



GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. There are normally no entry requirements, except that applicants should be over 18 years of age, though occasionally, if a course is to have real value, applicants must possess certain defined qualifications.
- The Director may, at his discretion, refuse to admit an applicant.
- 3. Application may not be accepted once the maximum limit is reached. The Department would therefore appreciate early enrolment by applicants.
- 4. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extral-Mural lectures will be held:
 - a) On all public holidays.
 - At a storm warning signal of No. 5 or above.

9 PAPER SCULPTURE FOR BEGINNERS

Time: Mondays 6—8 p.m., starting Sept. 20, 1965 Place: King's College, Bonham Road., Hong Kong No. of Meetings: 12, once weekly Fee: \$48 Tutor: Mr. Peter Lam, Lecturer in Art, N. T. C.

The aim of this course is mainly designed for school teachers and those who are keen to make paper sculpture for their pastime. The course will include instructions in the handling of materials, selecting of subject-matters and expressing of ideas in the form of 3—D art. Paper models, solids and volumes will also be attempted.

Students are required to provide their own materials. Enrolment is limited to 25.

10 PAINTING FOR BEGINNERS

Time: Mondays 6—8 p.m., starting Sept. 20, 1965

Place: Grantham Training College, Gascoigne Rd.,

Kowloon

No. of Meetings: 12, once weekly Fee: \$48 Tutor: Mr. Y. T. Kwong M. Sc. (Kansas) U. S. A.

This course is designed to provide a grounding for the complete beginner and to act as a stimulus for persons with little experience in painting. Each session will be divided into two sections, a short illustrated talk and demonstration of method, which will then be developed individually in a longer practical period. Basic principles of design and the elements of composition, such as the use of line, tone, texture and colour will be taught. Experiments will be made in a variety of media such as ink, chalk, pencil, poster and water colour.

Students will provide their own materials. Enrolment is limited to 25.

11 SOCIAL CRITICISM IN ART

Time: Tuesdays at 6.15 p.m., starting Oct. 5 1965 Place: British Council Library, Gloucester Bldg.,

H. K.

No. of Meetings: 10, once weekly Fee: \$ 20 Tutor: Mr. Frederick Joss, Diploma, Art and Crafts, State Academy for Applied Art, Vienna, F. R. S. A.

This course will deal with the motive forces and social effects of art; it will cover but not confine itself to the sphere of satire and humour, e. g. Deliberate Humourous and Satirical Art in Pre-History; Political Graphic Satire in Ancient Egypt, China, Rome etc.; Humour in Medieval Satanic Art (West) and comparable phenomena in China, Korea and Japan; How the Spanish Inquisition gave England Cartoon and Caricature, Western Definitions of Caricature and Cartoon; Modern Press Cartoon, Comic strip and animated Cartoon.

It will consider the border areas of art and propaganda, of taste and interest, in the changing light of historical development, with references to nature, purpose and forms of criticism. This course will not avoid but rather highlight the controversial. Art books from the British Council Library will serve for illustration.

12 MORE SKETCHING FOR PLEASURE

Time: Wednesdays 6.15—8.15 p.m.,

starting Sept. 22, 1965

No. of Meetings: 12, once weekly Fee: \$48 Tutor: Mr. Frederick Joss, Diploma Art and Crafts, State Academy for Applied Art, Vienna,, F. R. S. A.

Sketching—both by artists and non—artists—is vastly different from formal drawing or painting. Spontaneity and speed come first not skill or experience. Professional artists sketch to retain or regain freshness and freedom. Amateurs may discover themselves to be born sketchers. Even aimless doodling relieves tension. Professionals and amateurs (skilled or unskilled) will be encouraged to sketch all manner of objects, alive or otherwise: faces, figures, animals, trees, vehicles, toys, flowers-anything that comes handy, and will keep reasonably still for a few minutes. Media: pencil, pen, brush, chalk, fingers-anything. Light and weather permitting, part of the time will be spent sketching out of doors: at the waterfront, in gardens, on roof tops etc. Enrolment is limited to 30.

13 CERAMICS FOR BEGINNERS

Time: Wednesdays 6-8 p.m., starting Oct. 13, 1965

Mrs. L. Y. Y. Stenqvist Higher Diploma, The National School of Applied Arts, Stockholm, (Sweden)

In this course the students are taught various methods of handbuilt pottery, the decorating and glazing of the wares they produce.

Students will provide their own equipments, but there will be an extra charge on clay and glazes at about 50¢ per 100gr.; payable to the Tutor when the object is completed.

These 12 classes in General Design as seen in Textiles, Interior Decoration & Graphic Work are more than appreciation lectures in that students will be encouraged to carry out sketches and designs each week, completing them at home if necessary, for discussion the following week. By participation students will learn the principles of design more thoroughly. Some previous experience in art work is necessary. Those enrolling in the classes will be given details of the materials required.

Criticism and discussion will be given on the completion of each picture.
