor will select topics from the A.C.C.A. syllabus for Accounting 4 This syllabus covers group accounts, principles of consolidation, theory in relation to the nature and measurement of business income, aspects of financial statement construction, presentation and interpretation of accounts, accounting treatment of reorganisation and amalgamations and accounting for price level changes. These topics will be treated at the highest level.

86. Management Accounting. Peter Y. B. Lam, A.A.S.A. (Senior), Dip. Tech. (W. Aust.), A.C.I.S., A.B.I.A., A.M.B.I.M., F.H.K.S.A. Mondays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting September 25, 1978. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 15 meetings. Fee: \$120

Students will be introduced to various modern management accounting techniques and methods. The syllabus is mainly based on that of the A.C.C.A. and will cover: balance sheet analysis, inter-firm comparisons, budgeting and budgetary control, marginal and differential costings, discounted cash flow, pricing policies, control analysis, and control reporting.

Recommended Textbook: Management Accounting by W. M. Harper, Second Edition 1977.

87. Financial Management and Business Finance. A. M. J. Nash, A.C.M.A., A.M.B.I.M. Fridays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting September 8, 1978. Room 722, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$110

This course is designed to be helpful to students studying for examinations of the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators, Certified Accountants and Cost and Management Accountants. Course contents will include capital investment appraisal, cash flow statements, working capital management, inflation and its effect on financial management, valuation of companies, sources of finance, the effect on financial management of Government legislation, and, cost of capital. 88. The Accountant as a Manager. G. M. Docherty, J.P., M.Sc., A.C.C.A., A.C.I.S., A.M.B.I.M. Tuesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting September 12, 1978. Room 10, Central Market, Top Floor, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

It is very important that today's accountant should have an appreciation of the principles of effective management and an awareness of the behavioural aspects of accounting. This course will be of value to students taking A.C.C.A. Paper 17, Business Management, or I.C.S.A. Paper 16, Management: Principles and Policy.

Among the topics to be discussed are the setting of objectives and policy making, theories of management, the problems of centralisation- decentralisation, authority, responsibility and delegation, aspects of motivation, communication and the behavioural impact of budgeting.

89. Costing. Charles Kwok, B.A. (Econ.), B.Sc. (Bus. Admin.) Thursdays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting September 14, 1978. Room 418, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$120

The main areas of study will be: costing for materials, labour and overheads, job costing and process costing, breakeven analysis, profit volume ratio, marginal costing, introduction to standard costing, and variance analysis. The course will be particularly useful to students taking the A.C.C.A./A.C.M.A. Costing I examination.

Students will be introduced to the various parts of a computer system with emphasis on data storage and transmission equipment; the principles of data collecting, recording, storing and processing; systems analysis and design including the charting of systems, and also the development and carrying out of feasibility studies. Relevant cases studies and examples will be introduced and students will be expected to work through examination questions. 91. Auditing. Lai Dak Wing, A.C.C.A., A.H.K.S.A., F.A.I.A., A.M.B.I.M. Fridays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting September 29, 1978. Room 108, St. John's Co-Educational College, Taikoo Shing, Quarry Bay, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$90

Students will be introduced to the purpose and general principles of auditing, how to conduct an audit, the procedures and techniques to be employed for different kinds of audit and how to present an audit report.

92. Advanced Auditing. Stephen Lau, A.C.A., A.H.K.S.A. Mondays 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting September 25, 1978. Room 847, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$90

Following the A.C.C.A. syllabus, topics to be discussed and studied are, the validity of principles in public reporting, types of investigations, forms of audit report and the effectiveness of legislation in protecting interested parties, the effect of computers on audit practice, case law affecting auditors, the organisation of an audit and current developments in the practice of auditing.

93. An Introduction to U.K. Taxation. Miss M. Leung, B.Soc.Sc. A.C.I.S., A.M.B.I.M. Wednesdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 20, 1978. Room 108, St. John's Co-educational College, Taikoo Shing, Quarry Bay, Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$100

The aim of this course is to provide an introduction to the basic principles of United Kingdom Taxation and their application to practical problems. Topics to be studied include income tax schedules, personal income tax computation, sole proprietor and partnership assessments, capital allowances, treatment of losses and an introduction to corporation tax.

This course will not cover personal taxation though a revision lecture aiming to bring students up to date with the latest personal tax developments will be given. As only students who have passed a basic taxation examination will be admitted to the course, a photocopy of qualifications should be submitted with the application form.

The principles of Company Law, related statutes and relevent case law will be discussed with special reference to matters of particular concern to accountants and auditors. Students should note that this is essentially a revision course for the A.C.C.A. paper on Company Law. It is suitable for students who already have a basic grounding in the subject. 97. This course will follow the syllabus of the A.C.C.A. examination paper of the same name, thus the main areas to be studied will be the law and procedure relating to (a) bankruptcy and deeds of arrangement, (b) voluntary and compulsory liquidations, appointment of liquidators and receivers, and the disposition of property by will; devolution of property on intestacy; family provision; creation of trusts; grants of probate and administration; rights and duties of executors, administrators and trustees; administration and distribution of estates; death duties; all forms of executorship and trust accounts.

Participants must have a good level of accounting knowledge to gain full benefit from this course.

The recent growth of commodity trading in Hong Kong has created more awareness of its specialized nature, and this is an introductory course for those interested in trading commodity futures but without previous experience or training. It is intended to provide sufficient background to enable those who wish, to enter trading themselves. Special attention will be given to these topics: the concept of futures trading; the basic backgrounds of the key commodities; the practical techniques of placing orders; the analysis of price trends; explanation of commonly used technical terms; information on local and overseas markets.

121. An Introduction to Managerial Techniques. Vincent Ng, B.S., M.B.A., M.S. (UCLA). Wednesdays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting September 27, 1978. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8th Floor, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$95

Modern managerial activity contains within it elements of both science and art. The evolution of managerial thinking will be examined, including the ideas developed by the Classical, Human Relations, Neo-classical, and Modern Schools of Thought. Attention will also focus on the functions of the executive together with his role in establishing goals and strategy in the business enterprise. A variety of managerial techniques will be considered within the general framework of the need for corporate planning and for decision-making in conditions of uncertainty. Fundamental ideas will be illustrated with practical examples drawn from the financial, marketing and personnel areas of management.

The course will be suitable for young executives without formal knowledge of the full range of management techniques.

122. Financial Analysis in Business. Gabriel Lee Chi-wang, B.Sc. (H.K.), M.B.A. (Toronto). Fridays, 7.15–8.45 p.m., starting September 29, 1978. Room 229, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$95

In the conditions of modern business a number of analytical techniques have been developed for solving financial problems within the Company. The theory and practice of such methods will be examined in detail, together with ways of evaluating financial performance, alternative investment opportunities, financial risk and security pricing. The course is designed for junior credit analysts in the fields of banking and finance who wish to gain a greater awareness of modern techniques. It is planned that the course will allow maximum participation by course members in addition to the more formal mode of instruction. 123. Strategy in the Business Enterprise. George M. Internal and external criteria will be examined in order to provide the basis of appraisal of current attainment and the longer term direction of effort. The strategic considerations of companies of different size will also be taken into account.

The term indicates an attempt to manage and control the total flow of materials from selection of supplier, through inventory control into production, and, in certain cases, after processing into the finished product, distribution to the customer.

This course will benefit managers who are responsible for all or part of the purchasing, inventory control or stores activities. Topics covered will include various management techniques which can be applied specifically to the solving of material management problems. 125. Consumer Goods Marketing. Francis A. Chan, B.Sc. (Minnesota), Thursdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting September 28, 1978. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8th Floor, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$80

Successful marketing is the key to business success. The application of the marketing concept makes it necessary that all elements in the organization should have their activities focussed upon the attainment of specific marketing goals. The theory and practice of marketing will be dealt with in detail, including the definition of the market and consumer acceptance, marketing organization, market research, channels of distribution, selling, pricing policies and advertising and sales promotion activity. The tutor will address himself particularly to the problems of marketing consumer goods in the context of Hong Kong. This course is intended for junior executives whether in a specialist marketing area or not and for those engaged in General Management who wish to gain a greater insight into the relevance and working of the marketing function in a business operation.

The attention which is given to the marketing of Consumer Goods often draws attention away from the fact that a large and growing area of marketing activity is devoted to the sale and distribution of products from one business enterprise to another. The purpose of this course is to analyse the special problems which the marketing of Industrial Products can create. The speaker will trace the development of marketing policies in this field from the basis of Product Planning, Pricing, Sales Techniques, Distribution, Marketing Research, Advertising, and Promotional Strategies, to the continuance of customer loyalty through after-sales service. Case material will be used to illustrate the policies outlined in principle. The course will benefit managers both in the marketing area and those who work in other areas but who wish to extend their knowledge of marketing techniques. 127. International Marketing. T. R. Ramachandran, M.A. (Madras), Dip. Marketing (Bombay). Saturdays, 2.15-3.45 p.m., starting September 30, 1978. Room 28, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8th Floor, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$95

The selling and distribution of products in the overseas market presents a unique challenge to the marketing specialist. In addition to particular economic and financial criteria of such involvement, special attention has to be paid to the plan to open up new markets, modes of decision-making, the measurement of potential and of performance. This course aims to meet the needs of practising executives in business, whose responsibilities embrace overseas markets. The basic principles and problems of international marketing will be illustrated with selected case histories drawn from the recent past.

A wide range of quantitative techniques may be applied to the process of taking decisions in the business field. This course is focussed upon the needs of junior and middle managers who wish to gain a deeper insight into the application of statistics and the model-building approach to their functional specialism. An understanding of basic algebra and statistics will be assumed. Special attention will be paid to the techniques of decisionmaking in conditions of uncertainty, preference theory, network-analysis, discounting methods, linear programming, and regression analysis. Theoretical approaches will be illustrated with case histories.

The course is designed to help managers to assess their priorities in the non-technical sphere of administration and to stimulate thinking about modes of effective managerial conduct. 130. Operational Research is a most useful technique for all managers and administrators, enabling them to understand and use the more advanced methods of information collection, processing and control which lead to a more efficient organization. Students should have a basic knowledge of algebra but all other mathematical concepts will be explained. The course has been designed to suit those who have no previous knowledge of Operational Research and to act as an introductory course for those who wish to pursue more advanced studies in this area.

Outline Syllabus: Types of production systems; plant location. Provision of physical facilities: factory buildings, product and functional layouts, evaluation and choice of equipment, process planning, material handling and storage. Work place design; work physiology, working conditions, man/machine system design, safety and industrial accidents. CERTIFICATE COURSES IN THE USE OF ENGLISH

A sound working knowledge of English is one of the greatest needs in Hong Kong life today. To meet this need the Department offers a carefully devised two-year programme in the use of English that will provide the students with practical tuition in the following skills:

the ability to speak fluently and carry on conversation in English; the ability to understand accurately what is said by other speakers; the ability to write English well to meet a number of different situations; the ability to read easily and understand written English.

The tutors for the courses offered each year are drawn from a panel of university graduates and experienced teachers of English. They set assignments for the students to complete at home and in class, and these are then corrected and discussed in class. In addition to the textbooks that are prescribed, a large number of articles on topical subjects and short stories are available for comprehension and appreciation. The students are also provided with plenty of opportunity for oral practice and to express their own ideas.

Students are advised to apply for a place in a First Year course, but those who consider themselves adequately qualified and who pass the Entrance Examination sufficiently well may enrol in a Second Year course.

On completion of the First Year, all students will sit an examination, which if they pass sufficiently well, will qualify them to enrol in a Second Year course in the following year. Those who pass this examination, but not sufficiently well to qualify them for a place in a Second Year course, will be awarded a Statement of Proficiency.

On completion of the Second Year, all students will sit an examination that leads to the award of the Extra-Mural Certificate in the Use of English.

As these courses are intended for working adults, those attending any class in a secondary school will not be admitted.

The Extra-Mural Certificate in the Use of English is recognized by the Institute of Bankers for exemption purposes from the English Paper in their Examinations.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS: Those who have completed a First Year course sufficiently well in the year 1977-78 or who possess a Departmental Certificate in English for Business in Written Grade A, B or C may enrol in a Second Year course without any further test.

All those who do not have these qualifications must

- 1. have gained Grade E or above in English Language in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination, or in the case of English Language Syllabus A Grade C or above, or the equivalent in an approved examination.

The ability to express himself clearly in English is something that every businessman needs to pay very considerable attention to if he is going to be able to communicate effectively with his customers and suppliers not only in Hong Kong, but also in many of those countries that Hong Kong trades with. Within his company, too, the businessman needs to understand what his colleagues have to say and to communicate with them. Here again, a good command of English is often of the utmost importance.

The Extra-Mural courses in English for Business are specifically designed to help those engaged in commerce and industry, and provide intensive tuition in those applied varieties of English that they are most likely to require. They are therefore ideally suited for those who have to handle correspondence independently for their firms and need to communicate with others within them.

The idea behind this course is very simple. It is to look at the ways 'madness' has been defined and used in (mainly) European literature from ancient times to the present day. The texts are chosen with a view to showing how the various authors understood 'madness', what place it had in the general scheme of things, whether benign, dangerous, pathological or even peculiarly rational, as well as presenting works which, on the whole, are of great artistic merit. Those that are not are nonetheless forceful personal documents.

Almost everybody knows that the area of a circle is πr^2 , but what precisely does this mean? What is the meaning of speed if the distance travelled is not proportional to time? Without a knowledge of calculus these quite natural questions are not easy to answer and yet many elementary mathematics courses omit this topic.

This course aims to fill this gap and to provide a fairly comprehensive working knowledge in calculus up to A-level standard. It is hoped the course will be helpful to both those involved with the teaching of calculus in schools and to beginners wishing to find out what it is all about.

Syllabus: Limits, rates of change; differentiation; kinematics; product, quotient and function of a function rules; definite and indefinite integrals; fundamental theorem of calculus; application to areas and volumes; implicit differentiation; logarithmic and exponential functions; logarithmic differentiation; rates of reaction; trigonometric functions; methods of integration.

有人曾謂「建築是凝固了的音樂」。反之「凝固了的音樂是建築」亦 可。由此可見,音樂作品俱備建築結構,而這種建築結構便是樂曲之形式。

各種樂曲的形式是經過作曲家長期的摸索、嘗試、辮證、發展而取得 的成果。《曲式學》旣是藝術,亦是科學。藝術與科學都不是死板的,一成 不變的,亦不應對作曲家有所限制,否則就變成捨本求末,倒因爲果了。從 音樂史發展的歷史來看,樂曲形式的演變是整個音樂史發展的一個 組 成 部 份、是應作曲家抒發感情之需要而形成,建立各種體裁:因此、我們有貝多 芬的奏鳴曲、亦有舒伯特的奏鳴曲,各有各的風格和結構。

《曲式學》屬音樂美學範疇,亦是音樂欣賞之必修科目----對初入門 的人這是一門簡單的音樂常識;對有修養的人這是一門既抽象又眞實的學問。

The relation between music, movement and creative dance will be discussed first. Special attention will then be given to planning the lesson, describing in detail the progressive use of different themes and stimuli and stressing their value in developing a child's creative awareness and movement vocabulary. A detailed series of specimen lessons, designed to provide a frame work for teachers to build up and adapt to the needs of their own classes, will be given. The selection of music and poetry to accompany or stimulate dancing will also be discussed.

The Romance of the Three Kingdoms, The Water Margin, The Monkey, and The Dream of the Red Chamber are four famous novels in Chinese literature. For centuries they have fascinated millions of readers. This series of lectures will discuss their themes and literary techniques. Information about their authors and the evolution of their stories will also be given. It is hoped that participants can command a further understanding of Chinese culture through such novels, the English translation of which are available in the bookstores.

在五四之前,中國文學與西洋文學基少直接的相互影響,因此中西比 較文學的研究泰半傾向平衡探討。目前從事中西比較的學者,又不時試用西 方的批評理論和方法去重新詮釋中國文學,意圖開拓新的批評領域,並從而 反證西方理論的可行性及共通性。

唐詩之發展,通常分為初唐、盛唐、中唐及晚唐四期。初盛之際,四 傑沈宋開其端,王孟高岑嗣其響,含章奮藻,突過齊梁。至李杜二賢,更如 中天日月,大發光芒,綱舉目張,規模大備,五言之外,兼及七言,今體固 精,古禮亦隽。由是風氣所播,範疇愈拓,堂庶愈雄,中晚之間,名家尤為 輩出,如大曆十才子,如韓愈,孟郊,如白居易,元稹,劉禹錫,如劉長 卿,韋應物等,均爲中唐詩壇上之表表者,華采紛綸,勝場各擅,上承李杜 高岑,下開温李小杜,但見蟬錦之聯,絕無蜂腰之誚。本期將介 紹 中 唐 各 家,並緣作者之多,範疇之廣,特由十二講增爲十五講。 273. 中國古典文學之欣賞及習作 (Chinese Classics: Appreciation & Essay Writing)

古典文學深具中國語文之價值。本課程以深入邊出之方法解釋原文, 說出其精要之所在,並摘錄辭章,作爲爲作之舉例,此習作之意義也。

現代文學以語體文為主,惟寫作語體文則應以文言文為範本,若能精 讀古文名编,獲得良好之寫作基礎,既可寫作流暢之語體文,亦可寫成一篇 養易之文言文。此誠一舉兩得之法。

本課程將由中國傳統戲曲與話劇的關係談起:戲曲自元代算起,至今 已有六百年歷史,傳統悠久,遺產豐富;話劇的形式在辛亥革命後才傳入中 國,至今只有七十年,仍未普及。但戲曲以表現古代歷史和生活爲主,在反 映現代生活題材上,話劇應否取代戲曲?話劇又能否吸取戲曲形式來表達現 代內容?課程並且介紹翻譯劇對中國話劇的影響;「五四」以來的文藝論爭; 主要的中國劇作家、劇本和導演;國內對史坦尼、布萊希特的研究;話劇在 香港的發展等,香港話劇發展應否承襲中國話劇傳統,還是走上外國話劇的 道路?

整個課程邊介紹,邊討論,邊圍讀劇本及排演片段,適合 戲 劇 工 作 者、教師及大專學生進修。 275. 佛家大乘各宗要義 (Buddhist Philosophy)

倘能循序習作,不難啓發學者的興趣,進一步並足以資教學者獲致經 驗的幫助。 285. 篆刻藝術

290. Christian Thought in a Scientific Age. Michael Collier, M.A. (Cantab.), Dip. Th. (London), Ph.D., C. Eng., M.I.E.R.E., Lecturer in Electronic Engineering, Hong Kong Polytechnic. Thursdays, 6.40–8.10 p.m., starting October 12, 1978. Room 229, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$75

To many people there appears to be a large gap between the important technical, social and political issues of the day and the Christian message. Partly this arises from the scientific revolution of the last century which has fundamentally influenced man's thinking patterns. This course will look at the Christian message in the light of both the present academic scene and cultural attitudes revealed through films and books. Participation is open to all who are interested in exploring the relevance of Christianity to our global village. Subjects to be covered include:-

Please talk Sense: defining and communicating truth;

The Chicken or the Egg: origins;

The Exorcist and the Omen: the supernatural;

291. Introduction to Three Living Religions. Mrs. Rajeshwari Ghose, B.A. (Calcutta), M.A. (H.K.); Paul Clasper, Ph.D. (Union Theological Seminary, N.Y.C.), Senior Lecturer in religion, Chinese University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 5.45-7.45 p.m., starting October 25, 1978. Room 16, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8th Floor, 111 Connaught Road Central, Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

Whilst it is impossible to fully cover Hinduism, Buddhism and Christianity in an introductory course, an attempt will be made to highlight their basic beliefs, the social milieu in which they evolved, and their present-day roles. The following topics will be discussed:

Hinduism: the component elements; the place of the Vedas in the Hindu mind; the philosophy of the Upanisads; the theory of Karma and the caste system; rituals, public and private; and the 19th Century Hindu renaissance.

Buddhism : the life and times of the Buddha; the Dharma, the Buddhist Gospel; popular Buddhism in South East Asia; the growth of Mahayana; and Zen in China and Japan.

Christianity: Jesus and Paul, the Easter Faith and the Mission to the Gentiles; Worship, the Catholic Church and Sacraments; some Christian Mystics, including Meister Eckhart, Saint Teresa, Brother Lawrence, and Jacob Boehme; the Reformation and its consequences; and the modern Missionary Movement in Asia.

292. Philosophy of Science. L. Goldstein, Ph.D.(St. Andrews), Lecturer in Philosophy, University of Hong Kong. Mondays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting October 16, 1978. Room 320, University Main Building. IO meetings. Fee: \$70

The questions that will be examined in this course lie at the meeting ground between science and philosophy. We shall be concerned with the contribution that philosophy can make to science, and science to philosophy.

The scientist, in attempting to describe and explain events in the physical world, seeks a set of concepts and analogies adequate for this purpose. But what is an explanation? How are concepts related to the world? Do concepts change as new scientific theories emerge? What constitutes a satisfactory analogy? These are all *philosophical* questions.

The philosopher has long been concerned with puzzles about, for example, space, time, motion and freedom of the will. With the emergence of modern science and in particular the development, in this century, of relativity and quantum theories, it has come to be realized that progress towards a solution of these problems may depend heavily on such *scientific* advances.

Although we shall be discussing the interdependency of science and philosophy, no specialist knowledge of either subject will be presupposed. A general background in physics and a willingness to engage in argument would, however, be useful. 293. An Introduction to School Counselling & Guidance. Young people today find themselves growing up in a very restless and turbulent age, and are often perplexed by the rapid changes in our society. They also need help in understanding themselves better, in making wise decisions and in planning for their own future. When approached by his students, very often the classroom teacher finds that he lacks the professional training of the counsellor to help his students in any effective or meaningful way. This course is an attempt to provide some insight into the work of counselling for school teachers. It aims at introducing elementary principles and techniques of counselling, which will help teachers to become effective in their contact with students.

There will be a series of lectures, discussion and practical sessions on 15 Saturday mornings. In order to make the best use of these sessions, participants are required to read a recommended text, while video taped materials will be used extensively to examine the application of the major theories in local context. To facilitate maximum assimilation and consolidation of course content, two $1\frac{1}{2}$ -day workshops are scheduled to be held in September and December respectively. Participation in the 2 workshops is a must for everyone attending the course, the design of which is for full integration of theory and practice.

What are the common problems experienced by teachers working in a bilingual setting? This course is designed to familiarise interested people, teachers in particular, with the major theories and approaches to teaching. Focus will be given to specific problems of learning in a bilingual setting. The following topics will be discussed: conceptual and theoretical models of educational psychology; specific approaches to instruction; motivation and achievement; some linguistic effects of bilingualism on the mental processes and learning; and implications of bilingualism on teaching.

We will be discussing the parents' fears, their own feelings, the child's needs, where troubles begin and how to face problems as they arise. Other topics will include sex, responsibility, how to communicate effectively, how to appreciate your child as a person, and setting goals and limits for activities.

303. The Governance of China after Mao: the politics of China in the 1980's. Brian C. Shaw, B.A. (Hons.) (Wellington), Ph.D. (ANU), Lecturer in Political Science, University of Hong Kong, and member, International Institute for Strategic Studies (London). Mondays, 6.15–7.45 p.m., starting October 16, 1978. Room 103, University Main Building. 8 meetings. Fee: \$65

The dominance of the person and the Thought of the late Mao Tse-tung over Chinese political life after 1949 is well-known. Now that new leaders, with new policies, control the Chinese state, it is possible to attempt a more valid assessment of the achievements of the era of Mao. Was the Maoist vision-often contradictory and paradoxical-essentially a correct reflection of the best path for "the Chinese revolution", or was it flawed and incomplete? Is the continued political importance of the People's Liberation Army a tacit admission of the inadequacy of existing civilian political institutions: and if so, what are the implications of this for the future? What are the prospects for the further improvement of the quality of the Chinese people's daily life, and what are the implications for greater "democratisation" of political life? Will the hoped-for success of the "Four Modernisations" entail a qualitative change in the domestic and foreign goals of the Chinese State: and, if so, what are the political implications for countries and territories with different social and political systems? These and other issues will be discussed in these lectures, which look broadly at problems arising from the manifestation, management, extension and transformation of political power in China, with emphasis on prospects for the next two decades.

Minimum Entry Qualifications: Applicants should have 5 subjects including English and Mathematics at Grade E or above in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education, or equivalent.

An examination will be conducted at the end of the course. The award of an extra-mural certificate is conditional on passing the written examination, completing the set projects and attending at least 75% of the lectures.

It may be considered as a preliminary to the 'Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming'.

The syllabus will include: number systems and elementary arithmetic procedures; data processing organisation chart; the nature of data processing systems; input; storage; processing; control; output; input/output units; storage units; central processing and control; methods of processing, batch processing; random access; real time. 310. Digital Computer Organisation, Design and Engineering. Lai Chee-yan, B.Sc. (H.K.), Cert.Ed., M.Sc. (Tech.) (Manchester), M.I.E.E.E. Fridays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting September 22, 1978. This course follows part of the syllabuses of Papers 'A' of British Computer Society Part I & II Examinations, and will be of special help to those who intend to sit for professional examinations or take up a career in the computer field.

This course is designed to introduce the newcomer to the countryside of Hong Kong. It will first deal with the climate and Geography, followed by a general consideration of some of the main plant communities, e.g. grassland, woodland, Mangrove and sea shore. The plants of the Communities will be illustrated by colour slides and fresh specimens wherever possible. There will be two field visits, the cost of which is not included in the course fee. 312. Hong Kong Ecological Habitats. D. S. Hill, M.Sc., Ph.D., F.L.S., M.I.Biol., M.B.O.U., and Martha Dahlen, B.S. (Hort.). Tuesdays, 6.15– 8.15 p.m., starting September 26, 1978. Northecote Science Building, Department of Zoology, Lecture Room 302 and Laboratory 212. 14 meetings. Fee: \$150

This course is designed for local biology teachers, particularly those at fifth and sixth form level, and for anyone else who wishes to know more about the local flora and fauna from an ecological and a systematic point of view.

Each session will be concerned with one of the 14 major habitat-types, and the lecture will consider the physical and environmental factors operating in each habitat, and then the flora and fauna of that habitat will be studied in detail (illustrated with colour slides). Following the lecture there will be a laboratory demonstration of the animals (museum specimens) and plants from that habitat.

There will be a number of field trips, either on Saturday morning or afternoon, to visit selected specific habitats. The cost of these trips is not included in the fee.

The course is based upon the second edition of the book, 'Hong Kong Ecological Habitats: Plora & Fauna', by Hill, D. S., Gott, B., Morton, B. S., & I. J. Hodgkiss (completely revised and expanded), in which Hong Kong is divided ecologically into different basic habitat-types. Copies of this book will be available at the start of the course, priced at about HK\$30.00.

Increasing leisure is encouraging more and more people to go out into Hongkong's countryside, and natural history, especially birdwatching, is becoming more popular as a hobby. This course is designed to introduce the newcomer and beginner to Hong Kong's bird life, and at the same time outline the part birds play in the balance of nature, and the part even amateurs can play in extending our knowledge; ornithology is one of the few sciences where there is still a need for amateurs. There are Montessori schools and training centres now being established all over the world based on the original work of Dr. Maria Montessori. She founded the first "Children's Houses" in 1906 in the working class districts of Rome to meet the needs of young children in a crowded city environment. Slides, lectures, discussion and readings from "Montessori and the Family" will be used to illustrate the theory and practical application of teaching young children. Emphasis will be on practical application of the Montessori approach for use in Hong Kong.

Course participants will be invited to raise practical problems of child rearing in Hong Kong for purposes of discussion and problem solving using the Montessori approach.

325. Law for Social Workers. J. M. Miller, LL.B. (Wellington), Lecturer in Law, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting October 11, 1978. Room 230, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 20 meetings. Fee: \$120

A course designed to provide social workers with a basic understanding of those aspects of the law that will assist them in the execution of their professional duties. 
