Presentation Title: Utopian Phalansteries: Designing a course

for architectural literacy

Abstract

This paper will describe the development of a new EAP course for current Year 1 Architecture students at HKU that will become one module of the English in the Discipline course for Year 2 architecture students in the four year curriculum. The course aims to provide opportunities to enhance students' linguistic range specifically in their approach to architectural literacy. Architecture students are more used to expressing their work in drawings and models but they need to justify these verbally, and there is a body of reading they are expected to engage with, to help articulate their own design concepts and to reference well-known architectural work. They also need to produce short written texts for their portfolios. The course has been developed in response to these demands, specifically reading long critical texts, analyzing genre-specific features of architectural writing, and dealing with impromptu answers to the unexpected questions typical of the design studio. In this presentation we will explain the theoretical framework underpinning our course, and provide examples of the way this has been implemented.

Biodata

Peter Voller has taught in England, Italy, Japan and Hong Kong. He is co-ordinator of self-access language learning in CAES and organises language advising services in the HKU Language Resource Centre. He teaches MA courses in applied linguistics, EAP courses for architecture undergraduates and a broadening course in queer literature and history. His main research interests are autonomous learning, language advising, queer theory and architectural discourse.

Liz Samson taught in Iran before coming to HKU. Currently, she co-ordinates English Enhancement courses for the Faculty of Architecture and also teaches on a range of other courses. She is involved in teaching on the Centre's MA and PDipES programmes and has collaborated on the setting up of a pronunciation and speech website for Chinese learners of English.
