



GRADUATE SCHOOL

The Graduate School is both an administrative and academic unit, which co-ordinates University-wide activities related to postgraduate education. We work closely with departments and faculties to ensure that the University provides the best possible intellectual training to our MPhil and PhD students. In addition to organizing basic research training to students of all faculties, we render different scopes of support and services to cater for the needs of all MPhil and PhD students.

1 Computer Induction Programmes

The Graduate School, in collaboration with the Computer Centre, runs a number of computer induction programmes for research postgraduate students every year. The following programmes will be conducted in this academic year:

- Introduction to MS Windows ME
- PC & Network Services
- Microsoft Word 2000 for Windows ME
- Microsoft Excel 2000 for Windows ME
- Microsoft PowerPoint 2000 for Windows ME

2 Cantonese Courses

Cantonese is the mother tongue of Hong Kong people. There are many students enrolled in our research postgraduate programmes, who are from Mainland China and overseas. In order to help them mingle with local counterparts and Hong Kong culture more easily and quickly, the Graduate School runs the following courses for non-native speakers:

- I Cantonese Courses for Social Purposes for Expatriates
- II Cantonese Courses for Social Purposes for Mainland Students

3 Support Services

I Graduate Student Writing Support Service

To supplement the language courses in our new curricula, the Graduate School, in collaboration with the English Centre, offers a one-to-one Graduate Student Writing Service to research postgraduate students. The service aims to give individual advice and feedback on academic writing.

Students are required to submit a substantial piece of writing, which is to be reviewed by a teacher in the English Centre. Writing problems will be diagnosed and pointed out and brought to the attention of each individual student. By raising the awareness of the language issues, it is hoped that students' writing skills can be improved as a better writer. It is however not a proofreading or editing service.

II Statistical Advice Centre for Students (STACS)

The Statistical Advice Centre for Students (STACS), jointly run by the Department of Statistics and Actuarial Science and the Graduate School, is another one-to-one support service to give expert advice to research students and their supervisors on the problems that they may encounter in the design of experiments and the interpretation of data.

Each prospective user of this service will need the consent of his/her supervisor, and will need to provide a brief description of the problems that he/she has encountered.

The above Services are available throughout the academic year, and every MPhil and PhD student is eligible up to four hours of this consultation service for free. REFLECTIONS ON, AND DISCUSSION OF, GOOD SUPERVISORY PRACTICE

A seminar tailor-made for supervisors on the topic of 'Reflections on, and Discussion of, Good Supervisory Practice' successfully took place on 11 April 2001. Nearly 30 supervisors attended the seminar.

Professor George Gordon was our honourable speaker. Professor Gordon is the Director of the Centre for Academic Practice at the University of Strathclyde, one of the leading integrated faculty and student development centres in British universities. He served as an academic auditor with the Committee of Vice-Chancellors and Principals and has written widely on matters relating to quality assurance in higher education. He has undertaken consultancies in many countries and led management development programmes in Australia, Egypt, Hong Kong, Hungary, the USA and Saudi Arabia. He has also contributed in the UK based programmes for participants from Eastern Europe, the former USSR and Indonesia.



All participants found the seminar very useful.

After the presentation given by Professor Gordon, all supervisors enthusiastically expressed their views and exchanged their supervisory experience with one another. They also raised some supervisory problems and consulted Professor Gordon for advice. All participants enjoyed a meaningful morning.

The Postgraduate Library Workshop

The Postgraduate Library Workshop is one of the e-Learning Initiatives of the HKU Libraries, which aims to help students hone their information skills, and to make their process of knowledge discovery a fruitful and enjoyable experience. As in the past, the HKU Libraries offer a series of workshops before the commencement of the academic year to equip new admits to the postgraduate programmes with the basic information skills.

This year, in order to cater for the different levels of learning needs, the Libraries have arranged two types of workshops, namely the Hands-on Workshop and the Workshop for Busy People.

Hands-on Workshop

The Hands-on Workshops will cover a library tour and hands-on experience for finding books, journal articles, dissertations, and past examination papers. A session on remote access to the information resources will also be covered. This workshop is composed of two tracks.

Students who are new to this University are encouraged to register for both tracks. However, students may choose to register for either one of the tracks according to their own background.

Library workshops offer two separate tracks:

Track A

- Session 1 – Library tour
- Session 2 – Search strategies
- Session 3 – Dragon, the HKU Libraries catalogue

Track B

- Session 1 – Finding journal articles
- Session 2 – Dissertations and HKU past examination papers
- Session 3 – Web access to resources and Question & Answer

The Workshop for Busy People is a 2-hour course covering the more advanced features of Dragon (the Libraries catalogue), the journal article databases, and the dissertations databases.
