What I have learned in many years of research is that it calls upon all your problemsolving skills and your ability to communicate ideas clearly and succinctly. I would encourage you to sharpen these skills and build on them over the years you spend with us at HKU. They will serve you well whatever career path you choose to follow in the future.

Learning To Teach

In September 2002, 25 Postgraduate Studentship holders took part in the "Learning to Teach" programme, offered by the Centre for the Advancement of University Teaching (CAUT) in co-operation with the Faculty of Education. There were over 200 applications for the 25 places on the first course. Those chosen (on a first come-first served basis) to participate came from a wide range of disciplines. They attended the two-day workshop and took part in a variety of activities to develop some basic teaching skills. After Day One, they had to adapt some of the ideas and prepare a 'lesson' which they would give on Day Two. They had a week to prepare for this. Those who attended both days received a Certificate of Attendance from the CAUT.

Day One: The group worked through some of the challenges that university teachers face, for example, teaching in English, planning lessons, motivation, and using group work.

Day Two: A week later, the students worked in small groups and 'taught' a simulated lesson to the group. They had to remember that the rest of the group did not know anything about their subject, and modify materials from their subject for the range of abilities in the group and for students with no prior knowledge or interest in the topic. Each presenter received feedback, from the group and the facilitator, who provided written feedback as well.

After their micro-teaching session, many students commented on the amount of work that goes into a 15 minute presentation. Right! This is exactly what happens in real-life university teaching. But, according to the facilitators, they all did extremely well. Everyone was nervous about micro-teaching, but once they relaxed with their groups, they had a lot of fun, whilst learning to give and receive feedback. Afterwards, the class and their teachers had lunch together.

At the end of the course, the students requested 'more, please', and we are trying to meet their needs. Some of them have formed an Advisory Panel, to help plan the next series of 'Learning To Teach' courses, which will be offered in Semester Two, and will be advertised through the Graduate School and the CAUT. But what about those who applied but could not be offered a place? Or those who might like to take a course in the future?

All of those who applied were entered into our database, and will have the opportunity to participate in future programmes. They will receive details through email. PGSA Activity: "One-day Visiting Shenzhen"

With the great help of the Liaison Office of the Central People's Government in the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region, the Shenzhen Science and Technology Bureau and the Office of Student Affairs, as well as the generous funding from the Hong Kong Bank Foundation Fund, the one-day trip to Shenzhen was successfully held on 6 September 2002.

The activity, organized by the Postgraduate Student Association (PGSA), aimed to provide an opportunity for students to know more about the development of Mainland China and enhance their understanding of the economic situation and working condition in Shenzhen.

Before the 10th Anniversary of PGSA

"When you drink the water, think of those who dug the well." Just as this Chinese proverb has said, I often sat by the window of my office and asked myself, "Who launched and founded the PGSA ten years ago? And what has PGSA experienced over these years? How have our predecessors tried their bits by relays, one after another until this year, 2002, I stuck out my hand and accepted the heavy relay baton which is deeply engraved with "PGSA".

It was late winter of 1993 when the weather was a bit chilly. The trees, grass and flowers tightened up their brown suits in case they might get a cold. Birds' laughter was gone. Maybe they were curling up under their warm quilt. There were few people walking in the street. And only from time to time, shadows of people with their hands in their pockets passed by the window. Having no time to attend to these, Mr. Fraster and his friends devoted whole-heartedly to a heated discussion. Sometimes they talked in loud and sonorous voice, sometimes in whispers, and sometimes they just kept quiet and still. Through the window, you could see people standing up, writing at the desk or thinking and

cupping chins in their hands. After a long period of time, Mr. Fraster stood up, released the pen in his hand onto the desk and said in a sonorous and determined voice, "OK, let's call it a deal. Remember, today is December 20, 1993. And the PGSA of HKU is founded."

Then everything began from the scratch: selecting logos, designing application form for membership, writing up rules and regulations, applying for the Government's permission of establishment, holding the first annual meeting, striving for the space for activities and the use of facilities, appealing for sponsors, organizing varieties of activities, founding all kinds of ballgame teams and clubs, and sending representatives to all the committees of the University. It is in this way that all the presidents have been doing their best devotedly and enthusiastically for the existence, development and prosperity of the PGSA. And let's remember them forever! They are Mr. Stuart Fraster (2 terms), Mr. Park Ng (3 terms), Mr. Ng Man Hung (2 terms), Mr. Michael Koon (1 term) and Mr. Napo Lee (1 term).



52 postgraduate students participated in the tour. We arrived in Shenzhen at 10:00am on 6 September 2002. Our itinerary included visits to Shenzhen

Science and Technology Hall, Shenzhen Virtual University Park, Hi-tech Park, Overseas Student Pioneer Park as well as Zhongxing Telecom Corporation.

During the trip, the Shenzhen Government's preferential policies on the employment and investment of returned

talents from overseas were introduced, which ranged from taxation, accounting, facilities and so on. What's more, the

general development of the 120 enterprises in Overseas Student Pioneer Park was presented. The visit to the Hitech Park was really exciting and instructive. There we not only witnessed the short but progressive history of China's Hitech industries, but also exclaimed at their great potentialities in the future. Later, the visit to one of the top IT enterprises in Mainland China, Zhongxing—Telecom Corporation, drew an end to our one-day visit to

Shenzhen.

"I must say the trip to Shenzhen was eye-opening! Through the trip, I've realized that China is indeed catching up with full speed in Hi-Tech development areas. It's also exciting to know that our Chinese Government is doing her best to encourage returning Chinese scholars to set up companies as well as to welcome them to contribute their R&D experiences and knowledge," one of the participants said.

The one-day trip to Shenzhen has not only widened our eyesight to the rapid progress of Shenzhen, but also enriched our knowledge on the development of Mainland China.



The British Chevening Scholarships for Postgraduate Study in the UK 2003-2004

The British Chevening Scholarships Scheme is a global programme funded by the British Foreign and Commonwealth Office, international and local sponsors. The scheme in the Hong Kong and Macau region is designed to support areas of commercial, social and economic interest. The scholarships shall cover tuition fees up to £14,000, the airfare to and from the UK, and a substantial contribution towards living costs.

There are two types of awards:

- Postgraduate scholarships for a one-year taught masters degree in any subject area
- Specialist scholarships for 3-6 months intensive studies in designated fields in Business Leadership, Journalism, Manufacturing Management, and Healthcare.

There are approximately 50 awards this year. Applications are invited from dynamic, forward thinking permanent residents of Hong Kong and Macau who are at a formative state of their career. Postgraduate students and fresh graduates will also be considered. Applicants should have a sound level of English, a good first degree, and work experience in a relevant field.

The deadline of the application for the British Chevening Scheme is on 27 January 2003. For further information, please contact:
