


May the Extra-Mural Department, in the years to come, continue to grow and develop in the tradition it has already established.

PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL COURSES

The Department, by special agreement with the Chartered Institute of Secretaries, London, acts as local examiner for the four subjects in their Intermediate Examination, namely, Economic Theory, Accounting, General Principles of English Law and English. This "Intermediate Sessional Examination" will be held in May each year. Successful Candidates will then be recognised by the Chartered Institute of Secretaries, London, as having satisfied their Intermediate Examination requirements. However only registered students of the Chartered Institute of Secretaries who have enrolled for and attended 75% of each of the above four courses, organised by the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, are eligible to sit for it. The purpose of this arrangement is to enable the course syllabuses and the examination papers to be more closely related to local conditions; the questions are set and examination papers are marked by the tutors who lecture on the subjects. Both the examination questions and the papers are sent to the Institute for moderation and approval of results.

The Department also offers other professional and vocational courses which are specially designed to follow the syllabuses of the various professional examinations. These professional examinations are the Chartered Institute of Secretaries Intermediate and Final Examinations; the Association of Certified and Corporate Accountants Intermediate and Final Examinations; the Corporation of Secretaries Intermediate and Final Examinations; the Association of Incorporated Accountants Intermediate and Final Examinations; the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors First and Intermediate Examinations; the Solicitors' Parts I & II Qualifying Examinations; the Institute of Bankers Parts I & II Examinations.

The Department offers a Librarianship Certificate Course in cooperation with the Hon, Kong Library Association, preparing candidates for the United Kingdom Library Association Part I Examination.

In addition the Department offers London LL.B. External Degree courses whereby, through special arrangement with the *University of London*, qualified persons may study for the London LL.B. External Degree after office hours and over a shorter period of time than hitherto possible (that is, in three years instead of five).

Courses designed to form part of the academic training in Housing Management are also offered.

All the above professional and vocational courses are open to all interested, but those wishing to sit for the various examinations should make their own arrangements unless specified otherwise and should ensure beforehand that they have the necessary entry qualifications.

The Department welcomes the opportunity to cooperate with local organizations, and professional institutions to arrange special professional and vocational courses which meet the needs of Hong Kong.


