

GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. There are normally no entry requirements except that applicants should be over 18 years of age. Occasionally to have the full benefit of a course applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Applicants are therefore advised to read the description of a course carefully. Professional courses usually have clearly defined entry requirements.
- 2. The Director may at his discretion refuse to admit an applicant.
- 3. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held:
 - (a) on any public holidays.
 - (b) at a storm warning signal of No. 8 or above. (After the typhoon passes, if the No. 8 signal is lowered before 3 p.m., classes will take place as normal. If the signal is lowered after 3 p.m., classes will be cancelled that evening.)
 - (c) during the following holiday periods: December 22, 1980 to January 2, 1981 inclusive (Christmas and New Year). February 4-9, 1981 inclusive (Lunar New Year).

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Archaeology

440. Hong Kong: the Archaeological and Historical Scene. S. M. Bard, O.B.E., E.D., M.B.,B.S., Hon.D.Litt (H.K.), J.P., Executive Secretary, Antiquities and Monuments, Urban Services Department. Thursdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting February 12, 1981. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 7 meetings plus 3 field trips and 1 museum visit.

Fee: \$160

This course is designed for interested laymen as well as for junior secondary school teachers of History and Social Studies. It will cover the general outline of pre-history and the archaeological and historical features of Hong Kong including early settlements in the New Territories. It will also deal with the social organization of local village life, customs and traditions. The talks will be illustrated by slides and by specimens which can be handled by the students. There will be field trips to sites of archaeological and historical interest to see rock carvings, temples, ancestral halls, traditional study-libraries and walled villages. The cost of field trips is included in the fee.

Fee Refund: On being accepted for this course, teachers of history and social studies will be sent a full fee refund application form, which they should forward to the Director of Education together with their course fee receipt. This applies to all teachers in Government, aided and private schools. (Closing date for applications: February 4, 1981.)

UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE

The attention of extra-mural students is drawn to the following regulation of the University of Hong Kong regarding admission to the University:

"A mature person without formal academic qualifications who is aged 30 or over on September 1 of the year in which admission is sought may be deemed to have satisfied the minimum requirements for entrance to the University and be eligible for admission to read for a first degree except in the Faculty of Medicine. Art & Design

Courses in Art & Design and related areas are open to students of all levels of development unless otherwise stated.

PRACTICAL STUDIO COURSES

These are practical studio classes in the Visual Arts with emphasis on artistic skills and creative growth of the individual. Work will be carried out in the various media described. It must be stressed that in order for students to gain full benefit from studio courses they must be prepared to do work outside of class time, and should take this into consideration when enrolling for a particular course.

Students must provide all necessary materials, some of which will be available for purchase through the department. Materials will be discussed at the first class meeting.

441. Basic Freehand Drawing I. Benedict Wang, B.A. (Waterloo), B.F.A. (Manitoba), M.A. (North Dakota). Wednesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$175

This basic course in drawing techniques and theories will primarily emphasize three main areas; study of the human form by means of contour, gesture, weight and cross contour drawings; study of still life and architectural forms; and study of landscape. In addition there will be slide presentations to facilitate discussion of compositon and style. Students will be encouraged to experiment with a wide range of media including pencil, pen and ink, charcoal, conté crayon, ballpoint, sign pen, brush and wash. Students should note that there will be homework assignments each week and plan their time accordingly.

442. Basic Freehand Drawing II. Benedict Wang, B.A. (Waterloo), B.F.A (Manitoba), M.A. (North Dakota). Wednesdays, 8.00-10.00 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$175

This course will explore in greater depth the basic elements of drawing and how to take them toward a more finished state. The process through which a basic idea may be developed into graphic expression will also be discussed. Students should note that there will be homework assignments each week and plan their time accordingly. Basic Freehand Drawing, or the equivalent, is a prerequisite for the course, and in the event of oversubscription an interview will be required.

443. Figure Composition. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Tuesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$220 including model fee

Planned for those with previous experience in drawing from the human figure, the aim of this intermediate level course is to help students discover and develop ways of using the figure, and its aspects, in full, finished pieces of work employing a variety of media. Students should be prepared to do approximately six hours of homework each week. Enrolment is limited to 17 persons and in the event of oversubscription an interview will be required.

444. Portraiture. Alice Wolff, M.A. (Cal. Berkeley). Fridays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting February 20, 1981. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$170 including model fee

Through a series of exercises in conté crayon, charcoal, pastel, and paint, students will develop skills and techniques necessary for accuracy and expression in portraiture. Aimed at both beginners and more advanced students, the course will emphasize work from life, including self portraits, old masters, and symbolic portraits. Students will be expected to do work outside of class time.

445. Introduction to Painting. (Tutor to be appointed). Thursdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting February 19, 1981. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$175 including model fee

Painting is a way of communicating one's ideas through visual and technical means using paint as a medium. Oil, acrylic and watercolour will be the principal media used. The perennial questions of materials, composition, and use of colour will be discussed throughout the course. Both classical and contemporary painting styles and aesthetic and philosophic concepts of painting will be used as reference points and students will receive guidance on how to set and achieve their aims in painting. Previous experience in drawing is essential, and in the event of oversubscription an interview will be required. Students should be prepared to do work outside of class time. The studio will remain open until 9.30 p.m. so that students wishing to continue work begun that evening can do so.

446. Introduction to Fabric Printing. Marion Hughes, D.A. (Dundee College of Art), Cert.Ed. (Glasgow). Mondays, 6.45–8.45 p.m., starting February 16, 1981. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$220

All the main ways of printing patterns on to textiles as a traditional craft form will be introduced. Methods of block printing, silkscreen, batik and tie-dye will be explained and demonstrated so that students will be able to produce printed fabric at home. Equipment used is easily obtainable and in some cases can be made by the student. As well as printing specific articles, it is hoped that students will also produce lengths of printed fabric. In addition, the basic principles of design and drawing as they relate to textile design will be discussed. Students will be expected to provide most of their own materials. Inks and dyes will be provided for class use, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

447. Three-Dimensional Design. Patrick Fong, B.F.A., (Columbus College). Wednesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$145

Through a series of exercises in a variety of media students will experiment with, and come to understand the language, characteristics, and principles of 3-Dimensional Design. During the last few weeks of the course, time permitting,

this knowledge will be applied to simple, functional objects in the areas of package and product design. Students will be expected to do a minimum of 5 hours of work outside of class time.

448. Introduction to Batik. Marion Hughes, D.A. (Dundee College of Art), Cert.Ed. (Glasgow). Tuesdays, 6.45–8.45 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Pokfulam Sudio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$215 including materials fee

Originally a "native" craft of Indonesia, Batik is now an international "high" craft form. Both the Western and more complex Indonesian methods will be covered in this course. Uses and effects of Tajaenting, Tjap and brush, as well as, crackle effects from different waxes, and the mixing of dyes will be taught, and students will be encouraged to experiment in the media. Students must supply their own fabric and tools, but dyes and wax for use during class time will be provided. In order to gain full benefit, student should be prepared to do some work at home.

449. Illustration for Graphic Design. Andy C. Neilson, D.A. (Glasgow School of Art). Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$145

Various illustration techniques and their practical application in advertising design, books, posters, brochures, etc. will form the basis of this course. Commercial printing and production techniques, including costing will also be covered. Students should have some previous design and/or drawing experience, and must be prepared to do work outside of class time.

450. Introduction to Interior Design. Patrick Fong, B.F.A. (Columbus College). Wednesdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$145

Aimed at those with a serious interest in Interior Design, the concepts of Interior Design will be introduced through simple commercial and residential projects. Students will become familiar with floor and ceiling plans, layout, lighting, proportion and scale, colour and finishes, furniture and fabrics. In addition, the basic tools of mechanical and freehand drawing, including perspective, will be covered. Students will be expected to do a minimum of 5 hours' work outside of class time. In the event of oversubscription an interview may be required.

451. Colour Reproduction and Printing for the Graphic Designer. Norman de Brackinghe, D.M.S., M.I.O.P., M.Inst.M.P., A.M.B.I.M., A.S.I.A. Mondays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting February 16, 1981. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$145

Relationships between the Graphic Designer and the Printer often become strained as it appears that the two elements are often working towards different ends instead of the same goal. The aim of this course is to help the designer to pick his way through the technology that gets thrown at him and to understand in basic terms what is happening in order to improve the communication between himself and the printer. The designer needs to know sufficient technology to

understand the limitations of the processes that his work will go through in order to achieve a finished product. Once he does understand the limitations there is no reason why he cannot urge the printer towards those limits and in consequence extend both their ranges through a sense of discipline. The need for a course of this type is based on many years experience of working with graphic designers and acting as interpreter between the two factions. It is designed for those with a professional interest in the subject.

452. Architectural Drawing I. Lionel Parkinson, B.Arch. (Auckland), A.N.Z.I.A., H.K.I.A. Tuesdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$145

Planned to provide students with knowledge of, and practice in, the basic techniques of Architectural Drawing, the course aims to develop skill in draftsmanship, for those with little or no previous experience in drafting, to the stage where they can produce floor plans and drawings for buildings and objects of a simple nature. Students will be required to do homework, and should plan their time accordingly.

453. Architectural Drawing II. Lionel Parkinson, B.Arch. (Auckland), A.N.Z.I.A., H.K.I.A. Tuesdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room II, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8|F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$145

Those who have successfully completed Architectural Drawing I or the equivalent will further develop skills to the point where a wide range of drafting tasks can confidently be undertaken. Drawings will be produced for buildings and objects of a more complex nature than in Part I and will include the use of axonometric and isometric projections. Students will be required to do homework and should plan their time accordingly. In the event of oversubscription an interview will be required.

454. Perspective Drawing (Intermediate). Graham Campbell, Dip.Arch. (N.E.L.P.), R.I.B.A. Thursdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting February 19, 1981. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$145

Planned for those who have successfully completed Perspective Drawing (Elementary) or the equivalent, the course will cover more advanced techniques of mechanical perspective, such as two-point perspective, the use of shadows, colour and texture, and will be related to more complex buildings, interiors and objects. Students will be required to do homework and should plan their time accordingly. In the event of oversubscription an interview will be required.

455. Introduction to Photography. Joseph Yin, B.A. (Brooks Inst., Santa Barbara). Tuesdays, 7.00-9.00 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$215

Aimed at those with a serious interest in Photography as a vehicle for expression and communication, this course will cover the basic studio and darkroom techniques of black and white and colour photography as well as choices of equipment and materials. In addition, theories of photography, both aesthetic and philosophic, will be explored. Students will be expected to experiment in the media, and class critiques will be held on the results of these. Students must provide their own cameras. Basic darkroom materials and supplies to be used during class sessions will be provided.

456. Intermediate Photography. Robert Thompson. Mondays, 7.00-9.00 p.m., starting February 16, 1981. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$230

Aimed at those already familiar with the basics of photography, the emphasis will be on darkroom and studio techniques, such as solarisation, bas relief and other derivatives. Studio exercises will be held in still life and table top work, as well as occasional outdoor exercises. The majority of the work will be conducted in B/W with colour being introduced during the latter part of the course. There will also be a visit to a professional colour laboratory. In order to gain full benefit students will be expected to produce most finished work outside of class time. Papers, chemicals and other materials for use during class time will be provided and the cost of these is included in the fee.

457. Advanced Photography. Robert Thompson. Wednesdays, 7.00-9.00 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$215

Applicants must have mastered the mechanics of photography including competent darkroom procedures. In-depth studio work will be carried out in a variety of topics, both assigned and chosen, such as: landscape, portraiture, still life, special lens effects and others. In order to gain full benefit, students will be expected to produce most finished work outside of class time. Papers, chemicals and other materials for use during class time will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the fee.

DAYTIME COURSES

458. Introduction to Figure Drawing. Alice Wolff, M.A. (Cal.Berkeley). Fridays, 10.00 a.m.—12.00 noon, starting February 20, 1981. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$210

This course is designed for students who wish to develop greater confidence in their ability to draw the human figure. The initial drawing exercises are designed to increase the student's ability to draw and shade realistically. These will be followed by more expressive techniques utilizing fantasy and feelings that lead to strengthening of personal style. Charcoal, conté, pastel, oil and acrylic will be utilized and demonstrated.

459. Western Painting. Alice Wolff, M.A. (Cal.Berkeley). Thursdays, 10.00 a.m.—12.00 noon, starting February 19, 1981. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$160 including model fee

Specific techniques for rendering form in acrylic, oil, watercolour or gouache, leading to finished compositions will be the major focus of this course. A variety of subjects will be employed, including fantasy and dreams. Emphasis will be on the development of individual skills, and students with varying degrees of experience are welcome. In order to gain full benefit students must be prepared to do work outside of class time.

460. Figure Composition. Martha Lesser, B.S. (N.Y.U.). Mondays, 10.00 a.m.—12.00 noon, starting February 16, 1981. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$220 including model fee

461. Woodblock and Mixed-Media Printmaking. Nancy Woo, B.F.A (Cornell), M.A. (Columbia). Tuesdays, 10.00 a.m.—12.00 noon, starting February 17, 1981. Room II, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$185.

A chief merit of prints is their ability to meet the human mind on a simple level of appreciation and to lure it on to a more complex level of enjoyment as one's comprehension increases. This course will give the student an introduction to those basic techniques of woodblock print-making, and mixed-media printing, which will enable him to carry on in the media beyond the level which can be attained in twelve meetings. Both monochrome, and multi-colour prints will be produced, and class critiques will be held on these. In addition there will be discussions on both traditional and contemporary Western and Japanese woodblock prints. Students will be expected to provide most drawing and cutting materials. Some inks and sundries will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

462. Introduction to Fabric Printing. Marion Hughes, D.A. (Dundee College of Art), Cert.Ed. (Glasgow). Mondays, 10.00 a.m.—12.00 noon, starting February 16, 1981. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$220

時 間:一九八一年二月十九日起每星期四下午七時至九時。 (共十二點)

學 曹:一百一十五元。

本課程將介紹攝影入門之各種技巧。內容包括:攝影機之運用,黑房冲晒技術,構圖研究及基本彩色攝影原理與應用等。課程將由淺入深,務使學員對一般攝影效果達到控制自如之地步,藉以鞏固學員之良好基礎,進而增加深造攝影藝術及技巧之機會。

464. 商業美術設計 (Commercial Art and Design)

主講人:馬耀平先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 11號室。

時 間:一九八一年二月二十一日起每星期六下午二時三十分至四時三十分。 (共十二講)。

學 費:一百四十五元。

旨在通過實際設計練習,使學員增加基本設計之知識,並能在短期內掌握一定的意念構思能力及表達技巧。

課程內容包括:器材及物料運用,平面設計及色彩原理,照片及攝影特別效果 之處理,字體設計,捅圖技巧,正稿製作及印刷常證等。並輔以幻燈片及實例作研 討,及實地參觀商業美術設計之製作過程。舉員必須以課外時間做習作。

465. 人體素描 (Life Drawing)

主講人:王季麟先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 10號室。

時 間:一九八一年二月十六日起每星期一下午八時至十時。 (井十二: 本)

學 費:二百二十元。 (包括模特兒費)

人體具有多種不同之形狀及動態,故為訓練寫畫技術之理想題材。本課程將以輪廓線描法,動姿描法,量感及質感描法等作基本練習;並將討論文藝復興時期至現代之人體繪畫風格,構圖方法及其它有關理論等。寫畫工具將包括鉛筆、木炭條、粉彩、鋼筆、毛筆及畫紙等。

466. 基本素描 (Basic Freehand Drawing)

學 費:一百七十五元。 (包括模特兒費)

Business Studies

Courses Nos. 469 to 479 are designed to be of assistance to those preparing for the examinations of the Association of Certified Accountants, the Institute of Cost and Management Accountants, the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators, and some will also be relevant for some subjects in the Hong Kong Society of Accountants examination scheme. The courses are a complement to, not a substitute for, correspondence courses. Students should make their own arrangements for sitting the relevant examinations.

469. Financial Accounting: Foundation Stage 2. Charles Kwok, B.A., B.Sc., Wednesdays, 7.45-9.45 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 732, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$150

In the second part of the Foundation course, accounts of limited companies will be introduced, as will interpretation and appraisal of accounting information, departmental accounts, cash flow statements, the treatment of reserves and provisions, further aspects of depreciation, good will and concepts relating to the recognition of revenue.

470. Intermediate Accounting. Chan Sai Man, Gabriel, A.C.I.S., A.C.M.A., M.B.I.M. Wednesdays, 6.30-8.30 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 201, University Main Building. 14 meetings.

Partnership accounts, including change of partners and conversion to limited companies, and company accounts, including the issue of shares and debentures, are amongst subjects which will be covered in this course set at the intermediate level. Designed for students who have a good working knowledge of basic accounting principles, the course will also deal with final accounts for publication, the treatment of taxation in company accounts and the interpretation of accounts, including flow of funds statements.

471. Advanced Financial Accounting. Wong Kai Lun. A.I.B., A.C.C.A., Tuesdays, 7.15-9.15 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 16 meetings. Fee: \$190

The tutor will select topics from the A.C.C.A. syllabus for Accounting 4. This syllabus covers group accounts, principles of consolidation, theory in relation to the nature and measurement of business income, aspects of financial statement construction, presentation and interpretation of accounts, accounting treatment of reorganisation and amalgamations and accounting for price level changes. These topics will be treated at the highest level. Only students showing evidence of having passed the Accounting 3 level (or equivalent) will be enrolled on this course.

472. Data Processing and Systems Design. Tony C. K. Yip, B.Sc. (Alberta), Fridays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 20, 1981. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 17 meetings. Fee: \$155

The various parts of a computer system will be described with emphasis on data storage and transmission equipment; the principles of data collecting, recording, storing and processing; systems analysis and design including the charting of systems; and the development and carrying out of feasibility studies. Relevant case studies and examples will be introduced and students will be given the opportunity to work through examination questions.

473. Costing. John Lane, M.A., A.C.I.S., A.I.B. Tuesdays, 6.15-8.15 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 201, University Main Building. 14 meetings.

Fee: \$150

The main areas of study will be: costing for materials, labour and overheads, job costing and process costing, breakeven analysis, profit volume ratio, marginal costing, introduction to standard costing, and variance analysis. The course will be particularly useful to students taking the A.C.C.A./A.C.M.A. Costing I examination.

474. Auditing. Andy S. C. Lee, B.B.A. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 15 meetings. Fee: \$125

Following the ACCA syllabus, topics to be discussed and studied are, the validity of principles in public reporting, types of investigations, forms of audit report and the effectiveness of legislation in protecting interested parties, the effect of computers on audit practice, case law affecting auditors, the organisation of an audit and current developments in the practice of auditing. The course will also be suitable for students preparing for the H.K.S.A. examinations.

475. Statistics for Accountants. K. G. Jones, B.Com. (Melbourne), F.C.C.A., F.H.K.S.A., F.A.S.A., F.C.I.S., Principal Lecturer, Hong Kong Polytechnic. Saturdays, 3.30–5.30 p.m., starting Februarys 21, 1981. Room 16, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$135

The aim of this course is to give students an understanding of the nature of statistical relationships and how to interpret them as an aid in business planning and control. The course will follow the A.C.C.A. syllabus and topics to be studied include, the nature of statistics, sources, interpretation and collection of data, how to summarise and present data, statistical inference, introductory probability, sampling, correlation and regression, and measurement of change. The course also caters for parts of the H.K.S.A. syllabus, and for those accountants and chartered secretaries who have a general interest in the subject.

476. Company Financial Management: Policies and Practices. C. S. Chui, M.Sc., A.C.C.A., A.C.M.A. Fridays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 20, 1981. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre, 14 meetings.

Fee: \$130

The aim of this course is to help those candidates sitting for the "Financial Management' paper of the A.C.C.A./A.C.M.A. examinations. The theme of the course is developed through a problem solving and mathematical and analytical approach. Participants must therefore be prepared for case studies and problem solving exercises which will be regularly presented during the course. Those who have a background in accounting or a related discipline will find the course useful

477. An Introduction to U.K. Taxation. Miss M. Leung, B.Soc.Sc., A.C.I.S., M.B.I.M. Wednesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 25, 1981. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$115

The aim of this course is to provide an introduction to the basic principles of United Kingdom Taxation and their application to practical problems. The course is designed for students who have no previous knowledge of this subject. Topics to be studied include the various income tax schedules, personal income tax computation, sole proprietor and partnership assessments, capital allowances and treatment of losses including terminal loss.

478. Company Law for Accountants. Ng Shiu-Kwan, A.C.I.S., A.M.B.I.M. Wednesdays, 8.00–9.30 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 103, University Main Building. 16 meetings. Fee: \$140

Based on the ACCA syllabus this course will cover legal concepts and procedures of incorporation; memorandum and articles of association; promoters, prospectus and financial aspects of share capital, dividends, bonus and rights issues; directors and company secretary; membership; returns and statutory records; accounts and disclosure requirements; auditors; meetings; reconstruction, amalgamation and winding-up. Related case studies will be presented where appropriate.

479. Law and Procedure of Meetings. Desmond Lee, B.Sc. (Eng.), B.Sc. (Econ.), Dip.M.S., A.M.S.I.M., A.C.I.S. Mondays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting February 23, 1981. Room 21, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$130

The general principles and practice relating to company meetings will be considered including such aspects as drawing up of agenda, notices, minutes, voting and proxies and the rights and restrictions regarding the holding of meetings. While the course is primarily designed to assist students taking professional examinations, it will also be helpful to business executives by providing them with guidelines for conducting more effective meetings.

480. An Introduction to Accounting. Lui Chun Bing, Tommy, B.Soc.Sc. (H.K.), A.C.A. (Aust.), A.C.I.S., A.C.C.A., A.H.K.S.A. Wednesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting March 4, 1981. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 15 meetings.

A basic knowledge of accounting is essential for businessmen, managers of commercial or non-profit organisations, professional people like doctors, lawyers, architects, engineers, who run their own practice, and practically anybody who has some money to manage or invest. Accounting is the medium through which profitability, cash flow, tax exposure, etc. are directly or indirectly recorded. The course is designed for the aforementioned people who have little or no accounting training. It covers basic bookkeeping, and preparation and interpretation of financial statements. At the end of the course, participants should be able to understand and operate a set of business books, and to read and evaluate financial statements for management purposes.

481. Financial Statement Analysis. Mrs. S. Panchapakesan, B.Sc., A.C.A. Saturdays, 9.30–11.00 a.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 8 meetings. Fee: \$95

This course has been devised with a view to provide the non-accountant manager with an insight into the technique of financial statement analysis in respect of commercial and industrial enterprises. The lectures will impart the knowledge necessary to understand financial statements and thereafter cover the concepts of funds flow and ratio analysis which are invaluable tools for effective management. The course is ideally suited to those in the middle management cadre and also for owners of small to medium size firms.

482. Basic Financial Management. Kenneth C. S. Kwan, M.B.A. (Hawaii). Mondays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting February 23, 1981. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

This introductory course on financial management is designed for those working in the banking/finance sectors. Topics to be discussed will include financial analysis, planning and control, working capital management, capital budgeting techniques, financial structure and the cost of capital, and sources and forms of long-term financing. All these basic principles of financial management will be illustrated with worked examples and short case studies drawn from local financial institutions. Students should already have a knowledge of basic financial accounting.

Recommended Textbook: Financial Management and Policy by James C. Van Horne, Fourth Edition, (Prentice Hall International, 1977).

483. Financing a small business. James Yu. B.Sc., M.B.A. Thursdays, 8.05-9.35 p.m., starting March 5, 1981. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 8 meetings. Fee: \$95

Many small businesses fail because of lack of financial planning. This course will introduce some general concepts of financial management and methods of financing which are relevant to the small business. Topics discussed will include

preparation of simple accounting records, principles of financial management such as contribution analysis, break even analysis and pro forms statement, and the structuring of banking facilities and their relevance in short to medium term financing. The course will be most useful for managers/owners of small businesses and junior banking executives.

484. Company Secretaryship. J. A. Ellis, E.D., F.I.I.A., F.H.K.S.A., A.A.S.A., A.A.I.M., A.C.I.S., M.I.T.O. Mondays, 7.15-9.15 p.m., starting February 16, 1981. Room 142, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$130

The practical aspects of the Company Secretary's job will be described with special reference to the procedures and administration of companies registered under the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. This course is suitable for students who wish to acquire a basic knowledge of Secretarial Practice for practical use as well as for students taking professional examinations.

485. Hong Kong Taxation: Law & Practice (Part 2). Edward Chow, A.A.S.A., F.H.K.S.A. Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 852, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 8 meetings. Fee: \$85

Though this is a continuation of the course begun last Autumn, it is open to all who are interested in Hong Kong Taxation. More advanced aspects of the Hong Kong Inland Revenue Ordinance will be studied together with the relevant tax cases.

Reference Book: Hong Kong Inland Revenue Ordinance (Cap. 112).

486. An Introduction to Aspects of Business Law. Terence Ma, A.C.M.A., A.M.B.I.M. Mondays, 6.15-7.15 p.m., starting February 16, 1981. Room 847, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$100

This course is for those junior members of the accounting profession who have no previous knowledge in this area. It will also be suitable for other business people who need to know about business law. Whilst reference will be made to the U.K. system, practical local examples and information on the Hong Kong legal structure will be included.

This course will be given in Cantonese, however applicants must have a knowledge of English as legal terms and any class handouts will be in English.

487. O & M (Part II). Richard H. K. Kong, A.I.B., M.B.I.M., A.M.I.T.D., M.Inst.A.M. Saturdays, 2.00-3.30 p.m., starting March 7, 1981. Room 16, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 8 meetings. Fee: \$85

As a companion course to O & M (Part I), attention will be concentrated on the practical aspects of O & M work. Participants who are interested in or responsible for the efficiency of office procedures can benefit most from the course. In addition to the study of topics on form design & control, office equipment appraisal, office layout planning, organisation manuals and relevant aspects of human relations and motivation, students will be given opportunities to discuss the application of O & M techniques to their real life problems.

490. Hongkong Statistics for Business. Fridays, 5.45-7.40 p.m., starting March 13, 1981. Room 28, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 11 meetings. Fee: \$280 (including publications and reports)

This course is offered in cooperation with the Census and Statistics Department. It is designed to put managers, administrators and planners in closer touch with the statistical data available in Hong Kong, and to show how such data may be used to assist in business and forecasting. The course is an integrated series of lectures/seminars by experts in the field.

An introductory survey of traditional price theory and national income analysis, based on the concepts of optimization and equilibrium. Topics covered will include consumption choice, production decisions, choice under uncertainty in portfolio analysis, and the price mechanism in simple markets. This course may be suitable for candidates preparing for professional examinations requiring a paper in Economics.

492. Principles of Economics II. Nelson Yeung Cheuk-wah, M.A. (Econ.) (Guelph). Tuesdays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting February 24, 1981. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$140

The course is designed for those who have taken Principles of Economics I or its equivalent. The instructor will use appropriate cases to show that economics is relevant to the everyday activities and situations of our personal life. Discussions will lie in the areas of micro and macro economics in an open economy with strong emphasis on the relevance of basic economic concepts. Good mathematics is not required but ability to interpret simple graphical presentation is essential.

494. 新聞的經濟角度 (Economics for Journalists)

時 間:一九八一年一月三十一日及二月十四日,共兩講;由下午二時至六時。

學 費:二百元,包括講義。

資源運用的緩急先後,分配的對象和影響,往往是一般社會公共問題的重心。 要能够有系統地處理這些問題,促進大衆的瞭解,便需要有分析問題的工具。

本課程的目的,在於向新聞從業員介紹一些與日常社會現象息息相關的經濟學概念,如價格在私營、牟利機構和公營、非牟利機構裹所起的作用;以供求關係成行政程序分配資源所帶來的後果。爲人關注的宏觀經濟學問題如通貨膨脹、工業多元化與經濟成長等,更是本科主要課題之一。

第一講包括:經濟學是甚麼;價格的功能;價格管制的用意和實效; 個 案 研究:租務管制的後果;討論:「市場失敗」與干預政策,公共選擇和非牟利機構的 行爲;個案研究:工業多元化;總結討論。

第二講包括:應用貨幣主義;通貨膨脹的「輸入」和「輸出」;個案研究:香港的貨幣、金融、財政體制;國際貿易與金融體制;總結討論:香港與中國現代化。 參加資格:新聞從業員,需在職機構推薦。

495. Practice of Banking. C. S. Chan, A.I.B. Fridays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 20, 1981. Room 28, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 14 meetings. Fee: \$160

The objective of the course is to provide students with basic banking knowledge. Topics to be discussed will include: relationship of banker and customer, banking operations, types of account-holder, securities for advances, advances to customers and bank services. This course may be suitable for students who are preparing themselves for professional examinations in Banking.

496. An International Approach to Modern Banking. Joseph S. K. Yu, B. Comm. (McGill), M.B.A. (British Columbia). Thursdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 19, 1981. Room 21, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

This course is designed for financial executives and bank officers who would like to familiarize themselves with recent developments in modern financing techniques. Topics to be discussed will include: credit analysis, cash flow projections, shipping and real estate financing, loan syndication and documentation, international capital markets, foreign exchange and money markets, accounting for international banks, budgeting, management information systems and profit planning. Prior knowledge of basic accounting is assumed.

497. International Banking. Kenneth C. S. Kwan, M.B.A. (Hawaii), Thursdays, 6.30-8.30 p.m., starting February 26, 1981. Room 227, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 15 meetings. Fee: \$175

A course for individuals entering the international banking field as management trainees or credit analysts and for those interested in the various sectors of international banking practice. Credit analysis, international loan syndication and bond issue, project financing, country risk, management of foreign exchange and currency risk and international corporate finance are among the topics to be discussed. Enrolment will be limited to 30 students and will be by selection of those most qualified to benefit from the course. Preference will be given to sponsored students. Applicants should have college level economics and finance.

498. Foreign Exchange. Kong Hin-man, A.I.B., M.Inst.A.M. (Dip.), A.F.I.B.A. Mondays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting February 16, 1981. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

Foreign exchange risk can affect everybody especially those who are involved in foreign currency transactions. The course is tailored for those who want to understand in depth the operations of foreign exchange and money markets. Discussion will centre on means of hedging foreign exchange risk, exchange rate forecasting, interest arbitration and the relationship of foreign exchange markets and money markets. Internal administration and control procedures will also be included.

The basic concepts of statistical theory will be introduced for those who wish to acquire some knowledge of elementary statistics and for candidates studying for professional examinations requiring a statistics paper. Topics to be covered include: presentation of data; frequency distributions; introductory probability and elementary probability distributions; sample and population; statistical inference.

503. An Introduction to Managerial Techniques. Vincent Ng, B.S., M.B.A., M.S. (UCLA), F.B.I.M. Mondays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting March 30, 1981. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

Modern managerial activity contains within it elements of both science and art. The evolution of managerial thinking will be examined, including the ideas developed by the Classical, Human Relations, Neo-classical, and Modern Schools of thought. Attention will also focus on the functions of the executive together with his role in establishing goals and strategy in the business enterprise. A variety of managerial techniques will be considered within the general framework of the need for corporate planning and for decision-making in conditions of uncertainty. Fundamental ideas will be illustrated with practical examples drawn from the financial, marketing and personnel areas of management.

The course will be suitable for young executives without formal knowledge of the full range of management techniques.

504. An Introduction to Business Management. Auyeung Ying-fai, B.A. (Whitworth Coll.) M.B.A. (Portland State). Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$95

Managing a modern business enterprise is an activity for which relatively few of those who become involved in it have had proper training. The functions of the managerial process will be examined, together with the design of structure necessary to accomplish organizational objectives, and the development of managerial thought in its historical context. Particular attention will be paid to an analysis of the three major functional disciplines—Manufacture, Finance and Marketing—and a case study will also be reviewed. This course has been specially designed for junior executives or those about to enter the management field, who wish to broaden their knowledge of modern management techniques.

505. Introduction to Financial Control. Vincent Ng, B.S., M.B.A., M.S. (UCLA), F.B.I.M., and Bingley Wong, B.Com., A.C.I.S., F.H.K.S.A., M.B.I.M. Saturdays, 2.00-3.30 p.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

A number of analytical techniques have been developed for solving financial problems within the company. The theory and practice of such methods will be examined in detail, including the establishment of basic plans for accounting, gearing cost structure to management, and the tax implications. Also to be considered are techniques for internal auditing, inventory evaluation and control, the management of funds, profit planning, budgeting, financial reporting systems, together with the evaluation of liquidity performance.

506. Introduction to Operational Research. F. K. W. Mak, Ph.D. (London), C.Eng., M.I.Mech.E., F.B.I.M. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$110

Operational Research is a most useful technique for all managers and administrators, enabling them to understand and use the more advanced methods of information collection, processing and control which lead to a more efficient organization. Students should have a basic knowledge of algebra but all other mathematical concepts will be explained. The course has been designed to suit those who have no previous knowledge of Operational Research and to act as an introductory course for those who wish to pursue more advanced studies in this area.

507. Work Study. Lui Sik-fai, M.Sc. (Aston), M.M.I.M. Tuesdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

The application of work study is one of the most important management techniques in improving productivity, planning and control, and labour relations in industrial and commercial concerns. Amongst the techniques to be covered are: the relationship between work study, productivity and standard of living; the scientific and systematic approach to method study; standard time; work measurement techniques; time study; predetermined motion time system (PMTS); analytical estimating and activity sampling; human factors in work study.

508. Manufacturing Planning and Control. Alfred Chan Tit-yu, B.Sc. (New York State), M.Sc. (Georgia I.T.). Wednesdays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

Planning and control problems in manufacturing industry present managers with some of the most complex and important areas of decision-making. This course is designed for junior and middle managers in the production field who face such problems. Planning and reporting techniques will be analyzed together with the relation between production and other functional areas of manufacture. Specific attention will be paid to demand forecasting, design and industrial engineering, the planning of production and materials flow, operations scheduling, and reporting control on the shop floor.

509. Materials Management: a conceptual approach. L. Cdr. J. E. Flanagan, U.S.N., B.Sc. (Annapolis), M.S. (Monterey). Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 28, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8 F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

Materials Management is an emerging concept whereby industrial, commercial and governmental organizations recognize that pushasing, production and distribution are not separate activities but three aspects of one basic task:

controlling the flow of materials and products from sources of supply, through manufacturing, and out through channels of distribution and into the hands of customers.

The course will benefit managers involved in any aspect of purchasing, production and distribution and will emphasize the significant contributions that can be made by materials managers in an age of scarce and ever more costly resources.

510. Organization Planning. Robert Powell, B.A. (East Anglia), D.M.S., M.M.S., M.B.I.M. Mondays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 16, 1981. Room 30, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$95

The design of the structures of commercial, public and industrial concerns is now recognized as a most important ingredient in their success. This course will concentrate on the relationship of growth and change to organization structure. Special attention will be paid to the implications of strategies, systems, environment, role prescription and the resolution of conflict in the design of organizations. The course is aimed to help managers who are involved in the process of organizational change to extend their knowledge of the factors involved.

511. Starting and Managing a Small Business. Chung Wing-kee, B.A. (Western Ontario), F.I.E.M., M.B.I.M. Fridays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 20, 1981, Room 30, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

The vast majority of business enterprises in Hong Kong are small in size. To launch and sustain such an enterprise is often a matter of high risk, involving careful assessment of all the financial, marketing, product and general business factors involved. This course is offered to those who are considering such a venture and wish to have a framework within which to proceed. Use will be made of case material in order to illustrate the legal and financial problems involved.

512. International Business. Lok Hung-Fai, B.Comm. (Concordia), M.B.A. (Br.Col.). Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 30. Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

The growth of business across national boundaries has brought about many changes, notably in the emergence of the multi-national organization whose responsibilities stretch beyond the jurisdiction of any one country. Operating a business enterprise in this context throws up potentially complex problems of structure and relationships, political and economic factors, and issues affecting the global strategy of the firm. The basic objective of this course is to introduce the student to some basic management skills in handing the problems in multinational business: to strengthen students' practical analysis and decision-making skills within international business situations. Discussion exercises and case study will be considered.

513. An Introduction to Marketing. Albert Chan, B.Sc. (H.K.), M.B.A. (C.U.H.K.). Tuesdays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 23, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 10 meetings. Fee: \$95

Marketing has been described as the performance of those activities that direct the flow of good and services from producer to consumer or user. This concept will be considered from its base to the modern practice of marketing management. The course has been designed for those who have no previous experience of the implications of marketing techniques and who wish to equip themselves for work in this field. Special attention will be paid to the organization of various marketing activities in order to ensure that they are properly co-ordinated.

514. International Marketing. Nelson Cheung, B.B.A. (C.U.H.K.). Fridays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting February 20, 1981. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$110

Marketing is a selling philosophy and an art of achieving objectives through the satisfaction of others. This course uses a managerial approach as the basis for decision-making in international marketing management. Topics covered include: planning and organizing for international marketing, international policy on product, pricing, promotion and distribution channels, coordination and controlling of world marketing operations. Advertising in some specific markets will also be considered. This course is intended for those who want to become marketing management executives working in an international context. Knowledge of basic marketing will be an advantage but is not essential.

515. The Marketing of Tourism. Maine Li, B.B.A. (Hawaii), M.B.A. (Texas). Saturdays, 2.00-3.30 p.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

The different facets of Hong Kong's Tourist Industry represent a marketing situation of large and growing proportions. Tourism may be defined as a series of interlinked elements in the marketing mix, covering people, promotions, the distribution of facilities, the product being marketed, and its price. All of these features of the Tourist Industry play their part in the attraction of visitors to Hong Kong. Special emphasis will be placed on the role of the Tourist Association and of techniques of Market Research in making the best use of facilities for developing tourism. The development of short and long term strategies for the Tourist Industry will also be a major theme. This course has been designed to be of interest to the wide variety of people who are directly or indirectly connected with tourism in Hong Kong.

516. Marketing Management. Gavin Wu, B.B.A., M.B.A. (Iowa). Saturdays, 2.00-3.30 p.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 30, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

Successful marketing is the key to business success. The application of the marketing concept makes it necessary that all elements in the organization should have their activities focussed upon the attainment of specific marketing goals.

The theory and practice of marketing will be dealt with in detail, including the definition of the market and consumer acceptance, marketing organization, market research, channels of distribution, selling, pricing policies and advertising and sales promotion activity. The tutor will address himself particularly to the problems of marketing consumer goods in the context of Hong Kong. This course is intended for junior executives whether in a specialist marketing area or not and for those engaged in General Management who wish to gain a greater insight into the relevance and working of the marketing function in a business operation.

517. Shipping Practice and Management. Maine Li, B.B.A. (Hawaii), M.B.A. (Texas). Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 21, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

Import and export trade is the essence of Hong Kong's economy. Shipping practice is directly or indirectly related to all kinds of import and export trade. This course will cover the basic knowledge concerning shipping practice and management. Topics to be discussed include: the functions of a Bill of Lading; containerization; different kinds of shipping companies and their functions; general structure and ship types; freight rate structure; maritime liens; chartering and charter-parties; the relationship between ship owners and merchants; the duties and authority of the master and the crew; shipping documents and procedure; loading and stowage of cargo; sales and purchase of vessels; the public control of shipping and navigation; marine pollution control; collisions and liability for damage; marine insurance; and the navigation of ships and safety at sea. Current issues concerning the shipping industry will also be discussed.

518. Personnel Management and Industrial Relations. Kwong Kam-yin, B.B.A. (C.U.H.K.), M.Sc. (Aston), A.M.I.P.M. Saturdays, 2.00-3.30 p.m., starting February 21, 1981. Room 21, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

The personnel function has emerged to become one of the most important elements in the successful running of an organization. The role of the personnel specialist will be considered in detail, notably in recruitment and selection, manpower planning, training and development, staff appraisal, wage and salaries administration, job analysis and evaluation. Also to be considered will be the range of interview and social skills needed by the Personnel Manager. Particular attention will be paid to the role of the personnel specialist in the Industrial Relations function: the opportunities and problems presented in the context of Hong Kong. The course is designed for those about to enter or recently involved in the personnel function.

519. Practising Personnel Management. Mannan H. Najmee, B.Soc.Sc. (H.K.), M.Sc. (Strathclyde), M.Sc. (Hull). Wednesdays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings.

Most enterprises have a Personnel Department whose functions vary according to the size and purpose of the organization. In this course the five general personnel functions will be examined: employment, training, wages and salaries, industrial relations and welfare and safety. Special attention will be paid to the problems of manpower planning, identifying training needs, methods of recruitment and selection, wage payment systems, salaries administration, job evaluation, industrial negotiations and occupational health and safety. The purpose of the course will be to increase participants' knowledge of the personnel function and relate these activities to the needs of business as a whole.

The course will discuss the philosophy, theories and the exercise of authority in the context of the contemporary teacher, the role of rituals, discipline and punishment in schools, the relationship between authority, sanctions and freedom and the effect of different types of institutions on the development of the free person.

532. Microprocessor Fundamentals. H. F. Li, M.S., Ph.D. (Calif.), M.I.E.E.E., Lecturer in Electrical Engineering, University of Hong Kong, C. C. Lau, M.Phil. (H.K.), M.I.E.E.E., Y. S. This course is designed for people in the computer/electronics field interested in updating their knowledge in microprocessors/microcomputers. A prior exposure to microprocessors will not be assumed. Preference will be given to those with a knowledge of computer programming and electronics.

Syllabus: Machine language programming, microprocessor architecture, system design, supporting components, input/output techniques, peripheral control techniques, peripheral equipments, micro-computer software system.

This course is designed for people with engineering and programming backgrounds. It aims to provide a more in-depth knowledge of the structure and design of advanced computers, usable in super-machines as well as microcomputers. System design methodology will be studied as an integral piece of hardware and software. A previous exposure to computer organisation would be helpful.

Syllabus: Processing architecture: variations in processor design (parallel/pipelined/array/associative/stack-processing), bussing, example systems. Memory architecture: memory hierarchy, virtual memory, cache, primary memory interconnections, memory performance evaluation. Soft-ware architecture: software design, operating system fundamental. Miscellaneous: microprogramming theory and practice, fault-tolerant computing.

534. Thyristor Applications in Power Engineering. C. C. Chan, B.Sc. (Peking Inst. of Mining), Postgr. Dip. (Tsing Hua), Sen. M.I.E.E.E., M.H.K.I.E. Wednesdays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting February 11, 1981. Room 167, Main Building, University of Hong Kong. 20 meetings. Fee: \$300

This course is designed for graduates or practising engineers in the electrical industry to familiarize them with modern applications of thyristors in machine controls and power systems.

Outline of Syllabus: Thyristors and their characteristics. Thyristor converters. D. C. Motor control using thyristors. A.C. variable speed drive using thyristors. HVDC power transmission. Static var systems for voltage and reactive power control. Interface between power electronic equipment and the utility supply system.

Entry Qualifications: Applicants should have either a Bachelor's degree, Polytechnic Higher Diploma or Higher Certificate in Electrical or Electronics Engineering or equivalent and should have related industrial experience.

By showing the contrast in stress and intonation between English and Chinese (Cantonese and Mandarin) the tutor will help the Chinese student to grasp:

The ability to write clear and effective reports is essential to a successful career in business because reports pervade all modern business operations. These reports may be oral or written, routine, periodic or special-purpose. They may take the form of a memorandum or letter or may warrant a special format. However presented, reports preserve and interchange information that keeps modern business operative. No discussion of business systems, organization, management or methodology is complete without some assumption of an efficient reporting system. Thus, reports are the basic tools of any business organization. Reports must be structured physically and logically to present information as clearly as possible. They must present data explicitly and implicitly in a dynamic format so that both primary and secondary readers are guided to the information they need.

Participants in the course will learn how to plan their reports so that the physical structure supports the message. They will learn to display key items at a glance and slot explanatory material where it logically belongs. By learning how to plan an efficient tool design for reports, participants will reduce the difficulty of presenting their ideas accurately and clearly.

Enrolment will be limited to 25 students and will be by selection of those most qualified to benefit from the course of tuition. All applicants should be university graduates or have been awarded either the Department's Certificate in English for Business since 1976 or Grade 'D' or above in the Use of English at Hong Kong University Matriculation level.

556. Legal English. Jean Hopkin, B.A. (Middx Poly.), Dip. Law. Wednesdays, 7.15-8.45 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$110

This course is therefore designed to assist those people whose work brings them into contact with legal terminology, but to whom English is a second language. This course will introduce teachers to some of the new developments in English language teaching and their possible impact on syllabus design and classroom procedures. Lectures and discussions will be supported by the showing of films.

Fee: \$80

The teaching of English can very easily become rather too formal and academic, with the emphasis placed on reading and writing only. The result is frequently that the students have considerable difficulty in speaking the language they have learned. The current trend, however, towards introducing language teaching games into the teaching of English has had the effect of de-formalising the teaching and making what is learnt more applicable to real life. Students will thus be able to make use of what they have learned, and this will have a positive effect on both their motivation and achievement.

The aim of this course is to devise and practise language teaching games for use in the classroom. Those introduced in the course will be situation-based, and there will be extensive use of micro-dialogue, with the students themselves speaking and responding in natural, spoken English. Consideration will also be given to different ways of playing the games and to the linguistic aims involved.

Participants should be prepared to play an active role in the group and be ready to adapt the games considered to the needs of their own pupils. They may be asked to bring their own materials and to devise and take part in the games.

Enrolment will be limited to 20 persons and may be by selection of those most qualified to benefit from the course of tuition. Preference will be given to those teaching English in Lower Secondary forms.

Fee Refund: on being accepted for this course, teachers of English will be sent a full fee refund application form, which they should forward to the Director of Education, together with their course fee receipt. This applies to all teachers

559. Literature in the Classroom. Mrs. S. P. Holgate, B.A. (Reading). Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 17, 1981. Room 205, Maryknoll Sisters' School, 2nd floor, Blue Pool Road. 10 meetings. Fee: \$100

Literature teaching is often seen as the onerous task of explaining texts to students line by line. This course will explore more stimulating and enjoyable methods of teaching literature in a classroom situation. Particular attention will be paid to stylistic appreciation and this exercise should help the teacher better understand how to read a text closely as well as inspire broader teaching methods. Although this course is primarily designed to meet the needs of teachers of English literature in secondary schools, others who are interested in exploring the question of what qualities transform the written page into a creative piece of art, may also apply for admission.

Is there such a thing as "American" culture? How do Americans look upon themselves? What are some of the forces which have shaped America into what it is today? To answer these questions, we must be aware of the history and development of American society. And, in studying the short story rather than history as such, we can observe how individual writers have commented on over 300 years of change in the American way of life. We will take a selection of American short stories in chronological order, from the 1600's to the present, and discuss them as they relate to the growing complexity of life in the U.S.A.

Wednesdays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting February 18, 1981. Room 29, St. Mary's Canossian College, 3rd floor, 162 Austin Road (entrance from Kimberley Road, Tsimshatsui). 10 meetings. Fee: \$90

Many British and American poets of this century have made extensive use of idiomatic language in their writing. Colloquial and popular figures of speech can often help define the particular dramatic presence or "voice" which seems to be speaking in a poem. Such current language forms in poetry will also enable the reader to appreciate the rich poetic potential of various idioms.

This course is organised around two main goals. First, we will study numerous figures of speech representing a broad variety of cultures and language styles. Secondly, by examining these idioms in the context of the poems, we will try to determine what kinds of poetic and social visions can be illustrated by the

literary use of idiomatic language.

Classes will follow a discussion format. Reading and discussion will centre around a number of generally short poems by contemporary poets.

563. 确物與岩石鑑定 (The identification of minerals and rocks)

本課程爲「香港自然地理野外考察」課程中礦物岩部分的擴展,結合標本對 香港的礦物與岩石作較爲詳細的講授,並着重介紹鑑別方法。

主要內容爲.礦物的定義,主要分類,形態及物理性質,香港主要金屬礦物 及主要造岩礦物的分述及其內眼鑑定。岩石的分類,主要火成岩、沉積岩、變質岩 的組成成分,結構、構造及鑑定。凡會選修或同時選修「香港自然地理野外考察」 課程者,可優先取錄。

本課程適合中學教師,工程地質,珠寶鑑定,以及對岩石,礦物有興趣的人 仕選修。(限收二十五人)。

The following topics will be discussed with the aim of providing practising Civil and Structural Engineers with up-to-date knowledge of recent trends in geotechnical engineering: site investigation techniques; rock mechanics: properties of intact rocks and their measurement, shear strength of jointed rocks; rock slope stability: rock joint survey and graphical presentation on stereonets methods of slope stability analysis, theory and design of rock anchors; soil mechanics: properties of soils and their measurement; soil slope stability: limit equilibrium methods; infiltration theories: infiltration of rain water into unprotected slopes and its effect on slope stability, physics of unsaturated flow; earth pressures on retaining structures; dewatering: effects on buildings; and modern stress-strain theories and computational methods: tensor notations, constitutive laws, introduction to finite element method, limit analyses, implication of strainsoftening in geotechnical engineering.

A basic knowledge of China's historical development through indepth analyses of the key issues is vital to an understanding of present-day China. The thematic approach is adopted to make meaningful China's complex transformation since 1842. The course will touch upon the following essential themes: Traditional Chinese World Order and the Tributary System; Internal Rebellion and Dynastic Decline; Reform and Chinese Conservatism; Nationalism, Revolution and Western Ideas; Marxism and Chinese Communism: KMT-CCP Rivalry; Land and the Peasants; the Gentry; Foreign Economic Activities and Imperialism; Modernization and the People's Republic.

《美學》作爲一門獨立科學是從一七五零年德國哲學家鮑姆嘉通開始的。其實 自從人類有藝術創作以來,就十分關心美學上的各種問題,並致力於這些問題的探 討和研究。在西方,從古希臘已開始美學的研究,柏拉圖和亞理斯多德這兩位哲學 大師就寫過不少美學和詩學的論著,影响後世深遠。

長期以來,美學偏重文藝理論方面,其中亦涉及音樂美學。公元前六世紀中葉哲學家畢達格拉斯認爲「音樂使宇宙諧和,一如數學與天文學」;公元前五世紀的柏拉圖主張音樂是社會與政治的教育工具;普羅丁納斯覺得音樂就是神力;而十七世紀的電布尼茲研究所得到的結論是「音樂是無意識數學之運算」。

哲學家與心理學家對音樂美學的觀點如上所述,而音樂家、音樂理論家的看法另有角度。克萊茲希瑪認爲音樂既非繪畫之代替,亦非自然產物,而是一篇精緻、優美絕倫之詩歌、散文。十九世紀德國音樂理論家雨果。瑞曼則認爲音樂作品是作曲者與聽家之間的媒介。另外一派則認爲音樂是純藝術,音樂應有力、優美、親切、富於情感。漢斯利克、哈爾姆、庫爾特、賀爾曼、姚德等十九世紀音樂理論家極力主張摒除情感與幻想,音樂作品只是聲音移動之形態的結果。

《音樂美學》課程將探討上述各點以及音樂作品與聽衆之間的關係。

(Certificate Course in Japanese)

宗 旨:本課程的開設是完全適應香港環境之所需,提供一項有系統性而分階數的日語訓練,給予一般從事工商、文教等各業人任一種進修日本語文的機會,以提高他們的工作條件及通過日語的學習,進而加深了解另一種文化。

山水畫在中國繪畫史上有千餘年的悠久歷史,早在唐代(公元618—905)著名的山水畫家王維的山水畫已經達到「畫中有詩」的高深意境,明末石濤並以李白、孟浩然、王維等富有畫意的詩,作爲山水畫的主題,寫出詩中的意境。所以中國山水畫首重意境,不同西洋風景畫的寫生。

本課程使學者對山水畫各項基本技法的熟練,養成主題內容意境的描繪。內容包括:筆與墨的調和;水與色的**渲染**;皴與擦的變化;古與今的比較;「詩中有畫」的啟發;「畫中有詩」的探討及紙與絹的運用。除堂課之外,並注重課外習作。 (限收二十人)。

本課程特爲有志研習中國書法藝術者而設,內容包括:甲骨文的書法藝術;鐘鼎文的書法藝術;石鼓文的書法藝術;小篆的書法藝術;古隸的書法藝術;八分書的藝術;正榜的書法藝術;行草書的藝術及即席示範,批改習作。

附記:本季課程以古典書法藝術爲重點,即以大篆小篆書法藝術爲研習中心, 佔十四講,古隸,八分,佔二講,正楷佔二講,行草書佔二講。

681. Moral Questions. Laurence Goldstein, Ph.D. (St. Andrews), Lecturer in Philosophy, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting March 10, 1981. Room 732, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. To meetings.

The purpose of this course is to raise for discussion a set of central and interrelated moral questions. Participants will not be discouraged from expressing their own views, but should have a serious interest in being proved wrong. Among the questions to be considered are: Is religion the basis of, or a substitute for, morality? Why marriage? What is the importance of filial piety? Is it always wrong to kill or let die? Are there persuasive arguments against acting only out of self-interest? In what sense, if any, is equality desirable? Can restrictions on freedom ever be justified?

682. Contemporary English Philosophy. Joseph C. T. Lee, LL.B. (H.K.), B.A. (London). Wednesdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting March 4, 1981. Room 21, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$90

The course aims at introducing the layman interested in philosophy to the predominant ideas that have evolved in the English philosophical scene during the present century. The sharpened techniques developed in the writings of contemporary English philosophers will be contrasted with the traditional ways of doing philosophy. Starting with Russell's logical atomism, the course will further discuss the tenets of logical positivism formulated in the works of Carnap and Ayer. However, the main emphasis will be centred upon the so called "linguistic philosophy" as practised by such Oxford philosophers as Austin, Ryle and Strawson. The importance of Wittgenstein will also be underlined. Illustrations will be drawn from logic, metaphysics, ethics and other branches of philosophy to assist understanding. Previous knowledge of philosophy will be an asset but not a prerequisite.

日常生活中常碰到的古文、四書片段和時下的世論,其中的思想概念有被我們接受的,有被我們懷疑的,而事實上,它們都直接或間接影响我們的心態及人生觀。為了啟發我們的思考能力和增强我們的分析和推理能力,本課程特別從古文,四書及今文中選出若干有趣味性的,較為人所熟知的,與現實社會有關的片段作為分析討論的例子。

687. 中國上古社思想研究 (Ancient Chinese Social Thought)

在太古初開的時代,先民留下千古名言,面對宇宙人生,建立精神的基礎;這個時代的思想特色是原始、渾厚、眞率、簡樸;但正因爲這些特色,他們的思想看來是不成體系,沒有邏輯,往往被後人忽視或曲解,再加上漫長的歲月洗刷,流傳至今的資料就只有一些斷簡殘篇及朦朧的神話傳說。要研究上古社會的思想,就憑意些零碎的資料,整理線索,加以各種的補述,逐步勾劃出先民思想的原來面貌。

本課程將從下列的角度去了解中國上古社會的思想特色:母系思想在原始社羣之衍生;中國社會之圖騰思想及其演化;「社稷」崇拜之農業基礎;「祖妣」崇拜及宗法社會之奠基;中國上古社會「公天下」之政治典範。

個人的身心成長與健全的心態有密切的關係,而一般人對於何謂健全與不健全心態的觀念和認識亦因複雜的社會和不同的文化背景而顯得混淆,本課程的目的是透過介紹常見有問題的心理和行為的徵象及成因去促進對健全和不健全心態的了解。內容包括:變態心理學的歷史背景和基本理論;神經病;精神性:性格失調;精神分裂;心理生理性問題等。

691. 現代父母之道入門 (Effective Parenthood)

一貫以來,我們的社會都流傳一種「天下無不是父母」的觀念;事實上,父母對子女的愛雖是無可置疑,但表達方式卻未盡是恰當,於是有所謂代溝;加以社會的基本結構已從大家庭演變爲小家庭,欠缺經驗也常令養兒育女成爲難事。所以去探討如何有效地表達愛的訊息是非常重要,而此又常牽涉青年父母本身的言行修養,致養兒育女的神聖工作不再是生而知之,而進爲學而知之。

Who is Zhao Ziyang? What is the National People's Congress? What are the Four Modernizations? This seminar-style course is not only designed for those seeking answers to the above questions, but also for those with a strong interest in current events/developments in the People's Republic. The approach here will be comprehensive, dealing with China's political scene, economic programmes, social changes—and paying special attention to major happenings whenever they occur.

Guest lecturers will be invited. Reading materials will also be made available (Enrolment limited to 20.)

In the face of widespread alienation and socio-cultural disintegration, what is the possibility of personal and political transformation in the modern world? The course will concentrate on the practical consequences of political theory, drawing on a variety of classical (Plato, Augustine, Hobbs and Rousseau), Modern (Marx, S. Weil, Rosenstock-huessy) and contemporary political thinkers. We will investigate the concept of transformation, its justification and process, methods of transformation, and the link between personal and political change.

A book of readings will be distributed at the first class session.

The modernization of China requires for its success an atmosphere of regional peace and stability. The ASEAN states have been drawn together temporarily in opposition to an apparently expansionist Viet Nam, but the difference of outlook and of domestic political circumstances of the ASEAN member-states seem difficult to reconcile in the longer term. Tensions in South Asia are unresolved. In these circumstances, what are the chances for the regional peace so desired by the present leaders of China? What are the consequences of major breakdown of regional order in the coming decades? This course discusses these

and related questions as they affect the present and future phases of China's search for security, and the interaction of these factors in the other states of the Asian region.

701. The Ultra-structure of Cells and Microorganisms. D. A. Griffiths, Ph.D., D.Sc. (Wales), Professor of Botany, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting February 10, 1981, Seminar Room, Northcote Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 8 meetings. Fee: \$100

This course will consider the structure of plant and animal cells as seen under the electron microscope. The importance and function of cell organelles will be included and variations from the basic plan as shown in different microorganisms (Algae, Fungi and Bacteria) will be discussed. It will be of particular interest to Biology teachers who may soon be teaching the new 'A' level syllabus.

Fee Refund: on being accepted for this course, teachers of 4th, 5th and 6th forms of biology will be sent a full fee refund application form, which they should forward to the Director of Education together with their course fee receipt. This applies to all teachers in Government, aided and private schools. (Closing date for applications: February 3.)

702. Hong Kong Trees and Shrubs. D. R. Kemp, B.Sc., Dip. Microbiology, M.Sc., Ph.D., M.I. Biol., Staff Tutor in Science, University of Hong Kong. Thursdays, 6.30-8.00 p.m., starting February 26, 1981. Lecture Room 302, Northcote Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 7 meetings. Fee: \$120

This course should be of use to secondary school teachers and interested laymen who wish to have a better knowledge of our local woody plants. Their classification into Families, based on the structure of the flowers, will form the basis of the course, and emphasis will be laid on locally occurring species, the recognition of which is essential for the study of plant ecology. It should be of interest to those who will soon be teaching the new 'A' level Biology syllabus. The plants considered will be demonstrated by fresh specimens or by the projection of slide transparencies wherever possible. In addition there will be two field trips, the cost of which is included in the fee.

Fee Refund: on being accepted for this course, teachers of biology will be sent a full fee refund application form, which they should forward to the Director of Education together with their course fee receipt. This applies to all teachers in Government, aided and private schools. (Closing date for applications: February 19.)

703. The Sea Shore Ecology of Hong Kong. B. S. Morton, B.Sc., Ph.D. (Lond.), Reader in Zoology, University of Hong Kong. A six day residential field course at the Y.M.C.A. Hostel at Wu Kwai Sha, Tolo Harbour, from 4 p.m. Sunday April 19, till 2 p.m. Saturday April 25, 1981. Accommodation is in 2 bedded rooms.

Fee: \$580 (including accommodation and full board).

The course will comprise general lectures covering sea-shore ecology. There will be special lectures followed by field trips to the following habitats: mangroves

and mud flats; sand flats; cobble/crevice shores; exposed rocky shores and the coral subtidal. Field trips will be followed by laboratory sessions where the student will be encouraged to investigate for himself the floristic and faunistic components of each habitat.

This is an aquatic field course aimed specifically at local teachers of Biology of 4th, 5th and 6th forms. It should be of considerable help to those who will soon be teaching the new 6th form syllabus. It should also be of interest to members of the general public who wish to know more about Hong Kong's marine environment.

Fee Refund: on being accepted for this course, teachers of biology will be sent a half-fee refund application form, which they should forward to the Director of Education together with their course fee receipt. 704. The History and Development of Computers and Microelectronics. W. A. Atherton, B.Sc., Ph.D., C. Eng., M.I.E.E., M.I.E.E.E., M. Inst. P., Lecturer in Electrical Engineering, University of Hong Kong. Thursdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 12, 1981. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 6 meetings. Fee: \$80

This course examines the developments in electronics which have led to the use of the microprocessor as an electronic component. The historical development of electronics and component technology will be examined with special emphasis on post World War Two developments in microelectronics and computers. It should appeal to electronic technologists who seek a wider view of their subject, relating economic, social and technical factors.

705. Gemstones: Theory and Practice. D. Healey, B.Sc., Ph.D., F.G.A. (Lond.), Lecturer in Physics, University of Hong Kong, Chairman, Gemological Association of Hong Kong. Two parallel courses on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 7.00–8.30 p.m., starting April 7 and 9, 1981 respectively. Room 124, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 8 meetings for each group. Fee: \$350

The aim will be to provide the basic background to enable people to collect and appreciate gemstones and avoid the pitfalls and costly mistakes that plague the novice. The course will involve some practical work and while basic gemmological knowledge will be taught, the emphasis will be on simple observation. The topics to be covered include Diamond, Emerald, Aquamarine, Ruby, Sapphire, Jade, Opal, Topaz, Quartz, Moonstone, Amber, Coral, Pearls, Lapis Lazuli, Garnets, Peridot, Malachite, Tourmaline, Turquoise, Spinel, Zircon, Chrysoberyl. Imitation and synthetic gems will also be discussed and methods of detection demonstrated.

Each group will be restricted to a maximum of twelve persons.

A course on the art and science of diamond grading. The methods adopted by the Gemmological Institute of America (GIA) and the Gemmological Association of Great Britain to grade the clarity, colour and proportion of diamonds will be explained. While the most advanced instrumentation will be demonstrated, the emphasis will be on basic techniques requiring only the simplest tools available in any jewellery store. Topics covered will include properties of diamonds, proportions, colour, clarity and pricing. Enrolment is limited to 12 people in each course, and will be confined to bona fide jewellery trade workers.

Students will be required to bring their identity card or passport to the first session in order to comply with insurance regulations.

710. Computerisation Made Simple. K. T. Lui, B.Sc. (Special) (H.K.). Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting March 12, 1981. Room 229, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$130

Computer involvement has become a commonplace in any system endeavour. This course aims at introducing students to the potential of computers, and to enable them to understand the basic functional parts of a computer. It shows computer users where the problems lie and what they can positively do to encourage success in computerisation of projects. In addition, fundamental knowledge of the power and limitation of the computer will be introduced.

This course assumes no prior technical knowledge of computers and leads participants through to a sophisticated appreciation of the purposes and methods for assessing the computer as an aid to the business enterprise, without losing sight of the need for simple and economic solutions. Frequent case histories will be used as illustrations.

Recommended Reading: Data Processing Made Simple by Susan Wooldridge.

711. Computer Applications: the Executive's Viewpoint. Miss Sylvia N. Y. Tse, B.Sc. (Wisconsin). Wednesdays, 6.10-7.40 p.m., starting March 4, 1981. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$130

This course aims to identify and explore the application of computers in accounting, administration, finance, management and marketing. Data processing will be dealt with in a depth sufficient for understanding the usage of computers as would be experienced by an executive. Preferably students should have at least some experience in a large corporation, and should have an understanding of its administrative structure. Topics to be covered include:

- What is a computer? Main types of hardware and software and their functions; a brief guide to computer jargon; case study: the configuration of a typical large computer user in Hong Kong.
- The place of the computer in an organization. Computer people and their jobs; relationships between users and computer people; case study: the administrative structure of a large computer dearptment in Hong Kong, and its place in the organization.
- Problems with the computer. The communications gap: talking to computer people; design of reports and screens; case study: a large computer system that failed.
- The user's role in systems analysis and design. Requesting an improvement in your system; helping with the design of new systems; definition of goals; anticipating problems; case study: improving an accounts receivable system.

712. Basic Principles of Computer Systems. P. F. Tse, B.Sc. (H.K.), Assistant Computer Officer, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 7.15-9.15 p.m., starting February 24, 1981. Room 167, University Main Building. 14 meetings.

Fee: \$150

This course aims to provide an explanation of how computer systems operate. It places equal emphasis on software and hardware aspects of computer systems and due consideration will be given to mini and micromachines. It is designed for people who have no previous knowledge of computers and is specially suitable for people thinking of taking up data processing as a career, as well as those whose work involves contact with computers. It may be considered as a preliminary to the 'Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming'.

The syllabus will include: overview of computer development, software and hardware interactions, computer structure, internal & external representation of information, data capturing and display devices, communication devices, study of data processing logic, procedure and algorithms, flowcharting, computer programming languages, concept of data processing methods and systems, internal computer operations, storage: volatile & nonvolatile, magnetic & nonmagnetic, disks, tapes, floppy disks; system security, backup and reliability.

713. Introduction to Data Processing. S. M. Chung, B.A. (H.K.), M.Sc., Ph.D. (Wisconsin), Lecturer in Computer Science, University of Hong Kong, and C. W. Liu, B.Sc. (H.K.). Mondays, 6.15-8.15 p.m., starting March 2, 1981. Room 725, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 8 meetings. Fee: \$130

This course is intended for those whose work involves contact with computer systems and who wish to obtain a fundamental understanding of the principles and methods of electronic data processing. It will be helpful to those who are preparing to take Data Processing in IDP, accounting, business or management examinations. No previous knowledge of computers is necessary but applicants should have passed English and Mathematics in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination or equivalent. It may be considered as a preliminary to the 'Certificate course in Digital Computer Programming'.

The syllabus will include: basic elements of a computer; data storage; input/output devices; punched-card data processing, the role of the systems analyst and relationships between users and computer people; data collection and organization; computer programming languages; file updating, sorting and searching; direct access methods and random processing; real-time, time-sharing and on-line systems, database management information systems. Relevant case studies or examples will be introduced. Computer time will be provided for participants to obtain some experience of using computing facilities.

Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming.

These courses are designed for people with no previous knowledge of computer programming. They aim to provide a thorough grounding in programming technique and to train independent computer programmers. Preference will be given to applicants to whom the skills taught during the course will be of direct relevance. Those who are able to enclose a letter from their employers to this effect are advised to do so.

Minimum Entry Qualifications: Applicants should have 5 subjects including English and Mathematics at Grade E or above in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination or equivalent. It is advantageous to the students if they have completed the Extra-Mural course, "Basic Principles of Computer Systems" or "Introduction to Data Processing". In addition, it is desirable that they have attended the Extra-Mural course in BASIC programming.

An examination will be conducted at the end of the course. The award of an extra-mural certificate is conditional on passing the written examination, completing the set projects and attending at least 75% of the lectures.

Students are expected to do a certain amount of work in their own time and are advised not to take any other public examination in the same year.

Syllabus:

Introduction: computer concepts; storage representation; problem definition and problem solving technique; flowchart.

Fortran: data values and types; storage allocation; arrays and strings; expressions, assignment statements; control statements; subroutines and program structure; input/output; applications to scientific problems.

Cobol: overview of the COBOL language; features of identification division, environment division, data division and procedure division; conditions and conditional statements; table handling technique; file processing concepts; structured programming; typical commercial system using COBOL; case studies.

Projects: the organization, writing and running of projects on digital computers form an integral part of the course.

Ample computer time will be provided for problem exercises and projects.

Closing date for application: February II, 1981.

Enrolment for each course is limited to 50 students.

- 716. Advanced Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming. Wednesdays and Fridays, 6.15–8.45 p.m., starting March 18, 1981. Wednesdays in Room 743, Knowles Building; Fridays in Room 732, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 55 meetings (including computing workshops), twice weekly.

This course is a follow-up of the Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming. It aims to provide a thorough training in computer programming. Preference will be given to applicants who are programmers or potential programmers. Those who are able to enclose supporting documents to this effect are advised to do so. Interviews might be required.

Minimum Entry Qualifications: applicants should have completed successfully a Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming offered by the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of Hong Kong, or equivalent.

An examination will be conducted at the end of the course. The award of an extra-mural certificate is conditional on passing the written examination, completing the projects and attending at least 75% of the lectures.

Students are expected to do a certain amount of work in their own time and are advised not to take any other public examination in the same year.

Syllabus:

Advanced Features of Cobol and Fortran: structured programming with Cobol; structured programming with Fortran; sequential and direct access; modular programs.

Data Processing: handling of data; storage devices; introduction to systems analysis and design; concepts of data base.

Data and File Structures: linear lists, stacks, queues, etc.; applications of fundamental data structures to programming techniques, searching and sorting; sequential files, indexed sequential files and direct files; their organization and processing.

Searching and Sorting Algorithms: linear search, binary search, direct search; internal and external sorts.

Programming Methodology: program style, design, efficiency, debugging and testing.

Features of PL/1, ALGOL and PASCAL.

Projects.

Ample computer time will be provided for exercises and projects.

717. Computers, and BASIC Programming, for Secondary School Teachers. P. F. Tse, B.Sc. (H.K.), Assistant Computer Officer, and other staff members of the Computer Centre, University of Hong Kong. Lectures on Fridays, 7.00–9.00 p.m., starting April 24, 1981. Room 231, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. Computer Workshops on either (a) Tuesdays, 8.00–9.45 p.m., starting June 9, 1981, or Wednesdays, (b) 6.15–8.00 p.m., (c) 8.00–9.45 p.m., starting June 10, 1981 (all students will attend the same lectures on Fridays and select one terminal workshop on either Tuesdays or Wednesdays), Room 218, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 18 lecture meetings and 12 workshop meetings.

Fee: \$600

Secondary school teachers will be provided with a fundamental knowledge of microcomputers so that they may be able to use them as a tool in their work. A training of the interactive mode of processing will also be introduced through the study of BASIC.

Participants will be required to attend separate terminal workshops and seminars in addition to lectures. They will have to work on assignments and a small project of their own. Topics to be covered will include:

Computer operations: source and format of information, its capturing and display, computer representation and communication; structure and mechanism of computer systems; survey of computer technology.

Software operations: software development techniques & tools; elements of BASIC language; overview of software available in microcomputers: e.g. DOS (disk operating system), assembler, Fortran, Pascal.

Problem solving: overview of non-scientific data processing systems; simulation, mathematical methods, teaching applications; project: the writing and running of self-designed projects.

Ample computer time will be provided for exercises and projects.

Enrolment is limited to 30, with 10 attending each workshop.

Fee Refund: on being accepted for this course, teachers of physics and mathematics will be sent a half fee refund application form, which they should forward to the Director of Education together with their course fee receipt. This applies to all teachers in Government, aided and private schools.

718. System Simulation: an Overview. S. S. Lau, B.A. (Calif.), M.Sc. (Oklahoma). Fridays, 7.15-9.15 p.m., starting March 6, 1981. Room 227, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$140

Simulation is a general-purpose technique which can be applied to the analysis of such problems as control of inventories, priority of servicing, optimisation of telephone switch board usage, queueing problems and managerial decisions. The use of simulation is expanding rapidly, and an understanding of the techniques

used in computer simulation is becoming increasingly important to those who employ the computer to construct analytical solutions to problems which otherwise cannot be explicitly formulated. This course is designed to introduce the inciples of simulation and the application of simulation languages to the daily

systems. Examples will be drawn from many fields.

Topics to be covered include: What is a system? Why simulation? How to use computers in system simulation? Principles of model-building and techniques of system simulation. Constructing discrete system models. A brief description of different simulation languages. Demonstrating FORTRAN as a simulation language. An overview of the General Purpose Simulation System (GPSS). Verification of simulation results.

Minimun Entry Require tent: No specialized knowledge in any particular discipline is assumed. However, applicants are expected to have been introduced to computer programming and to have some knowledge in FORTRAN. Familiarity with probability and statistics is desirable.

719. Fundamentals of Computer Systems and Data Processing. W. K. Hui, B.Sc. (H.K.), C. W. Liu, B.Sc. (H.K.) and Miss S. K. Ng, B.Sc. (York) Tuesdays and Fridays, 7.15-9.15 p.m., starting February 27, 1981. Room 229, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 35 meetings.

The syllabus will include: basic components of a computer; stored-programme computer; systems software; logic operators; hardware concepts; concepts of input/output device control; concepts of files; data structures; data processing concepts; life cycle of a project, including feasibility study, systems analysis, design, specification, development, documentation, turn-over and project control; sorting techniques; concepts of programming languages; numerical methods, simple statistics; modelling and simulation.

It will be very helpful to those who are preparing to sit for the Part I examination of the British Computer Society, as this course covers most of the syllabus of the Part I General Papers. Applicants must have knowledge of at least one high level programming language such as FORTRAN, COBOL etc. They should have passed 5 subjects including English and Mathematics in the Hong Kong 'Certificate of Education Examination or equivalent.

Enrolment is limited to 30 persons.

Applicants must enclose photostat copies of appropriate certificates along with their application forms.

720. Introduction to Computer Architecture. P. Chan, B. Math. (Waterloo) M.A.C.M., M.I.E.E.E. Mondays, 7.15-8.45 p.m., starting March 2, 1981. Room 121, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$100

Students will be provided with an intelligent appreciation of computer hardware systems from both the user's and the programmer's viewpoint. Attention will also be focused on methods of interpreting the technical information provided by the hardware manufacturers. The course is intended for those who already have a basic knowledge of computer systems and would like to pursue the following topics in detail.

Review of switching theory and machine organization including data representation.

Microprocessors and microcomputers: technology; microprocessor architecture; examples of microprocessors, microcomputer organization; input and output techniques; memory management; applications.

Computer selection: selection of a computer system for a given application; economic versus technical aspects.

Mainframe versus mini versus micro: what will be the future of the computer market?

Fundamental ideas will be illustrated by practical examples.

Minimum Entry Qualifications: applicants should have preferably completed an introductory course in fundamental computer principles, e.g., the Extra-Mural course entitled "Basic Principles of Computer Systems", and/or "Fundamentals of Computer Systems and Data Processing". Knowledge of at least one high level programming language, e.g., FORTRAN, COBOL, PL/1 is required. In addition, knowledge in assembler language is highly desirable. Applicants should have passes in Mathematics and English in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination or equivalent.

721. Fundamentals of Data Communications. P. W. To, M.I.E.E.E., W. M. Pau, B.Sc. (Eng.) (H.K.), M.I.E.E.E., and K. F. Cheung, B.Sc. (Eng.) (H.K.), M.I.E.E.E. Thursdays, 7.40-9.10 p.m., starting March 12, 1981. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 12 meetings. Fee: \$120

This course discusses different aspects of data communication from the point of view of a user. It starts with elementary concepts in data communication and then works through the more complicated part of communication network design. It is designed for those who are involved in the design of large or small scale teleprocessing networks and in computer operations. Preference will be given to those with a knowledge of computer operations and electronics. Course content will include:

Date communications terms, definition, transmission codes, transmission modes, etc.;

Communication lines characteristics, line conditioning, etc.;

Modem and interfaces: principle and characteristics and applications;

Multiplexer and concentrator and their usage in line cost saving and preformance enhancement;

Brief discussion on error detection schemes, and error correction schemes;

Network protocol and line control procedures;

Network control facilities;

System design considerations and criteria, etc.

BASIC

A number of courses on the popular programming language, BASIC, which is available in most mini and micro-computers, will be offered in the summer of 1981. These courses aim to provide a training of the interactive mode of processing through the study of BASIC. They are also aimed at secondary school

teachers because of the growing importance of microprocessors in science

teaching. Use of the computer is included in all meetings.

722. Clinical Pharmacology & Therapeutics of Rheumatic Diseases. L. W. Mak, M.D. (H.K.), Ph.D. (Lond.), M.R.C.P. (U.K.), Honorary Clinical Lecturer, Department of Medicine, University of Hong Kong. Monday, 6.30-7.30 p.m., starting February 23, 1981. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 5 meetings. Fee: \$70

Rheumatoid arthritis, gout and osteoarthritis are common diseases especially amongst elderly people causing great anxiety and pain. While the etiology for these diseases has not been well established, recent advanced in therapeutics and medications have brought great relief to the sufferers. The aim of this highly specialized course is to review recent advances in the understanding of these diseases. Special emphasis will be placed on clinical pharmacology and the relative. efficacy of drug treatment. This course, organized in conjunction with the Hong Kong Pharmaceutical Society, is open to only qualified pharmacists.

723. Common Human Parasitic Diseases. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting March 24, 1981. Lecture Theatre, Old Pathology Building, Queen Mary Hospital Compound. 10 meetings. Fee: \$110

Tutors: F. W. T. Wong, M.B. (Nat. Taiwan), Ph.D. (H.K.), Lecturer in Microbiology, University of Hong Kong.

- R. C. C. Ko, B.Sc. (Manit.), M.Sc. (Br. Col.), Ph.D. (Guelph), Lecturer in Zoology, University of Hong Kong.
- S. Y. Leung, H.T.C., A.I.M.L.S., Medical Technologist, Princess Margaret Hospital.

Hong Kong is one of the S.E. Asian countries where there is a high prevalence of parasitic infections. Diseases caused by parasites are commonly seen in children and not infrequently amongst adults. The purpose of this course is to make the general public aware of the parasitic diseases found in this region. The life cycle of the parasites, their mode of transmission and the treatment of parasitic diseases will be discussed. Finally, advice will be given with respect to the control and prevention of these diseases.

Selected Topics in Physiology

The following two courses are aimed at graduate science teachers, nurses, physiotherapists and other medical and health workers who have some fundamental conception of Physiology and wish to further their knowledge in the following specialized aspects.

724. Cardiovascular Physiology. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m. (lecture), 7.30-9.00 p.m. (practicals or demonstrations when applicable), starting March 10, 1981. Lecture Theatre 1, 2 | F., Li Shu Fan Building, Sassoon Road. 8 meetings. Fee: \$150

Tutors: A. Koo, M.B., B.S., Ph.D. (H.K.), Senior Lecturer in Physiology, University of Hong Kong.

M. A. K. Y. Lung, B.Sc., Ph.D. (H.K.) and

T. M. Wong, B.Sc. (C.U.H.K.), M.Sc., Ph.D. (H.K.), Lecturers in Physiology, University of Hong Kong.

Topics to be discussed include the haematopoietic system of the body, excitation and contraction of the heart, blood pressure measurement and regulation, blood flow and other relevant control mechanisms of circulation. The pathophysiology of heart diseases and hypertension will also be discussed. When applicable, lectures will be illustrated with demonstration on the human subject or on laboratory animals. Students should have a basic knowledge of Biology at the Hong Kong Certificate of Education level or its equivalent.

725. Eye and Brain: the basis of Seeing. L. S. Jen, Ph.D. (U. Wash.), Lecturer in Anatomy, University of Hong Kong. Wednesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., (lecture), 7.30-9.00 p.m. (demonstrations or practicals when applicable), starting March 18, 1981. Lecture Theatre 1, 2/F., Li Shu Fan Building, Sassoon Road. 5 meetings. Fee: \$120

The aim of this course is to introduce basic concepts of the structures and functions of the eye and the brain. The syllabus will include: general organization of the eye; retina and visual centres in the brain; transformation of visual information and visual analysis with respect to a number of variables such as position, movement, colour, etc.; the cause and therapy of certain common visual disorders such as myopia (nearsightness), diplopia (double vision), astigmatism, glaucoma, night blindness, etc. Students are expected to have some background in Biology at the high school or post-secondary level.

Enrolment is limited to 30.

726. Basic Radiation Protection. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m. (lecture), 7.30-9.30 p.m. (demonstration and practical when applicable), starting April 7, 1981. 3/F., Radioisotope Unit, Redmond Building, Pokfulam Road, University of Hong Kong. 6 meetings.

Tutors: M. Y. Tso-Wong, B.Sc. (C.U.H.K.), M.Sc. (Miami), Ph.D. (Wisc.), Lecturer in Radioisotope Unit, University of Hong Kong. W. W. Tso, M.Sc. (Miami), Ph.D. (Wisc.), Lecturer in Biochemistry, Chinese University of Hong Kong.

Paramedical and industrial workers dealing with X-rays and radioactive materials need to understand the basic principles of radiation protection. With this in mind, the following topics will be covered: physical aspects of radiation, biological effects of radiation, radiation dosimetry, basic standards of protection, external and internal radiation hazards, radiation survey and personnel monitoring, practical aspects of the use of radioactive material and the use of radiation technology in Hong Kong.

Enrolment is limited to 30. Although no qualification criteria are necessary for enrolment, it is preferable that students have some science background at least up to to the H.K. Certificate of Education level or its equivalent.

727. Actions of Drugs. Thursdays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting March 5, 1981. Lecture Theatre 1, 2/F., Li Shu Fan Building, Sassoon Road. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$100

Tutors: Dennis M. F. Li, B.Sc., Ph.D. (Monash) and John C. L. Wong, B.Sc., M.Phil. (H.K.), Ph.D. (Monash), Lecturers in Pharmacology, University of Hong Kong.

Drugs are administered to man for the treatment or prevention of disease. All drugs, however, do produce unwanted or toxic effects. The pharmacological actions and adverse reactions as well as the clinical applications of various groups of drugs, such as antineoplastic drugs, antihistamines, antibiotics, diuretics, vitamins and hormones will be discussed. A session on "drug abuse" will also be included.

This course is intended for dispensers, nurses, and those employed in the pharmaceutical industry. Students are expected to have a basic knowledge in Biology and Chemistry at least at the Hong Kong Certificate of Education level or its equivalent. It is preferable, although not a prerequisite, that intending students have attended the Extra-mural course, "Introductory Pharmacology".

728. 日常樂理學 (Drugs in Common Use)

主講人:黃澤霖博士(香港大學藥理系講師)。

(共十講)。學費:一百元。

講授語言: 粤語(輔以英語)。

目前藥物已成爲我們生活不可缺少的一部分。不但在生病時我們須要服藥, 就是在日常生活中如吸煙,飲酒,喝茶或咖啡等亦服用了相當數量的藥物。因此我 們應該具備普通的藥理學常識,使我們能明瞭及適當地應用藥物。

本課程將介紹人體對藥物的吸收,轉化及排泄,與及各類藥物對人體所產生的藥理作用,其副作用及毒性等。學員毋須具備醫學知識,本課程適合任何對藥物有與趣的人士參加。

731. 婦女與健康護理 (Health Care for Women)

(共十四講)。學費:八十五元。

本課程旨在爲婦女提供有關她們身體機能之基本認識,對婦女不同年齡應注意 之健康問題及各類普通疾病的料理作深入淺出之討論。課程內容包括:婦女生理剖 析,青春期及更年期,妊娠前後及母乳哺飼,節育與不孕,整容,健美,減肥,受 心理影響的疾病,白帶與性病,癌症及其預防,在職婦女問題及吸烟的害處。

732. Counselling Specifics for Workers in the Helping Professions. Peter M. Whyte, Dean of Students. University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-8.15 p.m., starting February 24, 1981. Room 230, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The first four lectures will explore the principles and constructs of Counselling, the skills which a counsellor must develop, and systematically study the universal qualities of clients.

The succeeding eight lectures will deal with specific problem areas or counselling approaches. Some of the topics which will be treated are: death, privacy, hostility, the disturbed family, the disturbed child, hypnosis and relaxation, the sexually disturbed, communication techniques and group experience.

733. Children's Work and Play: the Montessori Way. Charles F. Rossow, B.A. (Minn.), M.Ed. (Harvard), Montessori Diplomate (M.M.T.O.). Mondays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting February 16, 1981. Caritas St. Francis Kindergarten, 3/F., Caritas Building, 2 Caine Road, Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$120

Teachers, social workers and others, working in kindergartens, child care centres, residential homes etc., whose duties bring them into daily contact with young children up to the age of six, will be introduced to the Montessori method, which is heavily based on the observation of young children. Guided observations of such children will therefore form an important element of the course.

Topics to be discussed will include: Montessori philosophy; sensorial education; the 3 Selfs—self-motivation, self-teaching, self-discipline; sequential learning, movement and learning; prepared environment; the teacher; ground rules; preparation of learning materials, approaches to numerical concepts and daily life routines.

Participants will be involved in developing education kits utilizing Montesson principles. The first hour will be generally devoted to lectures and the second hour devoted to discussion and demonstration.

This course is co-sponsored by the Caritas Child Care Service.

734. Ministering to the Terminally III. David McCormick, B.Soc.Sc. (U.C.), M.Div., Ph.D. (Southwestern Theological Seminary). Mondays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 23, 1981. Room 16, Extra-Mural Town Centre, 8/F., Wing On Centre. 9 meetings. Fee: \$85

The purpose of this course is to better prepare the professional caring community—doctors, nurses, hospital staff, social workers, ministers, etc.—and interested lay people in dealing with the terminally ill and their problems. Objectives of ministry to the dying, the terminal trajectory and stages of dying will be examined. The specific problems of confirmation of diagnosis, defining

death, euthanasia and prolonging life will be discussed. Understanding family grief, family relationships and reaction, and developing a team approach in such work will also be considered.

735. Management Concepts for Social Workers. David G. Race, B.Sc. (U.M.I.S.T.), Ph.D. (Reading), Lecturer in Social Administration, University of Hong Kong. Mondays, 6.30–8.00 p.m., starting March 2, 1981. Room 201, Duke of Windsor Social Service Building, 15 Hennessy Road, Wanchai. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$05

Practising social workers will be introduced to concepts from the field of management studies which have relevance to their work. No attempt will be made to create managers out of social workers, but to try and bridge the communication gap which often exists between fieldworkers and the organizational hierarchy.

Topics covered will include: General views on management and on organizations. Social welfare organizations: problems of bureaucracy, problems of professionals in organizations. Assessment and measurement of work: history of work measurement, "scientific" management, work study, productivity. Personnel management: "human relations" school, job evaluation, appraisal schemes, training and staff development. Management information systems: usage and abusage of computers in management information, overview of computing. Financial planning and control: basic concepts of cost accounting, revenue and capital finance, budgeting. Quantitative methods in management: use of operational research and statistical methods, network analysis, game theory and decision making. Resource allocation.

736. The Sociology of Medicine. John L. Anderson, M.A. (Aberd.) Lecturer in Medical Sociology, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 24, 1981. Room 416, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$95

The aim of this course is to provide a greater understanding of the social aspects of health, illness and medical care. The course is ideally suited for anyone involved in medical and health care and for interested lay persons. Recent research results suggest that non-physical aspects of disease are becoming increasingly more important. Also, the medical profession has been criticised for practising without reference to the needs of the population it serves. Such topics form the basis for a fascinating study of medicine from a totally different perspective.

The course will cover the following: the contribution of non-physical factors to the disease process; social definitions of illness; illness behaviour; doctor-patient relationships and communication; the medical profession; the politics and organisation of health care. The usual format will be a lecture followed by a brief discussion. Films will be used to illustrate particular points.

737. Woman: Problems and Prospects. Anne Hughes, B.A. (Durh), M.Phil., Ac.Dip.Ed. (Lond.), Lecturer in Education, University of Hong Kong; Mark Fisher, M.A. (Oxon), Lecturer in Philosophy, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 1.30-3.30 p.m., starting February 24, 1981. Annex Hall, Y.W.C.A. Headquarters, I Macdonnell Road, Hong Kong. 6 meetings. Fee: \$100

Some of the issues which have been raised by the Women's Movement over the last few years will be examined. The position of women in society and the arguments for and against changing that position will be considered. Myths and facts about women, socialisation processes, educational issues, the representation of women by the media, women's role in the family and in the wider society will all be discussed.

This course is co-sponsored by the Hong Kong Young Women's Christian Association.

學 費:九十元。

青年階段的特色是生理、心理、精神及智力快速增長時期;是喜歡嘗試,冒險時期;是充滿理想,幻想時期;更是心緒凌亂,尋找自我時期。青年需要成人輔助以準備進入成年生活。若教師明白青年需要,在教學或課餘提供適當家庭生活教育課程,自然更易了解及隨時協助彼等解决難題。「香港社會福利」白皮書指出家庭生活教育將是香港青少年與家庭服務之一重點工作,而教師在此工作之影响力不容忽視。

本課程特爲中學教師而設,以家庭生活教育範圍內有關青年部份爲中心,着 重討論青年在身心成長,自我觀念,家人相處,友伴、性觀念,異性交往,前途、 戀愛、婚姻等所引起之問題。各專題均運用小組活動、討論、角色扮演等技巧,啟發參加者之實際感受,分享彼此之經驗及着重個人參予及主動策劃,以收理論實踐並重之效;各講題之內容分配及小組技巧之運用,皆務求適合於課室環境下推行,使壓員日後能適當地應用於實際工作中。

自一九七一年以來,學校社會工作漸漸發展起來,頗受社會人士及教育工作 者所關注;「香港社會福利白皮書」決議香港將全面性提供學校社會工作及學生輔 導工作。本課程專爲教師、學校行政人員及準學生輔導員而設,旨在探討並介紹學 校社會工作目前之發展情況,社會工作者在學校與師生之關係,工作方法和貢獻。

課程包括學校社會工作之目的、方式及發展趨向;目前香港社工的發展;學校辦社工之條件和方法;社工人員、教師、行政人員、家長及其他專業人員之間的關係;教師與社工人員之分工與合作; 就學青少年的發展過程 , 需要及常遇之難題;個案之研究;在學校中如何運用社會工作方法——包括個人、小組及社區的工作形式,技巧及社會資源的運用等。除講授外,並輔以幻燈片介紹,小組討論及角色示範等。

由於社會的急劇改變及中西文化的衝突,青年人所面對的挑戰和壓力不斷增加,對社會的適應往往發生困難,青年輔導工作已成爲協助青年成長重要的一環。 本課程目的是提高學員對青年問題的認識,增强彼等與青年建立關係之能力及提供 適當輔導技巧。

發展性小組工作着重協助人際關係之建立、生長與發展。其目的在提供適當 之機會給予每一小組之組員,在融洽、安穩及互助之氣氛下,嘗試新的社交方法, 並實習扮演新的人生角色。課程範圍將包括下列各項:互相認識及互信;緊張情緒 之鬆弛及自我之描述;內省;生活圈; 友誼研究:心聲之溝通; 個人在小組之角 色;領袖才能;社會性的戲劇或角式扮演;自我檢討。

小組工作是青少年工作中最常見的一種社會工作方法,但究竟什麼是 小 組 工作? 時下青少年的心態,需要又是什麼?作爲青少年工作者所負的使命爲何?在不同的場合中,如青少年中心、學校、住院服務、怎樣有效地運用小組工作?

本課程專爲現職而未有正式訓練之靑少年工作者及教師而設。旨在提供有關小 組工作之基本理論及概念,並協助學員了解小組裏常見的現象,加以分析,從而探 計帶領小組的技巧。


