GENERAL INFORMATION

1. There are normally no entry requirements, except that applicants should be over 18 years of age, though occasionally, to have the full benefit of a course, applicants must possess certain defined qualifications. Therefore, applicants are advised to read the description of a course carefully.
2. The Director may, at his discretion, refuse to admit an applicant.
3. Unless otherwise arranged, no Extra-Mural lectures will be held:—
 - a) On all public holidays.
 - b) At a storm warning signal of No. 5 or above.
 - c) During the following holiday period:
7th February, to 12th February, 1967 inclusive (Chinese New Year).
4. The course fee will cover the entire duration of a course.
5. Lectures are usually of one hour duration, unless otherwise stated.
6. Certificates of Attendance are issued, on payment of 50 cents, to those who have attended not less than two-thirds of a course of at least 20 meetings in duration.
7. Closing date for enrolment: *One week before the starting date of a course.* Late enrolments may not be accepted. However, applications are normally not accepted once the maximum limit is reached. The Department would therefore appreciate early enrolment by applicants.

After a period of disciplined work, students will be encouraged to experiment with greater freedom. Various media will be employed and different design possibilities will be explored. Problems will be planned to stimulate students' imagination and creativity.

Students will provide their own materials which will be announced in class. *Enrolment is limited to 25.*

20. INTERMEDIATE CERAMICS

This course is for those who either have completed the course "Ceramics for Beginners" or have a sufficient basis of ceramic knowledge. The first course dealt with the basic techniques of building pottery by hand. Now there will be more ventures into forms, more variations and experiments in decorating and glazing. The objects to be produced by students will be both functional and non-functional. There will be an extra charge for clay and glazes, at 60 cents for one hundred grams, to be paid to Mrs. Mellor as each object is finished.

21. THE HISTORY AND ART OF CHINESE SEALS

The course will be amply illustrated with slides and there will be a demonstration of seal engraving. Some previous knowledge of styles of Chinese characters would be useful but not essential.

The purpose of this course is to examine by means of both practical studio work and critical discussion the nature of colour and its various application in visual arts, with emphasis on contemporary trends.

Topics to be studied will include: basic design concepts, modulation of colour, transparency of colour, optical mixing of colour, colour and visual vibrations, colour and visual space etc.

Each lecture will be divided into two parts. The first hour will be devoted to the theory and criticism of studio projects, while the second hour will be spent on studio exercises, with the aid of special colour papers.

An introductory course in modern social psychology for all those who work with people—in schools, youth clubs, hospitals, offices and factories. A brief outline of the methods and results of modern psychology will be given, followed by topics like: understanding our relationships with others, studies in social motivation, personality development and problems, physical, intellectual and emotional aspects of behaviour, modes of adjustment, discipline problems and hints on influencing and managing young people, improving our working relations with others, morale in business and industry, case-studies, mental health aspects. There will be some films and slides, discussion of case-histories and typical problem-situations. Lectures will include ample time for questions, and for discussion.

Tutor: Mr. J.C. Nicholls, B.A. (Hons.) London, Dip. Ed. (Bristol); Senior Lecturer (English), St. Matthias College of Education, Bristol; Exchange Lecturer, N.T.C.

This is intended for people who care about what children read and particularly those who think that learning a language should include imaginative experience realized in that language.

By means of a close study and practical criticism of selected texts, through lectures designed as comment on more extensive reading, and group discussion, an attempt will be made to clarify the main characteristics of authentic children's literature. Particular attention will be given to modern writers and sources of information about their work. An assessment of the developmental needs and probable language skills of children in the upper primary and lower secondary classes has been used as a guide in the selection of texts for study.
