A WORD FROM OUR CHAIRMAN

"The Law Association? - Sewhat?"
Many of you are probably asking
yourself this question right now,
and, frankly speaking, there is
no ready answer. But let us consider the Law Association for
a moment.

We have had a short history of 7 years. Our 'birth' in itself was a painful experience. There had been much opposition from the Union Council before we were grant the status of a faculty society. But even then, we have always been treated (to a certain extent as outsiders. Our former site in Caine Road did much to enhance this image. Even after having made our move to the Main Campus, this had persisted. Recently, I had a talk with a 866enees

But let us look at some facts. Members of the Law Association have always been active in the University. We have produced many members who have held responsible posts in the various halls and clubs. 



We gather there has been some discussion among the Law students concerning the Law Librarian's request that students reshelve after use materials consulted in the Law Library, so perhaps it would be helpful if we invite Mrs. Shaw to go into this in more detail. Here is what Mrs. Shaw wants to say -

I am sure that every user of the Library has experienced the frustration of not finding on the shelf the law reports volume required and, after a time-consuming walk around the Library, finally locating the yolume amongst an abandoned pile of books on someone else's desk. How much better it would have been if the previous reader had reshelved the volume after use ! We cannot, as I will explain. have library staff rushing around reshelving non-stop and, if we did. I should think it would be rather disturbing to those studying in the Library, anyway especially as the volumes to be reshelved would always be from the same area of shelving.

During term the Library is open long hours and a rather complicated shift work time-table has had to be devised to ensure that at least one attendant and one Library assistant are on duty at all times. The Law Library attendants, unlike the Main Library attendants, are not employed solely to shelve. They must also supervise the Leans Counter, look after the issuing and returning of reserved books and also carry out various messengering duties from time to time. The library assistants (all of whom have their own special duties to perform) sometimes have to fill in at the Loans Counter, especially in the evenings or on weekends, so that the attendant on duty can get on with some of his other work. Books pile up on the tables in the Library during the day and, even if one of the attendants is able to put in a couple of hours of shelving during the afternoon, sufficient books will accumulate after that to necessitate another 2-3 hours

that the Library will be neat and tidy at opening time the following morning.

Depending on the staffing situation. we can semetimes get some shelving done on weekday mernings but generally there is nothing much to be shelved then as most students are at lectures and do not come into the Library to study until after about 11 a.m. We have, over the past week, kept statistics to the number of volumes collected at different times in the Library, the type of material involved and the time it takes to collect the material, sort it and reshelve it. Most of the material for reshelving (three quarters of it, at least) consists of volumes of various law reports series and usually it is much the same collection of volumes which is being reshelved several times a day.

Therefore, we should be most grateful to those of you who can spare the time to reshelve your books after study, when leaving the Library for a break or to attend a lecture, and I am sure that a classmates looking for the same books will be most grateful too. If you do not have time to reshelve everything the most important items are the law reports as the use of these is the heaviest.

Our attendants will, of course, continue to tidy the Library up when they can but, as they often are not free to do this when the need is greatest you will all be helping each other a great deal if you reshelve what you have used at least once a day and preferably before you go to lunch as 12-3 tends to be our most difficult peried.
