

Courses

The Department aims to provide a wide variety of courses, on subjects appropriate to University provision, wherever they are needed throughout Hong Kong generally.

This programme contains the 151 courses so far planned for the 1962/63 session (some additional courses will be offered later), and we sincerely hope you will find included the course you want. If so, we look forward to receiving your application; if not, please help us to help you by letting us know your needs. If you find the day, time, language or meeting place of a course inconvenient, please tell us frankly—it may be possible to make alternative arrangements to meet your demand.

Classes normally last for at least 1 hour.

Enrolment

Applications should be made to the Director on Application Forms (available from the Department) and must be accompanied by the appropriate fee.

Courses are normally open to all adults who are interested, except for a few courses for which certain basic qualifications are required.

Applications for courses commencing in September or early October should be received by Sept. 15th, 1962. Otherwise the closing date is a fortnight before the course begins. It is always helpful and wise to apply in good time in order to ensure your enrolment and that the course takes place. If there is unsatisfactory enrolment the Director reserves the right to cancel any course or make alternative arrangements. The Director may, at his discretion, refuse an applicant. If for any reason you are not accepted, you will be notified and your fee returned to you. However, if you do not hear otherwise before the course starts, you may assume that you have been accepted and you should attend the first meeting at the time and place advertised when enrolment will be confirmed.

Certificates of Attendance are issued, on request, to those who have attended not less than two-thirds of a course of at least 20 meetings in length



It will treat of the nature of social psychology, and its main methods, together with applications of its use in private homes, in factories and in offices, and in youth clubs, schools and the like. Films and slides will be shown, and illustrative case-studies quoted. Questions and discussion will be invited at the end of each session. A very suitable course for parents, youth leaders, nurses, and social workers, as well as for employers and all those who have to deal with other people in the course of their daily work.

23 Psychology for Teachers

This course will give a simple, clear exposition of the nature and methods of modern psychology applied to teaching problems and to the task of efficient school management. Useful hints on improved teaching methods, and on how to study and learn more effectively will be given, and special difficulties encountered in pupils (like backwardness and inattention and misbehaviour) will be discussed, and lines of treatment recommended. Films, slides and pupil case-studies will be shown, and questions and free discussion encouraged.

This course will provide a comprehensive explanation of the principles of assessing income liable to Hong Kong income tax.

Particular regard will be given to the constitution of the various departments of the Inland Revenue, including the powers and duties of the Board of Inland Revenue-the Board of Review—Commissioners and Assessors—The Liability and assessment of income to Property Tax—Salaries Tax—The profits of Sole traders—Partnerships—Companies Profits Tax—Interest Tax—Treatment of Loss claims—Personal assessments—Appeals.

39 Business Forecasting

This course presents techniques for identifying current level and predicting future level of business activity. A study is made of typical business cycle behaviour, significant business indicators and methods of forecasting, including graphical analysis, trend projection, and correlation and regression analysis. Applications of business forecasting include specific industry projections, evaluation of market potential for a company's product, and estimating potential value of investment stocks.

40 Economics of Full Employment

A sound understanding of these principles and their use is indispensable for the designer. In fact, in the world today there is such a bewilderingly wide range of goods that the average person constantly feels the needs to learn more about design.

The course consists of practical exercises in design in a graphic form; each week students will work out some problem. By the end of the course it is hoped that a good introductory survey of design will have been made.

A study of any period in the history of architecture reveals both the unchanging qualities and principles of architectural design, and the particular influences of time and place which give the period its own characteristics. Against this background, the course will cover the development of Christian architecture from the founding of the earliest churches in Rome to the emergence of the Gothic style in twelfth-century France. It will be seen how regional variations on an early-established plan were combined with a progressive development in structure, and how the consequent complexities of internal space and external form were resolved in an intergration characteristic of all great architecture. To this, wall paintings, glowing mosaics, and sculpture sometimes of fantastic imagery, were applied in an educational as well as a decorative role.

The lectures will be illustrated by slides specially taken during a recent study of the salient buildings by the Tutor.

If there is sufficient demand this course will form the first in a series dealing with the history of Architecture, both Western and Oriental.

During the last two years great numbers of students have enrolled for these courses and the present programme is the result of careful planning based on the tutors' experience of what students really need and on syllabuses which have proved their practical value in University and Extra-Mural courses.

Most of the tutors bave conducted these courses before with considerable success, and though there may be a variation in syllabus or in approach, the standards and aims of all are the same. The meeting places are so arranged that most students should be able to join a class near to their place of work or residence and so save in travelling as well as giving the class local roots.




